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BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

MINUTES, BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, ROOM 16, CITY HALL, FRIDAY, JANUARY 27, 1905.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Charles V. Fornes, President, Board of Aldermen; John F. Ahearn, President, Borough of Manhattan; Martin W. Littleton, President, Borough of Brooklyn; Louis F. Haffen, President, Borough of The Bronx; Joseph Cassidy, President, Borough of Queens; George Cromwell, President, Borough of Richmond.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, presiding.

Minutes of meetings held December 30, 1904, and January 6, 1905, were approved as printed.

The Secretary presented the following resolution from the Board of Aldermen, requesting the fixing of the salary of the position of Cashier in the office of the City Clerk at \$2,100 per annum:

In the Board of Aldermen.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and hereby is requested, the City Clerk concurring therein, to fix the salary of the position of Cashier in the office of the City Clerk at the rate of two thousand one hundred dollars per annum, the said amount being the minimum paid as salary for like positions in other Departments of the City government, this being a renewal of the request made by resolution of the Board of Aldermen under date of May 24, 1904, which was believed to have met with favor, but through some oversight was not provided for.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, January 10, 1905, a majority of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, that the salary of the position of Cashier in the office of the City Clerk be fixed at the rate of twenty-one hundred dollars (\$2,100) per annum.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Department of Health, requesting an appropriation of \$15,000 for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses required to be incurred for reindexing and consolidating the records of vital statistics

on file in the Bureau of Records of the Department of the old City of New York, for the period extending from 1866 to 1888, inclusive.

This matter was laid over, and the Secretary directed to request the Commissioner of said Department to apply to the Board of Aldermen for an issue of Special Revenue Bonds, under subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Receiver of Taxes, making application for an increase in salary:

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE—CITY OF NEW YORK, }
January 11, 1905. }

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller, Department of Finance, City of New York:

SIR—I respectfully request that my salary as Receiver of Taxes of The City of New York be increased to \$7,500. My services in the Department of Finance have extended over a period in excess of twenty-one years, having been appointed on October 30, 1883. From that date and until 1893, I acted as Auditor, and after a brief period as Deputy Receiver of Taxes was appointed Receiver at a salary of \$4,500, which was increased to \$5,000 by the Greater New York Charter in 1898.

Prior to consolidation the salary of the Receiver of Taxes of the then City of New York was \$4,700, when in 1897 \$47,354.091.20 were collected.

In the same year the salary of the Collector of Taxes in the then City of Brooklyn was \$5,000 for the collection of about \$17,000,000.

At the same time the cost of collecting taxes in the territory of what is now known as the Borough of Queens amounted to \$34,500. This amount was paid to sixteen Collectors in fees running annually from \$900 for School Collection District No. 3 to \$6,600 in Long Island City.

In the Borough of Richmond the fee system likewise prevailed and the cost to collect a tax of \$841,512.65 in 1897, on the minimum basis of 1 per cent., was \$8,415.

In 1870 the old City of New York paid its Receiver of Taxes a salary of \$10,000 in the collection of \$23,569,127.71, whereas, in 1904, I received \$5,000 for collecting \$88,659,939.01.

I am credibly informed that the compensation of the Receiver of Taxes of The City of New York is very much less than that received by similar officials in other leading cities of the country. For example, the Receiver of Taxes of the City of Philadelphia received a salary of \$10,000 for 1904 on the collection of \$23,178,133.51. The yearly collections of the City of Boston amount to about \$26,500,000, at a cost of \$140,000, of which the Collector of Taxes receives a salary of \$5,000. On a tax levy of \$88,659,939 in 1904, New York allowed \$181,837.44 for the cost of collections, out of which the Receiver received a salary of \$5,000. Taking the figures of the City of Boston and those of The City of New York as a basis of compensation, the salary of the Receiver of Taxes of this City would amount to over \$16,500.

The duties and responsibilities of the Receiver of Taxes of The City of New York have enormously increased since consolidation, and the number of assessment rolls, based upon apportionments of property throughout the several boroughs, particularly in the out-lying district, has doubled. In the year 1897, prior to consolidation, as Receiver of Taxes for the then City of New York, comprising the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, I had a force of fourteen Assistants with an entire salary roll of \$26,900 for the collection of a tax levy of over \$45,300,000. In 1904 the force regularly employed in the several boroughs throughout the Greater City numbered one Receiver, ten Deputies and a clerical force of one hundred and five men, with a salary roll of \$151,240, to collect a tax levy of over \$89,250,000. These figures do not include the Temporary Clerks employed during the opening months for the collection of taxes, whose number has increased proportionately.

With a personal staff of six Clerks, the Receiver of Taxes has two Deputies in each of the five boroughs, with a clerical force divided as follows:

Borough of Manhattan, 26 for the collection of \$66,224,576.67.
Borough of The Bronx, 13 for the collection of \$4,226,159.42.
Borough of Brooklyn, 33 for the collection of \$15,855,403.76.
Borough of Queens, 13 for the collection of \$2,146,216.28.
Borough of Richmond, 8 for the collection of \$800,504.73.

(The greater number of Clerks employed in the Borough of Brooklyn is accounted for by the fact that there are more than twice as many individual taxpayers in that borough than any other.)

In the discharge of the duties devolving upon me as Receiver of Taxes, wherein I have handled annually during the last six years, in excess of \$70,000,000 of the City's money, I believe I may be pardoned in claiming that my bureau is one of the best conducted in the City government, with an efficient force and without the loss of a single dollar.

I earnestly request that you give this application your favorable consideration.

SIR—The Auditing Bureau of the Department of Finance has refused to pay the salaries of Frederick Brown and W. J. Schumacker, Automobile Enginemen, who have been employed in that capacity for some time, on the ground that the salaries had not been fixed by the Board of Estimate and the Board of Aldermen. For weeks the pay-rolls containing the above names were approved by the Civil Service Commission and audited by your Department without question until a week ago.

Both appointments were regularly made from eligible lists.

For the examination held on Tuesday, October 4, 1904, it was specifically stated that the salary attached to the position was from \$2.50 to \$3.50 per day. I made the salaries of the two employed in this Department \$3.50 per diem.

