Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Friday, June 29, 1916, at 2 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Robbins, O'Keeffe, Farley, Sachs and Stern, Trustees. Excused—Mr. Paulding and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

Mr. Robbins was appointed Secretary, pro tem.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Deputy Commissioner Dougherty, of the Department of Public Charities, has informed Dr. Gregory that the Clinic for Atypical Children will be removed to Randall's Island on July 5; that the new clinic on Randall's Island will be for the sole purpose of examining children about to be transferred to the institutions on the island, and that Bellevue is expected to make provision for the examination of other defective children and court cases which may be sent for observation and examination, as heretofore. It will be very desirable to continue this clinic at Bellevue, but, of course, the work cannot be carried on without a proper staff. Dr. Gregory therefore asks that funds be obtained at once for the continuation and maintenance of such a clinic at Bellevue by an issue of special revenue bonds for the remainder of the year. We would require the services of two physicians, a psychologist, stenographer and four nurses, at a total annual cost of \$8,620. Pending the granting of this appropriation it is proposed to keep the psychologist by using a vacancy existing in the psychopathic service.

All of the hospitals of the department are experiencing increased difficulties in the securing and retaining of employees. Owing to the many vacancies now existing in the work, particularly in the laundry and cleaning departments, is not being maintained at its usual standard.

Several employees are absent from the hospital on account of the mobilizing of the National Guard. While we are able to get along for a very short time without filling these vacancies, if these employees are to be absent for a period of several weeks it will be necessary to fill the positions temporarily, and for this purpose additional funds will have to be provided.

The roster of the Bellevue Hospital Red Cross Unit has been completed and there are many questions to be determined should this unit be called out. There is to be a meeting at the Academy of Medicine at 4 o'clock on Friday for the determination of some of these questions. As the hospital service would not be crippled by the absence of such a large number of the staff of employees, I would ask that a policy be adopted to permit as many as possible to go with this unit should it be called upon for field duty.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent, as follows:

A request was authorized to the Board of Aldermen for an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$4,310 to pay the salaries of employees required to continue the Clinic for Atypical Children from July 1 to Dec. 31, 1916, and to make provision for such places in the departmental estimate for 1917.

After discussion, the President was requested to bring to the attention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the difficulty the department is having in securing and retaining a sufficient number of employees to carry on the various activities in the hospitals.

After discussion, it was Resolved to ask for an issue of special revenue bonds when it becomes necessary to provide funds to pay the salaries of those employees engaged to do the work of the regular employees absent on account of military service.

Wincor as Assistant Surgeon to Out-Patients, eye and ear service. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved and appointments made accordingly.

The Conference Committee of Harlem Hospital recommended the appointment of Dr. I. O. Palefski as Assistant Physician to Out-Patients, gastroenterology, and John J. Levberg as Assistant Physician to Out-Patients, eye, ear, nose and throat. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved and appointments made accordingly.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was Resolved to request the Board of Aldermen for permission to buy, in the open market, without public letting, the equipment required for the x-ray department of Bellevue Hospital, the estimated cost of which is \$22,500, and chargeable against the corporate stock appropriations of the department.

