Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held at 11 o'clock a. m., on Wednesday, April 13, 1910.

Present-William J. Gaynor, Mayor; Douglas Mathewson, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Charles H. Hyde, Chamberlain; John Purroy Mitchel, President Board of Aldermen, and Frank L. Dowling, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held April 6, 1910, were approved as printed.

The Chair called for a hearing, the matter of the request of the Commissioner of Docks that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the proposed amendment to the new plan for the improvement of the waterfront between Grand and Broome streets, East River, Borough of Manhattan, as transmitted by the Commissioner of Docks with the following communication:

> Department of Docks and Ferries, Pier "A," North River, New York, March 4, 1910.

Hon. WILLIAM J GAYNOR, Mayor and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR-I beg to submit herewith, for the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, tracings and print in triplicate showing proposed amendment to the new plan previously adopted between Grand and Broome streets, East River. This change is rendered necessary owing to the fact that when the plan was originally adopted, ferries were in operation in this locality which have since been abandoned, and there is no likelihood that the area will be required for such purposes in the future. A pier lay-out is therefore shown in red lines, and, when such piers are constructed. they will tend to greatly relieve the wharfage congestion in this vicinity. There is embodied in the plan a proposed modification of the bulkhead line, and request for same has been made to the War Department, which will no doubt be approved. The marginal street, wharf or place, as shown on the plan adopted December 19, 1888, is to be discontinued, as, in my opinion, there is no necessity for it; adequate access to the proposed piers can be had by the way of East street.

Public notice is hereby given that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907, will hold a public hearing in room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, at 11 o'clock a. m., on Wednesday, April 13, 1910, relative to a request of the Commissioner of Docks that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the proposed amendment to the new plan previously adopted, for the improvement of the water-front between Grand and Broome streets, East River, Borough of Manhattan, as adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law, March 4, 1910.

Techinal description of "new plan" for the improvement of the water-front between Grand street and Broome street, East River, Borough of Manhattan.

The proposed "new plan' between Grand street and Broome street, East River.

Borough of Manhattan, comprises the following: The establishment of two new piers 50 feet in width with a slip room of 140 feet extending from the established bulkhead line to the established pierhead line, the northerly side of the northerly pier being identical with the northerly side of the present Pier (old) 56, or Broome Street Pier.

Also the establishment of a new pier 45 feet in width, its northerly side extending from the proposed modified bulkhead line, its southerly side extending from the established bulkhead line to the established pierhead line. The southerly side of the new pier is coincident with the southerly side of the present Pier (old) 55, or Grand Street Pier: also the discontinuance of the marginal street, wharf or place between Grand and Broome streets.

The Commissioner of Docks in his communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund states that this change is rendered necessary owing to the fact that when the plan was originally adopted ferries were in operation in this locality which have since been abandoned, and there is no likelihood that the area will be required for such purposes in the future. A pier layout is therefore shown in red lines, and when such piers are constructed, they will tend to greatly relieve the wharfage congestion in this vicinity. There is embodied in the plan a proposed modification of the bu'khead line, and request for same has been made to the War Department, which will no doubt be approved. The marginal street, wharf or place, as shown on the plan adopted December 19, 1888, is to be discontinued, as there is no necessity for it; adequate access to the proposed piers can be had by the way of East street.

The proposed amended plan is open to the inspection of any citizen at the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York, at all times during business hours, from the beginning of this publication until the day of said hearing.

The proposed new plan, a technical description of which is attached hereto, is, in my opinion, suitable for this locality, and I would advise that it be approved subject to the approval by the War Department of the proposed modification of the bulkhead line.

Resoived, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the amended new plan for the improvement of the water-front between Grand and Broome streets, East River, Borough of Manhattan, adopted by the Commissioner of Docks, in accordance with law March 4, 1910.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Commissioner of Docks appeared before the Board and presented a communication in which he requested that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund consent to the suspension of the lease to the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, of the southerly side and outer end and entire surface of Pier 34, North River, as extended, together with the bulkhead extending 75 feet southerly, dated February 15, 1908.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Bridges, requesting a renewal of the lease to the City of two parcels of land running from Mott avenue to the Harlem River, in the Borough of The Bronx, required for the easterly approach to the temporary Madison Avenue Bridge.

The Commissioner of Bridges, who was present, was interrogated by members of the Board in regard to the matter.

Discussion followed.

On motion, the matter was referred to a select committee, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Bridges, requesting a renewal of the lease to the City of a strip of land extending from Madison avenue to the Harlem River, between One Hundred and Thirty-seventh and One Hundred and Thirty-sixth streets, Borough of Manhattan, required for the westerly approach to the temporary Madison Avenue Bridge, and the Comptroller presented a report

Which was referred to a select committee, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and Chairman of the Finance Committee. Board

The Deputy Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a renewal of the lease to the City of premises at No. 417 Richmond terrace, New Brighton, Borough of Richmond, for use of the Police Department:

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN-The Hon. William F. Baker, Police Commissioner, in a communication to your Honorable Board under date of January 27, 1910, requests a renewal of the lease of the premises on the second floor of No. 417 Richmond terrace, New Brighton, Borough of Richmond, used as a branch office of the Detective Bureau, for a period of two years from May 1, 1910, at a rental of \$480 a year, payable quarterly, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as in the present lease. Lessor to furnish water and pay taxes. Lessor, John Irving, No. 23 Jersey street, New Brighton, Borough of Richmond.