As above stated, the Auditing Bureau contend that the compensation should be fixed by the Board of Estimate and the Board of Aldermen, and I respectfully request that you bring the matter to the attention of the latter body at your earliest convenience and the result of such action forwarded to the Aldermen, to the end that the men be paid. It has also been suggested by the Auditing Bureau that the resolution be made retroactive, to cover the period for which pay has been withheld. As to legality or the propriety of such action I have personally no recommendation to make. What I desire is to have the men, who are performing regular and faithful duty, paid regularly.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Aldermen by resolution adopted January 10, 1905, and approved by the Mayor, January 17, 1905, grants permission to "the New York Butchers' Dressed Meat Company to lay and maintain seven cast-iron pipes under and across the carriageway of West Thirty-ninth street, about one hundred and eight feet west of Eleventh avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, said pipe to be of and used for the following dimensions and purposes, to wit: Two 4-inch pipes and one 2-inch pipe for the transmission of ammonia; two 4-inch pipes for the transmission of electricity and two 2½-inch pipes for the transmission of steam; the said pipes to connect the premises of said corporation on the north and south sides of said West Thirty-ninth street; provided, that the said New York Butchers' Dressed Meat Company shall pay to The City of New York, as compensation for the privilege, such amount as shall be ascertained, fixed and determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

I would report that the distance between curb lines at this point is 30 feet, and as per schedule of prices to be charged for the privilege of laying pipe lines, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 2, 1903 (see minutes, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, 1903, page 1782). The annual rental for the privilege would be \$60, and the charge for opening the street \$15.

DEAR SIR—We beg to acknowledge receipt of and refer to a communication from you under date of October 10, 1904, as follows:

"Herewith is sent to you for your investigation and report to this office an estimate from the Ellithorpe Improved Safety Air Cushion Company, in which they propose to install in the new Hall of Records Building, in the elevator shafts of the passenger elevators, six (6) air cushions for the sum of two thousand eight hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,850) for each air cushion.

"An early report is requested in order that the matter may be presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its consideration. Please return with your report the estimate and map herewith transmitted."

We herewith return the estimate and map transmitted. It is impossible to check from the map as there are no figures or scale on same.

In reference to the estimate we would respectfully make the following comments:

The estimate should state that the contractor for the air cushions will make, at his own expense, each and every alteration or change that may be found necessary to the existing conditions at the building, so as to properly install the air cushions. This is a matter of vital moment, as it is impossible to say what complications may result unless the Ellithorpe people are made responsible for any necessary changes.

The estimate also reads as follows:

"The owner of building is to have the elevator machinery built so as to admit of the car traveling from the lowest starting point of air cushion. Excavations, if required, to be furnished by another contractor, without cost to us.

"We are to have the privilege of access to building at such times as we deem necessary in order to complete our work, and to be allowed such space around the elevator shafts, in the installation of and putting in place of our material, as we require to properly complete air cushions. Space required for our work to be free from interference. It is particularly understood that this work is to be done during regular business hours; if otherwise, special agreement to be made in writing."

Instead of the owner building the elevator machinery to suit the air cushion, the air cushion should be built to suit the elevator machinery already contracted for.

The excavation should be done by the Ellithorpe people instead of the other contractor mentioned. They also require the privilege of access to the building at such times as they deem necessary and such space as they may require to be free from interference. This cannot be granted by the City as the building is in possession of John Peirce, the contractor, and the work must be installed so as not to interfere with his contract.

The installation of the air cushions should be done in any hour necessary, regardless of regular business hours.

Each air cushion should be tested by detaching the cables instead of only one as proposed.

The estimate does not state whether any changes will be required to the elevator, machinery, cars or door openings provided for in the contract with Mr. John Peirce.

There is no elevation given on the map to show how the air cushion will affect the external appearance of the bronze work.

In short, the estimate should be comprehensive enough to cover any and all changes that may be necessary to the work which is to be installed under the contract with Mr. John Peirce. As a matter of fact, it is our opinion that if you propose to install these air cushions that they should be contracted for with Mr. John Peirce, the present contractor, so as to avoid friction and to fix the responsibility on the person who has the contract for the installation of the elevator machinery.

SIR—Hon. John F. Ahearn, President, Borough of Manhattan, in communication dated November 16, 1904, transmits to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its consideration a report of Messrs. Horgan & Slattery, Architects for the New Hall of Records Building, on the proposition of the Ellithorpe Improved Safety Air Cushion Company to install in said building six Ellithorpe improved safety air cushions. Also a bid of John Peirce, proposing to install six Ellithorpe improved safety air cushions in the above mentioned building, with all the work incidental thereto, for the sum of \$3,135 per air cushion.

I would report: After receiving these papers, Mr. Peirce has made an additional proposal, dated November 23, 1904, containing fuller details of how the air cushions are to be installed, which reads as follows:

"I propose to furnish and erect in a substantial and workmanlike manner six (6) Ellithorpe improved safety air cushions in and about the elevator shafts of building located at Chambers and Centre streets, New York, and known as the Hall of Records, in accordance with the specifications as herein stated, and with further detailed drawings and specifications to be prepared by me, and to the entire satisfaction of the Architects.

"Construction to consist principally of beams, channels and steel plates of such sizes as may be necessary. Comprising a length of sufficient feet from the bottom to top of air cushion, including pit about (3) feet, cellar about XXXX, basement about (16) feet, linear, first floor about XXXX, second floor about XXXXX, third floor about XXXX.

"The doors opening into the air cushion to be furnished by me and to consist of steel construction and to be provided with ball-bearing trolleys.

"All work to be neatly painted. I will test any one of the six air cushions which you may desire by dropping the car from its highest point of travel into the air cushion without damage, thereby demonstrating the efficiency of the same to save life and limb in case of an accidental runaway or fall of the elevator car. Every part of the air-cushion work, as constructed by me, shall be erected in a good and workmanlike manner, and is guaranteed to be free from defect in material and workmanship, and should any appear within one year of date of completion same will be made good by me.

"The price for each air cushion complete and in good order as herein specified is thirty-one hundred and thirty-five dollars (\$3,135), payable as follows, in New York current funds:

"In monthly payments based upon the Architects' estimated value of material delivered at the building and work executed, less 10 per cent., which 10 per cent. is to be retained until the entire plant has been executed, tested and accepted.

"If test of dropping more than one car entirely detached from cables is required, the additional cost will be \$165 per car.

"It is distinctly understood and agreed that I am to pay for the cutting and repair of all materials and the furnishing and setting of new materials if required which are disturbed or injured in the construction of these air cushions."

