Hon. P. N. Malone, Fourth Avenue and Twenty-sixth Street, City:

Dear Mr. Malone—At the last meeting of the Committee on Streets and Local Improvements of the above organization I was directed to request you to present the inclosed resolution at the next meeting of the Board of Aldermen (to-morrow). Strangers coming into this locality find it almost impossible to locate certain street numbers. For instance, the block between Third and Fourth avenues may be numbered under the old plan. The block on the same street between Fourth and Fifth avenues may be numbered under the new system, and the numbers begin with the 400's.

What we are seeking for is a uniform system of numbering the houses, and the Commissioner of Public Works informs us that the inclosed resolution will give him the necessary authority to compel property-owners to do this. Very truly yours,

The Harlem Board of Commerce,

Hon. James Owens, Alderman, Thirty-seventh District, New York City:

Dear Sir—Our Board has for several years tried to arrange with the steamboats plying on the Hudson river to make a landing going north and south at the pier foot of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street. We succeeded, above five years since, in having the Public Dump removed from this pier and the pier repaired. It afterward was rebuilt and the upper part or second story used for a Recreation Pier. The first story can be used for steamboat traffic and not interfere with the full use of the upper part for recreation purposes. The population north of Eighty-sixth street and below the Harlem river is over 600,000. Any of these wishing to use the Hudson river steamboats are compelled to go either to Twenty-second or Desbrosses streets. This we believe to be gross injustice to the people living in this upper section of the City. A landing can easily be made at the One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street pier, and reached by all surface cars, and is, therefore, very convenient. We would respectfully petition the honorable Board of Aldermen to pass a resolution requesting the Hudson river steamboat companies to make a landing at the One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street pier for the benefit of passengers living north of Eighty-sixth street wishing to use their boats. We request also that you ask the Department of Docks to make as favorable leases with the steamboat companies for said pier as will be consistent with the rights of the city, and also give such needed accommodations on said pier that may be required for the better transportation of passengers.

We think that the taxpayers of the Twelfth (12th) Ward are entitled to be heard and their request granted.

Resolved, That the Dock Commissioner be and he is hereby respectfully requested to set aside the pier and slip at the foot of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street and the Hudson river for the use of passenger and freight steamers plying upon that stream. COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Corporation Counsel:

No. 235.

Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel,
New York, February 14, 1902.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—On the 19th day of December, 1899, my predecessor in office sent to the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York a communication relating to an assessment for repaving Nostrand avenue from Prospect place to Park place, in the former

City of Brooklyn. That communication may be found on page 1,767, Vol. IV., of the proceedings of the Council for the year 1899. This communication was referred to the Committee on Law Department, with instructions to prepare before the next meeting of the Board a proper enacting resolution, as indicated by the Corporation Counsel, to declare null and void an excessive assessment, and to direct a reassessment in accordance with the recommendation of the Corporation Counsel. No further action, however, was ever taken on the subject. In that communication the facts and the law are stated as follows:

"Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel,

"New York, December 19, 1899.

"To the Honorable the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York:

"Gentlemen—On the 31st day of December, 1897, an assessment for repaving Nostrand avenue from Prospect place to Park place, in the City of Brooklyn, was confirmed. This improvement was undertaken in accordance with the provisions of section 50, of title 15, of the Charter of the City of Brooklyn, as the same was amended by chapter 1,008 of the Laws of 1895 and chapter 771 of the Laws of 1896. This section provided, among other things, that 'one-half of the cost of such repavement should be borne by the city at large, and the other one-half by the property benefited, to be assessed thereon in the same manner as other assessments for local improvements are laid, except that it shall not be necessary to lay said assessment until after the completion of the work; provided, however, that in all cases where a surface railroad is laid and operated through any such street, one-half of the cost of such repavement shall be assessed upon such railroad and one-quarter thereof on the other property benefited within the district of assessment.'

"There is a surface railroad laid and operated upon Nostrand avenue through the length of this improvement. The Assessors of the City of Brooklyn, however, in laying the assessment, neglected to lay that portion of the assessment which was required by law to be placed upon the railroad company upon the property of that corporation, but placed one-half of the entire cost of the improvement upon the other property-owners along the line of the improvement, thus illegally increasing the assessment against the said property-owners to the extent of one-half of the amount legally assessable against them. By the Greater New York charter it is provided that all the powers and duties conferred or charged upon the Common Council of the City of Brooklyn shall be exercised and performed by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York except where otherwise provided by the Charter (section 46). Among the powers formerly authorized to be exercised by the Common Council of the City of Brooklyn were the following:

"Sec. 15. Whenever the attorney and counsel of the city shall be of opinion that any proceeding or assessments for local improvements are invalid and void by reason of irregularity in the conducting or laying the same, he shall forthwith report such opinion, and the reasons therefor, to the Common Council, and the Common Council shall enter an order in their minutes of proceedings declaring such assessments invalid and void, and the said assessments shall thereupon be held and deemed to be invalid and void, and the said Common Council are hereby authorized and empowered to cause the amount of such assessments to be reassessed, and to have new proceedings taken and reassessments made, in the same manner as the original proceedings and assessment should have been made, and such new proceedings and reassessment shall have the same effect as the original proceedings and assessments would have had had they been properly taken and made.' (Tit. X.)

"Sec. 18. In any case where an assessment for local improvement has been heretofore levied and confirmed, and the whole or a part which remains unpaid, the Common Council shall have power (if they shall be satisfied that injustice has heretofore been done to the parties assessed), to direct a new assessment to be levied for the amount remaining unpaid, with the interest thereon. They may enlarge and extend the district heretofore assessed as they may deem just and equitable, and the Board of Assessors, in levying and assessing said new assessment shall credit to all parties who may have paid the previous assessment the amount so paid by them, respectively, and their property shall be liable only for the balance, if any, of the new assessment, over and above the amount so paid by them respectively, and all proceedings for levying, confirming and collecting said new assessment shall be as is now provided by law.' (Tit. XIX.)

Upon this statement, I am of opinion that the assessment for repaving Nostrand avenue, from Prospect place to Park place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, is invalid and void, because of the invalidity in conducting or laying the same, for the reason that the Assessors of the City of Brooklyn, in laying said assessment, failed to observe the provision of law relating to assessments for such improvements, in that they neglected to impose upon the railroad company one-quarter of the expense of such improvement, as directed by said section 50 of title XV. of the Charter of the City of Brooklyn, but illegally placed one-half of the expense of said assessment upon the other property-owners along the line of the improvement.

I advise you that it is your duty in the premises to declare said assessment invalid and to direct that a new assessment be laid in accordance with law.

Hon. Charles V. Fornes, President Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—Prior to 1898, under a then existing ordinance of the Common Council, the Commissioner of Public Works had authority to obtain from the Comptroller, by requisition from time to time, the sum of \$300 from the appropriation for "Contingencies" for incidental expenses, such as postage, telegraphing, etc., renewing the advance upon requisition and furnishing at the same time a sworn statement of the disbursements made under the preceding advance.

The dissolution of the old Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, and the devolution of the subjects of gas and electricity upon this department, render it eminently necessary that the Board of Aldermen should, as early as possible, pass an ordinance authorizing the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to make such requisition and disbursements, and authorizing the Comptroller to make the advance.

I inclose herewith a draft of the proposed ordinance, and ask the favor of your action and influence to secure its early adoption.

Resolved, That, for the purpose of defraying any minor or incidental expenses contingent to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, as cannot be conveniently accounted for on separate vouchers, the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity may, by requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding three hundred (\$300) dollars.

The Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, may, in like manner, renew the drafts as often as may by him be deemed necessary, to the extent of the appropriation set apart for the contingencies of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity; but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers, certified by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, covering the expenditure of the money paid thereon.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—Prior to January 1, 1902, the authority of the Commissioner of Water Supply to cause water meters to be placed in buildings was limited to buildings in which water was used for business consumption (section 475, Charter of 1897).

By the Revised Charter, section 475, the Commissioner at the head of this Department may, if authorized by resolution or ordinance of the Board of Aldermen, cause meters to be placed in all apartment houses, tenements, flat houses and private dwellings.

The primary object of the water meter is to prevent, as far as possible, waste of water, and to provide the penalty for waste, when it does occur, by compelling the consumer to pay for the waste at meter rates.

There is no possible doubt that immense quantities of water are wasted in apartment houses, tenement houses and private dwellings in a majority of cases through defective and leaky plumbing, because the owner or tenant neglects or refuses to obey the

law and regulations which require him to keep the plumbing in good condition; in many other cases through wilful or wanton waste in letting the water run from faucets when there is no occasion for its use.

I believe that waste from either of these causes has assumed immense proportions, and the entire community, including honest and careful water consumers as well as dishonest and careless ones, is bonded and taxed for cost of works and maintenance to furnish the water thus wasted.

These conditions and considerations make it eminently desirable that your Board confer on the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity authority, in his discretion, to cause water meters to be placed in apartment houses, tenements, flat houses and private dwellings, and I respectfully submit herewith the draft of a resolution to that effect.

Gentlemen—I request that in accordance with section 56 of the Greater New York Charter you recommend to the Board of Aldermen that the salaries of two additional Deputy Paymasters in the Department of Finance be fixed at \$2,500 each.

On account of the change of law relative to the Department of Education,

which went into effect on January 1, and because of the changes in the system of making payments which I have instituted, the Paymaster and his deputies are required to sign about twice as many checks as formerly. The Paymaster now has five deputies and he believes that with two additional deputies he will be able to cope with the increased work.

The changes in the system of making payments by having checks sent direct to the different departments and offices rather than require city employees to call at an office of the Paymaster, thus needlessly wasting time, enable me to vacate four branch offices. These offices have either been turned over, or will be turned over, to other departments, and the saving in the rentals has been estimated by the Engineer of the Department of Finance at \$5,075 per annum. It will be seen, therefore, that, while the creation of two new positions of Deputy Paymaster will increase the salary roll \$5,000 per annum, the changes in the system which make it necessary to employ an additional force will result in a slight saving to the city, as well as add greatly to the convenience of city employees.

The proposed compensation of \$2,500 to each of the new Deputy Paymasters is the same as is now paid to Deputy Paymasters, and the appropriation is sufficient to cover the same.

REASONS FOR ENLARGEMENT OF WORKING FORCE OR INCREASE OF SALARIES.

Enlargement of Working Force.

1. Housekeeper needed for care of linen room, hiring and supervision of Laundresses, Seamstresses, Scrubwomen, etc.
2. Reception Agent (woman), speaking German, French and Italian, required in office, to meet relatives and friends of patients.
3. Supervising Engineer required to look after engines and heating plant at Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.
4. Manager of Laundry needed to give proper care to machinery and work.
5. Ten Trained Female Nurses added to oversee Male Wards—beginning of plan to have women Head Nurses in all Male Wards.
6. Bookkeeper and Contract Clerk needed for proper keeping of books—transferred from Charities Department.
7. Clerk also required for same reason—transferred from Charities Department.
8. Purchasing Agent, to purchase supplies for hospitals of department.
9. Stenographer needed for proceedings of Board of Trustees and to aid in office work of the Hospital.
10. Secretary to President to attend to correspondence of the Board of Trustees, as well as general business of the Department.
11. Two additional Engineers at Gouverneur Hospital, required by the eight hour law.
12. One more Engineer at Bellevue, required by eight hour law.

Increase of Salaries.

- A. The salary of the present Superintendent was increased last year because his family lived outside the Hospital.
- B. The salary of the Deputy Superintendent is increased because of his twenty-five years' service and to make it commensurate with his responsibilities.
- C. The salary of the Resident Physician of the Insane Pavilion has been increased to an amount sufficient to procure an efficient alienist from the State Hospitals for the Insane.
- D. The salary of the Stenographer is increased to the amount usual for good work.
- E. Slight increase in total salary list of Hospital Helpers required in order to pay wages sufficient (\$20 per month to men and \$15 per month to women) to attract and keep a respectable, trustworthy class of people. At present the Helpers, who come into intimate contact with the patients, are largely made up of old Work-house offenders. With the improvement in character the number of helpers is to be reduced, thus lessening the expense for maintenance.
- F. The great increase in cost of administration of Gouverneur Hospital is due to the size of the new hospital, containing one hundred and one (101) patients, instead of the thirty-nine (39) in the old building.

