

Resolved, That the Comptroller be requested to call on the various charitable societies and institutions in this city that are entitled to receive a share of the excise moneys, for a statement of their operations during the year ending September 30, 1880, the said statement to be sent to the Finance Department before the 30th of November, 1880.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), The Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

By unanimous consent, the rule adopted at meeting held June 24, 1879, relating to calls of meetings, be suspended in order to act upon the issue of "Assessment Bonds of the Corporation of the City of New York."

Whereupon the Comptroller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time as may be required, and at such rates of interest not exceeding five per cent. per annum, and for such period conformable to law as he may determine, "Assessment Bonds of the Corporation of the City of New York" to the amount of fifty thousand dollars, as authorized by chapter 397, Laws of 1852, and chapter 50, Laws of 1872.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller presented the following communication:

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, October, 1880.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

On November 1, 1880, Bonds of the Corporation issued for Expenditures incurred on the Riverside Avenue Improvement, for which assessments have not yet been laid, will become due and payable, amounting to \$119,000.

To provide for the payment of said bonds it will be necessary to reissue an equal amount of bonds of the same description, under the authority of section 3 of chapter 756 of the Laws of 1873, as follows, to wit:

Section 3. "If, at any time hereafter, the amount in the treasury of the City of New York, derived from collections of assessments, shall be insufficient to meet and pay when they become due and payable, any bonds issued by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, for expenditures incurred on public improvements, payable in whole or in part from assessments, then it shall be lawful for the Comptroller, and he is hereby authorized to issue like bonds for an amount sufficient to pay, and from the proceeds thereof, to pay the bonds so falling due as aforesaid."

Herewith I submit a resolution to authorize the reissue of bonds accordingly.

Whereas, Bonds of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, to the amount of one hundred and nineteen thousand dollars, issued for expenditures incurred on the Riverside Avenue Improvement, authorized by chapter 447, Law of 1876, for which no assessments have yet been laid, therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized, in pursuance of the provisions of law contained in section 3, chapter 756 of the Laws of 1873, to issue like bonds of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding five per cent. per annum, and payable at such times conformable to law, as he shall deem expedient, to an amount not exceeding one hundred and nineteen thousand dollars, for the purpose of paying and redeeming, from the proceeds thereof, said bonds falling due on November 1, 1880, namely:

"Assessment Bonds of the Corporation of the City of New York," authorized by chapter 447, Laws of 1876, for Riverside Avenue Improvement..... \$119,000 00

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller presented the following report:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
October 13, 1880.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

As provided by chapter 556 of the Laws of 1880, I have inquired into the facts and circumstances under which the contract for the work of regulating and grading Ninth avenue, from Eighty-sixth street to One Hundred and Tenth street, was made and entered into by the city, and being satisfied that the said contract comes within the provisions of the act, I have attached my certificate in favor of paying the contractor the sum of \$18,052.77 for difference in amount of interest charged by the city.

To provide for the payment of this amount, I recommend the adoption of a resolution, herewith submitted, authorizing the issue of Revenue Bonds, under the act referred to, to an amount not exceeding \$20,000.

Hon. EDWARD COOPER, Mayor, and Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction respectfully represent that since the establishment of telegraphic communication between the different islands under their control, they have, through the courtesy of the Western Union Telegraph Co., and the Fire Department of this city, been using their cables crossing the East river to Blackwell's, Randall's and Ward's Islands. The frequent interruptions to the line running to Blackwell's Island, caused by using condemned wires in the cable to that island, has caused great annoyance, and the liability of the owners of the cables requiring the use of the wires now connected with the line of this Department, which would render telegraphic communication useless, makes it desirable that new cables be laid which shall be the exclusive property of this Department.

I quote from section 115, Laws of 1873:

"No patented pavement shall be laid, and no patented article shall be advertised for, contracted for or purchased, except under such circumstances that there can be a fair and reasonable opportunity for competition, the conditions to secure which shall be prescribed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

All telegraphic cables being "patented articles," the above provision of the Charter requires the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to prescribe the conditions under which the same can be contracted for. The Commissioners, therefore, respectfully request that your Board adopt the preamble and resolution herewith submitted.

Whereas, The Department of Public Charities and Correction are desirous of purchasing and laying telegraphic cables to Blackwell's, Randall's, and Ward's Islands, and that it is claimed that said cables are patented; and

Whereas, Section 115 of the Charter of 1873 provides, among other things, as follows:

"No patented pavement shall be laid, and no patented article shall be advertised for, contracted for, or purchased, except under such circumstances that there can be a fair and reasonable opportunity for competition, the conditions to secure which shall be prescribed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment;" and

Whereas, The Department of Public Charities and Correction has applied to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to prescribe the conditions to secure a fair and reasonable opportunity for competition in bidding for said cables; therefore,

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby prescribe the following as the conditions under which such work may be contracted for:

The Department of Public Charities and Correction shall advertise, in the manner provided by section 91 of the Charter of 1873, for the supplying and laying telegraphic cables to Blackwell's, Randall's, and Ward's Islands, and the contract for the work covered by the advertisement, if awarded at all, shall be awarded to the lowest bidder, whose proposal, considering the price, quality, and durability of the cables which he offers to lay, will in the opinion of the Department be most advantageous to the city.

