DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, June 1, 1895.

In accordance with the provisions of section 51, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Department of Public Works makes the following report of its transactions for the week ending May 25, 1895:

Public Moneys Received during the Week.—For Croton water rents, \$95,153.11; for penalties, water rents, \$109.80; for tapping Croton pipes, \$293.50; for sewer permits, \$406.00; for restoring and repaving—Special Fund, \$4,062.83; for redemption of obstructions seized, \$33.50; for vault permits, \$10,716.66; total, \$110,775.40.

Public Lamps.—14 new lamps lighted, 2 old lamps relighted, 24 old lamps discontinued, 35 lamp-posts removed, 15 lamp-posts reset, 16 lamp-posts straightened, 10 columns releaded, 2 columns refitted, 11 service pipes refitted, 7 stand pipes refitted.

Permits Issued.—64 permits to tap Croton pipes, 58 permits to open streets, 17 permits to make sewer connections, 22 permits to repair sewer connections, 187 permits to place building material on streets, 36 permits, special, 8 permits to construct street vaults.

Repairing and Cleaning Sewers.—90 receiving-basins relieved, 99 receiving-basins and culverts cleaned, 6,130 lineal feet of sewer cleaned, 8,900 lineal feet of sewer relieved, 14,700 lineal feet of sewer examined, 7 lineal feet of brick sewer rebuilt, 5 manhole heads reset, 10 lineal feet of pipe culvert laid, 3 lineal feet of spur pipe laid, 1 new receiving-basin built, 2 new manhole heads and covers put on, 10 new manhole covers put on, 8 new basin covers put on, 71 cubic feet of brickwork built, 26 square feet flagging relaid, 16 square yards of pavement relaid, 120 cubic feet of earth excavated and refilled, 2 cart-loads of earth filling, 260 cart-loads of dirt removed.

Obstructions Removed.—17 obstructions removed from various streets and avenues.

Repairs to Pavement.—6,307 square yards of pavement repaired.

Opening of Proposals.

The Comptroller, by representative, attended the opening of proposals at the following Departments, viz.:

June 20. The Department of Street Improvements, 23d and 24th Wards—For regulating, grading, etc., and construction of sewers in the several streets and avenues enumerated in the advertisement of said department, dated June 6, 1895, published in the CITY RECORD.

June 22. The Fire Department—For furnishing 6,250 tons of coal.

Approval of Sureties.