Hon. C. V. FORNES, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—Pursuant to your instructions of January 6, 1902, I beg to submit herewith a statement of the payroll of this department as it stood on December 31, 1898, the payroll as it stood on December 31, 1901, and the payroll proposed for 1902, arranged in parallel columns so as to show each increase or decrease in salary and each increase or decrease in the number of persons employed under each title. I have endeavored to suggest in a very few words the general nature of the duties performed by each employee of the department, whenever such duties are not indicated by the title of the position.

In preparing this schedule I have had constantly in mind the desire of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that every item of expense not absolutely necessary for conducting the public business should be excluded and every item included should be reduced to the lowest possible expenditure consistent with efficient service. You will note that in very instance the payrolls of the various offices in this department have been decreased; that the payroll of the Central Office in Manhattan and The Bronx has been decreased from \$38,830 to \$35,296; of the Central Office in Brooklyn from \$52,640 to \$41,420, and of the Out Door Poor Department from \$30,853 to \$29,908. After a careful examination, however, I have not felt able to recommend any reduction in the numbers of those actually engaged in the care of patients in the hospitals and other institutions of this department; in fact, in two or three instances I have felt constrained to ask for an increase in the number of nurses, having become convinced that the present nursing service in two or three of the institutions is inadequate for the proper and creditable care of the sick.

I have also felt obliged to ask for an increase in the number of Engineers employed in several of the institutions. I find that this department has been violating both the spirit and the letter of the law requiring a licensed engineer to be in charge at all times of boiler plants. The hours of service required of the Engineers have also been excessive. The increase which is necessary to comply with the law regarding licensed engineers, to approximate the eight hour day (though not to secure this fully), and to more nearly approach the prevailing rate of wages, amounts to \$5,300 per annum.

The bakery in this department was, during the latter part of 1900 and the early part of 1901, manned by paid men, but on account of the scarcity of funds, prison labor was again restored in the bakery about the middle of 1901. The paid bakers were, however, reinstated by my predecessor to take effect on January 1, 1902. I have continued the employment of paid men, finding a consensus of opinion throughout the department that the results when paid men are employed are much more satisfactory than when the work is performed by prisoners. I have also been obliged to ask for a moderate increase for the salaries of nurses and helpers in the new tuberculosis pavilion which I have opened in connection with the Metropolitan Hospital.

In Brooklyn two new hospitals are about to be opened by this department, and this necessitates a considerable increase in the salary list for 1902, as compared with December 31, 1901. Another fact which increases the payroll for 1902 as compared with December 31, 1901, is that a Reception Hospital is maintained during the summer months at Coney Island, the employees of which do not appear on any payroll of December 31, 1901.

During the year 1901 our expenses were but \$4,096.64, while the attendance of patients was larger than ever, being 38,632.

Our treasury's main reliance are the voluntary contributions of about 250 members.

Lack of funds prevented the proper arrangement of the interior of our building and the purchase of necessary instruments. On account of the increased attendance we shall be obliged to make many interior alterations, and must provide many new instruments in order to give the sick poor the best scientific treatment obtainable.

We estimate an expenditure of not less than \$5,000 to enable us to make the most necessary improvements.

As we are located in a district where there are many deserving poor, who call constantly for medical treatment of their sick, and as our income is inadequate to make necessary improvements, etc., we beg your honorable body to make us an increased allowance.

REASONS FOR ENLARGEMENT OF WORKING FORCE OR INCREASE OF SALARIES.

Enlargement of Working Force.

1. Housekeeper needed for care of linen room, hiring and supervision of laundresses, seamstresses, scrubwomen, etc.
2. Reception Agent (woman), speaking German, French and Italian, required in office to meet relatives and friends of patients.
3. Supervising Engineer required to look after engines and heating plant at Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.
4. Manager of Laundry needed to give proper care to machinery and work.
5. Ten Trained Nurses (female) added to oversee Male Wards—beginning of plan to have women Head Nurses in all Male Wards.
6. Bookkeeper and Contract Clerk needed for proper keeping of books—both were transferred from Charities Department.
7. Clerk also required for same reason—transferred from Charities Department.
8. Purchasing Agent, to purchase supplies for Hospitals of Department.
9. Stenographer needed for proceedings of Board of Trustees, and to aid in office work of the Hospital.
10. Secretary to President to attend to correspondence of the Board of Trustees, as well as general business of the Department.
11. Two additional Engineers at Gouverneur Hospital required by the eight-hour law.
12. One more Engineer at Bellevue required by eight-hour law.

Increase of Salaries.

- A. The salary of the present Superintendent was increased last year because his family lived outside the Hospital.
- B. The salary of the Deputy Superintendent is increased because of his twenty-five years' service and to make it commensurate with his responsibilities.
- C. The salary of the Resident Physician of the Insane Pavilion has been increased to an amount sufficient to procure an experienced alienist from the State Hospitals for the Insane.
- D. The salary of the Stenographer is increased to the amount usual for good work.
- E—Slight increase in total salary list of Hospital Helpers required in order to pay wages sufficient (\$20 per month to men and \$15 per month to women) to attract and keep a respectable, trustworthy class of people. At present, the Helpers, who come into intimate contact with the patients, are largely made up of old work-house offenders. With the improvement in character, the number of Helpers is to be reduced, thus lessening the expense for maintenance.
- F—The Great increase in cost of administration of Gouverneur Hospital is due to the size of the new hospital, containing one hundred and one (101) patients, instead of the thirty-nine (39) in the old building.

SUPPLIES.

The estimate for supplies is based on the method recommended by the Commissioner of Accounts, October 27, 1899, except that it is based on the actual expense for the year 1901 instead of for the first six months of 1901. In one respect, however, this method has been departed from. The average census of patients in Gouverneur Hospital for 1900 was 34 and for 1901 78, an increase of 129.4-10 per cent. This was due to the opening of a new and larger hospital on January 7, 1901. It is evident that the average census for 1902 will not increase at the same rate as compared with 1901, as that for 1901 increased, as compared with 1900. The average census of patients for 1902 is likely to be about $\frac{1}{4}$ more than during 1901. We have, therefore, asked for an increased appropriation of supplies for Gouverneur Hospital of 12½ per cent. and not of 129.4-10 per cent., as would be required by the compliance with the method as suggested by the Commissioner of Accounts.

The supplies for 1901 were notoriously inadequate, particularly as to clothing and bedding, lumber and fuel and lights. We have therefore felt obliged to ask for an increase of 10 per cent. in order to meet the present scarcity of clothing and other supplies and also to allow for a moderate stock on hand January 1, 1903, since this Department is no longer allowed to draw from the General Storehouse on Blackwell's Island.

To the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—The Brooklyn Central Dispensary appeals through you to the Board of Estimate.

This dispensary has been organized and providing for the sick poor for fifty years last past.

It has a three-story brick building, built and equipped for a dispensary at a cost of fourteen thousand dollars (\$14,000).

It was erected by the generosity of its Trustees, some of whom left bequests at their death for payment of its construction.

The use of this building, equipments, medical attendance and advice is given to the city free of charge.

The Trustees were obliged to raise among themselves the sum of eighteen hundred dollars (\$1,800) to pay the running expenses for the year 1900 in addition to the amount paid by the city.

The Trustees feel that an institution that has for so many years provided for from 13,500 to 25,000 patients annually should be encouraged in its work, as some of the Trustees feel unable to meet the exactions upon their purses, in addition to the time and services necessary to properly carry on this charity.

We feel that this is a matter in which, upon an examination on your part, you would feel warranted in making an exception to the rule generally applied to dispensaries in this city.

MEMORANDUM OF DETAILS, to accompany Estimate of Expenditures necessary for the conduct of the Office of the Surrogate of the County of Kings, for the year 1902.

a. These various Recording Clerks have been put in the same class, and it is proposed to pay them equal salaries of one thousand dollars per year, and consequently this will necessitate the various reductions marked opposite each clerk.

b. The persons occupying these positions were, previous to the year 1898, employed in the office in doing the same class of work in which they are now engaged, but instead of being in receipt of a salary they were paid by fees. It is my understanding that at the request of Comptroller Coler they were placed upon a salary basis.

c. This is a new position, which may be designated as the Guardian Accounting Clerk, provided for by section 2844 of the Code of Civil Procedure. Under the provisions of the statutes, guardians of infants are required to annually file their account with the Surrogate's Court. The Surrogate is required to examine these accounts, and if same are not satisfactory to compel further and proper accountings. Section 2844 of the Code provides that if it is impossible for this examination to be made by the Surrogate or his Clerk or another clerk in the office, the Board must provide for a suitable compensation to be paid to the clerk who is to do this duty. I find that there has been no systematic examination of these accounts in my office, and that only about ten per cent (10%) of the Guardians appointed have attempted to make any accountings at all, and I think it is of great importance that the rights of these infants should be investigated and protected. As all of my time and that of the other clerks in the office is taken up with the specific duties which we are compelled to perform, I make the request for this new position, and as it will require the services of a competent person who will give it careful and assiduous attention, I think the salary should be fixed at not less than three thousand dollars a year.

d. CONTINGENT EXPENSES \$5,000.

The contingent expenses are sub-divided as follows:

This is apparently a very large increase over the previous year in Contingent Expenses, but an examination of the details of same will show that the increase is more apparent than real, and is caused by the following circumstances:

1. The item of recopying of old and mutilated records is necessitated by the condition of the first ten books containing the records of wills. These books are in very bad condition and should be recopied, so that the old ones could be placed in some safe place for preservation. The old books were written many years ago; the ink is quite faded; in all of them the paper is being torn and mutilated to such an extent that parts of the pages are in danger of dropping out. These books form the basis to the title of nearly all the real property in this County, and are the only original evidences of such titles, and their preservation should be attended to with the greatest of care. I will cheerfully produce one or all of these books for the inspection of the Board of Estimate to show that the request is well founded.

2. Telephone Service—The present telephone service has been entirely inadequate. There is one ordinary wall telephone, which is used by the entire office force. I find that attorneys doing business in New York and places not immediately adjoining the Courthouse telephone to the special clerks and ask for information. This necessitates the clerk leaving his desk and going to the telephone, and not only wastes his time, but interferes with the attention he gives to persons he is then doing business with. I have, therefore, obtained an estimate from the telephone company of the expense of having a switchboard with a branch telephone on the desk of each of the various clerks who are being continually spoken to over the telephone and the above item will, in my judgment, enable this to be properly done.

3. The furniture, repair, carpeting, etc., item it is somewhat difficult to precisely specify what is to be done. I have already had occasion to order one desk, and there will be one or two more needed before the close of the year. There is, necessarily, in connection with the large amount of furniture in the office, continually small repairs being made to the same, which in the aggregate, amount to considerable. The carpets in the office have been down over eight years, and during the summer they should be removed and cleaned. I believe the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) a very conservative estimate of the amount required.

Previous to the year 1902 all of the supplies for the office in the way of telephones, furniture, and similar supplies, were obtained from the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, and consequently the Contingent Fund of the Surrogate made no provisions for purchasing anything of this character. The Corporation Counsel, however, has advised the Superintendent of Buildings that under the new Charter these supplies must be purchased by each Department from the Contingent Fund awarded to that Department by your Board.

Under this opinion the items contained in the above estimate of 2, 3, 4, 6, 8 and 9 are the items which were formerly supplied to us by the Department of Buildings, Lighting and Supplies.

You will observe that the total of these items amount to the sum of nineteen hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$1,925). This leaves, therefore, for the same contingent expenses which we had last year, in which these special items were not included, the sum of five hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$575), which is practically only an increase of seventy-five dollars (\$75). As a matter of fact, I find that the actual amount expended by the Surrogate for the year 1901, of his Contingent Fund, was the sum of seven hundred and sixty-eight dollars and eighty cents (\$768.80), the difference which would thus have been occasioned being made up by the transfer to the Contingent Fund of an unexpended balance for salaries. I would like to call attention to the fact that my contingent expenses this year will necessarily be somewhat heavier than last year, as the clerk who will take charge of the Guardians' Accounts will necessarily have to expend a considerable amount for postage and stationery which has not before been necessary. With this general statement of the increase in the Contingent Expenses I will now take up in detail the other various items which I have specified heretofore.

4. It seems to me proper that there should be a few law books purchased for the direct use of the Surrogate. I find that there is connected with the office some minutes of the Board of Aldermen and some old directories. There is only the New York reports from 137 onward, a few of the miscellaneous and Hun reports and the Appellate Division reports. The Surrogate's Court, not being in the same building with the Law Library, which is contained in the regular Courthouse, it is very much in need of having a small working library. I would call attention to the fact that the Law Library in the Courthouse is very convenient to the Supreme Court rooms, and that equal convenience should be extended to the Surrogate's Court.