With this fuller description, an interview was had with Messrs. Horgan & Slattery, the Architects, and they have written this office as follows:

"Looking into the matter, we find that Mr. John Peirce's estimate of the 14th inst., and supplementary estimate of the 23d inst. about covers the points of objection we raised in our letter to Mr. Ahearn, dated the 17th of October, 1904.

"It might be well, however, to have a clear understanding on the following points:

"1. To state where the elevator machinery will or will not be interfered with, and if the former is the case to have it made clear that no extra charge will be made for making the necessary changes.

"2. Each of the elevators should be tested. A test of one does not assure anyone that the others will be safe; and

"3. The appearance of the exposed steel work around elevators must conform in design with the other work and sketches should be submitted for the architects' approval in all matters of this kind."

"In other respects we offer no objection to the scheme as now outlined in the estimates referred to. On the contrary, as an auxiliary safety device we commend it."

On August 5, 1903, I reported that "I have examined the model of the Ellithorpe safety air cushion at the company's office, Nos. 31 and 33 Broadway, and I consider that it will do all that is claimed for it: Check the fall of the elevator car (in case of accident) and stop it without any jar or injury to the occupant of the car; being simple in construction, it has no parts to get out of order, hence sure to work at any time.

"The appliance I consider excellent, and would advise that it be installed in the new Hall of Records Building."

I would therefore advise that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the President of the Borough of Manhattan to enter into an agreement with John Peirce to modify and alter his contract (known as Contract No. 4095) for the completion of the Hall of Records Building in an amount not to exceed \$19,800 for installing six (6) Ellithorpe improved safety air cushions, said agreement to include the suggestions of the architects.

1. To state where the elevator machinery will or will not be interfered with and if the former is the case, to have it made clear that no extra charge will be made for making the necessary changes.

2. Each of the elevators should be tested. A test of one does not assure anyone that the others will be safe; and

GENTLEMEN—In the matter of the proposed comfort station for Madison Square Park, for which the sum of \$18,000 was recently provided by your Honorable Board by an issue of Corporate Stock, I beg to say that upon a more careful study of the needs of that locality, and the character of structure appropriate for that park, it is estimated that an additional sum of \$12,000 will be required to effect a creditable accomplishment of this improvement.

The structures of similar character, which have been provided in the lower City parks, are in size, design and material of construction of a kind which would seem to be more appropriate to Madison Square than to Mulberry Bend, Hamilton Fish, and other parks where they have been erected. In fact it would seem wiser if the materials and fixtures of the stations in those localities had been of a plainer but a more substantial kind. However, I am of opinion that the building for Madison Square Park should at least be equal to those other structures in accommodations, structural material and equipment, and would therefore respectfully request that the additional sum of \$12,000 be provided in order that a creditable building and one in keeping with this park and its surroundings may be erected.

DEAR SIR—Owing to the sharp competition in bidding upon asphalt repaving in the Borough of Brooklyn the price has been reduced to 75 cents per square yard, as shown by the last bids opened. If the Borough of Brooklyn, through its Highway Department, should expend as much as \$2,500,000 in 1905 for asphalt pavement, and if that should be contracted for now while the price is as low as 75 cents per square yard, it would mean a saving in cost to the city of \$625,000, of \$2.50 a running foot on a street thirty feet wide, or 25 per cent. of the total cost; or, still more simply stated, with the saving thus made it would mean twelve miles of repaving could be laid in Brooklyn. If the opportunity to contract while the price is low is not taken advantage of and the City, through its authorities, makes no authorization, it is more than likely that the price of asphalt will rise to \$1 or \$1.50 before next spring, and this saving will be lost. The probable cause of the low price of asphalt is the cheapness of cement and the fact that there is no eight hour law regulating the work of the contractors. Before spring cement may go up in price and an eight hour law be passed. It does seem an unwise policy for the City to throw away this opportunity to save a half a million dollars when it is recalled that there are now one hundred miles of cobble stone streets in Brooklyn, which must, if progress is made, be taken up. An appropriation made at this time would not affect the City's finances than if it was authorized three or four months later, and would enable me to advertise for bids and have work contracted for and thereby take advantage of the earliest season for work, get the benefit of the low price of cement and asphalt at approximately 75 cents as against \$1.30, and also avoid the complications of an eight hour law.

I therefore request that the Board authorize an appropriation of \$2,500,000 for repaving streets and avenues in the Borough of Brooklyn, for the year 1905.

The Secretary presented a communication from George F. Randolph, relative to the acquisition of land for the Staten Island Ferry terminal.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan moved that when the Board adjourn that it adjourn to meet Tuesday, January 31, 1905, at 11 o'clock A. M., for a joint meeting with the Sinking Fund Commission called for the same date and hour, which motion was unanimously adopted.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan moved that the matter of the acquisition of land for the Staten Island Ferry terminal be laid over until the next meeting of the Board on Tuesday, January 31, 1905, at 11 o'clock A. M.

The Secretary presented the following resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$1,000 to meet the expenses for the proper conduct of the ceremonies attendant upon the opening of the new athletic and parade grounds in Pelham Bay Park, Borough of The Bronx:

In the Board of Aldermen.

Resolved, That in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to an amount not exceeding one thousand dollars to meet the expenses for the proper conduct of the ceremonies attendant upon the opening of the new athletic and parade grounds in Pelham Bay Park, Borough of The Bronx, on Saturday, July 16, 1904.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen October 11, 1904, four-fifths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, October 25, 1904, without his approval or disapproval thereof; therefore, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it.

SPECIFICATIONS.

1—Maxwell Park.

This park site, located at Bridge, Tillary and Jay streets, is in one of the most densely populated sections of the city, and has lately come into the possession of this Department. It is covered at present with about one hundred dwelling houses, none of which can be used for park purposes, and it will be necessary to demolish them in order to begin operations of park making. A park and playground in this section of the city has been greatly desired for a number of years and will be of great benefit to the people living in the neighborhood, who are mostly working people. No time should be lost in beginning the work of park construction and pushing the same to completion. Plans and specifications have been prepared for the construction of two playgrounds on this site, surrounded by strips of park. The playgrounds, one of which

is designed for boys and the other for girls, it is proposed to fit out with gymnastic and other apparatus, and in connection therewith a substantial and ornamental building, combining a shelter, locker rooms, baths and a band stand, is to be erected. The cost of this work is estimated at one hundred and four thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars, to be expended as follows:

2—Fulton Park.

