DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Report for the Quarter ending March 31, 1886.

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS, No. 36 UNION SQUARE, April 15, 1886.

Hon. WILLIAM R. GRACE, Mayor:

SIR—In accordance with section 49, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Department of Public Parks hereby submits the following statement of its transactions during the three months ending March 31, 1886:

Funds having become available for carrying on new and much needed improvements in the Annexed District, contracts, for which proposals were received in July last, have been awarded and executed for the following works:

Regulating grading etc. Fast One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, from North Third avenue

Regulating, grading, etc., East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, from North Third avenue to Morris avenue. Edward N. Lynch, contractor.

Regulating, grading, etc., East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, from North Third avenue to Southern Boulevard. Edward N. Lynch, contractor.

to Southern Boulevard. Edward N. Lynch, contractor.

Regulating, grading, etc., Tremont street (formerly Westchester avenue), from Boston road to Bronx river. B. C. Murray, contractor.

Constructing sewer in Morris avenue, from the summit between One Hundred and Thirty-ninth and One Hundred and Fortieth streets to North Third avenue. Michael Casey, contractor.

Proposals for the following named works, which were also received in July last, have been rejected, it being deemed to the interest of the City not to award the contracts at this time:

Regulating, etc., One Hundred and Fortieth street, North Third to Willis avenue.

Regulating, etc., One Hundred and Fiftieth street, North Third to Railroad avenue.

Regulating, etc., One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, Courtland to Morris avenue.

Sewer in Robbins avenue, One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to Westchester.

Sewer in One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, Washington to North Third avenue.

On the 16th of January proposals were received for furnishing and delivering 800 tons of best

On the 16th of January proposals were received for furnishing and delivering 800 tons of best quality white ash coal; also 100,000 pounds best timothy hay; 23,000 pounds best rye straw; 1,100 bags No. 1 white oats; 250 bags yellow corn; 160 bags bran.

The contracts for the above were awarded to the lowest bidders, as follows: For coal—James Fitzgerald.....

There being an insufficiency of light in the locality of the entrance to Central Park at Fifty-ninth street and Eighth avenue at night the Commissioner of Public Works has been requested to place additional lamp-posts in that vicinity and cause the same to be lighted.

Plans are being prepared for raising and otherwise improving the music stand on the Mall in Central Park; also for completing the terrace in conformity with the original design.

A plan for a Gatekeeper's house at One Hundred and Tenth street and Seventh avenue in the Park, has been prepared and approved and erection of the house has been ordered.

In pursuance of the provisions of chapter 478 of the Laws of 1885 for changing the lines of certain streets and avenues in the Twelfth and Twenty-fourth Wards at Kingsbridge, a plan showing such changes has been prepared and adopted by this Board and filed in the offices of the Register and Secretary of State, as required by law.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have been requested to lease for the way of this The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have been requested to lease for the use of this

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have been requested to lease for the use of this Department the premises hereinafter mentioned:

1. The second floor of the New Emigrant Industrial Savings Bank Building, Nos. 49 and 51 Chambers street, for four years and seven months from October 1, 1886, at a rental of \$6,500 per annum, to be used as the principal offices of the Department.

2. The two upper floors of the building Nos. 471 and 473 North Third avenue, for two years from May 1, 1886, at \$600 per annum, as offices for the Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and Engineer of Construction in charge of streets and sewers, etc.

3. The piece of land consisting of seven lots on the west side of College avenue, south of One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, for two years from May 1, 1886, at \$600 per annum, as a storage vard.

The Board of Aldermen have been requested to pass a resolution authorizing this Department to contract for telephonic service for the period from January 1 to December 31, 1886, at a price not

exceeding \$3,650, without public letting.

Permission has been given the trustees of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge to open the street in order to lay foundations for the extension of the bridge, under chapter 4 of the Laws of 1886; also to widen the sidewalk on the westerly side of Centre street, opposite the Hall of Records, in

in order to lay foundations for the extension of the bridge, under chapter 4 of the Laws of 1886; also to widen the sidewalk on the westerly side of Centre street, opposite the Hall of Records, in connection with the bridge extension.

