AN ORDINANCE forbidding the presence of dogs in the streets, highways and public places of The City of New York except under certain restrictions.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:
Section 1. Hereafter it shall be unlawful to permit any dog to go abroad loose or at large in any of the streets, highways or public places in The City of New York, unless such dog shall be securely muzzled so that it shall be impossible for it to bite, tear or otherwise wound with the teeth any human being or other animal.

Sec. 2. The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals is hereby appointed, empowered and directed to secure the enforcement of this ordinance by taking and detaining any dog found going abroad loose or at large and not muzzled as aforesaid, and the said society is hereby authorized to decide upon the sufficiency of the muzzle used in any and all cases arising under this ordinance. In case a dog taken as aforesaid shall have been duly licensed as required by law, and have a license tag attached to its collar, it shall be the duty of the said society forthwith to notify the owner thereof at the place of residence recorded by the society when the license was issued, and the owner shall be entitled to recover the dog on payment of three dollars (\$3) to the said society. The said society shall thereupon release the said dog to the owner. All moneys collected for the redemption of licensed dogs pursuant to this ordinance shall be paid monthly by the said society to the Chamberlain of The City of New York.

Sec. 3. If any licensed dog taken and detained pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance shall not, within three days after its taking, be recovered by its owner, in accordance with the provisions of section 2 of this ordinance, the said dog shall be disposed of in such manner as shall be directed by the Commissioner of Health, after notice by mail to the licensee of such dog, addressed to his residence as recorded by the said Society. Dogs not licensed which may be taken by the said Society shall be disposed of in accordance with chapter 115 of the Laws of 1894 and the amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. Nothing in this ordinance shall prevent the presence of any dog without a muzzle in any street, highway or public place, provided such dog shall be in charge of a competent person, and shall be securely held by a chain or leather strap not more than four feet long.

Sec. 5. Section 672 of the Revised Ordinances of 1897 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Sections 39 and 106 of the Plumbing Rules and Regulations of the Borough of Brooklyn are hereby amended to read:

Sec. 39. "All connections between lead pipes and between brass or copper pipes must be made by means of wiped solder joints, and all floor flanges of all sanitary fixtures and all connections between said fixtures and waste or soil pipes, where said connections are on outlet or sewer side of trap, shall be made without the use of red lead, putty, plaster, cement or any other similar substance."

Sec. 106. "All earthenware traps must have heavy brass floor plates, soldered to the lead bends, or, where brass or iron pipes are used, to be screwed to the same and bolted to the trap flange, and the joint to be made gas-tight without the use of red or white lead or any similar substance or rubber washers, the use of which, in the making of said connections, is hereby prohibited, and no device for such connections will be permitted to be used unless it has been approved by the Bureau of Buildings."

The Plumbing Rules and Regulations for the Borough of Brooklyn are hereby amended by adding the following sections:

PART XVI.

Gas Piping and Fixtures.

Sec. 161. Hereafter the gas piping and fixtures in all new buildings and all alterations and extensions made to the gas piping or fixtures in old buildings must be done in accordance with the following rules, which are made in accordance with the provisions of section 89 of the Building Code.

For additional requirements of public buildings, theatres and places of assemblage, see Part XXI. of the Building Code.

Sec. 162. Before the construction or alteration of any gas piping in any building or part of any building, a permit must be obtained from the Superintendent of Buildings. This permit will be issued only to a registered plumber and in conjunction with the permit for plumbing and drainage. Application must include all floor plans complete, showing each and every outlet and the number of burners to go on each outlet. Small alterations may be made by notifying the Bureau of Buildings, using the same blank forms provided for alterations and repairs to plumbing.

Sec. 163. Before any fixtures are connected with the gas piping, a permit must be obtained from the Superintendent of Buildings, application for same to be made on forms furnished by the Bureau of Buildings.

Sec. 164. All gas pipe shall be of the best quality wrought iron and of the kind classed as standard pipe and shall weigh according to the following scale:

3/8-inch, 0.56 pounds per foot;
1/2-inch, 0.85 pounds per foot;
3/4-inch, 1.12 pounds per foot;
1-inch, 1.67 pounds per foot;
1 1/4-inch, 2.24 pounds per foot;
2-inch, 2.68 pounds per foot;
2 1/2-inch, 3.61 pounds per foot;
3-inch, 5.75 pounds per foot;

3-inch, 7.54 pounds per foot;

3½-inch, 9.00 pounds per foot;

4-inch, 10.66 pounds per foot.

