#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 18, 1888:

There were 5,687 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.  
 There were 627 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.  
 There were 315 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.  
 There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 32 permits.  
 There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 4 permits.  
 There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 20 permits.

The certificates of 792 births, 62 still-births, 268 marriages and 796 deaths reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 18, 1888. This shows an increase of 7 births, 3 still-births, 56 marriages and 56 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1887 there was an increase of 131 births, 7 still-births, 44 marriages and 54 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; diphtheria, 9; whooping cough, 1; erysipelas, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 8; inanition, 5; rheumatism and gout, 1; bronchitis, 2; aneurism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; convulsions, 7; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1; premature and preterm births, 5; while the deaths from measles increased 6; scarlatina, 1; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 6; malarial fevers, 4; alcoholism, 2; cancer, 9; phthisis pulmonalis, 27; pneumonia, 7; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 3; apoplexy, 6; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 10; cyanosis and atelectasis, 5; surgical operations, 3; suicide, 4. The number of deaths from croup, puerperal diseases, heart diseases, gastritis, gastro-enteritis, enteritis and peritonitis and drowning, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 163 were in institutions, 440 in tenement-houses, 171 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 133 on the first, 207 on the second, 151 on the third, 84 on the fourth, 37 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 771 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 25 non-residents; 106 were stated to be single, 218 married, 97 widowed, and the condition of 375 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 796; still-births, 62; bodies in transitu, 12; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 83 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 792 births, 268 marriages, 62 still-births, 796 deaths; 12 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 151 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 11 transcripts of the birth record, 6 of marriage, and 106 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending February 18, 1888, was 26.4 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 30.029; the mean humidity was 89, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,340, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.07 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 751 deaths and still-births, or 87.53 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 27; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 291; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 116; Greenwood (undenominational), 47; Lutheran (undenominational), 94; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 22; Evergreen (undenominational), 51; Woodlawn (undenominational), 26; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 17; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 12; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 8; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 14; Washington (undenominational), 21.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending February 11, 1888, was in the following Wards, viz.: First, 9; Second, 0; Third, 5; Fourth, 13; Fifth, 7; Sixth, 16; Seventh, 19; Eighth, 31; Ninth, 35; Tenth, 20; Eleventh, 24; Twelfth, 106; Thirteenth, 20; Fourteenth, 24; Fifteenth, 16; Sixteenth, 14; Seventeenth, 51; Eighteenth, 38; Nineteenth, 134; Twentieth, 52; Twenty-first, 45; Twenty-second, 77; Twenty-third, 11; Twenty-fourth, 8.

The actual mortality for the week ending February 11, 1888, was 784; this is 46 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1887, and 87.2 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.01 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,509,081.

It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.

#### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:

"The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, public buildings and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which such rents are levied, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this chapter, or in any other chapter of the laws of this city, in the case of such buildings, the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters. \* \* \* \* \*

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

Meters will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

BAKERY.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURCHASERS.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work to be measured as bricks—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stalls not metered, the rates shall be as follows: HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough must be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STREAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot, one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each closet per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-closets, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three inches of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe waste to the street, and be approved by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

#### METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business or consumption, except private dwellings. It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law. \* \* \*"

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

#### Rate Without Meters.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien upon the premises, and the owner of the premises is responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all their applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such waste may be proved, unless it has occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.

must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed, will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 351 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter rents.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties for every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as regular charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled or returned on the books of the Department.