The consent of the Department was given to the erection, by Mr. Ferdinand Fish, of a store front to the building known as Nos. 57 and 59 West Forty-second street, to project three feet six inches beyond the house-line.

Permission has been given Messrs. J. & M. Haffen to construct a vault, twenty by eight feet in size, under the sidewalk in front of their premises on the south side of One Hundred and Fifty-second street, 335 feet east of Courtland avenue in accordance with a resolution of the Board of Aldermen.

Upon application, the privilege of decorating the tomb of General Grant on 30th May next was given the U. S. Grant Post, G. A. R.

The license of J. Clarence Dick for operating the boat service at the Central Park Lake has been renewed for one year, he agreeing to pay a fee of \$500 for the privilege.

The privilege of conducting the carriage service in Central Park and on Riverside Drive has been given to the Fifth Avenue Transportation Company for the term of five years, they agreeing to pay the sum of \$550 per annum for such privilege.

Permission has been given the Southern Bullevard Railroad Company to open the roadway of the Southern Boulevard for the purpose of laying car-tracks in and along said Boulevard, from North Third avenue to Boston avenue, said company having obtained the consent of the property-owners along the route, together with the authority of the Board of Aldermen.

The Board being of the opinion that a bill now before the Legislature conferring certain powers upon the Department of Public Parks, relative to the laying-out, opening, etc., of streets and avenues in the Annexed District, would, if passed, be to the interests of the public, have taken action expressing its approval of said bill and urging its being made a law.

CENTRAL AND CITY PARKS.

The usual careful attention has been given the various parks, and they now give every evidence of showing the care bestowed on them by presenting a beautiful appearance the coming summer. The roads, walks, bridges, lawns, trees and buildings have received the necessary care.

During the quarter, the work done has been principally that of maintenance, as the unsuitable weather would not permit, to any great extent, construction work.

During the winter months, the snow was regularly removed from the walks, and the ice on the lakes kept free of snow.

Manure was collected, composted, and is now being used on the lawns, beds, etc., in large

The road and walk basins, numbering about 250, have been cleaned once a month, and the refuse removed to the dump.

Two thousand yards of good garden mould has been received and used, and about 2,300 loads of manure spread on the lawns; about fifty yards of wood ashes have been used in connection with

The removal of ashes and other rubbish has been attended to daily.

The brush-wood, leaves, etc., removed by the gardeners, have been collected and burned and

the ashes used on the lawns.

About 500 tons of fresh stable manure has been collected from outside sources, placed in the

About 500 tons of fresh stable manure has been collected from outside sources, placed in the manure pit, and is in process of composting.

Nine hundred feet of stone drain has been laid in different parts of the Park.

The cellar under the dairy cottage has been repaired and a new floor constructed.

During the sleighing season a force of men were employed carting snow on the drives, and by so doing sleighing was enjoyed for a much longer time than on the outside drives.

About 8co loads of top-dressing were spread on the lawns.

At the large lake stone was placed along the banks at different points, to prevent the water washing away the earth from the roots of the trees.

Portions of the large lake and the streams in the Ramble have been cleaned, and 200 loads of offensive material removed therefrom.

A number of trees were removed, dead wood cut, and rock vines pruned.

In the construction of the new bridle road, 75 yards of rock were removed.

The urinals, cottages, summer-houses and skate building have received the necessary care and attention.

A large portion of the walks have received the necessary care, and in a short time will be in excellent condition.

The green and propagating houses have received their share of attention, and the routine work at the stables has been regularly attended to.

The mlets to the lakes have been cleaned and about 700 yards of material removed to the

67 basins have been cleaned.
A large number of trees have been planted in Tompkins Square, and the work of beautify-

A large number of trees have been planted in Tompkins Square, and the work of beautifying said park is nearly completed.

A trench has been dug from the green-houses to connect with the Croton-main on Fifth avenue, the pipe has been laid and connected, thereby supplying an abundance of water, and enabling two men to do the work of the ten formerly employed.