No pipe allowed of less than ¾ inch in diameter.

Sec. 165. All fittings (excepting stop cocks or valves) shall be of malleable iron.

Sec. 166. There shall be a heavy brass straightway cock or valve on the service pipe immediately inside the front foundation wall.

Iron cocks or valves are not permitted.

Sec. 167. Where it is not impracticable so to do, all risers shall be left not more than five feet from front wall.

Sec. 168. No pipe shall be laid so as to support any weight (except fixtures) or be subjected to any strain whatsoever. All pipe shall be properly laid and fastened

to prevent becoming trapped, and shall be laid, when practicable, above timbers or beams instead of beneath them. Where running lines or branches cross beams they must do so within thirty-six inches of the end of the beams, and in no case shall the said pipes be let into the beams more than two inches in depth. Any pipe laid in a cold or damp place shall be properly dripped, protected and painted with two coats of red lead and boiled oil or tarred.

Sec. 169. No gas pipe shall be laid in cement or concrete unless the pipe and channel in which it is placed are well covered with tar, nor within six inches of an electric wire, excepting where they immediately join outlets.

Sec. 170. All drops must be set plumb and securely fastened, each one having at least one soldered strap. Drops and outlets less than ¾ of an inch in diameter shall not be left more than one inch below plastering, centre-pieces or woodwork.

Sec. 171. All outlets and risers shall be left capped until covered by fixtures.

Sec. 172. No unions or running threads shall be permitted. Where necessary to cut out to repair leaks or make extensions, pipe shall be again put together with right and left couplings.

Sec. 173. No gasfitters' cement shall be used, except in putting fixtures together.

Sec. 174. All gas brackets and fixtures shall be placed so that the burners of same are not less than three feet below any ceiling or woodwork, unless the same is properly protected by a shield, in which case the distance shall not be less than eighteen inches.

No swinging or folding gas brackets shall be placed against any stud partition or woodwork.

No gas bracket on any lath and plaster partition or woodwork shall be less than five inches in length, measured from the burner to the plaster surface or woodwork.

Gas lights placed near window curtains or any other combustible material shall be protected by a proper shield.

Sec. 175. Gas outlets for burners shall not be placed under tanks, back of doors or within four feet of any meter.

Sec. 176. All buildings shall be piped according to the following scale:

Pipe ¾ inch, 26 feet, 3 burners;

Pipe ½ inch, 36 feet, 6 burners;

Pipe ¾ inch, 60 feet, 20 burners;

Pipe 1 inch, 80 feet, 35 burners;

Pipe 1¼ inches, 110 feet, 60 burners;

Pipe 1½ inches, 150 feet, 100 burners;

Pipe 2 inches, 200 feet, 200 burners;

Pipe 2½ inches, 300 feet, 300 burners;

Pipe 3 inches, 450 feet, 450 burners;

Pipe 3½ inches, 500 feet, 600 burners;

Pipe 4 inches, 600 feet, 750 burners.

Sec. 177. Outlets for gas ranges shall have a diameter not less than required for six burners, and all gas ranges and heaters shall have a straightway cock on service pipe.

Sec. 178. When brass piping is used on the outside of plastering or woodwork it shall be classed as fixtures.

Sec. 179. All brass tubing used for arms and stems of fixtures shall be at least No. 18 standard gauge and full size outside, so as to cut a full thread. All threads on brass pipe shall screw in at least 5-16 of an inch. All rope or square tubing shall be brazed or soldered into fittings and distributors, or have a nipple brazed into the tubing.

Sec. 180. All cast fittings, such as cocks, swing joints, double centres, nozzles, etc., shall be extra heavy brass. The plugs of all cocks must be ground to a smooth and true surface for their entire length, be free from sand-holes, have not less than ¾ of an inch bearing (except in cases of special design), have two flat sides on the end for the washer, and have two nuts instead of a tail screw. All stop pins to keys or cocks shall be screwed into place.

Sec. 181. After all piping is fitted and fastened and all outlets capped up, there must be applied by the plumber, in the presence of an Inspector of the Bureau of Buildings, a test with air to a pressure equal to a column of mercury 6 inches in height, and the same to stand for five minutes; only mercury gauge shall be used. No piping shall be covered up, nor shall any fixture, gas, heater or range, be connected thereto until a card showing the approval of this test has been issued by the Superintendent of Buildings. And, again, when all fixtures are hung, a similar test shall be applied in exactly the same manner, excepting that one burner fixture will be omitted to permit of applying a pump and gauge. On the Inspector's report of this test as above, a final approval card in duplicate will be issued by the Superintendent of Buildings.

