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## PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD, HELD IN NO. 320 BROADWAY, ON THURSDAY, DECEMBER 11, 1902.

There were present—Alexander E. Orr, President, presiding; John H. Starin, Vice-President; Mayor Seth Low, Comptroller Edward M. Grout and Commissioners Woodbury Langdon, Charles Stewart Smith and John Claflin.

Albert B. Boardman, of Counsel; William Barclay Parsons, Chief Engineer, and George S. Rice, Deputy Chief Engineer, also were present.

Commissioner Jesup wrote asking to be excused on account of necessary absence from town, and Mr. Shepard wrote that he was busy on the suit brought by Charles T. Barney, and asked to be excused.

The Minutes of the preceding meeting, that of the 4th of December, were read, and it was moved that they be approved.

Ayes—The President, Vice-President, Mayor, Comptroller and Commissioners Langdon, Smith and Claflin.

Nays—None.

Carried.

A letter from Alderman Herbert Parsons was read, acknowledging receipt of a certified copy of the resolution of the Board, adopted, at his instance, at the last meeting, and stating that the resolution was satisfactory to him.

The following letter of the Corporation Counsel was read:

December 5, 1902.

ALEXANDER E. ORR, Esq., President Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR—I am in receipt of your letter of this date inclosing a certified copy of a resolution adopted by the Rapid Transit Board at its meeting yesterday with respect to the easements for the construction and operation of the Rapid Transit Railroad under the property at the northeast corner of Broadway and Forty-second street. You state that it is most important that title to these easements be vested in the City as soon as possible, so that the work of construction at that point may not be seriously delayed.

In accordance with your request, I have given instructions to have the proceedings (which had been already begun) pushed forward as rapidly as possible, so that Commissioners may be appointed at an early day.

I note the request of the Rapid Transit Board that I shall not make any stipulation with the Astor estate in the proceedings before the Commissioners of Appraisal without referring it to your Board.

The Comptroller stated that he had talked with counsel for the Astor estate and for one of the principal tenants of the property at northeast corner of Broadway and Forty-second street and that some settlement might be reached.

DEAR SIR—We are advised that you are the contractor for the construction of the so-called Rapid Transit Tunnel planned to run under the waters of the East river, from the Borough of Manhattan to and into the Borough of Brooklyn, and that you have commenced work on Joralemon street, west of Furman street, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Pursuant to instructions from the New York Dock Company, the owner in fee of that part of Joralemon street lying between the waters of the East river and the westerly side of Furman street, and also of all the property abutting on both sides of that part of said street, we hereby require you to desist immediately from any obstruction of the surface of said Joralemon street, or from entering in or upon the land under the surface of that part of Joralemon street included between the westerly line of Furman street and the East river, and from entering upon, into or under any of the property of the New York Dock Company for any purpose whatsoever. Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board, Produce Exchange Building, New York City:

DEAR MR. ORR—I have your note of to-day with its inclosures. I suppose that the New York Dock Company intends asserting its ownership in Joralemon street.

You will perhaps remember that on the 23d of October last the Board adopted resolutions requesting the Corporation Counsel to proceed with the condemnation of the Brooklyn streets. I am not advised as to what headway the Corporation Counsel has made and will at once inquire. I shall be sorry indeed if there has been any delay which will delay the prosecution of the work on Joralemon street.

I shall take up the matter with Messrs. Davies, Stone and Auerbach, counsel for the Dock Company, saying to them frankly that I shall proceed to condemn an easement through Joralemon street, and that their rights will be fully recognized in the condemnation proceeding and award.

President Orr reported that there had been correspondence with the Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough of Brooklyn relative to the necessity for the issuance of permits for rapid transit work in that borough, and that it had been arranged that when permits are issued by the Chief Engineer of the Board for work in that borough notice shall in all cases be forwarded to the office of the Commissioner of Public Works.

The Chief Engineer presented maps of two pieces of property necessary to be condemned for rapid transit purposes at Elm and Worth streets, and the following resolution was moved:

Whereas, The Chief Engineer has made, prepared and duly submitted to this Board four similar maps or plans of the parcels of property at the intersection of Elm and Worth streets, in the County of New York, required for the construction and operation of the Rapid Transit Railroad, now under construction by John B. McDonald, in pursuance of the contract heretofore made between him and The City of New York, and bearing date the 21st day of February, 1900; and

Whereas, Upon each such map or plan so made there has, by authority of this Board, been placed a memorandum as part thereof, clearly indicating the particular estate or estates, rights, terms, privileges or easements to be acquired or extinguished for the purposes of such construction and operation in relation to each such parcel of property, such memorandum being substantially in the form following, to wit:

"Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York.

"Memorandum indicating the particular estate, rights and easements to be acquired for the purposes of the construction and operation of the rapid transit railroad in relation to the pieces or parcels of property shown upon this map, December 11, 1902.

"An estate in fee simple absolute, free from all liens or encumbrances, in and to the lands and premises, with the buildings thereon and the appurtenances thereto belonging, described as follows, that is to say:

"1. All that certain lot, piece or parcel of land with any and every building thereon erected, situate in the County of New York, beginning at a point at the intersection of the northerly line of Worth street with the easterly line of Elm street; running thence northerly along said easterly line of Elm street a distance of fifty-four (54) feet three-quarters (3/4) inches; running thence southerly along a curve with its concavity to the east of about four hundred and ninety (490) feet radius, a distance of about fifty-five (55) feet nine (9) inches to a point in the northerly line of Worth street distant thirteen (13) feet and six (6) inches easterly from the intersection of the northerly side of Worth street with the easterly side of Elm street; running thence westerly along said northerly line of Worth street a distance of thirteen (13) feet six (6) inches to the place of beginning.

"2. All that certain lot, piece or parcel of land with any and every building thereon erected, situate in the County of New York, beginning at a point at the intersection of the southerly line of Worth street with the easterly line of New Elm street; running thence easterly along the said southerly line of Worth street a distance of five (5) feet eight (8) inches; running thence southerly a distance of eleven (11) feet ten and a half (10 1/2) inches to a point in the easterly line of New Elm street distant thirteen (13) feet and two and one-eighth (2 1/8) inches southerly from the intersection of the southerly side of Worth street with the easterly side of New Elm street; running thence northerly along the easterly side of New Elm street a distance of thirteen (13) feet two and one-eighth (2 1/8) inches to the place of beginning.

"Adopted and approved by said Board the 11th day of December, 1902."

Now therefore it is

Resolved, That the said maps or plans so made and prepared and the said memorandum be and the same hereby are approved and adopted; that a certificate of such approval and adoption and of the approval and adoption of the said memorandum be written upon each of the said maps or plans and signed by the members of the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, and that one copy thereof, including such memorandum, shall be filed in the Chief Executive Department of The City of New York having principal charge of the streets, there to remain as a public record; and that two of said maps or plans and memoranda be forthwith transmitted to the Council to the Corporation, together with a copy of this resolution, and the direction of this Board to take legal proceedings to acquire for The City of New York the said estate in the above described premises; and that one of the said maps and plans remain on file as a public record in the office of this Board.

Carried.

President Orr brought up the matter of the station at Eighth avenue and One Hundred and Fourth street. The Mayor expressed the opinion that there should be a station there if its construction would not unduly delay the completion of the road, and if the readoption of the resolution would not embarrass the Board in other and similar matters. These two questions were referred to the Chief Engineer and Counsel respectively for report at the next meeting.

The following resolution was moved:

The contracts were all awarded to the lowest bidders after due advertisement. The work at Public School 70 consists in removing the buildings on a plot of land 125 feet on Seventy-sixth street by 102 feet 2 inches in depth, immediately in the rear of the present school building, and which plot was acquired in the years 1897 and 1900, building fence walls, concreting yard and sidewalks, and removing closets to the new yard. A full description of the new building to be erected on the northeasterly corner of Broome and Cannon streets, Public School 110 has been furnished me by the Superintendent of School Buildings and is inclosed.

At Public School 49 a plot of land 100 feet on Thirty-eighth street by 72 feet 6 inches deep, immediately in the rear of the present building, was acquired in 1899 and the present contract calls for the taking down of the three-story brick buildings to the height of the first story and forming ten new class-rooms in the buildings. The yards are to be concreted, new water closets built and a heating apparatus installed.

In Brooklyn the two contracts are for work on new buildings, heating plant in one and plumbing for the other.

I am of the opinion that the appropriation as made may be properly approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

PUBLIC SCHOOL 110, BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

This new building is to be erected on the northeasterly corner of Broome and Cannon streets, and will be five stories in height, with cellar underneath containing the boiler, coal and fan rooms.

The building will occupy a space 150 feet by 100 feet. This includes the space now occupied by the old school, which will be removed, making it necessary to build and equip one portion of the new building first and then remove the old building before finishing the entire structure.