The gardeners have been employed in preparing frames for summer bedding plants, and thirty-eight have thus far been set; more than 7,500 cuttings have been made and potted for future use. The store-house has been overhauled, the plants cleaned, pots washed and their general condition intercept. improved.

Some of the shrubs have been removed and all are to be transplanted in the new nursery near the north meadow. At this point nearly two acres of land have been cleared and put in condition for the reception of nursery stock.

At Mount Morris Park numerous shrubs have been transplanted, the trees and vines pruned, and several trees removed.

To the west of Mount St. Vincent the vistas have been cut out and the vines along the western

To the west of Mount St. Vincent the vistas have been cut out and the vines along the western drive have been pruned and their condition improved.

At the New Reservoir on the West Drive, a large number of dead, diseased and crowded trees have been removed, the evergreens trimmed and the ground cleared of weeds, seeding trees, etc.

At Fifty-ninth street and Sixth avenue, nearly all the vines had become overgrown and much dead wood allowed to accumulate, to the detriment of the healthy and vigorous growth of the vines; this has been, for the most part, cut away, thus exposing the rock face along Fifty-ninth street.

At this point a large quantity of poison ivy has been removed and will be eradicated during the summer.

From Fifty-ninth to Sixty-fifth street, along the Eighth avenue wall, numerous dead and dis-

eased trees have been removed.

eased trees have been removed.

The carpenters have been engaged in erecting platforms at the skate-houses on the large and Harlem lakes, fitting up gentlemen's water-closets at same points and inclosing the Terrace, besides the general repair work of the Department.

Four new animal cages have been made and others repaired; new beams, rafters, floor, etc., have been placed in the ladies' cottage near the Dairy and the building generally overhauled.

A new water-tank has been provided for the boiler-room in the Arsenal, together with some

The gentlemen's cottage near the Dairy and the ladies' cottage near Bridge 12 have been thoroughly repaired. oughy reparted. Repairs have been made in the Curlers' Cottage, as also in ladies' cottage in the Ramble. A trap-door has been inserted in the floor of the boat-house on the large lake, and in the Swedish

Cottage, desks and shelves have been erected.

300 square feet of new floor has been laid in the workshops, and a new vent-box for engine-room roof constructed; 3 new blacksmiths' benches have been made and others repaired; 70 feet of partition has been erected in the stables, and 16 stalls fitted up; a new floor has also been laid and 30

Necessary repairs have been made in the Bryant Park cottage.

The gate-box at Eighty-second street and Fifth avenue, also the sentry-box at the Grant tomb have been repaired.

New rafters, plate purlines, etc., have been place in the rustic arbors on the West Drive, near

A measuring apparatus has been made for use of Police Surgeon, and a new closet constructed his room; platforms, shelves, etc., have been made and placed in Police sub-station at

223 settees have been repaired.

Alterations and repairs have been made in the platform in East River Park.

At the Grant tomb a new walk, 9 feet wide and 100 feet long, has been constructed.

New centres have been made for the masons, and new shields, slide and gate made for the south gate of the Harlem Lake.

The old fence at Seventy-fourth street and Fifth avenue has been removed and replaced with a new one; 93 new posts have been made, as also 245 signs; 74 signs have been repaired.

The walks of the Third Avenue Bridge have been repaired and a new boat made and an old one repaired for the Madison Avenue Bridge; the planking of the Central Bridge has also received

Two new derricks have been constructed for the use of the gardeners, and a temporary water-closet fitted up for the use of the men working on the Fourth Avenue Parks.

The following have also been made: 35 new hot-bed frames.

3 new large tool-boxes.

205 tree signs. 400 stakes.

200 feet shelving.

A steam-pump, road roller and water truck used in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards have been repaired, and one extension rod made.

A new partition has been erected in the office of the Superintendent Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

The rolling stock has been repaired and is now in good condition.

The painters have been employed in decorating the Commissioners' room in the Arsenal, in painting the various cottages, signs, settees, rolling stock, etc.