Sec. 182. No meter will be set by any gas company until a certificate is filed with them from the Bureau of Buildings certifying that the gas pipes and fixtures comply with the foregoing rules.

Sec. 183. When for any reason, it may be impracticable to comply strictly with the foregoing rules, the Superintendent of Buildings shall have power to modify their provisions so that the spirit and substance thereof shall be complied with. Such modification shall be endorsed upon the permit over the signature of the Superintendent of Buildings.

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

New York City, July 3, 1903.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at the office of the Mayor, at 11 o'clock a. m.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A communication was received from the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, of date June 12, 1903, transmitting a certified copy of resolution of that body adopted at a meeting held June 10, 1903, declining to authorize the renewal of the lease of Room No. 161, in the Stewart Building, for the use of the Major-General Commanding the National Guard of New York, and transmitting a copy of an opinion of the Corporation Counsel on the subject.

Ordered filed.

The Acting Secretary presented a communication from Horgan & Slatery in relation to violation filed in the Armory Building of the First Battery, N. G. N. Y., on West Sixty-sixth street.

Ordered filed.

The Mayor read a report from the Commissioners of Accounts, in response to the request of the Board at a meeting held June 3, 1903, to investigate the charges preferred by Comptroller Grout against Secretary John P. Gustavson.

S. Laffin Kellogg, Esq., counsel for Secretary Gustavson, replied thereto, and requested the personal use of the report, exhibits and testimony in connection therewith.

On motion of the Mayor the Board delivered to Mr. Kellogg said report, exhibits and testimony, with the understanding that they should be returned to the Board at a meeting on July 13, 1903, at 2.30 o'clock p. m., and accepted his personal receipt for the same.

A communication was received from Messrs Lord & Hewlett asking that the Board make a contract with them for services in connection with the preparation of

plans and specifications for the proposed armory building for the Second Battalion, Naval Militia.

The Acting Secretary stated that such contract work was in progress.

A bill was presented by Lord & Hewlett for services in connection with the preparation of plans for the armory of the Second Battalion, Naval Militia, amounting to \$6,131.95.

On motion of the Mayor this was laid over.

The bill of Charles P. Young for stenographic services in connection with the acquisition of the site on Union street, Bedford avenue and President street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for an armory for Troop C, N. G. N. Y., amounting to \$242.50, was presented, properly certified by the Corporation Counsel, and the Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Armory Board does hereby approve the bill and expense of Charles P. Young, Stenographer, in the proceeding relative to acquiring the site for the proposed armory building for Troop C, N. G. N. Y., on the easterly side of Bedford avenue, extending from President to Union streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, amounting to the sum of two hundred and forty-two dollars and fifty cents (\$242.50), and recommends that the same be paid, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 393 of the Laws of 1896 and chapter 212 of the Laws of 1898, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same and authorize the issue of bonds for such payment.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Acting Secretary presented liens filed against Henry Day Company by Joseph E. Butterworth in the following amounts, viz.: \$105.61, \$103.35 and \$136.11, respectively.

Which were referred to the Comptroller.

In obedience to the resolution of the Armory Board of March 16, 1903, the Acting Secretary made a report in relation to the roofs of the armory of the Twenty-third Regiment and several other armories, and also in relation to the violations filed against the building of the Twenty-third Regiment, N. G. N. Y.

General McLeer objected to the expenditure of money on State armories, of such amounts as was recommended, and the matter was laid over, pending an expected report from the Attorney-General on this subject.

A communication was received from Messrs. Griffith & Hamlin, advisory architects, in relation to the competition for Troop C Armory, and presented five competitive designs, recommending Nos. 2 and 4 as worthy of consideration, but giving the preference to No. 2.

The Board then proceeded to examine the separate designs, and decided in favor of No. 2.

The Mayor then asked Captain Debevoise, representing Troop C, N. G. N. Y., whether Design No. 2, which was being considered, was acceptable to his organization. Captain Debevoise replied that he and his officers had given considerable study to the designs, and that Design No. 2, with slight modifications, would be entirely acceptable and up to the requirements of his organization.