The exterior will be faced with stone to the level of the second-story window sills and above will be of gray brick and terra cotta; the interior will be entirely fireproof in construction.

The style of the building is somewhat of the Tudor Gothic, conventionalized to meet modern requirements.

The building has been arranged to provide for a playground and gymnasium on the first floor, while the four succeeding floors provide accommodations for thirty-six class-rooms, portions of the second and fourth floors being constructed with sliding-door partitions, which slide back against the side walls forming large assembly rooms.

The building will accommodate about sixteen hundred pupils.

Each floor will be provided with the proper number of teachers' retiring rooms and toilets; also pupils' wardrobes, closets, etc. The main toilet accommodations for pupils will be placed in a separate building in the yard.

Shower baths and lockers have been provided on the first floor.

The building will be equipped with the most modern and approved apparatus and furniture.

The plenum system of forced ventilation will be employed and the building will be heated by steam. The sanitary appliances will be complete in every particular, and the structure when completed will be one of the best and most modern of public schools.

The present contract includes the general construction only, and amounts to \$222,640.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. Homer Folks, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities, in communication under date of October 16, 1902, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to chapter 724 of the Laws of 1896, to approve the plans and specifications for certain repairs, additions and improvements to the buildings of the Department of Public Charities.

I would report:

First—For furnishing and installing steam heating apparatus at the male and female barracks, Almshouse, Blackwell's Island. Estimated approximate cost, \$10,000.

These buildings are provided at present with a few direct radiators and an indirect scheme for the general heating of the buildings. The present indirect heating system, I am informed by the Supervising Engineer of the Department of Public Charities, is a failure, and does not heat the building satisfactorily. The use of this old system is to be discontinued and disconnected in so far as it interferes with the installation or operation of the new. The new or proposed work consists of an entirely new system of steam and return mains, together with a number of radiators, as set forth in the specifications and shown on the plans, erected in manner known as "one pipe system."

Second—For installing steam heating apparatus in building known as Wards 25 to 28, together with new system of returns for building known as Wards 21 to 24, Randall's Island. Estimated approximate cost, \$2,000.

The work in Wards 25 to 28 consists of furnishing and erecting sixty-four new radiators, running new steam and return mains as shown on plan; the system is to be the ordinary "two pipe system." In building known as Wards 21 to 24, the present old return is to be replaced by an entirely new system of return mains and branches, beginning at the return valve in radiators and running branches to the 2-inch main, which is to be provided and is to run at the highest point in cellar, and connect to the present 2-inch line which runs to basement of Wards 25 to 28.

Third—For installing steam heating apparatus in a building known as the Retreat Building, occupied by the Tuberculosis Infirmary on Blackwell's Island. Estimated approximate cost, \$8,000.

It is the intention to provide an entirely new heating apparatus for the building. This is to consist of sufficient surface to be connected up in a manner known as the "one pipe system." Steam will be supplied from boilers located in boiler-house through 6-inch main which now runs through subway and into basement of this building.

The specifications and plans for the respective work clearly state how the work is to be done, and the estimates appear to be made with some care. As stated by the Commissioner, the money being available, I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to section 2 of chapter 724 of the Laws of 1896, may properly approve the plans and specifications.

Hon. JACOB A. CANTOR, President, Borough of Manhattan, New York:

SIR—In my report of July 10, on the general subject of the placing of the subterranean pipes and conduits of lower Broadway in a pipe gallery to be constructed in connection with the extension of the subway of the Rapid Transit Commission from Ann street to Morris street, I covered as well as I could from the limited amount of exact data available the argument in favor of this ultimately inevitable public improvement in connection with a work which will minimize its cost and public inconvenience of its construction. So far as possible, I shall avoid repeating in this report the points included in the one referred to.

Whether the pipe gallery shall or shall not be built as part of this important public improvement, is a question demanding instant and final decision. Indeed, it should have been decided two months ago. The working drawings for the subway have been practically completed, and orders placed for the structural steel to specifications which could be modified with advantage and economy if the pipe gallery is to be built. It is not too late, however, to make such changes as are needed to accommodate the pipe gallery; but if the work on the subway is not to be held back, it is important that drawings and calculations should be made and the steel shapes ordered without further delay.

Without knowing definitely that the city would meet the cost of the pipe gallery, the chief engineer of the Rapid Transit Board made provision for it to the extent of sinking the subway to a depth which will permit the gallery to be built over it. But for this foresight it would even now be practically impossible without great cost and loss of time to the city, to construct the gallery at all. The gallery contemplated is a chamber the width of the subway and occupying all the space between it and the supports for the street. The height of this chamber is variable, owing to the fact that the grade of the subway could not be changed to conform to that of the street surface. The minimum height or headroom, is at Rector street, where, for a short distance, the net vertical height of the space available for pipes will be about three feet. The gross vertical height is seven feet six inches. Of this it is necessary to allow about four feet six inches for the beams under the yokes of the surface electric railroad. The average headroom in the gallery will be from four to five feet. The "pinch" at Rector street is for a comparatively short distance, but the net available space even there is greater than the largest of the street mains will require, and when necessary workmen can follow them for examination and repairs without serious difficulty.

As showing what the pipe gallery will look like in cross section, in its relation to the subway and to the street surface, I hand you herewith certain plans of the Subway Commission, on which the gallery and the disposition of pipes within it are indicated in pencil. The drawings marked "2D1" and "2D2" show the subway, pipe gallery and position of pipes in gallery from Ann street to Cedar street. The drawing marked "2D3" shows the same from Cedar street to Rector street; that marked "2D4" the same from Rector street to Morris street. It will be seen by one accustomed to the reading of drawings that the work presents no difficulties of moment from the engineering point of view. The excavation of the subway will be from the surface, consequently the whole area of the gallery must be removed, whether it is replaced or not. Some difference in the proportioning of the steel beams will be necessary if the pipe gallery is built, but this is a small matter. The ceiling of the subway may be made somewhat lighter than if it had the street to sustain, while the ceiling of the gallery does not need to be calculated for the rolling loads of traffic in addition to five to eleven feet of superincumbent earth, which if the gallery is omitted will have to be carried by the arches of the subway roof. These considerations warrant the estimate that the gallery may be built from Ann street to Morris street for \$250,000. For this figure I am indebted to the calculations of the engineers of the Rapid Transit Commission. With the information at my command I could not hope to revise or correct them, and to attempt to verify them would be a work of supererogation. Their deliberate and well considered judgment in such a matter may be accepted as the best obtainable.

I recommend that you ask for an appropriation of \$250,000 to build the pipe gallery, and am convinced that this amount will be sufficient for the purpose.

A concensus of engineering opinion would warrant the conclusion on the part of any intelligent student of municipal affairs that the time is not far distant when the concentration of underground pipes in galleries, where they will be accessible from end to end, will become a public necessity by reason of the existence of intolerable conditions from leakage, street excavation and other evils inseparable from the present system. That the authorities then responsible could not be aroused to a realizing sense of their duty in this matter when the subway excavation was begun is regretted by all who appreciate the serious character of the conditions now existing and realize the magnitude and cost of the work of correcting them as an undertaking by itself. In point of fact they never can be corrected in the streets and avenues occupied by the sections of the subway now under construction. Throughout most of its length the subway is as near the surface as the requirements of the street railroads will permit. A pipe gallery above it would be impossible; galleries on either side of it would be enormously costly, and involve a doubling up of mains which would scarcely be considered practicable.

For information of the conditions, as affecting the fire and health risks of New York resulting from the enormous leakage of gas from buried mains, it is not necessary to depend upon either professional or lay opinion. From tests made for gas in

a large number of places of public assembly in Manhattan by Hon. Perez M. Stewart, Superintendent of Buildings, the records of which are public documents, though wisely denied sensational publicity, some idea may be had of the extent to which gas leakage under impervious pavements is led or driven into buildings. The fire risk due to this cause has been studied and proclaimed in a circular (No. 539) of the National Board of Fire Underwriters. The health risks are suggested by the clinical study of typical cases of gas poisoning undertaken by the Committee on Hygiene of the New York County Medical Association. If these subjects have interest in this connection the original documents will have greater value than a summary thereof.

In connection with my report of July 10, 1902, above referred to, this report seems to me to cover the subject so far as the matter immediately in hand is concerned.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—On September 26 there was referred to me by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a communication from the President of the Borough of Manhattan asking the Board to appropriate the sum of \$250,000 for the purpose of constructing pipe galleries in connection with the subway of the Rapid Transit Railroad, on Broadway, from Ann street to Morris street. This communication was accompanied by a report of Dr. James C. Bayles, and I was instructed to confer with Chief Engineer Parsons of the Rapid Transit Commission, Dr. Bayles and the Corporation Counsel as to the feasibility of constructing these pipe galleries in connection with the Rapid Transit subway, and the proper way of providing the money to pay for this construction.