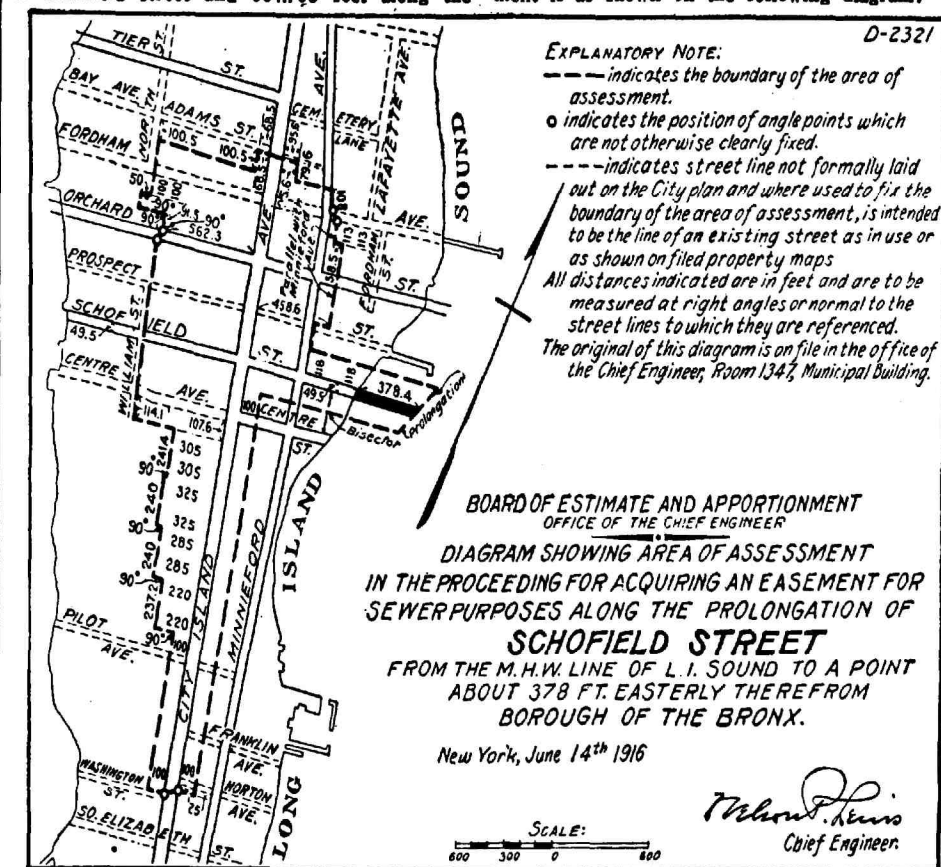

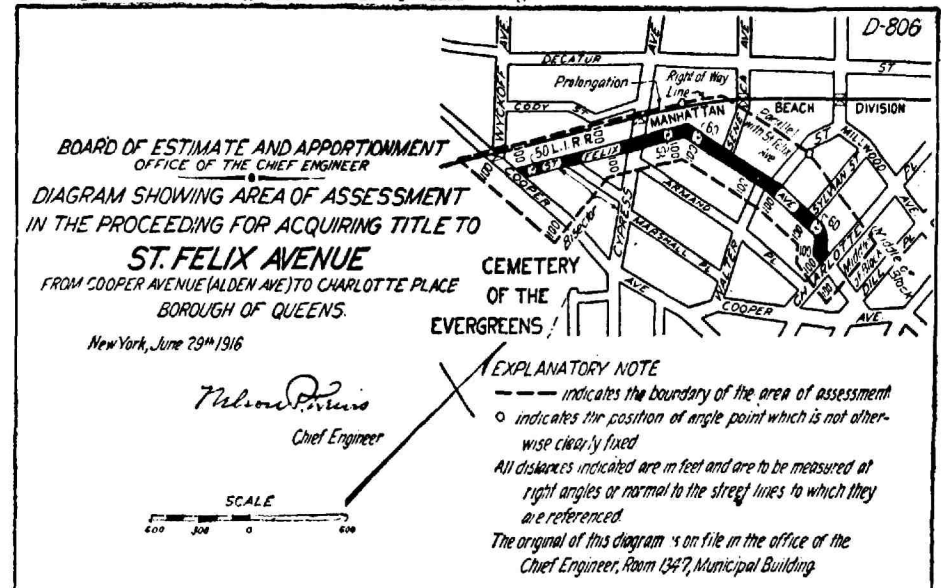

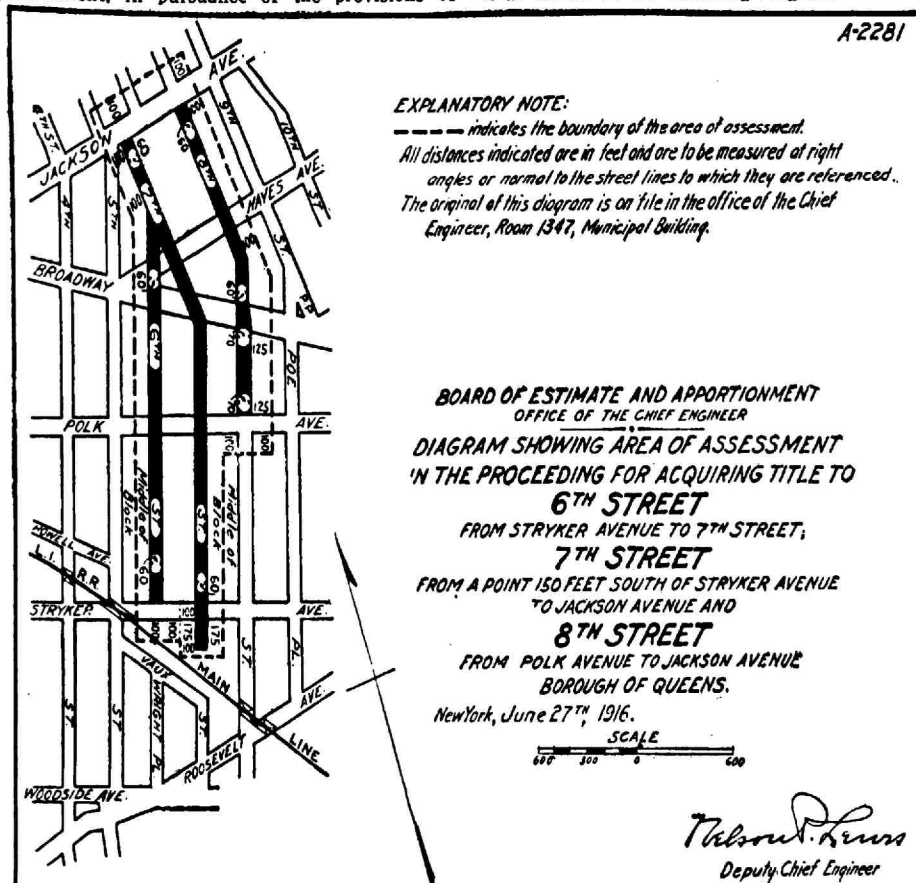

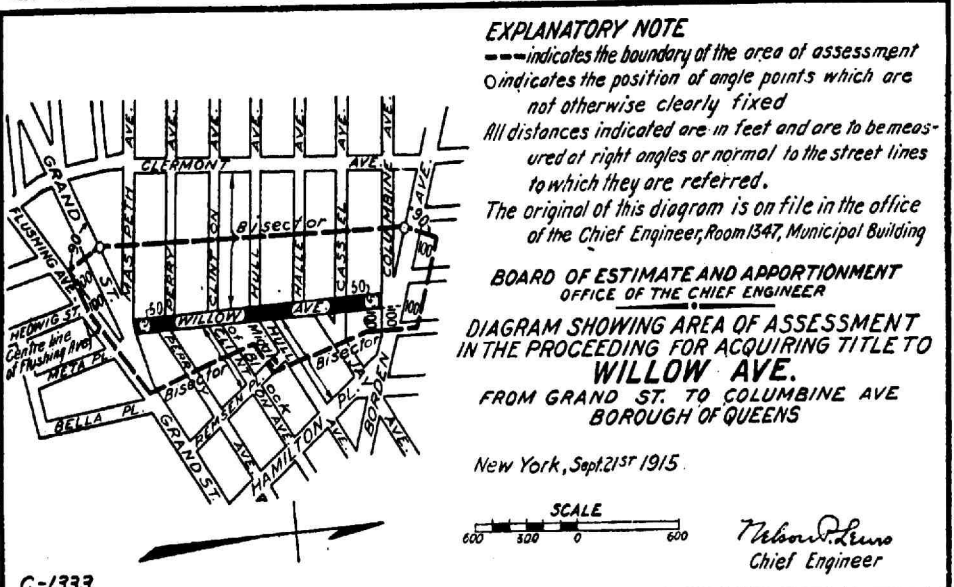

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, exceeding the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite the exterior walls and their foundations. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