At the outlet of the Harlem Lake, three heavy walls of cut stone and brick have been constructed, and fitted with three 12-inch screw water-gates or stop-cocks.

Twenty-eight rock steps with the necessary stone foundations have been erected near Fifty-ninth street and Fifth avenue, and 325 feet of flagging reset at the Sheepfold.

The plumbers have been engaged in repairing water-pipes, water-closets, urinals and the watering trucks, besides any necessary new work.

The work of removing cocoons and egg-masses of insects destructive to trees, plants and shrubs has been continued during the past three months as the weather would permit, as also the removal of scale insects so abundant and destructive to the trees in the City parks. In addition to the entomological work, the work on the herbarium and the designing and making plans of flower beds for spring planting, has also been engaged in.

In addition to the above, a study of the protococcus (protococcus viridis), has been engaged in, which is added to this report; also, the usual observations on the blooming of trees and plants, and the coming of the birds and insects.

The general observation of the trees and shrubs, as to the ripening of the wood, and the first swelling of the buds.

A large number of microscopical insects have been examined and will be reported as soon as they can be definitely determined and classified, so as to be placed in their proper positions on the

The microscopical plant, protococcus viridis, so abundant on many trees, rocks, and the stone-work of the Park, is no doubt one of the agents which helps disintegrate the stone, and, by the retention of moisture, not only softens it but gives the frost an opportunity to wedge off the small particles by the freezing of the water held there. On the Terrace Bridge this is evident, and on the base of the "Schiller" statue, running down the centre, may be seen a rough portion covered with "protococcus," and already quite a portion of the stone has crumbled away. This microscopical plant, protococcus viridis, is classed among the "protophyto," the sub-kingdom containing certain imperfectly known genera, which are, in all probability, but degraded forms of algæ, such as the families "rivularieæ," "oscillaricæ," "nostochineæ," "palmelleæ," and "volvocineæ." They are gelatinous organisms, found on damp stones, trunks of trees, and the earth, in fresh water, either cold or thermal, rarely in the sea, and are composed either of globules, or of simple or branched filaments, continuous or chambered, and nearly always enveloped in mucilage.

Protococcus, the genus under consideration, includes various unicellular palmellaceæ. They

Protococcus, the genus under consideration, includes various unicellular palmellaceæ. They increase by division into two or four parts which separate, but are connected by a semi-gelatinous layer. Sometimes its cells give rise to four cilioted zoospores of two sizes, the larger of which settle down and develop a cellulose coat, while of the farther development of the smaller nothing

The famous "red snow" of the Arctic regions and the Alps, which is found also on stones in fresh water streams, belongs to this genus, and is know as "protococcus nivolis."

Protococcus viridis grows on the trunks of trees, on stones, on patches of mortar, and apparently in most places sufficiently moist and shaded to induce its growth.

As observed in the Central and City Parks, it is found chiefly on the northern and northwestern

exposures, being most abundant on many trees near the ground. On those favorable for the retention of moisture and sufficiently shaded, the "protococcus" is

apparently as luxuriant fifteen feet above as at the base.

Different species of trees seem to be more or less favorable to its growth, and often the shade of a limb protects it from the rays of the sun and the beating rain.

On the European beech (Fagus sylvatica) it is abundant at the base of the tree only; at the height of two feet but little is found. The bark being of a hard close texture does not favor its growth.

On the red maple (Acer rubrum) it does not seem to be abundant, the bark although rather soft is not "hygroscopic" and therefore does not favor its development.

On the American elm (Ulmus Americana) the growth is most luxuriant, extending to a great height, the soft spongy bark being favorable to it.

On the Scotch pine (Pinus sylvestris) the growth is apparently very feeble and under the microscope the cells were seen to be scarce and in small detached clusters of from four to six. This outside of the bark of this tree is of a corky nature and apparently not hygroscopic. The color is very dark with patches of a whitish substance which under the microscope was found to be covered with a minute thallus-like structure of extreme delicacy and beauty, having a concave surface and finely fringed edges, with this growth but few protocacci were found the thallus of this minute lichen contesting with them the right of occupancy.