In accordance with these instructions I have conferred with Chief Engineer Parsons, Dr. Bayles and the Corporation Counsel, and have also discussed the plan quite fully with representatives of the different departments and corporations having pipes, subways and conduits in the street.

The pipes and conduits to be dealt with are the following:

Those of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity the mains of the New York Steam Company; the subways of the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company and of the Empire City Subway Company; the mains of the Consolidated Gas Company; the tubing of the Edison Electric Illuminating Company containing wires which have not been placed in the subways; and the pneumatic tubes of the Western Union Telegraph Company north of Dey street. The sewers belonging to the City have not been considered, as it is manifestly impracticable to place them in a pipe gallery which would be over the railroad subway, and provision having already been made for them in the contract already let.

It can be taken for granted that the best place for a pipe gallery will be over the roof of the railroad subway, there being scant room for such construction on the sides of the railroad, while the grade is such as to permit placing the chamber above it, although at several places the space here will be uncomfortably limited.

I have found the different corporations whose interests are affected by this plan conciliatory and not disposed to offer any obstruction to the suggestions which I have made. These suggestions, however, have been based upon the assumption that the placing of high tension electrical conductors in the same subway with gas mains, which have always leaked to a more or less degree, would be hazardous if the high tension wires were at any time to be exposed, or were not securely encased in a separate chamber of their own. I have therefore suggested that inasmuch as the high tension wires are already in the subways of the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company and the Empire City Subway Company, that these subways be treated as incidents in the street, and that wherever possible they be left intact and simply be incorporated in the pipe gallery it is proposed to construct, supporting them upon the floor, suspending them from the roof or building the side walls around them, as may be determined by their position with respect to the proposed gallery. The companies are disposed to accept such an arrangement in the belief that there would be no danger of explosions of mixed gas and air caused by their wires.

The representative of the gas company tells me that the gas mains would probably be entirely relaid and that flanged joints would likely be used, although with such a rigid construction it would doubtless be necessary to provide expansion joints at frequent intervals.

The Edison Company states that what is known as Standard Edison tubing, of which there are from two to seven lines on Broadway, is designed for burying in the earth, and they do not think it wise to place such tubing in a pipe gallery without protection, and that they would probably use some other kind of insulating covering. The pneumatic tubes of the Western Union Telegraph Company present no difficulty.

All of the companies above referred to are agreed, however, that they do not wish to occupy the same chamber or gallery with the mains of the New York Steam Company, not only for the reason that the great heat of these mains at times will cause an extreme amount of expansion, but for the reason also that the temperature of the gallery would be raised to a point which would render it almost intolerable for workmen. The president of the steam company has advised me that they will place their mains where directed, at some point outside the chamber.

The limited height available in the neighborhood of Rector street would make it difficult to lay and properly care for a 24-inch gas main, which is the size of the main of the Consolidated Gas Company at this point, and it would be very desirable if the grade of the railroad subway could be lowered sufficiently at this point to permit of a greater height for the chamber. It might be possible also to obtain an increased height on the sides of the street by raising the roof outside of the cable railroad tracks, although this would mean a more expensive and difficult construction.

An essential feature of a pipe gallery of the kind proposed would be ample drainage to provide for the prompt carrying off of water in case of a break in one of the water mains or the necessity of cutting into a main for any purpose. Such drainage would be provided at frequent intervals by direct connections with the sewers, which will doubtless be located on each side of the subway, and the grade of the floor of the chamber should be such as to readily carry the water to these outlets.

It is not safe, in my judgment, to presume that the gas mains will be laid so well as effectually to prevent leakage, although Dr. Bayles is of the opinion that this can be done. Some provision should therefore be made for ventilation. This could readily be accomplished by the location, at frequent intervals in the roof of the main tunnel, of light valves, made perhaps of mica or of thin aluminum discs, which would be opened by the slight air pressure in front of moving trains and would not permit air to be drawn back in the rear of such trains. This would result in the constant forcing of air from the railroad subway into the pipe gallery, from which it would escape through perforated manhole covers. It would probably be wise, however, to install at one or two points ventilating fans, not for constant use, but for emergencies, such as the breaking of a gas main, in order that the air in the galleries might be purified before workmen entered.

As to the method of meeting the cost of this gallery, I attach a communication received from the Corporation Counsel stating that in his opinion the appropriation for this purpose had better be included in the tax levy for the year 1903. If the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should decide to do this, the availability of the funds would be assured and all the preliminary work could be done except the making of the contract. I would suggest, however, that in order to avoid complications it would probably be wise to have plans for this gallery prepared by and the inspection of the work entrusted to the engineering staff of the Rapid Transit Commission. This would probably avoid misunderstanding and delay.

Although not especially instructed so to do, I have considered the feasibility of the building of a similar pipe gallery in connection with the subway in Fulton street, between Joralemon street and Flatbush avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The grades of the subway, as shown upon the plans of the Rapid Transit Commission, are such as will not permit of the building of a pipe gallery above the railroad subway on this street, and if such an addition to the Brooklyn subway is to be considered it would be necessary to lower the grade as much as five feet. The only alternative would be the placing of the galleries at the sides of the subway. I am of the opinion, however, that the narrow, deep gallery on each side, although it would have the advantage of accommodating the sewers, would be so filled with

pipes and conduits as to make access to the lower part of it very difficult, if not impossible.

The gas and electric companies in the Borough of Brooklyn have not shown the same disposition to co-operate with the City in this matter, as have those of the Borough of Manhattan, but there are no great difficulties in the way of the construction of a subway in Fulton street except the present grade of the railroad tunnel. The distance along Fulton street, from Joralemon street to Flatbush avenue is about 2,650 feet, or about 300 feet more than the proposed gallery in Broadway, but the estimate of the cost of the latter seems very liberal and I believe the Brooklyn work would probably cost less.

SIR—I have received your letter, dated October 1, 1902, in reference to the project for constructing pipe galleries in the subway of the rapid transit railroad on Broadway, from Ann to Morris street.

Without going into the subject at greater length it will be sufficient to state that I think that the best method of accomplishing the object will be to include in the Budget for 1903 an appropriation of the amount deemed necessary for the construction of the pipe gallery.

The money would be available immediately after the 1st of January, 1903, through the issue of revenue bonds, which is doubtless as soon as it would be actually needed.

The fact that the money had been actually appropriated would doubtless be sufficient to enable the rapid transit contractor to complete his plans and specifications for the steel work of the rapid transit structure.

Finance on the condition of the public markets in the Borough of Manhattan, together with his recommendations for action by the city authorities:

SIR—The Board of Health, at a meeting held June 11, 1902, directed that a copy of a report upon the markets of The City of New York, made by the Assistant Sanitary Superintendent, be furnished to the Comptroller.

This report deals with the general unsanitary condition of the markets, and more particularly with the dilapidated condition of the floors and roofs and the uncleanliness of the walls, as well as the defective plumbing and toilet arrangements, and also, in certain cases, points out that extensive repairs to the market buildings are absolutely necessary in the interest of the public health.

Recommendations are made as to remedying these defects, and stating further that unless the matter is attended to at once certain markets should be declared a public nuisance and ordered vacated.

A supplementary report from the Health Board upon the condition of Centre Market, dated October 9, 1902, has been received, in which reference is made to the previous communication, and states that a re-inspection of Centre Market has recently been made, and that nothing has been done to remedy the defects complained of nearly four months ago, and that the Board notified President Cantor that unless it learns that improvements are to be undertaken at once it will be necessary to order Centre Market premises vacated.

Still another communication, dated October 21, from the Health Board, states that the conditions of the several markets have not been improved since the June report, and requests that the President be informed what has been done by the Comptroller in order that the conditions may be remedied.

Copy of the original report was likewise sent to the Borough President and referred by him to the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices, who reported that certain of the nuisances would be abated, he having served notice on the stand-holders to comply with the requirements of the Board of Health, but that there was no money available for a general overhauling of the markets as required. Further, that he had made an estimate of the amount necessary to comply with the order of the Board of Health, and that the President of the Borough will endeavor to secure an issue of Special Revenue Bonds to cover the same.

The markets are controlled by the Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets, of the Department of Finance, but the maintenance devolves upon the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices, connected with the office of the Borough President.

This division of authority over the markets is, to my mind, a most serious defect in the system of government, and, taken in connection with insufficient appropriations for their maintenance, is largely responsible for the conditions of the markets to-day.