Fulton Park, bounded by Chauncey street, Fulton street and Stuyvesant avenue, acquired by the City during the last year, is now covered with old buildings which the Department proposes to have removed, there being not one among them which can be made suitable for park purposes. It is proposed to construct on this site a playground, fitted out with gymnasium apparatus, etc., and to be surrounded by walks, trees and shrubbery. A shelter house, fitted out with locker and toilet rooms, will be attached to the playground. It is expected to expend fifty-two thousand five hundred dollars in the creation of this park, as follows:

3—Stone Wall in Prospect Park.

Some years ago a handsome stone wall was erected along the north-westerly side of Prospect Park, fronting on Prospect Park, West. This wall begins at the main entrance to the park and terminates at Fifth street. From the present terminus of the wall to the Fifteenth street entrance the park is inclosed by a post and pipe rail, overgrown with a privet hedge. Both hedge and rail have broken down in numerous places and present at the present time a very ragged appearance and are absolutely no guard against depredations. It is my intention to continue the stone wall from Fifth to Fifteenth street, thereby completing the inclosure on this side of the park. The cost for three thousand linear feet of wall, including concrete foundation, is estimated at forty-five thousand dollars.

4—Paving Pitkin Avenue, Between Chester and Ames Avenues.

During the summer and fall of last year this Department was opportunely by delegations from the section known as Brownsville, requesting that something be done to remedy the conditions existing on Pitkin avenue, between Chester and Ames avenues. There is at present no pavement on this avenue between the points mentioned. The roadway consists of dirt, and in wet and stormy weather is covered with mud to a depth of six inches. It has been impossible in the past to do anything with this street, owing to the lack of funds. I have prepared plans and specifications for the paving of this street, and ask that money be provided to carry out the same. The amount necessary to do this work is as follows:

5—New Bronze Railing at Flower Garden, Prospect Park.

The railing around the lower terrace of the Flower Garden in Prospect Park, which was originally designed to be cast in bronze, was, for reasons of economy, done in iron, with a bronze or copper veneer. This railing has entirely disintegrated and must be replaced with a new one. I propose to erect a bluestone base and set thereon a bronze railing of massive and ornamental design, at a cost of seven thousand three hundred and ten dollars, as follows:

6—Paving Walks in Small Parks.

The walks in ten of the small parks constructed during the last ten years were originally covered with steam cinders, topped off with a layer of limestone screenings. This work was considered but temporary at the time of its inception, but no steps have so far been taken to replace this temporary covering with a permanent pavement. It becomes necessary every year to resurface these paths with screenings at considerable expense, and I intend, if granted the money, to permanently pave these walks with asphalt tiles on sand foundation. While the cost of this work amounts to a considerable figure, I do not hesitate to say that the amount expended will be saved in labor and material in ten years. The parks in which the new walks are to be laid are as follows:

7—Sidewalks Around Small Parks.

The sidewalks around ten small parks in the Borough of Brooklyn have been treated in the same way as the walks in the interior. While they are serviceable and of good appearance during dry weather, they become very disagreeable to walk on during the winter season and after a rain. There were numerous complaints about the condition of the sidewalks around some of these parks, and I intend to lay in their place concrete walks six feet in width, at an expense of sixteen thousand five hundred and seventy-five dollars, divided as follows:

8—Shelter Houses.

During the last year numerous requests have been made to this Department to provide shelter houses in the various small parks of Brooklyn and Queens. It has been impossible to meet the demands made upon the Department along these lines owing to the lack of funds. Most of our small parks, particularly the ones most frequently used, lack this very necessary accommodation. I therefore request your Honorable Board to provide the necessary funds to erect shelter houses at the following points:

9—Rubble Wall on Shore Line of Lake in Prospect Park.

In Prospect Park the large lake, covering an area of sixty-two acres, is to-day demanding the serious attention of this Department. Outside of cleaning the same, the next most urgent thing to do is to protect its banks and shore line along its entire length. The presence of muskrats and other animals is the main cause of the very bad and dangerous condition of these banks. The shore line has been eaten away and undermined in some places to a great depth, thereby causing the loss and destruction of a large number of trees. To remedy this condition, I have prepared plans and specifications for the erection of a rubble retaining wall, laid in cement mortar, along the shore line and below the level of the lake. This wall, when completed and the lake kept at its normal level, will not be seen, and will provide a safe and enduring shore line, into which the muskrats and other animals cannot dig or bore. It will require for the building of this wall, filling in with topsoil and sodding same, the sum of twenty-three thousand dollars, as follows:

10—New Boathouse in Prospect Park.

The boathouse in Prospect Park built during the time of the construction of the park is now entirely antiquated and inadequate to accommodate the great number of people that congregate around the lake during the boating and skating seasons. The foundation timbers have already rotted away, the flooring has settled in some places, and the structure to-day is absolutely unsafe. It is impossible to further repair the same, and after the present skating season it will have to be torn down. A new building, conforming to the general design of Prospect Park and in harmony with its surroundings, should be erected in its place, and in order to do so I ask your Honorable Body for an allowance of fifty thousand dollars for its construction.

11—Concrete Bottom to Lake in Prospect Park.

One of the chief sources of trouble and annoyance in the maintenance of parks is found in the pools and brook-line in Prospect Park. When the brook-line and pools were constructed some thirty years ago no provision was ever made for keeping them cleaned and free from decayed vegetation and silt. The result is that these pools and the brook-line every few years fill up to almost the surface of the water and have to be drained and dug out. One of these pools at present being excavated by this Department was found to contain a precipitation of four feet. This precipitation was composed mainly of decayed vegetation and the muck and dirt from the upper pools and brook-line. To remedy this condition, and make the cleaning of the pools and brook an easy matter, and to keep same in a healthy and sanitary condition, I propose to concrete the bottoms and sides, reconstruct the edges and sod same. The outlay required for said improvement is as follows:

12—Playgrounds

The Department has lately come into possession of a plot of ground at Union avenue and North Twelfth street, and another at Nassau avenue and Guernsey street. Both of these plots are portions of the proposed Williamsburg Park. It is my intention to convert both plots into playgrounds temporarily, until the remainder of the property is acquired, and turn them over to the public. The work contemplated is the grading and fencing of both pieces of land and the erection thereon of gymnastic apparatus.