On the Norway spruce (Picea excelsa) the growth seems to be most luxuriant on the branches and upper portions of the tree, the lower portion of the trunk being apparently too dry. In many specimens examined the gelatinous substance seemed to be of sufficient consistency to hold the smaller particles of quartz and foreign matter, in many cases the uplifting mass of growth was seen to carry upon it a great number of these particles.

On the Tulip tree (Liriodendon Tulipifera) the growth was the most luxuriant of any examined and the foreign matter less abundant, probably because the rapid growth standing out in large projecting clusters had covered it.

On the catalpa (Catalpa bignonioides) the plant had apparently been vigorous, yet when examined under the microscope it was found to be of a dark green and not of that bright yellow green so characteristic of vigorous growth.

On the European larch (Larix Europæa) the growth was not vigorous on the trunks, while on the branches and upper portions of the stem it appeared stronger, showing that on the bark of the younger wood it found a more congenial habitat. Under the microscope the masses were quite flat, and among them were observed masses of a white granular matter.

On the hibiscus (Hibiscus Syriacus) the growth was of the finest character, and hyphœ were observed in a budding process, having from two to six branched cells, below the hyphœ were the large masses of protococcus cells, which had been produced by fission, mostly in two's and four's, standing out in projecting clusters. In this specimen and in many others examined several brownish buds probably of another specie of protococcus were found showing growth by germination as well as by fission, and with abundant hyphœ.

On the white birch (Betula alba) the growth is chiefly confined to those broken portions of the bark which present a rough surface for the retention of moisture and the collecting of foreign matter. Under the microscope the growth was seen to be scanty, yet the hyphœ-bearing cells were abundant.

On the hemlock (Tsuga Canadensis) it was very abundant and of a bright yellow green, and the gelatinous mass was so strong that when placed under the cover-glass of a slide in water they were with difficulty separated.

On the deciduous cypress (Taxodium distichum), the plant was more vigorous than on any other coniferous tree, the soft spongy bark being well adapted for its growth.

On the west side of the "Park walls," along Fifth and Eighth avenues, the growth is so abundant that the coping and three tiers of Nova Scotia sandstone have a bright green color. The

next tier of North river blue stone has very little upon it, and on the basal course of gneiss none is apparent, yet on the mortar it is abundant.

On the Terrace, north of the Mall, the Nova Scotia sandstone on the northern and western exposures is covered with a rich growth, and no doubt this is one of the causes of the disintegration

The protococcus holding the moisture and the expansion by freezing, breaking the small particles of stone.

On the south side of the Transverse roads the growth is abundant, while on the north side but little is seen.

In treating the trees in the Central Park with polysolve, for the destruction of noxious insects the protococcus was apparently killed. After a week a rain storm set in which lasted for nearly three days. The growth in a short time was apparently as vigorous as ever on the portions of the tree that had been cleaned, giving the impression that the polysolve had either not killed the protococcus or that a new growth had rapidly been formed from the germs in the air. A number of experiments are now being tried to see if such is the case.

The following is a list of 100 trees which are prominently affected with "protococcus viridis" in the Central Park :

Magnolia glauca, Linn., Magnolia acuminata, Linn., Magnolia cordata, Michx., Magnolia macrophylla, Michx., Magnolia Umbrella, Lam., Magnolia conspicua, Salist; on the Magnolias the growth is near the ground and not abundant.

Liriodendron tulpifera, Linn.; luxuriant and of a bright yellow-green color.

Tilia Americana, Linn., Tilia Europæa, Linn., Tilia heterophylla, Vent., Tilia alba, Waldst and Kit; not abundant and chiefly at the bases of the trees.

Prelia trifolata. Linn.; abundant and luxurious

Ptelia trifoliata, Linn.; abundant and luxurious. Ilex Dahoon, Walter, Ilex opaca, Acton; not abundant and at the base.

Euonymus atropurpureus, Jacq., Euonymus Europœus, Linn.; abundant on both trunk and

Rhamnus catharticus, Linn.; little, if any, was observed upon this tree; the bark does not seem to be suitable for its growth.