The Collector of City Revenue has reported to the Comptroller under date of September 17, 1902, which report contains a statement of the revenue received from the respective markets from 1893 up to July, 1902, and this shows that the revenue increased from 1893 to 1895, after which it steadily decreased up to the present time, except in the year 1899, when the receipts from West Washington Market alone showed an increase of \$10,600 over the previous year and brought up the total amount received for that year, but the following year showed a decrease, which has continued to date.

In his report, the Collector describes the markets generally and their condition, and suggests that it might be advisable to use the sites of Clinton, Centre, Union, Tompkins and Catharine markets for other purposes.

Markets were primarily established for the purpose of giving the local government supervision of all food furnished the inhabitants, and the selection of locations for the different markets was made largely with a view to having them convenient to the different centres of population in the various districts.

Many of the markets of the past have been discontinued when their usefulness as such was deemed to be over, and it would now appear, from my investigation, that owing to the shifting of population away from the old centres, the encroachment of business, the changed conditions under which we now live, including the establishment of large and small stores for the sale of all food products, and especially the manner in which the markets have been maintained, or rather not maintained, but simply patched up from time to time, some radical action should be taken at once with certain of those still remaining.

I have caused an examination to be made of the five markets mentioned above, and would report that it is my opinion that these markets have outlived their usefulness for the reasons I have given, and that money spent in repairs upon them, except in the case of Tompkins Market, would be money wasted, and for your information I submit a brief history of each market, and will make certain recommendations for the utilization of the plots by the City.

The manner in which the markets as such may be abolished, is as follows:—

Section 47 of the Charter states:—

"The Board of Aldermen shall have power to provide by ordinance for the acquisition, construction or establishment of markets."

It will be necessary then to have the Board of Aldermen adopt a resolution similar to that when Essex Market was abolished in 1895, which declared the said market to be no longer a public market. (See resolution of June 4, 1895; approved by the Mayor June 7, 1895; all as printed in the minutes of the Sinking Fund of June 12, 1895, page 134.)

When the markets are abolished as such, the property should be turned over by the Comptroller to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, who shall reassign the same for other purposes, or dispose of the same pursuant to the provisions of Section 205 of the Charter which reads in part as follows:

"Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have power to sell \* \* \* any City property except parks, wharves and piers and land under water \* \* \*. If such property be market property it shall be sold only pursuant to a resolution adopted by an unanimous vote of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, concurred in by the Board of Aldermen. The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall have power to assign to use for any public purpose, any city property for whatsoever purpose originally acquired which may be found by the department having control thereof to be no longer required for such purpose."

There are no restrictions that I have been able to discover upon any of these five market sites, which would prevent their use for other City purposes, or the sale of the same upon proper action by the authorities.

Centre Market.

Located on the block bounded by Centre street, Centre Market place, Grand and Broome streets. Size of plot 88 feet 6 inches on Grand street, 35 feet 7 inches on Broome street, by 382 feet 10 inches in length on Centre street, and comprising an area of 23,750 square feet, or nine and one-half City lots.

Original site was purchased September 17, 1817, for \$5,000, and a market house, 25 feet by 80 feet, was completed in November of the same year, at a cost of \$1,000. Pursuant to chapter 232, Laws of 1836, additional land was acquired December 6, 1837, at a cost of \$32,127.38.

The present two-story and cellar brick building was erected during the year 1838, an appropriation of \$50,000 having been made. The contract price was \$40,370, and the building was opened January 17, 1839.

The ground floor was used for market purposes and the second story was assigned by the Board of Aldermen "to the use of the officers commanding the different divisions of militia."

In the year 1853 an addition on the Centre Market place side 30 feet wide and 35 feet high was made at a cost of \$5,000. The assessed valuation to-day is \$200,000. Value of land about \$275,000.

The market contains 124 stands, of which 49 are vacant, and the revenue has steadily declined since 1899, when it was \$6,500, and will probably not be over \$4,500 for 1902, with an expense account of from \$2,500 to \$2,700.

Estimate of cost of repairs to comply with the orders of the Board of Health is \$3,000. The character of this market as such has entirely disappeared, only three butchers and a poultry stand now doing business. Their trade is practically a wholesale trade and not local, in any sense of the word.

The cellar or basement is divided into 11 stands or cellars, so called, leases of which were offered at public auction on April 27, 1899, for a term of five years, and but five (5) were sold. Each lease contains a clause requiring the lessee to vacate at thirty days' notice, if the premises are required by the Corporation; the other cellars are leased from month to month. Total revenue from the cellars per annum is about \$1,600.

The occupation of these cellars is in nowise connected with market purposes, as several of them are used by Italians for sorting rags, the others for storage purposes. All are in an extremely dirty condition.

The City occupies the southerly end of the second story for court purposes for the Second District Municipal Court. In the rear of this the Police Department has a place for the storage of election material, and the northerly portion is now leased for a box manufactory, the lease being sold at the same time as the cellars, for a term of five years, at \$1,200 per annum. Total receipts from the building, about \$7,300.

I think from the above it will be seen that an expenditure of any money upon this building is not warranted, and unless such money is so spent the Board of Health has declared its intention of ordering the same vacated.

I would therefore recommend that you apply to the Board of Aldermen to discontinue the market as such. This having been done and the premises vacated, to turn the same over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, who should order the building demolished or sold at auction, the purchaser to remove the building and erect a suitable fence around the entire plot. Provision will have to be made for the housing of the Second District Municipal Court.

To my mind the site of this market is a most desirable one, being so centrally located and fronting upon three main thoroughfares, and would prove a most exceptional site for a new building to be used as Police Headquarters, of which the City is sadly in need.

The present Police Headquarters covers a plot of about 15,000 square feet, and I believe that a building could be so erected on the market site of 23,750 square feet, that an open space would be left on the Broome street end, which would materially enhance the effect and beauty of such a building.

Should this proposition be considered favorably, I would recommend that an issue of Corporate Stock be made, sufficient to cover the cost of the architect's fees in preparing plans, etc.

#### Tompkins Market.

Located on the block bounded by Third avenue, Hall place, East Sixth and East Seventh streets and facing Cooper square. Size of plot, 181 feet 9 inches on Third avenue by 100 feet, equal to 18,175 square feet, or 7.27 City lots.

A petition was presented to the Board of Aldermen October 6, 1828, signed by Nicholas Fish and others, asking for a market near the intersection of the Bowery and Third avenue, and the above site was selected on December 15, 1828. The property was acquired by purchase December 28, 1828, the consideration being \$20,000.

By the provisions of chapter 267 of the Laws of 1829, entitled "An Act authorizing the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York to erect a public market, and to lay out a public street in the Eleventh Ward of said City," a market building was erected and opened May 8, 1830. The act provided that whenever the Mayor, etc., or their successors, shall deem the continuation of such market upon the aforesaid premises unnecessary, they were empowered to convert the said premises to any other public purpose, or dispose of the same.

The present market building, a three-story and basement iron structure, was completed August 6, 1860, at a cost of \$186,541, and was originally planned for a market on the first floor, and as an armory for the Seventh Regiment. Subsequently other quarters were provided for the Seventh Regiment and the Sixty-ninth Regiment was assigned to the building, and is now in occupation of the basement, second and third floors.

The average revenue received from the market stands has been about \$6,000 per annum, and the expenses about \$2,400. The total number of stands is 110 of which 29 are now vacant. Wholesale meat dealers occupy quite a large amount of the rented space, and the character of a market for the general public is largely lost.

The report of the Health Department deals almost exclusively with the plumbing arrangements and the flooring, and the estimate as made by the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices to put the premises in proper sanitary condition, including inside painting, is \$2,500.

The general condition of the market I consider fair, and as the building will be required as quarters for the Sixty-ninth Regiment for at least two years, until the new armory is constructed on the plot located on the west side of Lexington avenue, between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets, which has been recently acquired for the purpose, I believe that the market should be placed in not only first-class sanitary condition, but should also be painted inside and out, as I believe that while this building remains, it should be kept in a condition creditable to the City. The stands on the outside of the building, at which are sold various articles of merchandise, are certainly not ornamental and in no wise market stands, and should be torn down.

I would therefore recommend that an issue of Special Revenue Bonds be authorized, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8, of section 188 of the Charter, sufficient to provide for repairs and painting, and that this market be maintained in good order until the regiment vacates the building.

The City is greatly in need of an uptown municipal building to accommodate the various departments and offices now located in leased buildings.

I give here a list of the leases made, with the square feet of space occupied, rental paid, etc., to show the requirements of the City at the present time.

This shows a rent roll of over \$51,000 per annum or the interest on nearly \$1,500,000, to say nothing of the inconvenience to the general public in being obliged to travel from one part of the City to another to reach the offices of various Boards, more or less intimately connected with each other, and also the time lost by the employees in going to and from the different departments.