One block of land under the Williamsburg Bridge, which has been turned over to the Park Department for improvement some time ago, has been set aside for a playground. It was graded and fenced last year, but the erection of the gymnastic and playground outfits was postponed on account of the danger from the unfinished portion of the roadway of the bridge overhead. It is now proposed to complete the work and erect a complete gymnastic outfit.

Canarsie Park, which was acquired by the Department in 1894, has not been improved except that it has been surrounded last year with a substantial iron fence. It is eminently suitable for a playground, and I intend erecting thereon the necessary gymnastic apparatus, and lay out some baseball grounds, running tracks, etc. The amount required for the various playgrounds is as follows:

13—Ornamental Entrance to Prospect Park at Fifteenth Street and Prospect Park, West.

It has been the policy of this Department to complete as rapidly as possible the ornamentation of all the entrances to Prospect Park. There remain but two entrances to be adorned and completed. Of the two, the entrance at Prospect Park, West, and Fifteenth street is the one I have selected for improvement this year. To properly improve and fit with appropriate stone work this entrance in a manner to comport with the neighborhood and surroundings, I will require the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars.

14—Sidewalks on Eastern Parkway Extension.

Numerous appeals and requests have been made from time to time to this Department to provide safe and proper sidewalks on both sides of the Eastern parkway extension, from Ralph avenue to Highland Park. An effort has been made by this Department during the past year to meet

these demands, but the amount of money available for the purpose has been limited and only a small portion of the sidewalks have been paved. In order to complete this necessary work of laying concrete sidewalks, six feet in width, on both sides of this boulevard where not already done, it will require the amount of seventy-five hundred dollars.

15—Bathing Plant at Bensonhurst Park.

For the past few years the Department of Parks has been opportunized for the erection of a municipal bathing establishment on the ocean or bay front. Last year this agitation culminated in an appeal to the Borough President for the erection of such an establishment at Coney Island, and he selected as the most suitable place for the construction and operation of a public bath the beach in front of Seaside Park, which is under the jurisdiction of this Department. I do not think that this strip of beach should be diverted to such a use, it being the only available piece of shore front at Coney Island open to the general public and largely patronized by mothers and small children. I have therefore fixed upon Bensonhurst Beach, in front of Bensonhurst Park, as a more fitting place for the erection of a bathing establishment owned and operated by this Department. The amount of money necessary to establish and equip the same is forty-nine thousand dollars, as follows:

16—Shore Road.

The boulevard overlooking the Bay and Narrows and extending from Sixty-sixth street along the shore of New York Bay to Fort Hamilton, has become a source of danger to the driving public during the last year. The land for this parkway, which is only partly constructed, was acquired at a cost of nearly four million dollars (\$4,000,000), and yet in places it is at present not more than from twelve to sixteen feet wide, and there is hardly room enough for two carriages to pass. Driving and automobilizing along the shore have increased very largely of late and some accidents have occurred during the past year. It is intended to widen the road to a width of fifty feet as contemplated in the design accepted by the Commission, and in general lay out a series of walks along the banks and on the side of the road next to the bay. In order to retain the proposed filling, it will be necessary that a sea wall be constructed to extend from the line of Bay Ridge avenue to Fort Hamilton. The amount asked for can be expended in the following manner:

17—Dyker Beach Park.

This park, comprising one hundred and forty-four acres, has only been improved by the construction of a driveway through it. It overlooks Gravesend Bay and has a broad sandy beach where the public could enjoy bathing. There is here a possibility of improving property of extraordinary value and utility. It is desired to excavate the swampland which lies in the centre of the property, making a beautiful lagoon where the public could enjoy boating. The dredging from the lagoon could be used for filling the upland and constructing the banks. It is the intention of the Department to plant the redeemed land, erect boat houses, lay out golf links, construct driveways and walks, and build a sluiceway from the lagoon into Gravesend Bay. The property was purchased at a cost of two hundred and thirty-two thousand dollars (\$232,000), and up to the present time the public has had very little benefit of the park. Excavating lake, paving shore of lake, and construction of flood-gate into Gravesend Bay

18—Eastern Parkway.

This magnificent drive extending from Prospect Park to Ralph avenue, being a part of the boulevard system, consists of a macadamized drive with belgian blocks at the side, and broad shaded walks on either side of the main thoroughfare. Outside of the walks are traffic roads on either side, now paved with a very poor quality of cobble-stone. It is desired to repave these side-roads with asphalt so as to remove all the heavy trucking from the main driveway. The constantly increasing traffic over the main road from the Williamsburg section to Prospect Park and the Boulevard makes it imperative that the entire centre driveway be placed at the service of light drivers:

19—Paving Ninth Avenue, from Plaza to Fifteenth Street.

There is at present on Ninth avenue, which forms the westerly border of Prospect Park, a broad walk which is practically impassable to pedestrians in the spring and fall. The walk has been graded and covered temporarily with a light coating of screenings, but owing to the springy nature of the soil, this walk is not serviceable, except in dry weather. A substantial concrete walk should be constructed in keeping with the dignity of Prospect Park.

20—Coney Island Creek Bridge.

The principal parkway and the most frequented driveway in the City, the Ocean parkway, crosses Coney Island Creek on an antiquated timber bridge. This structure is now in a very dilapidated and dangerous condition, having been constructed over twenty years ago. The traffic over the road is increasing from year to year, it being the only well-paved connecting link between Brooklyn and Coney Island. The Department desires to replace the old structure with a modern concrete and steel bridge, and wishes to impress your Honorable Board with the fact that the present structure is in an extremely dangerous condition and should be replaced at once. I would, therefore, ask for an appropriation of forty-five thousand dollars to make the improvement.

21—Parade Ground.

The parade ground adjoining Prospect Park is practically at the present time the only available playground for the greater part of the Borough of Brooklyn. The grounds are at times patronized by from some twenty-five to thirty thousand people a day, and during the baseball season we accommodate from twenty to fifty ball teams daily. The dressing rooms are located in a rambling frame structure at one end of the grounds, put up over thirty years ago, as temporary buildings.

They are absolutely inadequate, unsanitary and in a dilapidated condition. All the framework and the underpinnings have rotted away, and it is not possible to make any repairs unless a large amount of money is expended. The Department proposes to do away with these unsightly structures and erect in their stead a suitable brick building containing lockers, shower baths and all modern sanitary arrangements. To meet the expense of this we ask your Honorable Board for an appropriation of fifty thousand dollars.