The Department may reject all the bids received in response to any advertisement, if it shall deem it for the interest of the city to do so, and may readvertise until a satisfactory proposal shall be received—but the contract when awarded must be awarded to the lowest bidder for the particular kind of cable which is adopted.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting, held, pursuant to adjournment, October 11, 1880.

Present—Hon. Edward Cooper, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Patrick Keenan, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Communications Nos. I. and II., in relation to the issue of stock, exempt from taxation, as authorized by act, chapter 552, Laws of 1880; and also in relation to the Bonds and Stocks of the City and County of New York, due November 1, 1880, and providing for the issue of Consolidated Stock: submitted by the Comptroller at the last meeting and laid over for consideration, were taken up for action; whereupon the Comptroller withdrew the preamble and resolution submitted with said communications respectively.

The Mayor submitted the following preambles and resolutions, viz.:

Whereas, There will fall due on the first day of November next bonds of the City of New York, as follows:

5 per cent. Assessment Bonds	\$996,800 00

6 per cent. Assessment Fund Bonds	300,000 00
5 per cent. Street Improvement Fund Bonds	120,100 00

5 per cent. Department of Parks Improvement Bonds	27,000 00
6 per cent. Department of Parks Improvement Bonds	900,000 00

\$3,650,500 00

Therefore,

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 6 of the act, chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York, deeming it advantageous

for the interest of the city so to do, do hereby determine to call in at maturity, and to pay and redeem at par, a portion of the bonded debt of the City of New York, consisting of the bonds specified in the preamble to this resolution, and for such purpose do, by concurrent vote, authorize and direct the Comptroller to issue consolidated stock of the City of New York, as authorized by said act, for the sum of two million eight hundred thousand dollars (\$2,800,000), payable on the first day of November, 1910, and at the rate of interest of four per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually, namely, on the first day of May and on the first day of November in each year.*

And whereas, the act, chapter 552 of the Laws of 1880, provides as follows, viz.:

CHAPTER 552.

AN ACT to authorize the issue of certain bonds and stocks of the city of New York exempt from taxation.

Passed June 9, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The commissioners of "the sinking fund of the city of New York for the redemption of the city debt," when duly authorized by ordinance of the common council, may, by concurrent resolution, direct that the bonds and stocks of said city, hereafter issued pursuant to law, shall be exempt from taxation by said city and by the county of New York, but not from taxation for state purposes; and all bonds and stocks issued pursuant to such authority, shall be exempt from taxation accordingly, provided that said bonds and stocks shall not bear interest exceeding the rate of four and one-half per centum per annum.

Sec. 2. The bonds and stocks of the city of New York, issued pursuant to the provisions of this statute, shall express upon their face the fact that they are exempt from taxation by the city and county of New York, but not from state taxation, and shall refer to this act, and to the ordinance of the common council, and the resolution of the commissioners of the sinking fund authorizing their issue.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

And whereas, the Common Council of the city of New York have passed the following ordinance, viz.:

AN ORDINANCE to authorize the issue of certain bonds and stocks of the city of New York exempt from taxation.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. The commissioners of "the sinking fund of the city of New York for the redemption of the city debt," are hereby authorized, as provided by section 1 of chapter 552 of the Laws of 1880, by concurrent resolution, to direct, that the bonds and stocks of the city of New York, hereafter issued, pursuant to law, shall be exempt from taxation by said city, and by the county of New York, but not from taxation for state purposes; and all bonds and stocks issued pursuant to such authority, shall be exempt from taxation accordingly, provided that said bonds and stocks shall not bear interest exceeding the rate of four and one-half per cent. per annum.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 14, 1880.

Approved by the Mayor, October 2, 1880.

Now, as authorized by said ordinance, and pursuant to the authority conferred by the provisions of the said Act, chapter 552 of the Laws of 1880, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do, by concurrent resolution, hereby

Resolved, That Consolidated Stock of the City of New York, to the amount of two million eight hundred thousand dollars (\$2,800,000), which they have this day authorized to be issued, shall be exempt from taxation by the City of New York or by the County of New York, but not from taxation for State purposes.

The foregoing preambles and resolutions submitted by the Mayor were unanimously adopted:

Hon. Edward Cooper, Mayor; Hon. Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Patrick Keenan, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, voting in the affirmative.

The Mayor submitted the following resolution of the Common Council, adopted October 5, 1880; which, on motion, was referred to the Comptroller, viz.:

Resolved, That a ferry be and is hereby established from a point at or near the intersection of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street and Second avenue, on the southerly side of Harlem river, to the opposite shore, at or near the present depot of the New Haven and Harlem Railway; and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are hereby authorized and directed to sell at public auction, to the highest responsible bidder or bidders, the right to operate the ferry hereby established, on such terms and conditions, and subject to such restrictions in respect to rates of ferriage, time of running the boats, duration of the franchise, and all other regulations deemed of advantage to the public, as may be prescribed by the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

* The difference between the amount of bonds falling due November 1, 1880, and the amount of Consolidated Stock authorized to be issued by this resolution, will be paid from cash in the Sinking Fund collected from assessments and cash in the Treasury available for the purpose.

CHAPTER 195.

AN ACT in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment thereof.

If any such assessment shall not be paid before the first day of December, 1880, the rate of interest thereon will be twelve per centum per annum thereafter, as provided by law, from the date of confirmation to the date of payment. The said act of 1880 is published herewith.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over even per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Section 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Section 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