I fully appreciate that the Board of Health would be visited by an entirely different class of people from that having business with the other offices I have mentioned, but the site of Tompkins Market is sufficiently large to provide for an almost complete isolation of the Board of Health in one end of the building with ample entrances, while the general offices could be placed in the other.

It appears to me that no site could be more advantageously located with regard to communication with all parts of the City than this one, and as the Health Board lease does not expire until 1909, and it will be impossible to obtain possession of the market property until 1904 or 1905, there is ample time to make plans and construct an office building which will meet all requirements, if the matter is taken in hand at once.

It is seldom that property can be secured fronting on four streets without large cost to the City in acquiring additional land for new streets, as in the case of the Hall of Records.

Should this proposition receive favorable consideration, I believe that it is not too early for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an issue of Corporate Stock to provide the means necessary for the employment of an architect to draw the plans, as it must be remembered that in all cases of public buildings constructed by the City the progress has been extraordinarily slow in the past. The market property is assessed at \$176,000; valuation of land would be about \$240,000.

#### Clinton Market.

Located on the block bounded by Canal, Washington, Spring and West streets. Contains an area of about 23,800 square feet, equal to nine and one-half city lots. Part of the land was acquired by the City under the Charters of 1686 and 1730, and chapter 214 of the Laws of 1827, authorized the City to acquire by purchase or condemnation all the remaining land in the block not owned by the City. Two plots were secured by purchase in 1827 at a cost of \$14,650 and the remainder was condemned by a Sheriff's Jury. A market house was constructed and finished in 1829, the estimated cost of which was \$20,450.

During the present year the Bureau of Buildings condemned the building as unsafe and obtained a precept from the Supreme Court ordering the same to be taken down within 48 hours. At the earnest solicitation of the standholders, who represented that some of them had been in the market all their lives and that their means of livelihood lay in the market, I am informed that a modification of this precept was obtained, which permitted a portion of the market to stand, provided it was strengthened and made safe.

The modified order has been largely carried out and a greater part of the building has been razed to the level of the floor. That remaining consists of a wooden structure, 30 feet deep, extending along the southerly side of Spring street from the corner of Washington street for 150 feet, and along the westerly side of Washington street for 69 feet; also a two-story brick building adjoining on Washington street, about 31 feet by 41 feet. The foundations under the wooden structure are of stone and apparently of no great depth, the roof being supported by upright granite posts. The building has been strengthened by tie rods, straps and some new beams, but at best is but a shambles, and to my mind a veritable eyesore, and cannot be put in even a presentable appearance either inside or outside.

Should all of the thirty-five stands be rented, an estimate of the revenue would be about \$2,500 per annum.

I do not think it creditable to the City to own or operate such a building and I believe that it is deeply to be regretted that the original order to raze the entire structure was not carried out.

I would therefore recommend to you that you apply to the Board of Aldermen to abolish this market, and that you turn the premises over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, who should order the remaining building removed, and the premises properly fenced, the fence to be painted and not used for advertising purposes.

I expect at an early date to submit a report for your consideration upon the use of this land for another city purpose.

The premises are assessed on the tax books at \$110,000, and a fair valuation of the land would be nearly twice this sum.

#### Union Market.

The original market site was acquired by condemnation proceedings November 21, 1834, pursuant to chapter 150 of the Laws of 1834, at a cost of \$13,888.15, and was the block bounded by East Houston, Columbia, East Second and Sheriff streets, being 21 feet 3 inches on Columbia street, 46 feet 6 inches on Sheriff street by about 200 feet in depth, and containing an area of 6,775 square feet, equal to 2.71 city lots.

A market house was constructed in 1835, a large part of which was destroyed by fire in 1836 and was rebuilt in 1837. The present three-story and cellar brick building, covering the entire plot, was erected in 1853 for a market and a police station combined, and to-day the Police Department occupies the entire building with the exception of what might be termed a store on the ground floor facing Columbia street, and cellar beneath, containing a total area of 1,500 square feet, divided up into twelve stands, five of which are leased to coffee merchants and one stand used for the sale of milk.

Outside of the building on the sidewalk are located two stands, at one of which fish is sold and at the adjoining one fruit, both stands being of a temporary character.

I do not consider that these premises are in any sense of the word a market, and as they have been allowed to become in bad repair I would recommend that you apply to the Board of Aldermen to have the same abolished as a market; that the standholders be told to vacate, and that the premises be turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The receipts from the standholders for the year 1901 were less than \$1,000, and the expense of maintaining this so-called market was \$1,310.37.

I am now causing an investigation to be made to ascertain what department is most clearly in need of additional quarters, and will make a further recommendation to you as soon as I have obtained all the facts.

#### Catharine Market.

Located in the centre of Catharine slip, and comprising two plots of land, the first between South and Water streets, 41 feet 2 inches by 160 feet 4 inches, and the second between Water and Cherry streets, 37 feet 6 inches by 109 feet.

This land was acquired under the original charters of 1686 and 1730, and the first market was established in 1786 by Henry Rutgers and others, who obtained permission to erect a public market house at their own expense. A second building was erected in 1800 and another in 1828, and still another in 1854.

From the outside this market presents a most dilapidated appearance, and there is really but little worth preserving except the roofs, and I am in some doubt if even these would stand long enough to make it desirable to make other extensive repairs.

The stands are fairly well rented, only seven out of a total of sixty-seven being vacant. However, two restaurants, one in each building, occupy 2,200 square feet, while all of the stands for market purposes cover but about 4,500 square feet.

Extensive repairs are necessary, estimated to cost \$4,500, and as there is no sewer under the market it will be necessary to make long connections from the different leaders to comply with the orders of the Board of Health.

I am informed that the price of stands is much lower than stores in the vicinity could be secured for, and that there is little or no local trade, the market men now holding stands depending almost entirely upon the trade from the watermen.

Receipts from stands for 1901 were about \$5,000, with a promise of a slight increase this year. Expenses about \$3,500.

I do not believe the buildings, even when the orders of the Board of Health are complied with, should be permitted to stand, for, as I have said in the case of Clinton Market, it is my opinion that the City should not own and maintain any such unsightly structures, and I do not believe that were the two market houses to be entirely reconstructed and put in presentable shape, the revenue derived would pay for the new work and maintaining them in proper condition.

I would therefore recommend to you that you apply to the Board of Aldermen to abolish Catharine Market as such, the property to be turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

In my opinion, the land upon which these market buildings stand could not be put to better use than for street purposes, and by paving the entire width of Catharine slip the public will be much benefited.

A ferry to Brooklyn is located at the foot of Catharine slip and the roadways on either side of the market building are narrow—17 to 19 feet on one side and 28 to 30 feet on the other—when considered as the only direct approach to a ferry. The traffic is greatly congested in front of the ferryhouse and alongside of the market at frequent intervals.

It would appear to me that should this market be abolished it would be most

desirable to pave the entire space, which is greatly needed for the traffic at this point.

The property is assessed on the tax books at \$80,000, and a fair valuation of the land would be about \$125,000.

In regard to the condition of the other markets mentioned in the report of the Board of Health, I would recommend that Special Revenue Bonds be issued in an amount sufficient to enable the President of the Borough to comply with the orders issued by the said Board, and also to make other necessary repairs, which will place the markets in fairly good condition.

Much work can be done to advantage in Washington Market by removing the partition erected on the curb lines of Vesey, West and Fulton streets and replacing the same by entirely new work; also removing all the cold air pipes in the upper part of the market which are no longer in use, and placing new doors at all entrances.

#### Recommendations for Action.

(b) Authorize an issue of Corporate Stock to an amount not exceeding \$20,000 for the employment of an architect to prepare plans for police headquarters, to be located on the site of Centre Market.

(c) Authorize an issue of Corporate Stock to an amount not exceeding \$20,000 for the employment of an architect to prepare plans for a new municipal building, to be located on the site of Tompkins Market.

The title to this property can therefore only be obtained through condemnation proceedings.

As this plot is necessary to complete the site and cannot be bought at private sale, I would advise that the Corporation Counsel be authorized to institute condemnation proceeding



**GENTLEMEN**—This is to confirm our previous verbal statements to the President of the Aqueduct Commissioners in regard to an important matter concerning the future progress of the work at the New Croton Dam.

In the beginning of August all the men there employed struck and abandoned the work; when asked regarding the cause of the strike, their representatives told us that, as they learned that a law had been passed making the working day for all men employed on City works eight hours instead of ten, they wanted their working time reduced to eight hours. We informed them that we would present the case for the consideration of the Aqueduct Commissioners at the earliest opportunity. On the strength of this statement they resumed work after two days.

The matter was verbally explained at the time to the President of your Board, and we were again prepared to-day to call your attention to it, but were told by the Chief Engineer that no meeting would take place.