5. The postage item is an absolute disbursement, which cannot be avoided. Last year one hundred and seventeen dollars (\$117) was actually used for this purpose, and, as I have stated above, the employment of a Guardian Accounting Clerk will necessitate a large additional outlay, and, in my judgment, two hundred dollars (\$200) is absolutely necessary.

6. The amount for file boxes is an absolute necessity.

The volume of business is increasing rapidly and requires a greater number than in the past. At the present there are absolutely none of them. I was compelled to give an order for six dozen of these files, at nine dollars and sixty cents (\$9.60) a dozen. These have to be specially made for the office, and if I was in a position to give a larger order they could be bought more cheaply.

7. Box in the Safe Deposit Company. This is a necessity for the deposit of wills which are left with the Surrogate, and, of course, cannot be omitted.

8. I have estimated as to the amount of ice which will probably be required, and, with the number of coolers which will be necessary, think that the above sum is absolutely necessary.

9. The item for typewriters and supplies for same is lower by fifty per cent. (50%) than I found in the past necessary to expend on typewriters in my private office.

10 and 11. The items 10 and 11 are plainly necessary, and, of course, can only be estimated. The amounts are small and, I believe, are very conservative.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—In conformity with the request of the Hon. Edward M. Grout, Comptroller, as per his circular letter of January 16, 1902, St. John's Guild hereby submits its revised estimate of its expenditures for the year 1902.

By chapter 501 of the Laws of 1894 your Honorable Board was directed to pay to St. John's Guild annually "to be applied to the maintenance and operation of its hospitals, to the support of its other charitable work and to the general uses and purposes of said Society," \$30,000.

Such payments were made for several years.

In the budget made up for the years 1900 and 1901 the annual appropriations thus authorized and directed were reduced from \$30,000 to \$20,000, notwithstanding (1) that the persons receiving the support of the Guild increased in numbers during these years, and (2) that upon a per capita basis St. John's Guild was entitled to more than the full amount of the appropriation awarded to it by the Legislature of 1894, which appropriation was subsequently confirmed by the Charters of Greater New York, both original and revised. See 3 Laws of 1897, page 78; and 3 Laws of 1901, page 97.

Thus, for two years last past the Society has received from The City of New York only \$20,000 annually, although on the per capita basis established by the Hon. Bird S. Coler, Comptroller, it was entitled to receive and should have been paid annually a sum exceeding by nearly \$10,000 the amount originally appropriated by the Legislature.

During the present year the Society, on a similar per capita basis, will be entitled to receive from the city nearly, if not quite, \$40,000.

We thus show your Honorable Board not only that there is now rightfully due the Society the arrears of such annual appropriations which were withheld for insufficient reasons, but also that it would be most unjust not to allow the Society for the year 1902 the full amount fixed by the Legislature in three different and independent enactments.

St. John's Guild therefore submits the following as and for its estimate of expenditures for the year 1902:

It requires the arrears of the appropriations made by your predecessor Boards for the years 1900 and 1901, in order to discharge obligations incurred during those years in excess of the annual sums allowed it, to wit..... \$20,000 00

Gentlemen—In obedience to your circular letter of January, 1902, under the head of Charitable Institutions, addressed to this Society, the Society for the Aid of Friendless Women and Children begs leave to submit the following estimates:

Payment for the support of such women and children as may be regularly committed to them by the Commissioner of Charities and Correction in the Borough of Brooklyn, \$4,500.

In addition to this, they call the attention of the Board to the fact that by their charter they are incorporated for the purpose of giving temporary aid to destitute women and children. To carry out this provision it is absolutely necessary that they act in many instances before there has been time to make application for a regular commitment. As represented in the application of this Society for last year, the analogy for money to be appropriated for the support of women and children suddenly brought to face overwhelming adversities, is to be found in the support of emergency hospitals. When any person is crippled and needs quick aid to save life, he is sent to a hospital to receive emergency treatment, without regard to where he lives, or what his financial condition may be. A woman with her little children is suddenly left a widow and is homeless. If somebody does not aid her immediately she and her children are in a condition worse than death by sudden accident. The Home constantly has probably about from ten (10) to fifteen (15) of what might be called sudden emergency cases. They are never refused admission as long as there is room. They are tenderly cared for and aided in getting work for their own support. These people, above all others, should be paid for on proper proof of actual emergency conditions. To that end the Society requests you to appropriate \$1,500, and to formulate proper means of proof for such cases, and when proof of this character is made, they respectfully request that the Society may be paid for this work, which is of double benefit to the city; one, in relieving needy poor, and another, in preventing vice and crime. The two items together will amount to an application for \$6,000, which they respectfully ask.

They furnish this estimate of expenditure, and send it in triplicate, one copy to the Mayor, one copy to the Comptroller, and one to the Board of Aldermen.

In testimony of which the President and Treasurer have hereunto set their hands and affixed the seal of the corporation.

They attach to each of these triplicate estimates a report for the year 1900-1901.

To the Honorable the Mayor, the Comptroller and the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York:

The petition of the Harlem Library respectfully shows:

That it is a library association duly incorporated under the Laws of 1798, its charter having been amended by chapter 217 of the Laws of 1871.

The library owns real estate in the County of New York, in the Borough of Manhattan, being the real estate occupied by it at No. 32 West One Hundred and Twenty-third street, in said borough.

It owns about 23,500 volumes of books, and maintains its association as a free library for the free circulation of books among the inhabitants of The City of New York, until such time as the plan of consolidation is perfected, the trustees having passed the initial resolutions to effect the transfer.

It has actually circulated in the twelve months ended June 30, 1901, more than 136,000 volumes to be read by the people at their homes, and no charge was made in any case for such circulation.

The library is subject to the inspection of the University of the State of New York and registered by it as maintaining the proper standing, and the Regents have

issued "certificate of approved circulation," showing that the circulation of books upon which your honorable Board is entitled to appropriate money under the statute for the year ending June 30, 1901, is 136,000 volumes, for the maximum appropriation which may be made under the statute amounts to \$13,600, and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is allowed by law to make this application of money in this city in this library.

The corporation is in great need of funds, to properly carry on the present work, and also to meet the imperative demands for the extension of reading facilities to the people of the city. This library is one of the oldest in the city. It was for the first time made free in 1897, and its circulation since that time has phenomenally increased. For the first year after such increase it was much hampered in its work, for the reason that it received no funds, as formerly, from the borrowing readers.

In the fall of 1899, an appropriation was made for this library of \$7,200, but the sum appropriated for the preceding year having been only \$2,400, the library has been seriously handicapped in its work. Still, the larger appropriation which has been paid to it in installments during the current year has greatly influenced the usefulness of the library; the circulation of books has been remarkably increased during the past year, it having been in some months the largest the library has ever known.

It is now contemplated to open the library on Sundays, at first to readers only, and should a demand develop, for the circulation of books as well. Should either of these steps be taken, the expenses of the library will be largely increased.

The class of books purchased by the library is of the highest quality, and these books are much used by the readers.

The amount of the appropriation asked for, and which the law authorizes your Board to make, which, under the certified circulation is \$13,600, is not more than enough to meet current expenses, and to provide for the continual demands upon the library.

Annexed hereto is a statement of the Library Account for the year ending December 31, 1901, as required by the Comptroller.

Wherefore your petitioner prays that your honorable Board may make to this corporation the full allotment which, under the law, it is authorized and empowered to make.

The number of Domestic, Maids, Orderlies and other Helpers provided under the second head is 16. It may be necessary to employ a better class in the future, suggesting increased compensation. In the number named is included 5 Orderlies who, having been patients and having recovered the use of their limbs and being without homes, are employed as Waitresses and Caretakers for the young children, and are clothed and allowed the nominal sum of \$2.50 per month.

The average number of children in the House is about 70, nearly half of whom are in bed in the surgical wards.

There is no allowance as fees or emoluments to Trustees, Surgeons, Physicians, Consultants, etc.

The New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children,

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—Pursuant to Laws of 1894, chapters 25 and 336, and section 230, paragraph 22, subdivision 2, of the Greater New York Charter, and section 230, paragraph 9, subdivisions 2 and 24 of chapter 466, Laws of 1901, The New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children hereby respectfully makes application for an appropriation of \$40,000 for the year 1902.

The amount asked for is an increase of \$10,000 over the appropriation of last year. It is asked for because the Society's work has greatly increased since its original appropriation in 1894, thus causing the necessity of larger expenditure to maintain its present standard of efficiency.

In support of this application we would invite your attention to the following facts:

1. Although exempt by law from taxation, the Society pays to the city its annual taxes upon its real estate, consisting of the building, No. 297 Fourth Avenue, used for its offices and reception rooms for the care of the children.

2. At its own expense, the Society cares for all children under the age of sixteen years arrested or taken in charge by the police or its own officers in the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx, providing them while in its custody temporarily with proper food, clothing and attendance pending their disposition by the Magistrates or Courts.

Section 291 of the Penal Code provides that no children shall be confined in prisons, or practically in station houses. The city has no place for their detention. Institutions decline to receive such children, because the commitment is temporary (Penal Code, section 291, subdivision 6), and to erect a fire-proof building for the purpose and properly equip it with accessories, attendants, food, medical attention, etc., to say nothing of the incidental fees of the Sheriff for transportation of the children to and from the courts, would be a most expensive matter for the city. The city is now relieved of this expense by the Society. The number of such children cared for by the Society during the year 1901 was 5,176, and no part of the money appropriated to the Society by the city is used for this purpose. This expense was paid entirely from subscriptions from annual donors and others. Children thus received, who are the victims of physical violence, not only frequently require medical attention, but a physical examination is often directed by the Court to determine the truth of their story, and to corroborate their evidence against the offender. All such examinations are made by skilled physicians assisted by a competent nurse, with every facility afforded by the best hospitals in the land. Moreover, for the better protection of the children thus temporarily in the care of the Institution, isolating rooms are provided for those who may be found at any time suffering from contagious disease, and a skilled nurse is always in attendance to see that every ordinance of the Board of Health is enforced and every suggestion of the physicians carried out.

3. The city's appropriation is used to defray the expenses of the transportation of the children to and from different courts, those incidental to the employment and investigation by the Society's officers of their cases by the direction of the court, and for the collection of moneys from parents under orders of courts for account of board of children to reimburse the city for their care while in institutions. The Society has transferred during the year 1901 in its own wagon to and from different courts 6,780 children. It has investigated at the request of Magistrates and courts during the year 1901 the applications for the commitment of 1,049 children. Our investigations resulted in the commitment of only 396 of these children, leaving as improper cases 653, which, if they had been committed would have entailed an annual expense on the county of \$104 for each child, or a total of \$67,912. This sum was therefore saved to the city as the direct result of our investigations. The Society has also investigated the cases of 3,975 children charged with offences, and reported the facts to the courts and Magistrates, upon which they were able to base their conclusions in acting in the disposition of the children. It has also aided in securing the evidence in 117 cases of criminal assaults upon children. It has prepared and submitted to the District-Attorney accurate briefs, upon which such cases were tried, the children being cared for by the Society at its own expense. It has caused 239 orders to be made for the support of children by the parents, when committed to institutions, and has collected and paid over to the city the money received upon the same; and where such payments were not made it has aided in the prosecution of the parents and others, thereby securing payment to the city for the year 1901 of the sum of \$20,491.48, which sum could not have been collected had it not been for the energetic action of this Society. This shows an increase of \$6,083 over the year 1900. This has entailed a heavy expense upon the Society, not only for clerical hire to keep the necessary books of the accounts, but for the trained agents necessary to follow up the parents and others to see if they pay as directed, or if not, that the proper court proceedings are instituted to compel payment.

The work of the Society never ends, night or day. Its building is always open, and children are received at all hours, bathed, dressed and properly cared for. During the year 1902 a new Children's Court will be put in operation. Practically there are now in existence seven such courts in the city, in each of which the Society keeps an officer in attendance to take charge of all such cases. These will have to be continued, and two or three new officers will have to be placed in the newly organized court, in addition to which the Society will be put to an extra expense for the transportation of children from the seven District Courts to the Children's Court.