Æsculus Hippocastauum, Linn., Æsculus flava, Art., Æsculus macrostachys; neither abundant nor vigorous.

Acer Pennsylvanicum, Linn., Acer spicatum, Lam., Acer circinatum, Pursh., Acer saccharinum, Wang., Acer dasycarpum, Ehrht., Acer rubrum, Linn., Acer platanoides, Linn., Acer Pseudo-Plotanus, Linn.; on Acer rubrum and Acer dasycarpum the growth does not seem to be as vigorous as on the remaining species.

Negundo aceroides, Moench; abundant and vigorous.

Robinia Pseudacacia, Linn., Robinia viscosa, Vent; quite abundant but apparently not vigorous. Gymnocladus Canadensis, Lam.; not abundant and in small detached masses. Gleditschia triacanthos, Linn.; very little was observed on this tree.

Cercis Canadensis, Linn.; a very small quantity at the base only.

Prunus serotina, Ehrht.; abundant at the base only; the bark apparently too hard for its growth. Pyrus Americana, D. C.; abundant and vigorous.

Cratægus Crus-Galli, Linn., Cratægus Coccinea, Linn., Cratægus oxycantha, Linn., Cratægus tomentosa, Linn.; growth not abundant and weak.

Amelanchier Canadensis, Torr. and Gray; abundant and vigorous.

Hamamelis Virginica, Linn.; very little was found on this tree.

Cornus florida, Linn.; not abundant and at the base only.

Nyssa sylvatica, Marshall; not abundant and only at the base.

Diospyros Virginiana, Linn.; not abundant and at the base of the tree only.

Halesia tetraptera, Linn.; growth very abundant and vigorous at the base; where the trees were bearing the growth extended well up the trunk.

Fraxinus Americana, Linn., Fraxinus pubescens, Linn., Fraxinus viridis, Michx. f., Fraxinus species, Linn., on the safe the preocecus find a suitable habitat as it is abundant and vigorous.

By reason of unsuitable weather during the past quarter little progress has been made in the work of construction, and only a small force of masons and stonecutters have been employed.

In the Central Park the cutters when not employed upon repairs have been dressing stone for the completion of the retaining-wall of Transverse Road No. 2.

The work done on same is 1,090 superficial feet of face stone, or 60 cubic yards of stone dressed.

The necessary excavating has been done at Seventy-seventh and Eighty-first streets and Eighth avenue for the changes made in the bridle roads.

On the City parks below the Central Park no construction work has been done.

MORNINGSIDE PARK IMPROVEMENT.

The work of the erection of granite steps, platforms, brick arches, iron beams, etc., required at the four octagonal bays and two entrances adjoining Morningside avenue, which was being done under contract, and in progress at the beginning of the quarter, has been prosecuted during favorable weather and has been fully completed.

RIVERSIDE PARK IMPROVEMENT.

No construction work has been done on this improvement.

On the low and marshy grounds within the Park near Seventy-ninth and Ninety-second streets, a large quantity of filling has been furnished and delivered from sources exterior to the Park and without cost to the Department; and on the easterly side of the avenue, from One Hundred and Second to One Hundred and Fourth streets, about 800 cubic yards of garden mould has been placed on the surface preparatory to the seeding of the plot.

ASSESSMENT MAPS AND LISTS FOR SEWER IN BROOK AVENUE.

The changes requested by the Board of Assessors in the maps and lists, so that the same should conform to the present tax maps, as required by section 869, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, has required the preparation of an entire new set of maps and lists to be made in duplicate, and which covers the

the preparation of an entire new set of maps and lists to be made in duplicate, and which covers the area of over 8,600 plots.

After having the same well advanced in order to comply with the requirements of chapter 530, Laws of 1885, it was necessary to again go over and indicate thereon all "unimproved land included within the lines of streets, avenues, roads, public squares, or places shown and laid out upon any map or maps filed by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks," and to compute the areas and make the necessary deductions from the original areas.
