Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 16, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,069.
 The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 310.
 During the past week 212 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.
 There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 24 permits.
 There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 10 permits.
 There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 5 miscellaneous permits.
 There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 23 permits.
 At premises where contagious diseases were reported 192 visits were made, and 87 disinfections and 22 fumigations were performed.
 The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 6.
 The number of vaccinations performed was 1,888, of which 72 were primary, and 1,816 revaccinations.
 There were seized and condemned 7,145 pounds of meat.
 The number of specimens of milk examined was 52, the number of arrests made was 7, and the amount of fines imposed was \$25.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 23, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,614.
 The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 381.
 During the past week 173 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.
 There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 38 permits.
 There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 6 permits.
 There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 4 miscellaneous permits.
 There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks, 16 permits.
 At premises where contagious diseases were reported 107 visits were made, and 64 disinfections, and 18 fumigations were performed.
 The number of cases of contagious diseases removed to Riverside Hospital was 12.
 The number of vaccinations performed was 2,159, of which 46 were primary, and 2,113 revaccinations.
 There were seized and condemned 5,835 pounds of meat.
 The number of specimens of milk examined was 73, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 45, and the amount of fines imposed was \$86.

The certificates of 530 births, 61 still-births, 207 marriages and 652 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 16, 1886. This shows a decrease of 310 births, 70 marriages and 58 deaths, and the same number of still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was a decrease of 106 births and 7 still-births, and an increase of 4 marriages and 9 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 6; diphtheria, 6; whooping-cough, 5; typhus fever, 2; typhoid fever, 1; malarial fevers, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 5; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 5; phthisis pulmonalis, 28; bronchitis, 3; aneurism, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; convulsions, 7; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 9; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 9; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; drowning, 1; while the deaths from small-pox increased 2; measles, 1; croup, 1; erysipelas, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 3; inanition, 1; pneumonia, 6; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 4; premature and preterm births, 5; surgical operations, 2; suicide, 4. The number of deaths from rheumatism and gout, and heart diseases was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 114 were in institutions, 369 in tenement-houses, 161 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 3 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 136 on the first, 179 on the second, 127 on the third, 58 on the fourth, 26 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 652 were stated to be residents of New York City and 0 non-resident; 88 were stated to be single, 177 married, 80 widowed, and the condition of 307 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 136 were in institutions, 404 in tenement-houses, 160 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 18 were on the basement floor, 119 on the first, 170 on the second, 157 on the third, 78 on the fourth, 29 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 710 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 6 non-residents; 107 were stated to be single, 176 married, 95 widowed, and the condition of 338 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 716; still-births, 57; bodies in transitu, 15; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 86 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 674 births, 200 marriages, 57 still-births, 716 deaths; 15 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 137 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 5 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 75 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending January 23, 1886, was 28.3 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.001; the mean humidity was 80, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,324, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.99 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

THE CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE CROTON Aqueduct reports to me to-day that during the past twenty days the water in the city reservoirs has gone down three feet three inches, equal to 98,000,000 gallons, showing that this amount of water was used and wasted over and above the supply received through the Croton Aqueduct and the Bronx river. The Department has no means to stop this enormous waste, which is caused by consumers keeping faucets open day and night to prevent freezing in the service-pipes, and can only make this most urgent appeal to them to stop it, and notify them that unless it is stopped the pressures in the water-mains will be so much reduced that in a few days the water will not rise to the basements and cellars in thousands of buildings.