Your attention is also drawn to the fact that the Society has been put to an extraordinary expense of \$4,599 in removing its boilers, heating apparatus, etc., from the vaults under the sidewalk in front of our building. This vault space was held under license from the city, contained our four boilers, and was the receptacle for the large amount of coal used by the Society. It contained the engineer's department. Under the subway plans our corner is to be used for a station for the underground road, consequently the city has taken from us most of this vault space, and we have been compelled to vacate, thus entailing the heavy expense mentioned above.

With the growth of the city's population and the multiplication of agencies for the care, reformation and correcting of children under the influence of that humane spirit now happily predominant in the treatment of children's cases, the Society's beneficent work is increasing. No opportunity may be passed by. We cannot select whom to help and whom not to help. Every case involving the interest of a child and brought to our attention demands and receives immediate action.

For these reasons the Society respectfully asks for the increased appropriation to enable it to meet the increased demands made upon it.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

An estimate of the amount of expenditures required for the maintenance of the Surrogates' Court and office for the year 1902 is herewith respectfully submitted for your consideration and action.

For the present year is required the same appropriation as was made for the previous year for the clerks employed pursuant to chapter 57 of the Laws of 1883, as amended by chapter 467 of the Laws of 1890, in the preservation and transcription of mutilated and obliterated records. Eight clerks are so employed at a salary of \$1,200 a year each, and a Superintendent and Examiner at \$1,500 a year. Four libers in addition to those now on hand, at a cost of \$30 each, and \$100 for stationery, will be required for the prosecution of this work this year. The necessity for this work has been duly certified in accordance with the acts mentioned. A certificate as to the same accompanied the communication of September 11, 1890, of the then Surrogate, submitting the estimates for that year; a similar certificate was attached to the respective estimates submitted August 16, 1892; September 5, 1895; September 15, 1896; September 7, 1897; September 28, 1899, and October 1, 1900. A like certificate is submitted herewith.

For office contingencies \$1,350 are required, being the same amount allowed for this purpose last year. One thousand dollars are needed for the payment of the Sheriff for services in serving citations and orders in proceedings commenced by the Surrogates to compel accountings of delinquent guardians, executors and others. The amount is the same as was appropriated for the same purpose for last year.

The total appropriation asked is \$167,570, the amount now appropriated for this year by the previous Board of Estimate and Apportionment. We have not therefore prepared the comparative tabulated statement asked for by the Comptroller's communication of the 15th of January, as the two columns composing it would be identical in character and amount.

The salaries of the Surrogates are fixed by chapter 290 of the Laws of 1889 and chapter 642 of the Laws of 1892, and the salaries of the clerks and employees other than those engaged in the transcription of the mutilated and obliterated records are designated and fixed pursuant to chapter 530 of the Laws of 1884 and chapter 642 of the Laws of 1892. The compensation of the last mentioned clerks is provided for by chapter 57 of the Laws of 1883, as amended by chapter 467 of the Laws of 1890, above referred to.

Annexed hereto is the classification of the working force of clerks and employees of the Surrogates' Court and office, marked "A," called for by the communication of His Honor the Mayor, dated January 6, 1902.

The present positions and working force of the Surrogates' Court and office are the same as they were on December 31, 1898, with the following exceptions: The position of Bookkeeper, created in 1901, salary \$1,500; of Correspondence Searcher, created in 1899, salary \$1,300, and that of an additional clerk in the Probate Department, called the Third Assistant Probate Clerk, created in 1901, salary \$1,000. The necessity for the appointment of the Correspondence Searcher was disclosed in the communication of August 10, 1898, submitting the estimates for the year 1899. That was the great number of communications continually being received, seeking information relative to estates and other business of the office, necessitating a search of its records or correspondence to enable the Surrogates to make suitable answers. The appointment of a bookkeeper was authorized pursuant to the recommendation of the Commissioners of Accounts, contained in their report of July 5, 1900, and the direction of the Comptroller of the City, contained in his communication to the Surrogates of July 17, 1900. The appointment of the additional clerk in the Probate Department was required by the growth of the business in that Department, requiring the frequent temporary assignment of clerks from the Department engaged in copying the current records, thereby impairing the efficiency of that Department and retarding its work. These reasons were set forth in the communication of October 1, 1900, presenting the estimates for the succeeding year.

Dear Sir—Pursuant to resolution of the Board of Estimate January 6, 1902, I transmit herewith a statement of the amount of money required to conduct this office for the year 1902, divided into two parts, showing the amount required from January 1, 1902, to May 1, 1902, and the amount for the balance of the year, May 1 to December 31, 1902. The amount appropriated by the Board of Estimate for the year 1902:

For salaries.....	\$63,020 00
For recopying and indexing libers of conveyances and mortgages.....	25,000 00

The amount thus appropriated is the same as now asked for with respect to salaries, recopying and reindexing of libers of conveyances and mortgages and for recopying and certifying to filed maps. The amount allowed for compensation for Copyists and Recording Clerks, \$10,000, was an error, as the amount actually paid by the Register of Kings County in the year 1901 aggregated \$24,000, and from the experience I have had in this office it appears probable that the amount will reach \$25,000 this year. Under the act chapter 706, Laws of 1901, making this office a salaried one, it becomes my duty to cause all orders or requisitions requiring searches to be executed without delay, and to be certified and ready for delivery within ten days, the act further provides that each record searcher or title company shall receive as his or its full compensation for every search so made one-third of the fees formerly allowed to the Register of Kings County for such searches. I estimate that the office will receive for the year 1902 \$1,500, the whole of which amount will be paid to the City Chamberlain, and as one-third of this amount will be due the searchers, some provision must be made for the payment of same.

Through some oversight no contingent fund was provided in the appropriation made for this office, and I believe that the sum of \$1,000 will be required for this purpose.

The Maternity of the Long Island College Hospital is a department of the Long Island College Hospital, existing under the same corporate name and management, and conducted as a lying-in hospital and as such receives for treatment such persons of the poor of Kings County as require the care for which it is designed.

During the year ending December 30, 1901, there have been received in said Maternity thirty-nine (39) cases which have been accepted by the Commissioner of Charities of Kings County as proper charges against said county.

For the care and treatment of these cases The City of New York has paid to the Long Island College Hospital the sum of \$18 per case, which, together with overtime for mothers and children, aggregates a total payment by the city of \$740.08.

The above is not a statement of the charity work done by the Maternity, but only of emergency cases admitted and accepted by the Commissioner of Charities.

We do, therefore, most respectfully request that your Honorable Board include in your statement and estimate the sum of \$1,200, to be paid to the Long Island College Hospital as provided by section 230 of the Greater New York Charter.

The Long Island College Hospital is a corporation duly organized under the provisions of chapter 19 of the Laws of 1858, of the State of New York, and acts amendatory thereof, and maintains in the Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, City of New York, a general hospital for the treatment of medical and surgical cases; that as departments thereof, but under the same corporate name and management, it maintains The Maternity of The Long Island College Hospital and the Dispensary of The Long Island College Hospital.

During the year ending December 31, 1901, The Long Island College Hospital has rendered, free of charge to the patients, medical and surgical aid and treatment to the poor of Kings County, who applied to it therefor and were approved by the Commissioner of Charities of Kings County. During the said period of one year the number of persons so treated in The Long Island College Hospital (exclusive

of the Maternity and the Dispensary) was 593, who remained in Hospital 11,488 days, divided as follows:

198 medical cases	1,765 days
395 surgical cases	9,723 days
593 total cases	11,488 days

—and for whose treatment The City of New York paid to The Long Island College Hospital the sum of \$8,665.92.

In view of the above statement it is respectfully requested that your Honorable Board include in your statement and estimate the sum of \$10,000 to be paid to The Long Island College Hospital, as provided by section 230 of the Greater New York Charter.

Dear Sir—The New York Medical College and Hospital for Women, Nos. 17 and 19 West One Hundred and First street, respectfully request of your honorable body the appropriation to its use (according to chapter 723 of the Laws of 1893) the sum of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000), the same being the estimated amount necessary to pay twenty-five dollars (\$25) per capita for obstetric attendance on needy poor women in their homes, or domiciled in the hospital of the above-named institution; and, furthermore, we would ask for in-patients the sum of eighteen dollars (\$18) per month for each needy mother domiciled in the Hospital, if retained therein two months or more, and the same pro rata amount for each fraction of a month, the time not to exceed one year; also for each homeless or needy mother with nursing infant who resides in the Hospital by request of or permission of its officers and nursing her own infant, provided such residence shall exceed two months, and an additional sum of 35 cents per day for the infant so domiciled.

Furthermore, for in-patients other than maternity cases, the sum of 80 cents for surgical cases and 60 cents for medical cases.

Dear Sir—Complying with the request contained in your circular letter of January 16, 1902, we beg to state:

I. This institution does not receive any fixed appropriation from the City Government.

II. It does receive from the city remuneration at the rate of two dollars per week for each child over the age of two years legally committed to it, and thirty-eight cents per day for every infant under that age, while the same remain within its charge. (See section 230, Charter of Greater New York, amended by chapter 196 of Laws of 1899.)

III. On an average for the past three years (ending September 30, 1901), it received from the city for the care of children so committed to it \$53,831.86 per year.

IV. As children are constantly being received and discharged, it is impossible to say what amount should be paid the institution by the city for the year 1903, but a safe conjecture would seem to be that it should not be less than the above-mentioned amount.

V. Regretting our inability to answer your inquiries more positively, and trusting that the foregoing may to some extent be of service to you, and be what you desire, with every wish to furnish whatever further information may lie within our power, we have the honor to remain,

Gentlemen—The Aguilar Free Library Society hereby applies for an appropriation of fifty-five thousand dollars, pursuant to chapter 378, paragraph 37, of the Laws of 1892.

The Aguilar Free Library Society is duly incorporated under the laws of this State, and owns over eighty thousand volumes and maintains four (4) libraries, namely, at No. 197 East Broadway, No. 113 East Fifty-ninth street, No. 106 Avenue C and No. 174 East One Hundred and Tenth street, and a Traveling Library Department, at No. 113 East Fifty-ninth street. These libraries are open daily for the free circulation of books among the inhabitants of The City of New York.

During the year ending June 30, 1901, the number of volumes actually withdrawn from the Aguilar Free Library by the inhabitants of The City of New York, for use at their homes, was over 730,000.

The Aguilar Free Library is subject to the inspection of the Regents of the University of the State of New York and registered by them as maintaining a proper standard.

The Regents have executed certificates of approved circulation, covering the five libraries maintained by this Society, showing that the circulation of books upon which your Honorable Board is entitled to appropriate money, under the Laws of 1892, chapter 378, paragraph 37, for the year ending June 30, 1901, is seven hundred and thirty thousand.

The appropriation to which, under such certificate the Aguilar Free Library is entitled, is seventy-three thousand dollars.

The Aguilar Free Library is in great need of the amount asked for, for the reason that in addition to the necessarily greater expenditures, entailed by the increase of circulation at our different branches, an entirely new three story building has been rented at the corner of Avenue C and Seventh street, in place of the limited quarters heretofore occupied at No. 616 Fifth street. The engagement of these quarters, while giving greater facilities for satisfying the demands of our readers, as shown by the increased circulation, has entailed great additional expense in the way

of fixtures, lighting, rental, more assistants and new books, amounting to several thousand dollars.

The appropriation for the year 1901 was \$32,350, and expenditures, as indicated by the following statement, was \$44,740.26.

The total, it will be noticed, exceeds the appropriation by \$12,390.26. This excess has been made up by the balance from the previous year, some donations and other sources. There is no assurance of similar donations for the year 1902, and the balance on December 31, 1901, was only \$1,741.41.

The increase in the item for salaries is for the purpose of adding to the staff of assistants, as the circulation has increased more than 100,000 volumes during the past year, and also for the purpose of equalizing the hours of service of the members of the staff to correspond with the hours of service of the members of the circulating department of the New York Public Library.

The increase indicated for books is necessary, as during the past two years the appropriation has not permitted the Library Trustees to purchase a sufficient number of books to meet the increased demand and the wear and tear of the volumes in the library has been greater than ever owing to the increased circulation. The price of new books has also increased.

An increased allowance will enable the Society to equip and maintain a reading-room on the third floor of the new building, No. 106 Avenue C. The room is ready for occupancy, but our limited resources have not permitted the engagement of assistants nor the purchase of the necessary furniture, newspapers and periodicals. A reading-room in this crowded district would be a great boon.