This is a flat of six cooms and bath occupying the second floor of the brick postoffice building, 25 by 44 feet, and has been occupied by the Detective Bureau for two years at the same rental as now asked for the renewal; the landlord to make all necessary alterations and repairs and to furnish steam heat and water.

Commissioner Bingham in a letter dated March 23, 1908, and Commissioner Baker in a letter dated March 1, 1910, both state that the rent is reasonable and just-

For purposes of comparison, it may be stated that flats of five and six rooms and bath in the neighborhood, rent for from \$25 to \$35 a month, without heat. As the Detective Bureau is open practically at all hours, it requires being constantly kept heated in cold weather.

Deeming the premises the most available in the neighborhood for the purpose of the Detective Bureau, being the only flat in the building, and the rent being reason able and just, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a renewal of the lease of the premises on the second floor of No. 417 Richmond terrace, New Brighton, Borough of Richmond, for a branch office of the Detective Bureau of the Police Department, for a term of two years from May 1 1910, at a rental of \$480 a year, payable quarterly, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the present lease. Lessor, John Irving, No. 23 Jersey street, New Brighton, Borough of Richmond.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

GENTLEMEN-The Commissioner of Licenses, in a communication under date of April 1, 1910, requests the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize a lease of Rooms Nos. 901, 902, 903, 904, 905 and 906 in the Broadway-Chambers Building, situated at No. 277 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for a period of three years from May 1, 1910, at an annual rental of \$4,000, payable quarterly.

The Commissioner of Licenses at present occupies Rooms Nos. 807, 808, 809 and 810 in this building, at an annual rental of \$3,218, under a lease which expires May 1, 1910. The area of the rooms occupied at this time amounts to about 1,514 square feet, which at the present rental is at the rate of \$2.12 per square foot. In his communication requesting the new lease, the Commissioner of Licenses states that the present space occupied by him is entirely inadequate for the needs of his office and begs to call to the attention of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the fact that the Bureau of Licenses has been in existence for a period of nearly six years, and notwithstanding the fact that the work of the office has almost doubled itself in this period, they are still occupying the same office space as in the beginning.

The rooms the Commissioner of Licenses proposes to occupy contain an area of about 2,000 square feet, which, at the rental of \$4,000 per annum asked, amounts to \$2 per square foot. The Commissioner deems this rent to be fair and reasonable. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment are at present occupying offices in this building at the same rate. While this proposed lease shows an increase of \$782 in the rental asked, they are occupying an additional space of 486 square feet.

The rental of offices of a similar character in the Barclay Building, at No. 299

Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, is at the rate of \$2 per square foot. I, therefore, respectfully recommend, the rent being reasonable and just, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the leasing of Rooms Nos. 901, 902, 903, 904, 905 and 906, in the Broadway-Chambers Building, No. 277 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Bureau of Licenses, for a period of three years from May 1, 1910, at an annual rental of \$4,000, payable quarterly, the lessors to furnish light, heat, elevator and janitor service. Lessors, Frederick Southack and Alwyn Ball, Jr., agents.

The following communication was received from the President of the Borough of Queens, relative to a lease of a plot of vacant land at the southwest corner of State and Leavitt streets, Boroughs of Queens:

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, and Chairman of the Sinking Fund Commission:

DEAR SIR-The occupancy of the premises at the southwest corner of State and Leavitt streets, Flushing, Borough of Queens, being essential for the proper transaction of the business of the Bureau of Highways, it is hereby recommended that your Commission enter into a lease with Mrs. Annie G. Callan, the owner (by virtue of a judgment of the Supreme Court, dated November 24, 1909), for five years from November 24, 1909, at four hundred dollars (\$400) per annum, payable quarterly, the City to pay water rates, the owner to pay all other taxes. We deem this rent to be just and reasonable, to an extraordinary extent, for this property.

We are this day making application to the Board of Aldermen for an issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) to pay the rental on account of this lease.

These premises have been occupied since consolidation by The City of New York as a corporation yard, jointly by this office and the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The agreements between the two Departments are not to be terminated by the making of this lease.

In connection therewith the Deputy Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

To the Honorable The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Hon. Lawrence Gresser, President of the Borough of Queens, in a communication to your Board, under date of April 1, 1910, requests that a lease be authorized of the corporation yard on the southwest corner of State and Leavitt streets, Flushing, Borough of Queens, for a period of five years from November 24, 1909, at a rental of \$400 a year, payable quarterly, the owner to pay all taxes and the City to pay for the water used on the premises. Lessor, Annie Gorham Callan; agent, Arthur Van de Water, No. 63 Main street, Flushing.