22—Forest Park.

It is proposed to continue and complete the system of roadways laid out through this park on the original plan. The specifications are as follows:

23—Sunset Park.

The part of Sunset Park now in our possession is rapidly nearing completion. The two blocks which the Board of Estimate last year decided to purchase, in addition, are to be improved as soon as turned over to us. In order to hold the high banks around this park it will be necessary to complete the stone wall, part of which had been built last year; the length of the same is 2,500 feet, and the cost, based upon the completed part, is \$45,000. To finish the grading and complete the walks contemplated it will require \$15,000 for labor and team hire. I therefore request your Honorable Board for an allowance of \$60,000 to complete this park.

To complete Sunset Park..... 60,000 00

24—Seaside Park.

During last year the ocean made serious inroads upon the beach fronting Seaside Park at Coney Island. It has encroached upon our land to such an extent that for a considerable distance we have lost all the upland, thus enabling the Brighton Beach Improvement Association to secure from the Land Board at Albany all the land under water formerly owned by us. If the inroads of the sea are not checked it will only be a matter of time when all the upland as well as the beach will be lost to us. Property in that location on the ocean front has recently been sold at a price near \$50,000 an acre. The original tract of land owned by the Park Department comprised seventy acres; to-day there is less than half this left. Every acre lost means a loss of \$50,000. The bulkhead completed last year at the foot of the Ocean parkway has checked erosion to some extent, and the timber jetty now building will give us further protection, but it is absolutely necessary to erect another jetty from 600 to 800 feet long to save what beach is left. This jetty will cost \$25,000.

25—New Office Building.

The offices of the Department of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens are now located in what is known as the Litchfield Mansion. This building was originally erected as a private residence and has been fitted up for the use of the Department of Parks of the old City of Brooklyn. It also houses the Police of the Seventy-third Precinct. The building has no modern conveniences of any sort, and is thoroughly unsanitary, and not large enough to transact the growing business of this Department. I propose to erect a suitable office building on land owned by the Department of Parks on Plaza street, just outside of Prospect Park, at a cost of \$30,000.

Office building..... 30,000 00

26—Fencing Forest and Highland Parks.

These two parks have been partly fenced in by former administrations, but the work has never been completed. I propose to finish the fencing in of these properties, which should have been done years ago, at an expense of twenty-one thousand dollars.

15,000 linear feet iron picket fencing, at \$1.40..... 21,000 00

27—Topsoil for Prospect Park, Seaside Park, Red Hook Park, Fort Greene Park and Carroll Park.

Prospect Park—The work of replacing the worn-out and exhausted soil along a considerable area of this park has been carried on to some extent during the year just passed. Owing to lack of funds but a relatively small portion of the park could be so treated, and the work of re-soiling will have to continue for a number of years. This year I propose to spread fifteen thousand cubic yards of soil, at one dollar, amounting to fifteen thousand dollars.

15,000 cubic yards topsoil, at \$1..... 15,000 00

Seaside Park—The interior portion of this park, which is entirely filled-in ground, has settled considerably during the last two years, and it is not elevated enough above high water to produce the best results in planting. I propose to raise the grade of this park, requiring twelve thousand cubic yards of topsoil, at one dollar and twenty-five cents, amounting to fifteen thousand dollars.

12,000 cubic yards topsoil, at \$1.25..... 15,000 00

Fort Greene Park—This park was laid out and constructed over thirty years ago. The soil wherein trees, plants and shrubs have been planted has become exhausted and vegetation is dying out. It will be necessary to gradually re-soil this park, and I have decided to begin the work of doing so this year. I intend to spread five thousand cubic yards, at one dollar per yard, amounting to five thousand dollars.

5,000 cubic yards topsoil, at \$1..... 5,000 00

Red Hook Park—This park, being constructed on what was formerly an ash dump, was never properly provided with a sufficient depth of topsoil; furthermore, it has settled quite extensively and it will be necessary, in order to improve the park, to add five thousand cubic yards of topsoil, at one dollar and twenty-five cents, amounting to seventy-five hundred dollars.

5,000 cubic yards topsoil, at \$1.25..... 7,500 00

Carroll Park—The same condition which exists in the older parks is also true of Carroll Park. This park has been in existence some thirty years and has received a great deal of rough usage during that time. Along with other improvements I propose to re-soil the same, requiring two thousand cubic yards of topsoil, at one dollar and twenty-five cents per cubic yard, amounting to twenty-five hundred dollars.

2,000 cubic yards topsoil, at \$1.25..... 2,500 00

28—Rainey Park.

This park site, bounded by Vernon avenue, Pierce avenue, East river and Sanford street, was purchased by the City last summer, but so far no steps have been taken to improve the same and transform it into a park. I propose to do this work during the coming season at an expense of twenty thousand dollars.

29—Amersfort Park.

Amersfort Park, bounded by Avenues I and J, East Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth streets, has been recently acquired by the City, and I propose to beautify the same and open it to the public during the coming season. It will require five thousand dollars for top-soil, trees, shrubs and labor.

Top-soil, trees, shrubs and labor..... 5,000 00

30—Bay Ridge Parkway.

Bay Ridge Parkway is destined to be the connecting link between Fort Hamilton avenue and the Shore road. Up to the present time the portion lying between Fourth avenue and the Shore road has been completed. The part from Fourth avenue to Fort Hamilton avenue is still in its rough state, and I propose to begin the work of construction during the coming season if your Honorable Board will grant me the necessary funds. The amount required is as follows:

31—Steam Rollers.

The Department, which has over forty-two miles of parkways under its control and maintenance, has been of late years compelled to hire a number of steam rollers at the rate of eight or ten dollars a day. We have expended more money the last year in the hiring of rollers than a new steam roller could be purchased for. I feel that it is in the interest of economy to purchase two modern twelve-ton steam rollers, at a cost of three thousand dollars each.