The above estimate is slightly modified from that which was handed to the Board last September.

MESSAGE FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

Hon. James B. Reynolds, Secretary to the Mayor, at this point was escorted by the Sergeant-at-Arms to the desk, and presented the following message from his Honor the Mayor, which the President directed the Clerk to read.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—In accordance with the requirements of section 115 of the Charter I have the honor to submit herewith, attached to this report as Appendix A, the usual statement in regard to the bonded indebtedness of the City for the year ending December 31, 1901. This statement is submitted in the customary form, for purposes of comparison. The statement is a little confusing, because it does not distinguish between Special Revenue Bonds and the Permanent Funded Debt, and because it takes no account of the cash in the Sinking Funds. In order to supplement the information thus given in summary, I submit also, as Appendix B, a detailed statement of bonds and stocks redeemed and canceled in 1901; as Appendix C, a detailed statement of the bonds and stocks issued during the same year; as Appendix D, a statement showing the transactions of the City Treasury and of the Sinking Funds in 1901; as Appendix E, a statement showing in detail the receipts and disbursements of the several sinking funds; and, as Appendix F, a comparison between the budgets of 1899, 1900, 1901 and 1902; except that the budget for 1902 cannot be exactly compared in detail with the others, because of the changed organization of some of the Departments effected by the revision of the Charter.

THE CITY DEBT.

Asking reference to these statements for details, the following comparison will be interesting:

The gross funded debt, as here given, consists of—

The Special Revenue Bonds are issued for various purposes, as authorized by the Charter, and are redeemable out of the next succeeding tax levy. There follows an analysis of the foregoing figures from this point of view.

There were issued during the year altogether, in addition to Revenue Bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of taxes, bonds amounting to a little more than \$42,500,000; and there were redeemed bonds amounting to \$16,500,000.

THE SINKING FUNDS.

It thus appears that the net growth of the Sinking Funds during the year, \$7,000,000, has offset more than 25 per cent. of the gross increase of the Permanent Funded Debt. When it is considered that almost all of the bonds issued in 1901 run for forty or fifty years, and that in this sum are included \$11,000,000 issued for the Rapid Transit R. R., which will be redeemed out of the earnings of the road itself, it is clear that the growth of the Sinking Funds, as a whole, is out of all proportion to the actual requirements of the debt. This inference is strengthened by the following table, showing the amount of bonds issued during the last four years.

Special revenue bonds, as already stated, are redeemed out of the succeeding tax levy, and the revenue bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of taxes out of the current levy. All revenue bonds, therefore, may be disregarded in considering the operation of the Sinking Funds.

That is to say, in four years the income of the Sinking Funds, in connection with taxation, has offset approximately \$60,000,000 of long-term bonds actually issued. Of this sum \$35,000,000 represents permanent debt redeemed, and the remainder appears in the increase of the Sinking Funds. As a matter of fact, the Sinking Funds grow at the rate of \$15,000,000 a year, and the rate of growth is constantly accelerating. The permanent debt that falls due in 1902 amounts, in round numbers, to only \$7,000,000, and in 1903 to only \$6,000,000. The Sinking Funds, it is true, keep down the net debt, and permit the issue of additional bonds for public improvements, but the burden of taxation for installments of permanent debt and on account of interest grows apace with every increase of the gross debt. Since 1899 the amount necessary to be raised by taxation for these purposes has increased by \$3,262,098.83, notwithstanding the fact that, during this period, a very large amount of five, six and seven per cent. bonds has been redeemed. In scarcely any year up to 1928 does the amount of bonds falling due appreciably exceed even the present annual accumulation of the Sinking Funds, and this rate of accumulation is constantly growing. In other words, in fifty years, the time for which the longest city bonds are made to run, even at the present

* This includes \$3,356,124.08 of Assessment Bonds, which should be paid, ultimately, from assessments for local improvements.

annual rate of increase, the increase of the Sinking Funds would redeem \$750,000,000 of debt, without regard to the capital of the Sinking Funds; whereas, at the present time, the gross funded debt of the city is only \$416,000,000, and the net permanent funded debt a little less than \$286,000,000.

It is evident that here is something that calls for the most careful study. I am not yet sufficiently familiar with all the elements of the problem to make any specific recommendation; but I am confident that the taxpayers of the present generation are entitled to some relief from this partially unnecessary burden, which is already so needlessly heavy, and which, unfortunately, grows heavier year by year. I believe some way can be found to secure relief, at least measurably, without prejudice either to the interests of the bondholders or to the city's contract with them.

In the course of my examination into the present financial condition of the city, my mind has naturally reverted to the recent public discussion of the effect upon the city of the constitutional limitation upon its debt. Undoubtedly, this also is an important question; but I prefer not to express an opinion upon it until I am better acquainted with the city's business. The general impression made upon me by my study of the situation is, that the city's resources are marvellous. On the other hand, it is also clear that the demands upon these resources are fully proportioned to the greatness of the city. In the meanwhile, I am inclined to believe that no sufficient thought has yet been given to the equitable adjustment of the inevitable cost of growth between the present and the future. I hope that it may be possible for me to deal with this question comprehensively at some later day.

SCHOOLS.

While not attempting at this time to consider in detail the needs of the city, there are three or four main lines of expenditure which must command the careful consideration of the authorities. First of all, in importance, I place the question of providing adequate school accommodations for the children of the city. It is roughly estimated that a sum approximating four millions of dollars must be raised every year for the purchase of new sites and the erection of new school buildings in order to keep up with the normal annual growth of the school population. In the meanwhile, the recent Board of Education has placed itself upon record as believing that an expenditure of eight millions of dollars, in addition, is now necessary for the same purposes, in order to make good existing deficiencies. Without making myself responsible for the accuracy of either of these estimates, both of which seem to me large, it is evident that here is a problem of the first magnitude. I imagine that \$10,000,000 would substantially meet both the existing deficiencies and the current needs. It is idle to improve the material conditions of the city, if it is to be done at the expense of leaving many thousands of its children in ignorance during the best years of their school life. It makes comparatively little difference to the city, as to most public improvements, whether they are secured a year or two earlier or a year or two later; but two or three years taken out of the school life of a child affect his own well being and his value as a citizen as long as he lives. It is for this reason that I consider that the very first claim upon the resources of the city is to make as large appropriations for school buildings and school sites as the financial condition of the city will justify.

WATER SUPPLY.

Next in importance as a problem affecting the future is the question of our water supply. It is unquestionably the first duty of the Water Department to do everything in its power to stop waste. If unrestricted waste is permitted no city can have a large enough supply unless it commands an inexhaustible reservoir at its doors. On the other hand, the discovery of accidental leakage must always be more or less a matter of chance. The stoppage of domestic waste by the universal installation of meters is something to which no American city is likely to come until forced to it by circumstances. Something, however, can be done in the direction of stopping waste; and whatever can be accomplished by an intelligent effort in this direction may be confidently looked for at the hands of the present Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

In the meanwhile the problem of a permanent increase in the city's water supply is not so distant that it can be safely neglected for a moment. When the Croton Dam is completed provision will have been made for the storage of water on the Croton watershed upon a scale adequate to supply the present needs of Manhattan and The Bronx for an estimated period of four months without regard to rainfall. What this signifies is best made clear by the statement that the water impounded by the Croton Dam will make a lake 19-23 miles long, with an average depth of 30 feet. The creation of an artificial lake on such a scale as this is naturally possible only in a hilly country where the land so placed under water has comparatively little value. Unfortunately a question has arisen concerning the construction of this dam that may delay the completion of it for two years or more. The dam was originally designed as a composite dam; that is to say, it was to be built partly of stone and partly of an embankment shielding a comparatively thin core wall. The present Chief Engineer of the Aqueduct Commission has taken the ground that this dam should have been designed, originally, to be all stone; and that even now it is wise to make it an all stone dam, although the change in construction will involve two years of delay and an increase in cost of \$400,000, more or less. In this contention the Chief Engineer is sustained by a commission of experts. The matter is still under consideration by the Aqueduct Board, which has deferred action until the present Mayor and Comptroller can have an opportunity thoroughly to acquaint themselves with the problem. The Comptroller and myself are unwilling to reach a determination upon a question of such gravity until we have been able to look at the work upon the ground. This we shall hope to do at the earliest opportunity.

The water supply of Brooklyn, on the other hand, is already inadequate for its needs, if tested by the rate of actual consumption in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. During the last two or three summers Brooklyn has several times been on the verge of a water famine. The need of an increased water supply for Brooklyn, therefore, is both immediate and urgent. The natural way in which to meet the pressing need is to carry the present Brooklyn system further down Long Island. Plans for such an extension were matured when the Honorable Alfred T. White was Commissioner of City Works of Brooklyn. These plans could readily be carried out at once, except for the fact that the people of Suffolk County are unwilling to permit even the waste water of the county to be used by the city. This objection expressed itself several years ago by securing the passage of a law, in 1896, the object of which is to prevent the extension of Brooklyn's water works into Suffolk County. It is evident from a conference, recently held in the Mayor's office, with the legislative representatives of Suffolk and Nassau counties, that public opinion in Suffolk still demands the retention of this law. In the presence of the immediate and urgent character of Brooklyn's need, I think it has become the duty of the city to ask for the repeal of this law, so that Brooklyn's immediate and pressing need can be met; and an act intended to repeal this so-called Burr law has accordingly been introduced into the Legislature at my request. The city is entirely willing to be limited as to the percentage of the average annual rainfall which it is at liberty to take; and, under such a restriction, it does not seem to be reasonable for the State to allow a great community to be deprived of the water that it needs, when what it asks for is the privilege of using water that otherwise goes to waste. The extension of the Brooklyn aqueduct system, moreover, is equally in the interest of Nassau County; for it is evident that if Brooklyn's needs cannot be met by enlarging the area of country from which it draws its supply, it must continue to draw, with increasing hardship, upon the area which constitutes its present watershed. It would be singularly unjust for the State to deprive the city, on the one hand, of the privilege of taking surplus water from Suffolk County; and, on the other hand, to expose the city to suits for damages because it takes too much water from Nassau County. The actual hardship of this situation would be great enough if Brooklyn's population remained at a standstill; but, as the population of Brooklyn is growing with great rapidity, every element of hardship involved in this dilemma is constantly intensified.

While it seems to me essential, therefore, that the city must make an effort to meet Brooklyn's immediate need by an extension of its system into Suffolk County, it may frankly be conceded that such an extension cannot permanently solve the problem of an adequate supply of water for the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens. In the first place, the amount of water that can properly be taken from the proposed Suffolk County watershed is limited to 100,000,000 gallons per diem, more or less; and, in the second place, the cost of building an aqueduct on Long Island is greater than elsewhere, because it has to be built on the tide level or near it, so as to catch the drainage from the largest area; and because, on account of the slight grade, the conduit has to have a large cross section. The maintenance of the system, also, is costly, because the water has to be lifted at the end of each ten-mile section, or thereabouts.

Under these circumstances, the city cannot content itself simply with the effort to relieve Brooklyn's immediate necessities. The city must begin at once to plan for the large increase in its water supply needed to meet the demands of the next generation. At the end of my second month in office I may not attempt to discuss the details of so great a problem. My purpose is, simply, to point it out, and to call the attention of the public to the fact that it cannot be safely neglected. The Department of Water Supply, naturally, will give the matter the most careful study, and, at a later day, I may be able to make definite suggestions. In the meantime, I think it ought to be one of the earliest subjects of inquiry to determine how the present water supply of Manhattan and The Bronx can be connected with the Long Island system, so that the deficiencies of one, whether temporary or permanent, may be made good from the other.

IMPROVEMENTS TO WHICH CITY IS COMMITTED.

Soon after the recent election I asked the then Comptroller of the city to furnish me with a statement of the enterprises to which the city was already committed; or which were under consideration; and the estimated amount of the expense remaining to be provided for in connection with the same. The footings of this statement, dated December 1, 1901, may be summarized as follows:

For Bridges.....	\$35,194,500 00

The city is not actually committed for every item in this total; but for the greater part of it the city is committed. It is somewhat striking that neither of the subjects to which I have called attention—schools and an increased water supply—figures in this list at all; except as provision is included for the completion of the Croton Dam and the Jerome Park Reservoir—enterprises to which the city has been committed for years—and the sum of \$700,000 to pay for school sites in proceedings already begun. The city, in the mean time, is close to its debt limit; so that it will readily be understood that the financial problem bequeathed to the new administration is not an easy one.