This is a plot at the southwest corner of Leavitt and State streets, fronting 150 feet on Leavitt street and 100 feet on State street. It was sold for the taxes of 1878 and was bid in by the Village of Flushing. The village authorities took possession of it about twenty years ago and used it for a corporation yard up to the time of consolidation. When the village took possession of the property, no rent was paid to the former owner, but the property was exempted from taxation. After consolidation, it was turned over to the Bureau of Highways as a corporation yard, and that Bureau gave up a part of it, 33 by 100 feet, at the south end of the plot to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

In 1908 the present owner, Mrs. Callan, redeemed the property by paying all taxes and interest due up to that time, amounting, it is claimed, to upwards of \$3,000. The matter was taken to Court and a judgment was entered November 24, 1909. against the City, giving Mrs. Callan possession of the property. The City, however, has continued in possession, paying no rent therefor, and the Department of Taxes and Assessments has recently been notified to return the property to the assessment list for the purposes of taxation.

The plot is assessed (exempt): \$5,000 00

The six lots, including the corner, are fairly worth a total of \$7,500. The improvements thereon were all placed there by the City. These consist of a 6-foot tight board fence around the plot, a 1-story frame building, 28 by 65 feet, used by the Bureau of Highways as a blacksmith shop and storage room, and a 1-story building 20 by 30 feet, used by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for office and storage purposes. The Bureau of Highways is willing to allow the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to continue in possession of the part of the plot now occupied by it.

There is no other similar vacant plot in the immediate vicinity so well located with which a comparison could be made. The nearest approach is a plot 100 by 125 feet at the southeast corner of Bayside avenue and Farrington street, for which a rental of \$300 a year for the bare plot is asked, or \$600 a year if the owner encloses the plot with 6-foot tight board fence and erects thereon an open shed, 50 by 100 feet. Assessed value, \$1,050. Appraised market value by Bureau of Real Estate, \$3,000.

The President of the Borough of Queens states in his letter that the rental of \$400 a year for the plot now occupied is fair and reasonable, and he will immediately apply to the Board of Aldermen for an issue of special revenue bonds to pay the rent from November 24, 1909, to December 31, 1910.

The rent being reasonable and just and the yard being necessary and located conveniently at this point, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the execution of a lease of the premises 150 by 100 feet at the southwest corner of State and Leavitt streets, Flushing, Borough of Queens, for use as a corporation yard by the President of the Borough of Queens, for a term of five years from November 24, 1909, at a rental of \$400 a year, pavable quarterly, the owner to pay taxes and the City to pay for the water used on the premises Lessor, Annie Gorham Callan.

SIR—This Department is in possession, under a lease which expires May 1, 1910, of a store, ground floor and celler beneath, of the premises No. 316 East Thirtythird street, Borough of Manhattan, at the annual rental of \$330. The place is altogether unsuitable for various reasons; among them, it is entirely too small to accommodate the number of Sweepers for whom the section station is required Another very important reason is that the place is and has been continually out of repair and it has been impossible to induce the lessor to take any suitable action in this matter.

The premises proposed to be leased were formerly rented for \$42 per month, \$2 more than the proposed lease. As a rule, stores in that neighborhood are but 10 feet wide, and this store, ordinarily in renting, would be considered two stores divided by a partition, but this partition at present is not erected.

The lessor is to keep the premises in good and tenantable condition and repair and to pay for the Croton water used on the premises. The total rental of the building is \$8,472 per annum.

The Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning has stated that in his estimation, the rent seems satisfactory.

electric light fixtures. The rent for the first four years was \$1,500 a year, but since May 1, 1906, the rent has been \$2,000 a year.

The Coroners occupy, approximately, 3,300 square feet of floor space, and the rent therefore is about 60 cents per square foot. This includes steam heat, gas, electric light, interior repairs, janitor hall service and cleaning windows. The items of heat and light are considerable, as the office is open from 8 a. m. until 12 p. m.,

on every day in the year.

As a comparison it may be stated that the next floor above, divided into ten offices, pays a rental of \$1,920 a year, including only steam heat, water and hall service, the tenants paying for light and janitor.

The top floor is divided into two lodge rooms which are rented to each lodge at the rate of \$100 a year for two nights a month. There are now fourteen lodges using these rooms, making an income of \$1,400, but the rooms could if necessary accommodate ten more lodges, which would bring the income of the top floor up to \$2,400.

There is no similar office building in the immediate neighborhood. Comparison, however, may be made with Nos. 765 and 767 Tremont avenue (new Nos. 505 and 507), one block further west, where the third floor of the building, 35 feet 7 inches by 78 feet, used for offices, rents for a total of \$1,800 per annum, or approximately 60 cents per square foot.



The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its depart-ments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated

herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the mat-ters set forth in the blank forms mentioned

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-

mate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally

upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifica tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said

office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any

obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in

figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or

estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Cor-District, at the Judge's Chambers, in the City of New Rochelle, N. Y., on the 30th day of April, 1910, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon of that day, or as soon thereafter as Counsel can be heard. Reserving to The City of New York the right to
