Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 16, 1886 :

Janu ary 16, 1886: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,069. The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 310. During the past week 212 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 24 permits. There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 10 permits. There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 5 miscellaneous permits. There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 5 miscellaneous permits. There were issued to coasignees to an disinfect privy sinks, 23 permits. At premises where contagious diseases were reported 192 visits were made, and 87 disinfections and 22 fumigations were performed. The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 6. The number of vaccinations performed was 1,888, of which 72 were primary, and 1,816 re-vaccinations.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 6 permits. There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 4 miscellaneous permits. There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks, 16 permits. At premises where contagious diseases were reported 107 visits were made, and 64 disinfections, and 18 fumigations were performed. The number of cases of contagious diseases removed to Riverside Hospital was 12. The number of vaccinations performed was 2,159, of which 46 were primary, and 2,113 revac cinations.

There were seized and condemned 5,835 pounds of meat. The number of specimens of milk examined was 73, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 45, and the amount of fines imposed was \$86.

The certificates of 530 births, 61 still-births, 207 marriages and 652 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the weck ending Saturday, January 16, 1886. This shows a decrease of 310 births, 70 marriages and 58 deaths, and the same number of still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding weck; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was a decrease of 106 births and 7 still-births, and an increase of 4 marriages and 9 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 6; diphtheria, 6; whooping-cough, 5; typhus fever, 2; typhoid fever, 1; malarial fevers, 3; diarthceal diseases, 5; alcoholism, 1; convulsions, 7; apoptery, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 9; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; gastritis, entertitis and peretonitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 9; cyanosis and ateletasis, 1; drowning, 1; while the deaths from small-pox increased 2; measles, 1; croup, 1; erysipelas, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 3; inanition, 1; pneumonia, 6; marasmus, tabes mesen-tereca and scroula, 4; premature and preternatural births, 5; surgical operations, 2; suicide, 4. The number of deaths from rheumatism and gout, and heart diseases was the same in the two successive weeks.

Whereas, The power to regulate the use of the streets and sidewalks for signs, sign-posts, awn-ings, awning-posts, horse-troughs, urinals, telegraph posts and other purposes is vested by law or charter exclusively in the Common Council of this City; and Thereas, It has been quite recently held by the courts that it is not competent for the Common Council to delegate any of its powers, but they must be regarded as "public powers and trusts, devolved by law or charter upon the Common Council, or governing body, to be exercised by it when and in such manner as it shall judge best, and cannot be delegated to others; " and "Whereas, The ordinance approved February 24, 1866, vesting in the Mayor, the power " to regulate permits for street stands, show-cases, signs, stairways, hoistways and deliveries," and the several amendments thereto; also sections 281, 282, 283, 284, 283, 286, 287, 288, 280, 290 and 291 of article XXX of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, and all the amendments thereto, including the resolutions approved April 8, 1884, which went into effect May 1, 1884, delegating this power to the Mayor through the Register of Permits, are clearly illegal, and every such per-mit so granted is null and void, and of no binding effect ; be it therefore Resolved, That the said ordinance approved February 24, 1866, and the several amendments thereto, "to regulate permits for street stands, show-cases, signs, stairways, hoistways and deliv-eries"; also sections 281 to 291, inclusive, of article XXX of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, and the several amendments thereto, including the resolutions approved April 8, 1884, which went into effect May 1, 1884, delegating like powers to the Mayor, through the Register of Permits, be and they are hereby severally and respectively annulled, rescinded and repealed, and the sid office of Register of Permits be and is hereby abolished.