BRIDGES.

The recent administration has fixed the main lines upon which the improvement of inter-borough communication must proceed for a number of years to come. There are at present three bridges planned for and in course of construction across the East river. These bridges are now known as "Bridge No. 2," "Bridge No. 3" and "Bridge No. 4," respectively. These numbers relate to the order in which the construction of the bridges has been authorized, and not to their geographical relations to one another. For this reason, and because the designation itself is evidently temporary, I commend to your favorable consideration the proposition of Bridge Commissioner Lindenthal that permanent names be given to all of the East river bridges. It is evidently the duty of the city authorities to carry forward all of these bridges as rapidly as possible. In particular, no effort will be spared to secure the early completion of Bridge No. 2, for it is clear that adequate relief for the existing Brooklyn Bridge cannot be had so quickly in any other way as by the opening of this second highway across the East river.

On the other hand, it is impossible to suppose that the present conditions prevailing at the Manhattan end of the Brooklyn Bridge are to remain unmodified during the twenty months which it is estimated must intervene before the completion of Bridge No. 2. The conditions at the Manhattan end of the Brooklyn Bridge involve not only the danger of life and limb, but they amount to a public scandal. If the difficulty cannot be cured the cause of it must be removed. Looking at the problem as I do, with a layman's eye, the principal difficulty seems to me to come from the presence upon the same loop, used by the surface cars, of the cars of different lines, so that the people who gather during the rush hours are animated by conflicting purposes. Some want to reach the cars of one line and some of another; and inasmuch as the people do not necessarily reach the bridge in the order in which the cars arrive upon the loop, the crowd is continually agitated by the pushing backwards and forwards of people who want to take a particular car or to avoid the car that they do not want, in order to make room for others. It seems to me source of danger and disturbance would be removed.

The permanent solution of the problem is a very different matter; and this is receiving very careful study at the hands of the Bridge Commission. The problem at the Manhattan end of the old bridge, however, is a very complicated one, and any solution of it, to be satisfactory, ought to take care of the cars from Brooklyn, to provide a remedy for the defects of the Manhattan railway station at the bridge, and to furnish a connection with the subway railroad now in course of construction in Manhattan.

BROOKLYN TUNNEL.

The recent city administration also gave its approval to a plan, proposed by the Rapid Transit Commission, for the construction of a tunnel to be used for furnishing railroad communication between the subway system of Manhattan at the New York end of the Brooklyn Bridge, the Brooklyn Borough Hall, and the Long Island Railroad Depot. This undertaking has proceeded up to the point where all the necessary legal consents have been obtained, and it will shortly come before the city authorities for the appropriation that will make it possible. The city should certainly insist upon a uniform rate of fare over all subway lines constructed with the city's money. There may also be other conditions of vital importance that ought to be contained in any contract to be made by the Rapid Transit Commission for the construction of this tunnel. This question, in all of its aspects, has already commanded the attention of the Mayor and the Comptroller, sitting as members of the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners, and everything possible will be done, not only by them, but by the whole Board, to safeguard every public interest before the city is asked to make an appropriation on this account. On the other hand, when all such points have been covered, the enterprise is one that should command the favorable consideration of those who are called upon to act. If four tracks are insisted upon down Broadway from the bridge to the Battery, it will result in great delay. In this connection, it ought to be considered whether two additional tracks running directly from the bridge to the same point in Brooklyn would not meet all that is imperative in this very natural demand.

FERRIES.

In this connection I desire to call attention also to the importance of the ferry question between the boroughs, and, especially, between the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond. On the East River the construction of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge has already importantly modified the use of the ferries. As the other projected bridges come into use, the ferries are likely to lose even further their comparative importance. Under these circumstances, the city must expect to lose a considerable part of the income which it has heretofore derived from ferry franchises. My suggestion is, that the renewal of these franchises be studied less from the point of view of securing income for the city than from the point of view of promoting the public advantage by improving the accommodations secured for those who use the ferries. It is possible that a considerable relief of the bridges may be effected in this way, while the cost to the city, under the circumstances, cannot be great.

As between Manhattan and Richmond, the necessity for improved ferry communication is evident and pressing. The new Charter gives to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, upon the recommendation of the Commissioner of Docks, authority to enter into a ferry lease for the period of twenty-five years. In making such a lease the city may well insist upon a sufficient number of boats of the best character; upon as many landing places as may be deemed desirable; upon such frequency of trips, such a rate of speed, and such a rate of fare, as will thoroughly protect the public interest and promote the growth of the beautiful Borough of Richmond. I have charged the Commissioner of Docks to give to this matter, at the earliest possible day, the most careful and complete study.

DOCKS AND PIERS.

The continued commercial supremacy of our port is evidently closely related to the supply of adequate pier accommodation, on modern lines, to keep up with the demands of domestic and foreign commerce, both by steam and sail. The city is thoroughly committed to the policy of owning the entire water front of Manhattan Island, and out of a total length of 36 miles it already owns 25½ miles. The process of improving this water front under city ownership should be carried on without pause and as rapidly as

the financial condition of the city will permit. Since 1870, when the Department of Docks was established, this Department has spent in round numbers \$47,500,000 in acquiring and improving such property. Its income from the docks in the same period has exceeded this outlay by \$2,000,000. The difference between the revenues of the Department for the year 1870 and the year just closed, 1901, if capitalized at 3½ per cent., would represent a gain in value of dock property of more than \$74,000,000. In other words, every dollar invested by the city in this way during the last thirty-one years has produced two dollars. I propose to do everything in my power to enlarge the commercial facilities of the city along the water front, not forgetting any part of our commerce, either the domestic or the foreign—the canal boat, the sailing vessel, the steamship or the railroad; and, for this purpose, I shall not hesitate to ask the co-operation of your honorable Body in any form that may be necessary.

SMALL PARKS.

There remains a subject not less important than any other, the duty of increasing the small breathing places throughout the city and of making available for the use of the people those which have been already secured. I am confident that neither the Board of Estimate and Apportionment nor your honorable Body will need any urging to make appropriations for this purpose as generous as the resources of the city will permit. It was a source of sincere regret to me to be obliged to veto the ordinance adopted by the last Municipal Assembly for the improvement of Seward Park; and I did so only because I was persuaded that the legality of any bonds issued under the authority of that ordinance, whether I signed it or whether I allowed it to mature, could always be called in question. At its meeting last week, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the necessary issue of bonds to enable this matter to go forward without delay.

LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

The important subject of local improvements in all the boroughs must also have sympathetic and considerate attention. Under the revised Charter this work can, and doubtless will, proceed more rapidly than heretofore up to the point of procuring the issue of the assessment bonds that will enable the work actually to be done. Assessment bonds, however, form a part of the city debt, and the amount that can be issued in any one year is vitally affected by the city debt limit. I do not doubt that it will be the desire of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and, as I trust, of your honorable Board, to deal as generously as is practicable with demands of this kind, for everybody understands how vitally important to every neighborhood these local improvements are. There is, however, a limit beyond which the city cannot go for any purpose, and this limit will have to be observed. I confess to some concern as to how the apportionment of assessment fund bonds is to be made between the different boroughs, without friction. Probably no better way can be devised than for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to determine in bulk the amount of assessment bonds that can be issued in any one year. This amount being fixed, the Borough Presidents may then be asked to agree among themselves, if possible, within this limit, upon the sum to be available in each borough. This sum being agreed upon, the local authorities in each borough may then be left to determine among themselves, as between the various local improvements suggested, those that are the most necessary. If the Borough Presidents cannot agree among themselves as to the proportion of this fund to be assigned to the various boroughs, the determination will have to be made by the general city officers; but I sincerely hope that the matter can be worked out along the line first suggested. In a general way—although every rule has its exceptions—I think that a safe rule to be observed is to lend the assistance of the city to those outlying districts where the people are. It is only seldom becoming to lend the credit of the city to build up new neighborhoods, when neighborhoods already in existence lack sewers and streets which citizens actually need.

I think the same rule may well be applied to the location of the school buildings to be erected each year. It is entirely practicable for the police to make, annually, at very small expense, a census of the children of school age in the city. Wherever such a census indicates the largest number of children out of school altogether, and in part-time classes, there the new buildings ought to be placed. A rule like this will avoid controversies on borough lines, and will insure, at any given time, the prompt meeting of the greatest existing need.

CITY ORDINANCES.

The ordinances of the City ought to be revised and codified at as early a day as possible. The same ordinances which existed in the various parts of the City at the moment of consolidation remain in force still, for the most part; and no effort has been made to adapt these ordinances to the changing conditions of the City's life. For instance, the ordinances relating to peddlers need to be restudied, and to be adapted to actual conditions. Such ordinances may well be different for different sections of the City, permitting greater liberties in those sections of the City where the peddler ministers most importantly to the life of the people. I urgently ask your Honorable Body to take the necessary steps to bring about such a revision and codification of the ordinances at an early day.

GOVERNMENTAL PROBLEM.

I cannot close this message without calling attention to the very serious governmental problem with which the present administration is confronted. In many departments the title of the office frequently has nothing to do with the occupation of the incumbent. The same sort of work is done in different departments by officers having different titles; and the salaries of these officers differ according to the taste and fancy of the Commissioner by whom they were fixed. The change wrought by the revised Charter, in the relation of the administrative officers of the city to the departmental forces under their control, is a serious one. Heretofore every administrative officer has been at liberty to organize his department in accordance with his own judgment—to abolish, or to consolidate, or to create positions at his pleasure; and to fix salaries, provided that the sum total of salaries paid by him did not exceed the amount appropriated for that purpose. With such powers, this situation could be promptly remedied with the co-operation of the Municipal and the State Civil Service Commissions. By the revised Charter, however, it is provided that all salaries shall remain as they stood on January 1, 1902, except as changed by the authority of the Board of Aldermen acting on the recommendation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Provision is carefully made in the Charter to prevent a deadlock between the two boards on the subject of salaries as to the budget to be made every autumn; but no such provision has been incorporated into the Charter with reference to the emergency budget to be made this spring. Under these circumstances it appears to be essential to secure legislation which will enable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to fix salaries in revising the budget prior to the first of May. When preparing the bill relating to this subject, recently introduced into the Legislature at my request, I was under the impression that the power to create and consolidate positions had also been taken away from the heads of departments; but, upon further conference with the Corporation Counsel, I am satisfied that this power remains intact. It has only been modified by requiring the salaries to be fixed, in case of change, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen. Under these circumstances, I shall ask to have the bill recently submitted at my request amended so as to give the Board of Estimate and Apportionment only the emergency power to fix salaries in connection with the budget to be prepared by it this spring.

All the other problems connected with the civil service of the city, and they are many, grow out of abuses of the civil service law, and these must be remedied patiently, as best they may be, under the terms of that law, precisely as they would have been under the terms of the bill presented by me at Albany, as originally drawn. These abuses have to do with the fact that in scarcely any office, if in any, are all the employees doing the work which their titles would indicate. But with this power to consolidate and create new offices inherent in the heads of departments; with the power through the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to fix salaries; and with the power to reclassify places, through the Civil Service Commissions, only time is necessary to bring about a much better situation. But, at best, time is necessary; and the people as well as the officials must be content to see the desired result attained slowly.

BOROUGH AND DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS.

I am not able at this time to make such a report of the work of the various borough presidents and departmental heads as I should like to submit, were it practicable to do so. It is enough to say that all of the new officials, whether elective or appointive, have taken hold of their work with intelligence and with energy. The Borough President of Manhattan and the Borough President of Brooklyn have each effected, by dismissals a partial reorganization of the bureaus committed to their charge that has effected a saving of rather more than one hundred thousand dollars in each case. In several of the departments, notably in the Department of Health and in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, savings equally large in amount have already been effected. In most of the departments it has been found practicable already to effect economies, more or less important, without disadvantage to the public interests. The full effect of a proper reorganization, however, can not be realized until the new classification of the city civil list, to which I have alluded, has been secured. I am happy to report that wherever contracts have been let at public letting the prices obtained by the city for work to be done this year show a large saving on the cost of similar work last year. It is not worth while at the present time to attempt to go into detail, for the reason that my own information is too fragmentary to permit of a careful exhibit. It has been my purpose in this message, more particularly, to point out some of the larger problems with which the city must deal in the near future and to call the attention of your honorable Board to some of the matters in which your co-operation will be necessary in order that the best results may be obtained. The revisers of the Charter have thought it wise to restore to the Board of Aldermen much of the control of the current public business that under previous charters was taken from them. It is earnestly to be hoped that your honorable Body will meet these new responsibilities in such a manner as to justify the confidence of those who have drawn the Charter upon these lines.