Our men are becoming uneasy in regard to this matter, and we are fearful of another strike occurring.

The uninterrupted consummation of the work is of such importance that we trust you will give the matter your early consideration.

**GENTLEMEN**—The men employed by us at the New Croton Dam struck again yesterday for an eight-hour workday; we had foreseen their action, and so reported to you in our communication of September 9, 1902.

This morning our employees came to our office and stated that the reason for the strike was that the Legislature and City officials have passed a law making eight hours a day's work, and that all the employees of the City or under contracts made by the City were now working eight hours for a day's work, or had been promised—as in the case of the Jerome Park Reservoir—that eight hours would be a day's work when the necessary papers or amended contract were provided.

We have been trying to enforce the ten hours a day work, but in the face of the new law and from previous experience in handling strikes at the Dam, we know that it will be impossible to prosecute the work on those lines, and our efforts in that direction would only result in delay to the work.

We respectfully request you to arrange our contract prices proportionately in accordance with the change of time or hours worked, substantially as you have just done for the contract for Jerome Park Reservoir, which presents a case absolutely parallel to ours.

Hon. WM. H. TEN EYCK, President, Aqueduct Commissioners, No. 280 Broadway, New York:

DEAR SIR—Yesterday morning we sent for the principal English speaking workmen and the English speaking Italians to come to our office on the work; they sent in answer a delegation of about twenty men. We stated to them that we had presented to the proper authorities what they, the workmen, claimed as a grievance, that they should be excluded from the benefits of the law that was passed for the reduction of the hours of labor of all employees on contracts let by The City of New York. We told them that there was some differences of opinion in relation to the law, and that while the matter was under consideration by the authorities, we wanted all our employees to return to their work, and to do so at once. Further, we wanted any man that was not satisfied with these conditions to come to the office, receive his pay and leave the work at once. The delegation were apparently satisfied, and said that they would report to the workmen immediately what we had directed. We expected from the way in which they listened to our statement and ultimatum—which we thought was fair to all concerned—that they would return to the work this morning; but instead of the force employed at the Dam returning to the work, our superintendent, Mr. Goldsborough, reports by telephone that all men on the work at the Dam, highways and quarries are on the strike this morning.

We make this report so that you may be fully apprised of the condition of affairs on the work at the present time.

**GENTLEMEN**—We are in receipt of your letters of the 17th and 18th of September, notifying us that men employed by you under your contract with the City for the construction of the New Croton Dam had struck for an eight-hour workday.

We are sorry to learn that this important work is again delayed, but in the absence of any provision in the contract respecting the hours of labor of your employees, we cannot now intervene.

We assume from the statements in your letter that you do not think that you can continue the execution of your contract with the City under present circumstances, but we would like a definite statement from you on the subject.

We do not understand that we can arbitrarily make the changes in the contract desired by you upon the request contained in your letter of September 17, 1902, and without any specific statement of your proposals, which in any event must be considered on their merits. If you will read the terms of the act to which you refer, and which is alleged to give us authority to change the contract, you will see there stated the conditions under which alone we would have power to act. Moreover, we cannot agree with your conclusion that you present a case absolutely parallel with that of the contract for the Jerome Park Reservoir.

To the Honorable the Aqueduct Commissioners:

**GENTLEMEN**—The following is an answer to your communication of September 19: You refer to the absence in our contract of any provisions respecting the hours of labor of our employees. It is precisely for that reason that we hold that new conditions have been established when the Act of April 14, 1902, approved by the Mayor of the City, rendered the eight-hour day mandatory.

As to the impossibility of prosecuting the work under present circumstances, in regard to which you desire a "definite statement," we have to state as follows: Since the eight-hour law was passed many of our men waited patiently for the application of it to the work on the dam, but a large number of them, attracted by the shorter hours obtaining elsewhere, left us. It is with extreme difficulty that we have succeeded in keeping the work going, but during all the summer, notwithstanding our efforts, we have been shorthanded, thus working at a disadvantage and to the detriment of the progress of the work.

We have already reported to you that our men asked for the application of the eight-hour law, and that, after waiting a month for an answer, which we could not at that time obtain from your Board, they struck.

Desirous to avoid delay we have tried to resume work with willing men. Last Wednesday a working party was assailed and dispersed by armed strikers and a man was wounded. To-day we have succeeded in working fifty (50) men on the highway, but we are unable to resume work at the dam.

We have read the terms of the act and we entertain the opinion expressed by Chief Engineer Nelson P. Lewis, of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, of July 15, 1902 (page 179 of the printed minutes of the Aqueduct Commissioners), that "The intent of the law doubtless is that the working time of the men now employed upon any of these contracts may be reduced from ten to eight hours a day, and that the contractor shall be reimbursed for the additional cost of doing the work on an eight-hour basis."

We respectfully maintain that our case is absolutely parallel with that of the contract for the Jerome Park Reservoir, for the reasons that all the arguments on the strength of which the Aqueduct Commissioners resolved to recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the necessary amendments to the Jerome Park Reservoir can apply equally well in our case. The aforesaid arguments are mainly contained in the communication of the Secretary of the New York Central Federated Union and in the resolutions of the Aqueduct Commissioners of July 26, 1902, the statements in which apply equally well for the contract for our work (with the exceptions of dates, names, schedule of prices, mention of public hearing, etc., which obviously apply only to Jerome Park Reservoir).

The only difference verbally mentioned by one of the Commissioners was that Jerome Park Reservoir is within the boundaries of New York City. We fail to see how this fact can affect the question at hand, inasmuch as New York City is our labor market.

It may not be out of place to state here that the eight-hour work system would expedite the work, as in the most favorable season it would be possible to work two shifts of stonecutters and masons.

In conclusion, and in conformity with our communication of September 17, we respectfully request that the Aqueduct Commissioners recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the new Croton Dam amendments similar to those recommended for Jerome Park Reservoir.

There is nothing in the contract which prevents your acceding to the alleged desire of your employees that their working hours be reduced and no statement from you that the effect of so doing would cause you any injury. No facts are stated as a basis for a proposed modification, nor is any sufficient reason given why such a modification would be for the best interests of The City of New York. The Act of the Legislature referred to is in no sense mandatory, and in our opinion you have not presented a case which would enable us to exercise a discretion in accordance with its terms. We must therefore insist upon your proceeding with the work without further delay.

To the Honorable the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—We have received your letter of September 26, 1902. You maintain that you have no statement from us that a reduction of the hours of work would cause us any injury. We beg to state that if we had to pay our men the same wages for a reduced number of hours, it follows that our financial loss would be large and easily estimated, causing us an obvious injury.

As regards facts for a basis of modification of our contract, we beg to hand you herewith a table of prices which we submit for your consideration.

We notice that you refer to an absence of sufficient reasons given by us why such a modification would be for the best interests of The City of New York. We respectfully submit the following reasons for your consideration:

The contract for the construction of the New Croton Dam was executed in 1892, before the eight-hour working day had been adopted by Legislation as the policy of the State in all public works.

Since then, the eight-hour day has been given the force of law in relation to public work by action of the Legislature and has, as a matter of fact, become universal for City work.

In the vicinity of the New Croton Dam an important contract is in force under the eight-hour law and others have to be made in the Croton Reservoir upon the same basis.

Under these circumstances there have already been, since the passing of the Law of April 14, 1902, many delays in the construction of the Dam owing to our inability of securing a sufficient number of men for working on a ten-hour basis, and while these conditions remain unchanged, more delays are certain to occur; and, as you are aware, the work is now stopped, owing to the impossibility of keeping our men at work under the old conditions.

From what precedes it can be seen that the adoption of the eight-hour day would importantly hasten the completion of the Dam, which is of vital consequence to the Water Supply System of New York.

Considering that the demands of the workmen are due to a legislative act approved by the Mayor of New York, which imposes upon us new conditions which were not contemplated in our contract, we do not consider that we can be held responsible for the delays which have already occurred. Although we know that the Act of April 14, 1902, is not mandatory, we feel justified in representing that in our opinion our case calls for the exercise of discretion in accordance with its terms.

PRELIMINARY REPORT NO. 425.

CHIEF ENGINEER'S OFFICE—AQUEDUCT COMMISSIONERS,  
October 22, 1902.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—Relating to the communications received from Messrs. Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, addressed to the Aqueduct Commissioners, dated September 29 and October 4, 1902, relative to the additional cost to complete the contract for building the New Croton Dam, which would result from the observance of eight hours to constitute a day's work for all men employed instead of the present system of ten hours, which communications were referred to me for examination and report, I beg to report that I have conferred with the Engineer of the Department of Finance and the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as directed.

