Sir—Pursuant to the provisions of the Charter, I hereby transmit to you a tabulated report of the operations of the Tenement House Department of The City of New York covering the period from January 1, 1904, to December 31, 1905.

This report covers the year 1904, as well as the year 1905, for which the report is now due, for the reason that it seemed desirable to present tabulated statements for the year 1904 that should continue and be comparable with the tables presented in the first report covering the period from the organization of the Department to June 30, 1903, and the tables contained in the CITY RECORD for March 23, 1904, covering the period from July 1 to December 31, 1903.

The present tabulated statements submitted form a direct continuation of the previous tables, so that there is on record a continuous tabulated statement of the work of the Department from its organization to December 31, 1905. These tables for 1904 and 1905 have been divided in semi-annual periods, so that the work of any six months can be compared with that of any other.

Rule 6 of the Rules and Regulations of this Department is hereby amended to read as follows:

POLICE SURGEONS.

Chief Surgeon.

The Chief Surgeon shall have general supervision of the work of the Police Surgeons. He shall receive, tabulate and preserve the daily reports of the District Surgeons. He shall keep in his office the sick record of each individual member of the Force. He shall, when directed by the Police Commissioner, investigate cases in which either for trivial injuries or disorders, or incurable diseases, members of the Force are carried upon the sick list for lengthened periods. He shall receive, through official channels, and investigate, complaints of neglect or other derelictions of Police Surgeons, and report the result of his investigations to the Police Commissioner. He shall, in official matters, be the sole medium of communication between the Police Surgeons and the Police Commissioner. He shall prepare quarterly and yearly reports of the medical and surgical work of the Department, containing such information as the Police Commissioner may direct.

District Surgeons.

(a) A District Surgeon, when notified that a member of the Force has reported sick, shall visit him without delay, shall assume exclusive control of such member of the Force while he remains upon the sick list, and return him to duty without unnecessary loss of time, with a written order to his commanding officer. He shall visit such member as frequently as the nature of his injury or disability may require, shall be entirely responsible for his treatment, and may order his removal to a hospital, if in his judgment such a move is essential to his proper treatment.

(b) Police Surgeons shall make, through the Chief Surgeon, daily reports of sickness and death, in such a form as may be directed by the Police Commissioner.

(c) It shall be the duty of the Surgeon, when a member of the Force upon the sick list shall have been transferred to another Surgical District, to forward to the Surgeon of that district the sick report, containing the record of said member of the Force, to date of transfer.

(d) A Surgeon designated for examination of members of the Force, or of candidates for appointment, as to their mental or physical condition, shall, when prevented by illness or other sufficient cause from discharging that duty, apply to the Chief Surgeon for relief.

(e) Each Surgeon assigned to such duty of examination shall make personal examination of each officer or candidate before certifying to his condition.

(f) Surgeons, when called to station houses to make examinations in cases of alleged intoxication or criminality, shall report at once, through official channels, to the Police Commissioner, the results of such examinations.

(g) Surgeons, in cases of members of the Force reporting sick, and found to be malingerers, shall order their immediate return to duty, and prefer charges against them, through official channels.

(h) Surgeons, in cases of members of the Force incapacitated by reason of their own improper conduct, shall recommend to the Police Commissioner their suspension from duty pending their recovery.

(i) Surgeons applying for leave of absence shall state in their applications the names of the Surgeons who will discharge their duties during their absence.

(j) Surgeons shall receive no compensation for services rendered to any member of the Force.

(k) Surgeons shall allow no other business to interfere with their official duties.

(l) Surgeons, when members of the Force are permanently disabled or when the physical or mental ability of any member of the Force to do police duty is questioned, shall recommend to the Police Commissioner, through official channels, that such member of the Force be examined by the Surgeons of the Department.