The Committee on Street Cleaning to whom was referred the annexed ordinance to provide for the removal of snow, ice, etc., from thoroughfares in the Borough of Richmond respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject they recommend that the annexed substitute ordinance be adopted.

(Substitute Ordinance.)

AN ORDINANCE for the removal of ice, snow and other material from sidewalks and gutters in the Borough of Richmond, City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1—The owner or owners, lessee or lessees, occupant or occupants of any house or other building or vacant lot, fronting on any street or avenue that is flagged, shall keep the sidewalk and gutter free from snow, ice, dirt or other material, and in case of said snow, ice, dirt or other material being deposited upon said sidewalk or in said gutter, the same shall be removed within four (4) hours after the snow ceases to fall, or after the other materials are deposited thereupon or therein, the time between 9 p. m. and 7 a. m. not being included in above period of four hours.

In default of the owner or owners, lessee or lessees, occupant or occupants of any house, or other building or vacant lots, fronting on any street or avenue, the sidewalk of which is flagged in front of said premises, complying with the above ordinance, it shall then be the duty of the President of the Borough, and he is hereby authorized, to cause said snow, ice, dirt or other material to be removed from the said sidewalk and gutter, the expense of said work to be charged to any available fund for the maintenance of cleaning of highways. He shall then certify to the Corporation Counsel the amount of the expense chargeable against each piece of property, with the description of said property as assessed on the last preceding assessment roll, and the name or names of the owner or owners, lessee or lessees, occupant or occupants of the property where possible to obtain the same. The Corporation Counsel is hereby directed and authorized to sue for and recover the amount of this expense, together with \$10 penalty for each offense, and when so recovered the amount of expense incurred by the President of the Borough shall be turned over to the City Chamberlain, to be deposited to the "Special Fund, Restoring and Repaving" and credited to the Borough of Richmond.

Sec. 2—All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3—This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolved, That permission be and the same hereby is given to the Subway Realty Company and its assigns to construct and maintain a vault under East Forty-first street, in the Borough of Manhattan, adjacent to the said Subway Realty Company's property, to be bounded on the north by the northerly curb line and on the south by the center of Forty-first street, and to extend from the westerly curb line on Park avenue to the westerly line of the said Company's property; also a vault, situated beyond the curb line on Park avenue, adjacent to the Company's property, to be bounded on the west by the westerly curb line of Park avenue, as extended to the center of Forty-first street; on the south by the center line of Forty-first street, and on the east and north by the westerly retaining wall of the Rapid Transit tunnel, which is to be situated in Park avenue, as appears more fully by the accompanying diagram, on payment of such fee as shall be deemed an adequate compensation by the Sinking Fund Commission, the work to be done at the expense of the Subway Realty Company or its assigns, under the direction of the President of the Borough of Manhattan; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Municipal Art Society of The City of New York to lay out in the carriageway of Fifth avenue, at a point just south of Twenty-third street in the Borough of Manhattan, an "Isle of Safety," on which shall be erected an electrolier, the same to be a gift to The City of New York by the said Municipal Art Society of The City of New York, the work to be done at the expense of the said society and under the supervision of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

Report of Committee on Laws and Legislation—

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to whom was referred the annexed ordinance in favor of licensing, etc., bootblacks and stands within the stoop lines, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the annexed substitute be adopted.

(Substitute Ordinance.)

A GENERAL ORDINANCE to provide for the licensing and otherwise regulating the erection of stands within stoop lines and under the stairs of the elevated railroad stations in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. No person shall have or use any bootblack stand outside of any building in The City of New York, and there shall be no booth or stand erected within stoop lines of any building or under the stairs of the Elevated Railroad stations in The City of New York, without first procuring a license therefor as hereinafter provided; and any person so doing shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction before any magistrate, shall be fined by said magistrate not less than \$2 or more than \$10 for each offense, and in default of payment of such fine may be committed to prison by such magistrate until the same be paid; but such imprisonment shall not exceed 10 days.

Sec. 2. All licenses for bootblacks and stands within stoop lines or under the stairs of the Elevated Railroad stations in The City of New York shall be granted by authority of the Mayor, and issued by the Bureau of Licenses for a term of one year from the date thereof, unless sooner suspended or revoked by the Mayor or the Chief of said Bureau, with the approval of the Mayor; and no person shall be licensed except a citizen of the United States or one who has regularly declared intention to become such citizen and the time to obtain such full citizenship has not yet elapsed.

Sec. 3. Stands within stoop lines may be permitted and licensed with the consent of the owner of the premises and the consent of the Alderman of the district in which said stand is to be located, for the sale of newspapers, periodicals, fruits and soda-water and the blacking of boots, and no bootblack stand shall be provided with more than three chairs. All such stands shall be classified and the annual license fees therefor shall be fixed and collected as specified in the schedule following:

Stands for the sale of newspapers, periodicals or both.....	\$15 00
Stands for the sale of fruits or soda-water or both.....	10 00
Bootblack stands, one chair.....	5 00
Bootblack stands, with more than one chair.....	10 00

Sec. 4. Every such stand must be strictly within the stoop line and shall not be an obstruction to the free use of the sidewalk by the public, and shall not exceed the space of six feet long by four feet wide, except that in the case of bootblack stands a space not more than three feet wide and four feet long may be occupied by each chair of such stand. The construction and erection of all stands permitted by this ordinance shall be at the expense of the applicant and under the direction of the President of the Borough in which said stand is located. No rent or other compensation shall be directly or indirectly paid by the licensee to the owner or occupant of the premises where such stand is located. No person shall be permitted to sleep in any portion of the structure or hold more than one license. Upon the written revocation by the owner of the consent previously given therefor, the Mayor or Chief of the Bureau of Licenses shall have power to transfer said permit or license to another location with the consent of the owner of such premises, for the unexpired term of the permit or license, and the consent of the Alderman of the district in which said stand or booth is located.

Sec. 5. Any person desiring to erect a stand or booth underneath the stairs of any of the elevated railroad stations in The City of New York for the sale of newspapers and periodicals, shall file in the Bureau of Licenses an application, having indorsed thereon the consent of the Alderman of the district in which said stand or booth is located, in which the applicant shall specify the location desired for such stand, and no such stand or booth or any projection therefrom shall be erected which is wider than the width of the stairs under which it is placed or which extends along the sidewalk a greater distance than to a point where the under surface of the stairs is not over seven feet from the level of the sidewalk; and said stand shall be constructed, erected and maintained at the expense of the applicant and under the direction of the President of the Borough in which such stand is located, upon plans to be approved by the Chief Engineer of the Elevated Railroad Company affected, so as to permit a ready removal of so much thereof as may be necessary to enable the said company, its agents or employees, to get convenient access to any part of said stairways for the inspection, painting or repairing thereof, and shall be painted the same color as the stairs of the elevated railroad, and no advertisement shall be painted or displayed thereon.

Sec. 6. Every license granted pursuant to section 5 of this ordinance shall contain the following reservation: "It is expressly agreed and understood that this permit is given subject to the right of the elevated railroad company affected, its agents, employees, successors or assigns, or the owner of said stairway, at any time properly to inspect, paint, repair, renew, reconstruct or remove said stairway, or any portion thereof, and without claim on the part of said licensee as against said company, its agents, employees, successors or assigns, or the owner of said stairway, for damages to or interference with said booth or stand, or the business therein conducted, occasioned by such inspection, painting, repair, renewal, reconstruction or removal."

Sec. 7. The licensee shall pay for such a stand or booth underneath the stairs of the elevated railroad stations, the annual license fee of \$10.

Sec. 8. The official license for any stand or booth must be displayed thereon so as to be easily visible at all times.

Sec. 9. The Chief of the Bureau of Licenses shall have the power to hear and determine complaints against any of the licensees hereunder, and impose a fine of not less than \$1 or more than \$5 for any violation of the regulations herein provided and, subject to the approval of the Mayor, shall have power to suspend the license pending payment of such fine. All such fines when collected shall be paid into the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt.

Sec. 10. All ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York, inconsistent or conflicting herewith, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 11. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the said ordinance be amended as follows, by adding at the end of section 2 the following words "unless requested by residents of house;" that sections 3 and 7 be stricken out; that the words "ten" and "ten days" be stricken out, and that the words "three" and "one day" be inserted in lieu thereof, respectively, in section 14; that the several sections be renumbered, and that the said ordinance as amended be adopted.

Sir—I request that the proposed ordinance entitled "An Ordinance regulating the cleaning of streets and sidewalks and keeping them clean and removing snow and ice therefrom in The City of New York," which was adopted by the Council of the Municipal Assembly, November 27, 1902, and introduced (as No. 1836) into the Board of Aldermen of the Municipal Assembly, December 4, 1900, where, on motion of Alderman Bridges, it was referred to the Committee on Street Cleaning, be taken up without delay so that this Department may have the assistance of a suitable ordinance and be able to call upon the police to enforce it.

AN ORDINANCE regulating the cleaning of streets and sidewalks and keeping them clean and removing snow and ice therefrom in The City of New York.
Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen as follows:

Section 1. No person or persons shall throw, cast, or lay, or direct, suffer, or permit any servant, agent, or employee, to throw, cast, or lay any ashes, offal, vegetables, garbage, dross, cinders, shells, straw, shavings, paper, dirt, filth, or rubbish of any kind whatsoever in any street in The City of New York, either upon the roadway or sidewalk thereof, except that in the morning before 8 o'clock, or before the first sweeping of the roadway by the Department of Street Cleaning, dust from the sidewalk may be swept into the gutter, if there piled, but not otherwise, and at no other time.

The willful violation of any of the foregoing provisions of this section shall be and is hereby declared to be a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by a fine of not less than one dollar nor more than ten dollars or by imprisonment for a term of not less than one nor more than five days.

Sec. 2. No person other than an authorized employee or agent of the Department of Street Cleaning shall disturb or remove any ashes, garbage, or light refuse or rubbish placed by householders or their tenants or by occupants or their servants within the stoop or area line or in front of houses or lots for removal, unless requested by residents of house.

Sec. 3. No person not properly authorized to sprinkle the streets shall throw, pour, or deposit any water or other liquid on any part of the street, avenue, or public place, except in the side gutters thereof.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of all persons and corporations engaged in sprinkling the streets of The City of New York to use on asphalt pavements a quantity of water sufficient thoroughly to wash off and clean the same, and on all other pavements to use not more water than shall be sufficient to lay the dust thereon.

Sec. 5. No one being the owner, driver, manager or conductor of any cart or other vehicle, or of any receptacle shall scatter, drop or spill, or permit to be scattered, dropped or spilled, any dirt, sand, gravel, clay, loam, stone or building rubbish, or hay, straw, oats, sawdust, shavings or other light materials of any sort, or manufacturing, trade or household waste, refuse, rubbish of any sort, or ashes or manure, garbage or other organic refuse or other offensive matter thereon, or permit the same to be blown off therefrom by the wind, in or upon any street, avenue or public place.

Sec. 6. No person shall throw, cast or distribute in or upon any of the streets, avenues or public places, any hand bills, circulars, cards or other advertising matter whatsoever.

Sec. 7. No person shall set out beyond the stoop or area line any receptacle for garbage, ashes, or other refuse matter, or cause or suffer to be set out such receptacle more than one hour before the time designated for the arrival of the carts of the Department of Street Cleaning, except in boroughs or portions of boroughs where the manner of collecting such garbage, ashes or other refuse matter is provided to be done otherwise by contract.

Sec. 8. Every owner, lessee, tenant or occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the city abutting upon any paved street, avenue or public place, shall, before 10 o'clock in the forenoon after any snow fall, remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk or gutter; provided, however, that such removal shall in all such cases be made before the removal of snow and ice from the roadway by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, or subject to the regulations of said Commissioner of Street Cleaning for the removal of snow and ice.

Sec. 9. In case the snow and ice on the sidewalk shall be frozen so hard that it cannot be removed without injury to the pavement, the owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground as aforesaid, shall, within the time specified in the last preceding section, cause the sidewalk abutting on the said premises to be strewn with ashes, sand, sawdust, or some similar suitable material, and shall, as soon thereafter as the weather shall permit, thoroughly clean said sidewalk.

