Petition of property-owners on One Hundred and Eighteenth street, from Tenth avenue to Morningside avenue, for a change of grade.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

The undersigned owners of lots of land on One Hundred and Eighteenth street, between Tenth avenue and Morningside avenue, in said city, respectfully petition that the grade of said One Hundred and Eighteenth street, between said avenues, be fixed and established as follows, viz.:

At Tenth avenue, at a grade of 126 feet and 6 inches; at a distance of 194 feet east of Tenth avenue, at a grade of 137 feet; at a distance of 250 feet east of Tenth avenue, at a grade of 137 feet and 5 inches; at a distance of 300 feet east of Tenth avenue, at a grade of 137 feet, and at Morningside avenue, at a grade of 128 feet.

Your petitioners state that since the grade of One Hundred and Eighteenth street was established between said avenues, the grade of the crown of One Hundred and Seventeenth street has been lowered, and that the grade of One Hundred and Eighteenth street should be lowered for uniformity, in pursuance to this petition, and that a change of such grade would be an improvement to said One Hundred and Eighteenth street and to the property on that street.