Reducing the period of a day's labor from ten to eight hours with the same rate of wages per day increases the cost of such labor 25 per cent. In the table of prices submitted October 4, 1902, an additional price, equivalent to 25 per cent increase on the contract prices, is asked for all items produced by labor; some of the items are the result of labor only, others embrace both labor and material. In the latter cases the value of the material, such as brick, granite, cement, powder, timber, etc., has been deducted from the contract prices, and the balance has been treated as the cost of labor. I have examined each item of the prices with the Engineers mentioned above, and from the best information I find that 25 per cent additional is asked on all items of labor.

The estimated cost of the work remaining to be done to complete the contract on September 30, 1902, the date of the last estimate, is \$1,375,507.01, of which I estimate that \$155,531.69 is for material and \$1,220,035

The additional price asked for granite dimension stone masonry is 25 per cent. of the cost of the labor of quarrying, cutting, hauling and laying it in the finished work. This cost has been determined by deducting from the contract price, \$35 per cubic yard, the value of the material used, which is 25 cents per cubic yard for the granite in its natural position in the quarry, and 50 cents for cement used to lay a cubic yard, making 84 cents per cubic yard; this, deducted from the contract price (\$35), leaves \$34.16 for the labor portion of the item. On this the contractors ask an additional price of 25 per cent., which is equivalent to \$8.54 per cubic yard.

The quarry from which the granite is procured is located six miles distant from the dam, to which the stone is carried on a steam railroad which was constructed for that purpose. The stone used for the construction of the highways is hauled by teams, as well as by the railroad.

In computing the cost of the labor and materials used in the different items of the contract the question of profit or loss to the contractors has not been considered.

REPORT No. 426.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—In compliance with a resolution of October 7, 1902, I beg to submit the following, relating to the New Croton Dam:

(a.) If the contract now in force could be diligently carried out, the work should be completed by April 1, 1905, provided, however, that the contractors would not be embarrassed by strikes or by inability to secure sufficient labor to keep a full force employed.

(b.) In prosecuting the proposed amended contract under the eight-hour law provision three shifts of men could be employed on the work of earth and rock excavation by allowing half an hour or so for lunch, and two shifts of masons could be employed five months of the year.

(c.) In my opinion it would be possible to shorten the time for the completion of the contract in its proposed amended form by increasing the number of shifts employed, and by keeping the gangs constantly full of a better class of men, as could be secured under the eight-hour system.

(d.) Earth and rock excavation is the only class of work which could be done both day and night. The plant is equipped with electric lights for such work.

(e.) I can suggest no additional provisions for the proposed amended contract which would enable you to enforce diligence on the part of the contractors in the completion of the contract other than is provided in the contract under clauses M and P.

(f.) As to a form of a weekly report that would keep you informed as to the diligence of the contractors in prosecuting the work, I would say that the extension of the New Croton Dam consists of two general features, namely—the excavation of the foundation pit and the building of the masonry. The engineer could estimate the time required to excavate the pit and report to you weekly as to whether the contractors were doing more or less work than required, and the same practice could be instituted when the contractors commence the construction of the masonry.

All other work on the contract can be completed before the time of the completion of the work of extending the dam.

CHAPTER 588.

An Act relative to the powers of the Aqueduct Commissioners provided for and holding office under and pursuant to the provisions of chapter four hundred and ninety of the Laws of Eighteen Hundred and Eighty-three and its amendments. (Became a law April 14, 1902, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, three-fifths being present. Accepted by the City.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Aqueduct Commissioners, provided for and holding office under and pursuant to the provisions of an act of the Legislature of the State of New York, entitled "An Act to provide new reservoirs, dams, and a new aqueduct, with the appurtenances thereto, for the purpose of supplying The City of New York with an increased supply of pure and wholesome water," said act being chapter four hundred and ninety of the Laws of Eighteen Hundred and Eighty-three, and its amendments, are hereby authorized and empowered to agree with any person, firm or corporation with whom they have contracted or may hereafter contract, upon such terms and conditions as shall in their judgment and discretion be for the best interests of The City of New York, that eight hours shall constitute a day's work for all laborers employed by said person, firm or corporation in the performance of his or its contract, and that no laborer employed in the performance of any such contract shall be required, permitted or allowed to work more than eight hours. No agreement made under the provisions of this act shall be valid or binding until the same has been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

The Board fixed Friday, November 7, 1902, at 2:30 p. m., as the time for such public hearing.

The Secretary presented a petition of Frederick Lang, Watchman in the Department of Docks and Ferries, requesting that the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted February 11, reducing his salary to \$900 per annum be rescinded; that his salary be fixed at \$2,000 per annum, and that he receive due

compensation from said Department for failure to pay him the compensation of \$2,000 as agreed upon.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

(PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.)

A special meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York was held on Thursday, December 4, 1902, in the old Council Chamber (Room 16), City Hall, at 10:30 o'clock in the forenoon, pursuant to resolution.

Present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

The Mayor, Hon. Seth Low, presided.

WIDENING PARK AVENUE, ETC., MANHATTAN.

Hearing was resumed in the matter of the application of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to have Park avenue widened, between Fifty-sixth and Forty-ninth streets, and to close portions of the side streets and of Park avenue between Forty-sixth and Fifty-first streets, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Mr. Place, on behalf of the railroad company, submitted the following communication:

NEW YORK CENTRAL AND HUDSON RIVER RAILROAD COMPANY,  
GRAND CENTRAL STATION,  
NEW YORK, December 3, 1902.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

On or about the 30th of August, 1902, the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and the New York and Harlem Railroad Company presented a petition to the Local Board of the Murray Hill District of Local Improvements of the Borough of Manhattan for an alteration or change in the map of The City of New York. Under the proposed change Park avenue was to be widened on the westerly side from Forty-ninth street to Fifty-sixth street, portions of the avenue as widened, and also portions of Forty-sixth, Forty-seventh, Forty-eighth and Forty-ninth streets were to be closed; and the existing open cut from Forty-ninth street to Fifty-sixth street was to be widened.

These proposed changes were to be made to enable the railroad company to enlarge the surface yard, forming a part of its terminal at the Grand Central Station. The proceeding thus commenced was the result of an effort on the part of the officials of the railroad company, after conference with City officials, to do whatever might be possible under existing law of the work necessary to be done in order to effect the proposed change of motive power to be used in the Park Avenue tunnel, specific enabling legislation having failed at the last session of the Legislature. The enlargement of the existing yard was regarded by the railroad company as absolutely essential, and its enlargement as a surface yard was regarded as the most advantageous method for railroad purposes, and it was supposed that this method, in connection with the proposed adoption of electricity as a motive power, would be satisfactory to the City.

Due notice was given of the presentation of the petition to the Local Board, and several public hearings were had thereon. At these hearings the neighboring property owners were represented and numerous suggestions were made, both by the representatives of the property owners and by the members of the Local Board, of things which it was thought the railroad company ought to agree to do, but the proposed plan of enlarging as a surface yard did not seem to be seriously opposed. All parties who appeared having had an opportunity to be heard, the Local Board, on October 24, 1902, adopted a resolution approving the proposed changes, and required the railroad company to execute an undertaking or agreement covering the matters suggested, which had been agreed upon, and such agreement was thereupon executed by the company and has been filed with the Mayor of the City.

Pursuant to the Charter the petition and the resolution of the Local Board were transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and this Board gave notice of a public hearing to be had on the 21st day of November, 1902. A public hearing was had on that day, and an adjourned hearing was had on the 26th day of November, 1902. At both of these hearings it has developed that certain property holders desired that further improvements should be made for the benefit of the City and of their property, namely, that streets or certain streets now partially cut off on either side of the terminal yard be carried over the railroad tracks in order to connect the different portions of the City.

While the depression of the railroad company's tracks to enable the streets to be carried over them would result in advantage to the City, and in great benefit to certain of the property in the vicinity of the terminal, it would make the railroad yard much less desirable for railroad purposes than the proposed surface yard; therefore it is respectfully submitted that the railroad company, in justice and fairness, should not be called upon to stand the entire expense incurred by such a change, which would benefit the City and property holders solely.

More or less closely related to the proposed change in motive power, two other subjects are under consideration with the City authorities, and these should also be disposed of prior to the carrying out of the contemplated change of motive power:

1. The elimination of grade crossings at Morris Heights, Fordham Heights and High Bridge.

2. The elimination of grade crossings in the vicinity of Kingsbridge, including Kingsbridge road, East Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, Broadway, Corlear street, Tibbett avenue, West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, and West Two Hundred and Twenty-seventh street.

The best method, and probably the only feasible one, of eliminating the grade crossings at Morris Heights, Fordham Heights and High Bridge, is by carrying the streets over the railroad tracks by means of bridges with suitable approaches.