2 steam rollers, at \$3,000 each..... 6,000 00

Total amount..... \$1,438,946 50

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$750,000), for the purpose of providing means for the improvement and construction of parks, parkways, playgrounds, boulevards and driveways, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, in The City of New York, as follows:

In the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.....	\$250,000 00
In the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.....	250,000 00
In the Borough of The Bronx.....	250,000 00
	<u>\$750,000 00</u>

—and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$750,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

The Secretary presented a petition from William P. McGarry, requesting to be allowed to withdraw his bid, or correct an error in same, for the construction of sewers on Quay street, from East river to West street, and West street, from Quay street to North Fifteenth street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Referred to the Comptroller and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

The Secretary presented the following opinion of the Corporation Counsel, relative to the request of the members of the Defender Hose Company for compensation for services rendered as volunteer firemen:

LAW DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL,
NEW YORK, January 5, 1905.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I am in receipt of a communication from Mr. J. W. Stevenson, Deputy Comptroller, transmitting for my consideration and opinion, copies of communications from the Fire Department with the application of members of the Defender Hose Company, of the former Village of Eastchester, for compensation for services rendered as volunteer firemen.

Under chapter 613 of the Laws of 1900 it is mandatory on the Fire Department to certify to your Board the names as furnished to it, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is then authorized by the same act to appropriate an amount sufficient in their judgment to compensate the volunteer firemen.

As long as the City avails itself of the services of the volunteer force I should advise that such an amount be appropriated as will fairly compensate the volunteer firemen for services performed.

I inclose you herewith a copy of letter of advice sent to the Fire Commissioner when I had the same matter under consideration at his request.

The papers transmitted with the communication of Mr. Stevenson are herewith returned.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—As directed by you I have made an examination regarding the list of names of persons who were volunteer firemen in that portion of Westchester County annexed to The City of New York (being members of the Defender Hose Company of the former village of Eastchester), and who rendered services as such volunteer firemen within the said annexed territory, or held themselves in readiness so to do, from and after the 12th day of June, 1900, up to and including the dates set opposite their respective names, which list is certified by Hon. Nicholas J. Hayes, Fire Commissioner, and transmitted to the Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Together with the certified list transmitted is a copy of a report of Chief James J. McCartney, of the Fifteenth Battalion, to the Chief of the Fire Department, Edward F. Croker, in relation to an investigation made of the said Defender Hose Company, in connection with the list of members, certified by the Foreman of the said company, which list has since been certified by the Fire Commissioner, as previously stated. From the report it appears that supplies have been furnished the Defender Hose Company by

the Fire Department from time to time, since the organization of the company. The report also gives a list of alarms to which the company has responded, and further states that "the certificate filed by the Foreman corresponds with the books of the company."

As the result of my examination, I beg to report as follows:

Amount of Appropriation for Payment of Services of Members of Defender Hose Company, within Discretion of Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The certified list is transmitted for the purpose of having the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriate a sufficient amount to compensate said volunteer firemen for their services, as provided by chapter 613 of the Laws of 1900, which law is an amendment of chapter 686 of the Laws of 1899, and authorizes the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to appropriate an amount sufficient, "in their judgment," to compensate each volunteer fireman of that portion of Westchester County annexed to The City of New York by chapter 934 of the Laws of 1895, who was, between the 12th day of June, 1895, an active member of a fire engine, hose, hook and ladder or patrol company in the territory so annexed, and continued to render services as fireman, or held himself in readiness so to do until the 12th day of June, 1899, or thereafter.

Adverse Opinion of Former Corporation Counsel.

It appears that in 1900 the members of the Defender Hose Company were compensated for their services from June 12, 1895 to and including June 12, 1900, being paid from an appropriation of \$6,216.40, authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on August 8, 1900.

In November, 1901, the Fire Commissioner certified to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the members of Defender Hose Company, in order that the Board might appropriate an amount sufficient to compensate the members of the said hose company for their services from June 12, 1900, to June 12, 1901.

The matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel by the then Comptroller, Hon. Bird S. Coler, and in an opinion dated December 16, 1901, former Corporation Counsel John Whalen states: " * * * In my opinion, chapter 613 of the Laws of 1900 does not authorize any appropriation for the compensation of the members of the Defender Hose Company of the late Village of Eastchester, for the period from June 12, 1900, to June 12, 1901. In other words, said act does not authorize the compensation of said firemen for their services from time to time until the paid Fire Department is established in said territory."

Opinion and Advice of Present Corporation Counsel.

In an opinion under date of November 1904, rendered the Hon. Nicholas J. Hayes, Fire Commissioner, the Corporation Counsel states: " * * * The law is mandatory as referring to the forwarding of the certified list to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, but after the matter is properly presented to the Board it is within their discretion, after they have heard all the circumstances, to determine just what action shall be taken."

Under date of January 5, 1905, the Corporation Counsel advises the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as follows: " * * * As long as the City avails itself of the services of the volunteer force, I should advise that such an amount be appropriated as will fairly compensate the volunteer firemen for services performed."

Foreman of Company Authorized by Law to Certify List of Members, Provided Company Has No Chief Engineer.

Chapter 613 of the Laws of 1900 provides that the Chief Engineers of the late fire departments of the towns and incorporated villages in the County of Westchester, annexed to The City of New York, and if there was no Chief Engineer of a fire department in one or more of the towns or portions of towns, or villages, so annexed, then the foreman of each fire engine, hose, hook and ladder or patrol company therein shall forthwith furnish to the Fire Department of The City of New York duly certified and verified lists containing the names of all those volunteer firemen within the territory so annexed, who from the 12th day of June, 1895, until the 12th day of June, 1899, or thereafter, rendered services as firemen within the said annexed territory or held themselves in readiness so to do.

As the Defender Hose Company has no Chief Engineer, the names of the members are certified to the Fire Commissioner by the Foreman of the said company.

RECOMMENDATION.

The list certified by the Foreman, Mr. Thomas H. Hodge, states that each member has served from June 11, 1900. The time of service to be considered by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, however, should begin June 13, 1900, as the men whose names appear upon the certified list have been paid for their services from June 12, 1895, to and including June 12, 1900, which payment was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by resolution passed August 8, 1900, as previously mentioned. This payment was based upon the following rates established by the Board on November 29, 1899:

EDWARD F. CROKER, Chief of Department:

SIR—In compliance with orders from your office, relative to the order of the Deputy and Acting Commissioner of the Department to make a thorough investigation of the Defender Hose Company of Eastchester, New York, in connection with the claim of the members of that company for services rendered, I respectfully report that by my personal examination of their quarters in Boston road, near Fifth avenue, and by interviewing the Foreman, Thomas H. Hodge, and by looking over the records of the company, kept by them, I find that this company is incorporated and was organized on June 12, 1895. They occupy one store and attic frame building, size 30 by 40 feet, owned by L. B. Holler, a member of the company, and their equipment and apparatus is as follows:

One 2-wheel hose jumper, carrying 400 feet of 2½-inch hose.
Two leather pipes, one controlling nozzle, two lamps, two axes, drag rope, by which the jumper is propelled.