Sec. 10. Whenever any owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground abutting upon any paved street, avenue or public place, shall fail to comply with the provision of any ordinance of the city for the removal of snow and ice from the sidewalk or gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which said building or lot abuts, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning may cause such removal to be made, and thereupon the expense of such removal as to each particular lot of ground shall be ascertained and certified by the said Commissioner of Street Cleaning to the Comptroller of the city, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may authorize such additional expenditures as may be required for the said removal of such ice and snow to be paid out of any appropriation made for any purpose of the Department of Street Cleaning; and the Comptroller shall raise the amount of such additional expenditures by the issue and sale of revenue bonds, as provided by law, and shall place the amount so raised to the credit of the Department of Street Cleaning to supply the deficiency occasioned by such additional expenditure; the term lot as used in this section shall intend and mean a space not to exceed twenty-five feet in width fronting on the street, avenue or public place upon which the violation is charged to have been permitted or committed.

Sec. 11. It shall be the duty of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning immediately after every snowfall or the formation of ice on the crosswalks or in the culverts of paved streets, avenues or public places, forthwith to cause the removal of said snow and ice from the said crosswalks and culverts, and to keep the crosswalks and culverts aforesaid clean and free from obstruction.

Sec. 12. Every street railroad corporation shall remove all the snow and ice from its tracks and the spaces between, and shall not throw the same on either side thereof, and shall immediately carry away and dispose of the same under the direction of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, under a fine of one hundred dollars for every city block in length in which the said corporation shall fail to so remove and dispose of the same, as aforesaid; provided, however, that, for the more speedy and effective removal of snow and ice from the paved streets, avenues and public places of the city, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning shall have power and authority to enter into agreements for the entire winter season, or part thereof, with any street surface railroad or other railroad having tracks in the city for the removal of snow and ice for the entire width of the street, avenue or public place, from house-line to house-line, at any part of the route of the said railroad, provided, that nothing in said agreements shall be inconsistent with any law of the State of New York, or with any right of The City of New York.

Sec. 13. (a) It shall not be lawful for any surface railroad company, or other company, or any corporation or person whatever, or the officers, agents or servants thereof, to cause or allow any snow plow, sweeping machine or other similar instrument to pass over the tracks or lines used by them within the limits of the city unless by the written permit of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning; any violation of this section shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars for each such offense.

(b) No such permit or renewal thereof shall be granted except upon the condition and agreement upon the part of the company applying for such permit or renewal, that the party to whom the said permit has been granted shall and will, at its own expense, promptly remove and carry away the snow thrown up by such plow or machine, and that such snow plow, sweeping machine or other instrument shall be so constructed as not to throw any slush or snow upon the sidewalks or buildings, under a penalty of ten dollars for every house or sidewalk in front thereof, upon which slush or snow shall be thrown.

(c) No such permit or renewal shall be granted unless the party to whom granted shall expressly covenant, stipulate and agree that in case of its failure, neglect or omission to promptly remove and carry away the snow and ice thrown up by such snow plow or other instrument, then the same may be removed under the direction of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, and the expense of removing the same shall be paid by the said party to the said Commissioner, on demand, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may authorize that the amount or amounts of money so paid shall be credited to the appropriation of the Department of Street Cleaning for the removal of snow and ice.

(d.) In case of neglect or refusal or omission of the party to whom such permit may be granted promptly to remove and to carry away the snow and ice thrown up by such plow or other instrument, then the Commissioner of Street Cleaning may forthwith cause the same to be removed at the public expense, and all expenditures made or incurred therefor shall be chargeable upon the party so neglecting, refusing or omitting to perform its agreement, and shall be recoverable by an action at law on behalf of The City of New York.

Sec. 14. Any person violating any provision or regulation hereof shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof by any magistrate, either upon confession of the party or competent testimony, may be fined for such offense any sum not less than one dollar and not exceeding three dollars, except as herein otherwise provided; and in default of payment of such fine may be committed to prison by such

magistrate until the same be paid, but such imprisonment shall not exceed one day.

Sec. 15. All ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York, regulating the cleaning of streets and keeping them clean, and the removal of snow and ice from the streets of The City of New York, and all other ordinances or parts thereof inconsistent herewith, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 16 This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Preamble and Resolutions Recommended to be Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February, 1902.

Whereas, The Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, constituted pursuant to the provisions of chapter 4 of the Laws of 1894, and the acts amendatory thereof, has duly determined that the routes and general plans adopted by said Board on the fourteenth day of January, 1897, and the fourth day of February, 1897, should be modified by adding to the said routes or extending the same from a point under Lenox avenue, near One Hundred and Forty-second street, northerly to One Hundred and Fiftieth street; and thereafter did transmit to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York a copy of said plans and conclusions as adopted, which plans and conclusions thus adopted were received by said Board of Aldermen on the thirtieth day of January, 1902, at 2 o'clock p. m., at a meeting of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, duly convened on such day at such hour; and

Whereas, The said Board of Aldermen did, by resolution duly adopted at said meeting, fix a day not less than one week nor more than ten days after the receipt of such plans and conclusions, for the consideration thereof, to wit, this sixth day of February, 1902, at 2 o'clock p. m.; and

Whereas, The said Board of Aldermen on this sixth day of February, 1902, has proceeded with the consideration of such plans and conclusions; and

Whereas, The plans and conclusions and modifications are duly set forth in the resolutions of the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, as follows:

"Resolved, That subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as in these resolutions hereinafter mentioned, the said routes and general plan heretofore adopted by this Board be and they hereby are modified by adding to the said routes the following, to wit:

"And also extending from a point under Lenox avenue, near One Hundred and Forty-second street, northerly, under Lenox avenue to a point at or near its intersection with the street known as "Exterior street," including connections by necessary and suitable switches and tracks or otherwise, with abutting properties used as terminal or storage grounds.

"The general plan of construction of the portion of the route hereby added shall be by tunnel in the same manner as provided in the routes and general plan for the construction of the rapid transit railroad under the portion of Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Tenth street and One Hundred and Forty-second street. There shall be at least two parallel tracks, with the right at any time to add a third track, in the discretion of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners.

"A station and station approaches may also be built at the intersection of one of the streets intersecting Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-second and Exterior streets, as the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners may decide."

"In all other respects the provisions of the said general plan of construction adopted January 14 and February 4, 1897, shall be applicable to the portion of the route hereby substituted; and it is further

"Resolved, That, whereas, this Board has duly made the inquiries and investigation necessary or proper in the premises, and has determined that the modification aforesaid of the said routes and general plan are necessary for the interests of the public and of The City of New York, and should be established as herein provided, this Board does hereby determine and establish the said routes and general plan as hereby modified, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as hereinafter mentioned; and it is further

"Resolved, That the said modifications of routes and general plans shall take effect only upon and after the following consents and approvals thereto shall be duly had, to wit:

"1. The consent of the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York.

"2. The consent of the Mayor of The City of New York.

"3. The consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property along streets or such portions of streets as are included in the portion of routes by these resolutions proposed to be substituted as aforesaid; or if such consent cannot be obtained, then in lieu thereof the determination of three Commissioners to be appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, duly confirmed by the said Appellate Division.

"4. The consent of the said John B. McDonald, contractor, and of his sureties, as follows: Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company; The United States Fidelity Guaranty Company; The City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia; American Surety Company of New York; National Surety Company, and Perry Belmont.

"It is further

"Resolved, That this Board hereby adopts the drawing now produced and numbered one as showing the modifications or extension hereby adopted."

Now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby does, by a majority vote of all its members, approve such plans and conclusion and modification, and does consent to the construction of a railway or railways, in accordance therewith; and that The City of New York does hereby approve of all such plans and conclusions and modification and consents to such construction.

On motion, the above papers were laid over and made a special order for the next meeting at 2:50 p. m.

Subsequently Alderman Stewart moved that the vote by which the above action was taken be reconsidered.

No. 250.

By Alderman Sullivan—

AN ORDINANCE to regulate the price and quality of illuminating gas furnished in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Any corporation, association, company, copartnership or person shall not charge or receive for illuminating gas in the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn

and The Bronx, in The City of New York, sums to exceed seventy-five cents per thousand cubic feet.

Sec. 2. The illuminating gas furnished by any such corporation, association, company, copartnership or person shall have an illuminating power of not less than twenty-two sperm candles of six to the pound, burning at the rate of one hundred and twenty grains of spermaceti per pound, tested at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture by a burner containing five cubic feet of gas per hour, and shall, as regards purity, comply with the standard now or hereafter established by law.

Sec. 3. For any violation of this ordinance the offender shall be subject to a fine of fifty dollars for each and every violation, to be collected in an action brought by Counsel to the Corporation.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Which was referred to the Committee on Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

No. 251.

Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, hereby recommends to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that an extension of the water main be laid on Forest avenue, from Bement avenue to Broadway, in the First Ward of the borough, and that two fire hydrants be placed thereon.

Which was carried.

A petition for a gas main on Myrtle avenue, in the First Ward, was laid before the Board, and it was moved by Alderman Maloy, and seconded by Alderman Shea, that it be

Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, hereby recommends to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that a gas main be laid on Broadway, in the First Ward of the borough, to connect with the existing main on Prospect street, to Myrtle avenue, and thence through Myrtle avenue so far as the same is a public street.

BUREAU OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

During the week ending February 22 sixty-four (64) orders for supplies and repairs, of which one was subsequently canceled, were issued by the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices. These orders comprehended, among other things, the furnishings of 80 gross tons of best grade Lehigh egg coal to the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School, for which four estimates were submitted, ranging from \$5.40

to \$5.74 per ton, and which was awarded at the former figure; for furnishing 15 gross tons of best grade Lehigh egg coal for the Borough Hall, for which four estimates were submitted, ranging from \$5.10 to \$5.38 per ton, and which was awarded at the former figure; for the shoring up of partitions in the office occupied by the Law Department in the Borough Hall, removing dangerous arches, placing new "L" beam, building new arches, and making good all plastering and other work in connection therewith, a proposition which demanded immediate attention, and the order for which was awarded outright to W. & T. Lamb; for furnishing all labor and materials necessary to do electric wiring in the office of the President of the Borough, Borough Hall, in accordance with specifications therefor, which was competed for by three contractors, and the figures for which were \$43.50, \$52 and \$120, respectively, the order for which was awarded to the lowest bidder, P. O'Rourke; to furnish all labor and materials necessary to do certain electrical work in the Register's office, Hall of Records, in accordance with specifications, for which three contractors competed, their figures being \$45, \$54 and \$85, respectively, and the order for which was awarded the lowest bidder, John Kruger; for furnishing and delivering to the Kings County Court House 50 gross tons of best grade Lehigh egg coal, for which eight dealers were requested to submit bids, but for which only two responded, their figures being \$5.05 and \$5.24, respectively, per ton, the order for which was awarded to the M.-O.-H. Coal Company.

Patrick Shevlin, an Engineer in the Borough Hall, was transferred to the Hall of Records on February 17.

The janitors of the public buildings were notified by the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices on February 17 to see that the tours of duty of the engineers employed in their respective buildings should be equally arranged; that instead of permitting one engineer to remain constantly on duty from 8 a. m. to 4 p. m., they should see that the engineers alternated with each other on the late tours, so that each should have a fair share of the day assignment.

The resignation of Bridget Dunne, a Cleaner in the Borough Hall, to take effect on February 19, 1902, was received and approved.

Robert Spitzer, of No. 49 Central place, a Janitor in this Bureau, who was appointed on December 31, 1901, and assigned to duty in the Second District Municipal Court, was dismissed from the public service, to take effect on February 24 after a hearing on charges of neglect of duty.

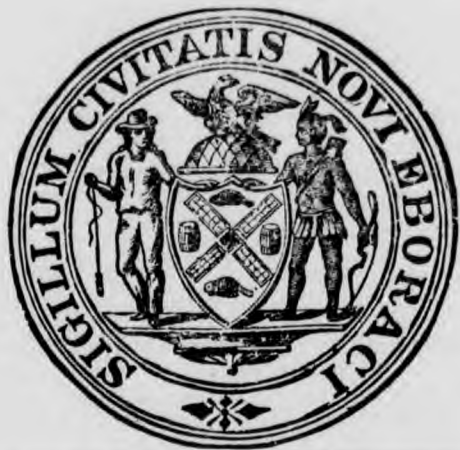