The Mayor then opened the envelopes, disclosing the identity of the several numbers representing the designs, as follows:

No. 1. Kimball, Hirsch & Hutton.

No. 2. Pilcher, Thomas & Tachau.

No. 3. Parfitt Brothers.

No. 4. Lord & Hewlett.

No. 5. R. F. Almirall.

—and offered the following:

Resolved, That in accordance with the recommendations of the advisory architects, the plans of Messrs. Pilcher, Thomas & Tachau, No. 16 Court street, Borough of Brooklyn, for an armory for Troop C, N. G. N. Y., on the site on the easterly side of Bedford avenue, between President and Union streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, be accepted and approved, subject to such minor modifications as the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens may recommend; that the architects be engaged under the terms of the Programme of Competition, provided that the bids for the erection thereof shall come within the sum which has been appropriated by the Armory Board, including architects' fees; that when the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens have made their recommendation the architects be requested to prepare the detail plans and specifications, which the Secretary is directed to transmit, together with the resolution of the Armory Board adopted at a meeting held March 16, 1903, appropriating \$500,000 for the erection of the armory, to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their concurrence; that when the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have so concurred the Secretary be directed to advertise for bids and proposals for the erection and completion of the building.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Acting Secretary requested that the Board authorize the lease of Room "L," on the street floor of the Stewart Building, for the use of the Armory Board, in place of the present quarters on the fifth floor, the room being more convenient for the transaction of business, and at a less rental, the Superintendent of the Stewart Building having acceded to the proposed change.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Armory Board recommends the leasing of the room on the street floor of the Stewart Building, containing 426 square feet, and known as Room "L," at the sum of nine hundred dollars (\$900) per annum, for the term of ten months, extending to May 1, 1904, and that the lease of the present quarters, namely, Room No. 203, on the fifth floor of the Stewart Building, be canceled, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500) be and is hereby appropriated for finishing the building and for the purchase of new furniture for the furnishing of the armory of the First Battery, N. Y., on West Sixty-sixth street, 150 feet east of Columbus avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, and for the superintendence and inspection thereof, in accordance with the provisions of section 134, chapter 212, of the Laws of 1898, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same.

The Acting Secretary reported that a careful examination of the Armory Accounts showed that the accounts of the Ninth Regiment, Second Battery and First Brigade Headquarters were overdrawn, and that the accounts of the Sixty-ninth Regiment, First Battery and First Naval Battalion were so far encroached upon that not sufficient funds remained in either of these organizations for the purchase of the coal recommended to be advertised for. The Acting Secretary therefore requested transfer

to these organizations, in several amounts, and the Mayor offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to transfer the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) from the appropriation made to the Armory Board for the year 1903, entitled "Care and Maintenance of Armories, Administration," the same being in excess of the amount required for the purposes thereof, to the appropriation made to the Ninth Regiment, N. G. N. Y., entitled "Repairs and Supplies," the amount of said appropriation being insufficient.

Doctor William Mabon, Superintendent of Bellevue Hospital, reported as follows:

Bellevue Hospital—Repairs—The contractor for the dormitory reports that the work on his contract is delayed owing to the difficulty in getting supplies. For a day or two last week he was able to get a certain proportion, but later on it was impossible to get any. He has no trouble in getting carpenters and other mechanics.

The new hot water line from the administration building to the kitchen has been laid and is working satisfactorily.

The work of installing the laundry machinery is in a fair state of progress.

The plumber is installing new appliances in the Crane operating room and in the amphitheatre.

The Marquand Pavilion has been painted according to the specifications, and the painting of the Townsend cottage is nearly finished.

The painters have begun work on the cook house and on the wall at the First avenue side of the hospital.

An opinion from the Corporation Counsel in regard to contractors who fail to comply with the specifications when furnishing goods to this Department is presented for your consideration. Also an opinion regarding architect's fees.

Harlem Hospital—Repairs to the Dispensary Building have gone on satisfactorily and the Maternity Ward is about ready to be opened. A new obstetric table has been ordered for the service and the Supervising Nurse requests two additional helpers. This seems necessary, and some arrangement should be made to provide funds to pay them.

The flashing around the chimney of this building leaks rather badly. Repairs to this part of the roof were not provided for in the contract and there was no indication at that time of the flashing being leaky.

There is nothing special to report at either Gouverneur or Fordham.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment requested to approve of the appointment of Mr. Tracy as Junior Clerk.