Two methods of eliminating the grade crossings at Kingsbridge, which includes the seven crossings above named, are possible:

1. The streets may be carried over the railroad on the present line. The objection to this is that the necessary change of grade of streets may result in great damage to abutting property, and such change of grade of streets is very strenuously opposed by the property holders.

2. These grade crossings may be eliminated pursuant to the provisions of chapter 516 of the Laws of 1901. The plan which has been proposed under this act is that of changing the line of the railroad from a point at or near Kingsbridge to a new line which will follow the course of the Harlem Ship Canal. The obvious advantage of this plan to the railroad company is in the straightening of its line, and the obvious disadvantage is the necessity of having two bridges, one of which will be a draw bridge, and will require an Act of Congress. The Act of the Legislature, in substance, provides that the City shall bear the expense of the new right of way, or rather, the difference between the cost of the new right of way and the value of such parts of the present right of way as shall be abandoned, and that the railroad company shall pay the cost of construction and all other costs incident to the change in this line. The advantages to the City, and to the locality, of this plan are great and decided, both with respect to the physical conditions and cost.

If the method of depressing the entire terminal yard and its approaches to such an extent as may be necessary to carry existing streets over the tracks by means of viaducts or bridges shall be adopted, it will be necessary for the railroad company to obtain the right to use certain portions of Park avenue and of the intersecting streets beneath the surface. The plan of widening Park avenue, and of widening the existing cut from Forty-ninth street to Fifty-seventh street, and of closing certain portions of Forty-sixth, Forty-seventh, Forty-eighth and Forty-ninth streets could then be abandoned.

With the desire to treat all of these matters not only in a fair, but in a liberal spirit, and if possible to show to the City and its citizens that it is willing to meet any reasonable demand provided it is not called upon to make changes that will be seriously detrimental to its terminal property, or to incur an expense which would not be justifiable in the proper management of the property, the company submits the following propositions:

1. The elimination of grade crossings at Morris Heights, Fordham Heights and High Bridge.

The company will construct the necessary bridges and abutments to carry the streets over its tracks, and will do all the work within its own lines, at its own expense; the City to bring the streets by proper approaches to the grade of the bridges in such manner as it shall see fit.

2. The elimination of grade crossings in the vicinity of Kingsbridge, including Kingsbridge road, East Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, Broadway, Corlear street, Tibbett avenue, West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, and West Two Hundred and Twenty-seventh street.

The company will either:

(a) Construct the necessary bridges and abutments to carry the streets over its tracks, on the existing line, and will do all the work within its own lines, at its own expense; the City to bring the streets by proper approaches to the grade of the bridges, in such manner as it shall see fit; or

(b) It will unite with the City in eliminating these seven grade crossings in accordance with the provisions of chapter 516 of the Laws of 1901.

3. The enlargement of the terminal yard.

The company will depress all of its tracks between the southerly line of Forty-fifth street and Fifty-seventh street to such an extent as may be necessary to enable the City to carry, by means of viaducts or bridges over the tracks, at a grade not exceeding four per cent., such of the intersecting streets from Forty-fifth to Fifty-sixth street, both inclusive, as the City may deem necessary in the public interest, the expense of extending these streets over the railroad company's tracks to be borne by the City.

In consideration of the great expense of the railroad company in depressing its tracks for the above purpose, the latter shall be given the right to use, subject to the right of the City to construct and maintain such bridges or viaducts, those portions of Forty-fifth, Forty-sixth, Forty-seventh, Forty-eighth and Forty-ninth streets included within the limits of its enlarged yard, and of Park avenue, from the southerly side of Forty-fifth street, northerly to Fifty-seventh street (the existing roadways of Park avenue not to be interfered with), and to a connection with the Rapid Transit subway at Forty-second street, and the right to erect and maintain on any bridges or viaducts, carrying streets over its tracks, such signal, electrical and other apparatus as may be required for the operation of its road.

If the changes of the terminals at the Grand Central Station are made it may be found necessary to use the land under the surface of Vanderbilt avenue and Depew place, but without interfering with the surface of these streets.

It is understood that your Board may not now be in a position to take final action on all of these propositions, but if they are acceptable to the City, the company is ready to consider with the City all questions of detail, both in relation to these propositions and to any legislation which may be required to carry them into effect.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Relative to the communication of December 1, 1902, of Albert R. Moore, Esq., concerning Forty-sixth street, I have the honor to report:

The Directory for 1900 gives the residence of Robert Van Wyck as No. 135 East Forty-sixth street.

I submit the following items of information connected with the memoranda submitted by Mr. Moore:

1. The Bridge—The plans for the new bridge appear to have been approved by the Department of Highways in July, 1900, as will be seen by copy of letter from John D. Creamer, Secretary to the Commissioner, to W. J. Wilgus, Chief Engineer (copy herewith marked 'A'), but the permit for the work was not issued until December 28, 1900. I attach a copy of this permit, marked "B," copied from the letter book in the Bureau of Highways. I also attach five blue prints of the bridge plans obtained from Chief Engineer Wilgus through H. A. Stahl, Office Engineer of the Railroad Company. There appear to be no such maps or plans on file in the Bureau of Highways. The new bridge was opened to the public March 25, 1901.

2. The Laying of Tracks Across Forty-sixth Street—I inclose copy of letter from Chief Engineer Wilgus to the Commissioner of Highways asking for a permit to lay said tracks, and a copy of the permit granted August 8, 1900, obtained from Engineer W. B. Martin of the Bureau of Highways, together with a memorandum by him regarding his signature on the permit. I also attach a tracing obtained from the Railroad Company showing the location of the new tracks (the dotted lines).

3. The New Brick Wall—On examination of the premises I find a brick wall with a large gate on the roadway and a small gate on the northerly sidewalk built across Forty-sixth street, located 130 feet easterly of Park avenue. After diligent search and inquiry in the Bureau of Highways and among the proper officials of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, I have been unable to find any application, permit, plan or other information regarding the tearing down of the old wall or the building of the new wall further east. Mr. J. H. Franklin, Manager of the Grand Central Station, under whose supervision the new wall was built, says he will have a search made for the permit, and if found, will send me a copy.

No drawings or plans of any of these works are on file in the Bureau of Highways, nor can I find any of these matters came before the Board of Aldermen during the year 1900 or 1901, nor was any permit granted by that body.

Resolved, That, in the judgment of this Board, every street, from and including Forty-fifth street to Fifty-fifth street, if it is found to be both practicable and desirable

in the general interest and in the interest of the traveling public to do so, should be carried across the railroad yard and tracks at a grade available for vehicle traffic.

Resolved, That any additional tracks to be laid in Park avenue should be laid under the surface of the avenue as it now exists; and that, wherever possible, the open cut in Park avenue should be closed over.

Resolved, That it be referred to a committee to consist of the Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the President of the Borough of The Bronx, to consider and report on or before December 19, 1902, the best practicable plan for the treatment of both railroad tracks and streets; and of adjusting the various questions relating to grade crossings pending between the City and the railroad.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the President of the Borough of The Bronx—12.

The Comptroller requested the railroad company, through Mr. Place, to file with the Department of Finance a statement of just what authority of law the company relied upon for the use of every foot of street around the Grand Central Depot that they were using, to which Mr. Place consented.

At the request of the several counsel representing the property owners, Friday, December 12, was fixed as a date on or before which they might file with the committee any suggestions they might have to make.

The hearing was then closed and the meeting adjourned.

The committee appointed by the above resolutions went into executive session at once.

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

That proceedings be initiated to acquire title to Northern avenue, from West One Hundred and Eighty-first street to points 784.30 feet and 756.23 feet northerly therefrom, as more fully shown and described on the map adopted on July 11, 1902, for the laying out of said Northern avenue on the map of The City of New York, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; and it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a copy of a resolution of the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, Borough of Manhattan, adopted on October 28, 1902, initiating proceedings to acquire title to Northern avenue, from West One Hundred and Eighty-first street to points 784.3 feet and 756.23 feet northerly therefrom.

A resolution to open this street was adopted by the Board of Public Improvements on December 24, 1901, but no progress has been made under the same owing to an error in the map. On October 16, 1902, the proceedings for changing the lines of the street so as to conform with the original intentions in laying it out were completed, and the revised map was ordered to be filed.

Northern avenue, as now laid out upon the map of The City of New York, has a width of 60 feet, and occupies the site of an old lane on the line of which are two houses, and a third is about to be erected. Lacking the evidence of a survey, it is not possible to state whether or not there are buildings upon the land to be acquired, although a superficial examination would indicate their absence. Favorable action upon the resolution is recommended.

I would also recommend that the resolution of December 24, 1901, requesting the Corporation Counsel to apply for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, be rescinded.

Resolved, That the entire cost and expense of said proceedings shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.
