

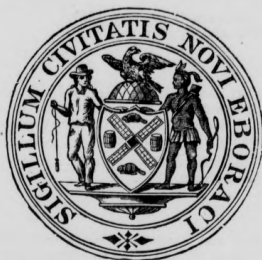

APPROVED PAPERS

Approved Papers for the week ending November 5, 1887.

Resolved, That the Suburban Rapid Transit Company be and hereby is authorized and directed to widen the roadway on the east side of Third avenue, opposite One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, in front of their property, in accordance with plan dated July 29, 1887, and filed with the Department of Public Parks, on condition that the said company agree to pave and keep in repair the portion of roadway so widened and to maintain a sidewalk fifteen feet wide in front of their property with a flagged footwalk four feet wide on the same, under the direction of the Department of Public Parks.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 321 of the New York City Consolidated Act of 1883, passed July 1, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after July 1, 1887, shall be added, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through a water meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Assessors, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, to be imposed in each and every case of non-payment of water rents, and every person violating the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the

use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or consumed.