From City Prison—From Warden, reporting the escape on the afternoon of June 23, 1903, of Michael Callahan and Robert Booth, two Workhouse prisoners, transferred as Helpers at City Prison. Escape was effected by wrenching out an iron bar and bending another bar in door, through which space, of about one foot by three feet, the men must have crawled. The walls of prison having been torn down preparatory to being rebuilt, the men were able to pass out to the street, where they probably met confederates, as their prison clothing was left in cellar. Police Department notified, and detectives have been detailed to search for the escaped prisoners. The Commissioner has made a personal investigation of this matter. 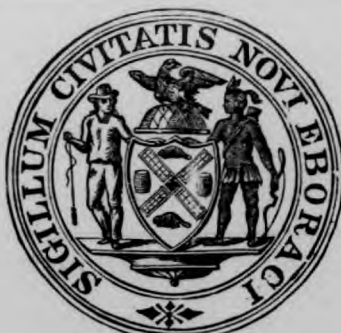

Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railway by itself, and shall not include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the grantee, its successors or assigns. It shall be made in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railway company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railway company. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last five years of the original franchise.

Third—Upon the termination of the said franchise, right or privilege, whether original or renewal, if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or its

Fourteenth—The said railway company shall apply to each car run over said railway a proper fender and wheelguard in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Fifteenth—All cars on said railway shall be heated through the cold weather in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and each car shall be well lighted either by the Pintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Sixteenth—The said company shall at all times keep the street between its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side of said streets, free and clear from ice and snow.

Seventeenth—The said railway company, as long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said streets and highways and bridges, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of said streets and highways and bridges, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And The City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street and highway and bridge, and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper city officer at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Eighteenth—The said railway company, its successors and assigns, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and highways and bridges hereby granted, shall cause the entire roadway of each of the same to be watered at least three times in every twenty-four hours when the thermometer is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, except that when the width of any roadway between curb lines shall exceed 60 feet, the roadway of but 60 feet shall be watered as above.

Section 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of article 4 of the Railroad Law, as it existed at the time of the adoption of this ordinance applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted hereafter affecting the surface railways operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Section 4. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that at any time after five years from the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railway hereby granted, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, if it deems it necessary in the public interest so to do may require the grantee, its successors or assigns, in case the railway upon any portion of the routes above described shall consist of a single track, to construct and operate a second track upon any or all of the routes hereby granted, whether on streets, highways and bridges or upon any private property or right-of-way included in any of such routes so as to make a double-track railway.

Section 5. Said grantee shall commence construction within three months from the date when it has obtained complete legal authority to begin construction, including necessary permits from the city officials and departments, and shall complete the construction of a single track railway upon all of the route hereby granted on or before July 1, 1904, otherwise this grant shall be thereupon forfeited and immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings. If upon the route above described, or upon any portion thereof, there shall not be constructed and in actual operation by July 1, 1904, a railway properly equipped and operated as provided by this ordinance, the said route or portion thereof shall be conclusively taken to have been abandoned by the company, and so much of the rights and franchises hereby granted as pertain to such route or portion thereof, not then constructed from and after July 1, 1904, shall be thereupon forthwith and immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings. Provided that such time may be extended upon the same conditions as to forfeiture under and for causes specified in section 99 of the Railroad Law, as it now exists, and by a properly executed instrument in writing; and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may similarly extend such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year, if, in their discretion, it seems best so to do, and that the city officials or departments who or which shall at the time of such construction have authority over the said streets and highways and bridges, may similarly extend, by properly executed instrument in writing, such

time for a period or periods not exceeding one year further, if reasonable, in their judgment, by reason of requirements as to the manner of construction imposed by the city officials.

Section 6. If for any reason the right or franchise of the grantee in any of the streets, highways and bridges above described shall cease, or if for a period of six successive months the railway tracks upon any of such streets, highways and bridges shall not be operated as provided for in this ordinance, the Comptroller of The City of New York may require the grantee, its successors or assigns, to remove its tracks and other structures upon such streets, highways and bridges within thirty days after notice, and in default of their removal pursuant to such notice, the proper local authorities having jurisdiction may cause them to be removed and The City of New York may recover the cost and expense of such removal, either by deducting them from the fund deposited as required in section 7 hereof, or by action; and the rights and franchises of the grantee, its successors or assigns, in such portions of the streets, highways and bridges, in case any such exist, shall forthwith and immediately cease upon the removal of such tracks or structures and without judicial or other proceedings.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