There is also one 35-foot, one 18-foot, one 10-foot ladder and one 18-foot scaling ladder; five 8-foot hooks, six fire pails and two lamps; also on reserve, ten lengths of 2½-inch hose, one play pipe, one 4-wheel hose carriage.

All of these articles have been furnished by our Department and delivered to the Defender Hose Company from time to time since the organization of the company, which was June 12, 1895.

The Defender Hose Company is located in a detached city section, containing town dock properties, factories, steamboat and docks, lumber yards, steam saw mills, wood yards, coal pockets, residences, hotels, etc., within a radius of one square mile, and have no communication with the Fire Department, being without fire alarm or fire bell, depending on this company in case of fire until our Department would be notified by telephone.

The number of members at present is twelve—was formerly eighteen—which includes one Foreman, one Assistant Foreman and one Second Assistant Foreman, and I am informed by the Foreman that the cause of the reduction of the membership is that a good many of them have moved from this vicinity. The certificate filed by the Foreman corresponds with the books of the company.

I find that since the date of the last payment quite a few alarms have been responded to by the members of said company, and the books show the following fires were responded to:

SIR—In the estimate of the Board of Assessors for the year 1905 appropriations were asked for certain grades in certain positions, which grades have not yet been fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen for this office. These positions and grades are as follows:

It will be seen that the proposed increase is \$150 in each case, and is in the nature of a promotion. The amount appropriated for 1905 is sufficient to cover the proposed salaries, they having been included in the detailed estimate of salaries as submitted.

The reasons for these changes in salary are, substantially as stated in the estimate, as follows:

The Stenographer is called upon to report a great deal of testimony in hearings before the Board of Assessors, particularly in special matters involving claims for damages alleged to have been caused by the construction of approaches to various bridges throughout the City. These claims involve large amounts, and the testimony is voluminous. In addition, he is called upon to attend to all the regular routine of the office arising in connection with the stenographic work of the Board. He is required to possess the qualifications of a Court Stenographer, and was in fact appointed from the Court Reporter's list. He has been in the office since 1899.

The Topographical Draughtsman is a very competent man, having been employed in the office of the Surveyor to the Department of Taxes and Assessments for ten years, and in this office for more than a year. His training and experience have been such as fit him peculiarly for his duties in this office.

The Messenger has been in the office for six years, and has performed his duties faithfully. He receives all papers that are filed in the office, attends to the telephone switchboard, and performs all the other duties that attach to the position of Messenger. His time of service, and his experience, the Board thinks, entitle him to the proposed amount of salary.

We would therefore request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment pass a resolution providing for the grade of Stenographer, \$2,250; Topographical Draughtsman, \$1,650, and Messenger, \$1,200, and that the same be transmitted to the Board of Aldermen for its action.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT AND THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, IN JOINT SESSION, AT MEETING HELD TUESDAY, JANUARY 31, 1905, IN ROOM 16, CITY HALL, AT 11 O'CLOCK A. M.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Charles V. Fornes, President, Board of Aldermen; John F. Ahearn, President, Borough of Manhattan; Martin W. Littleton, President, Borough of Brooklyn; George Cromwell, President, Borough of Richmond, Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Patrick Keenan, Chamberlain; Charles V. Fornes, President, Board of Aldermen; John T. McCall, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The Mayor announced that the object of the joint meeting was the consideration of the Staten Island ferry matter.

The following communications were received:

NEW YORK, January 19, 1905.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller of The City of New York:

SIR—The City of New York, by its Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on April 17, 1903, adopted a plan for streets in the vicinity of St. George, Borough of Richmond, and thereafter, on May 29, 1903, authorized the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition thereof.

The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, owner of part of the land included in these said proceedings, made objection to the appointment of Commissioners, and the matter is still in abeyance.

The City of New York, by its Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, later approved a plan for the improvement of the water front in the vicinity of St. George, Borough of Richmond, as adopted by the Commissioner of Docks, and thereafter the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings to acquire the property and improvements shown on said map.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on June 21, 1904, adopted a resolution, pursuant to the provisions of law, vesting title in The City of New York to said property and improvements on the day of the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners to be appointed. These Commissioners were appointed December 27, 1904.

The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company is now willing to withdraw its opposition to the first proceedings if a cash purchase shall be made by The City of New York of the following property:

A strip of land fifty (50) feet wide on the water side of Jay street, west of DeKalb street, which was included in the proceeding for the acquisition of land for the widening of Jay street; also the property covered by the map approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the dock improvement, which likewise includes a portion of the land desired by the City for the widening of Jay street, marked as Parcel B in the proceeding above mentioned, said two parcels of land being the two parcels referred to in conferences between us prior to your departure for Europe.

The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company is willing to sell the property herein described to you as Comptroller of The City of New York for the sum of five hundred and forty thousand dollars (\$540,000).

It must, however, be understood that this offer is made with reference to a prompt settlement, and it must not be used against the railway company in case of any litigation.

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication of the 23d inst., with copy of offer from Mr. George F. Randolph on behalf of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, to sell to The City of New York certain lands formerly owned by said company at St. George, in the Borough of Richmond, for the sum of \$540,000.

On November 20, 1903, a resolution was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorizing the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the property required by this Department at St. George, in the Borough of Richmond, for ferry purposes. On May 10, 1904, I submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a recommendation covering all of the matters in connection with the proposed municipal ferry to Staten Island, and among other things, recommended an offer of \$525,000 to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company for the land owned by said company and needed by this Department at St. George. This offer, however, owing to objections raised by the Comptroller, was not approved and on June 21, 1904, resolutions were adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorizing me to enter into an agreement with the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company for the purchase of the property for the sum of \$500,000, and directing me to request the Corporation Counsel to proceed with the condemnation proceedings in the event of the offer of \$500,000 not being accepted. The offer of \$500,000 was not accepted by the company, and I therefore requested the Corporation Counsel to commence the proceedings. The proceedings were duly commenced, the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were appointed by the Court and these Commissioners filed their oaths of office with the Clerk of the County of Richmond on the 17th day of January, 1905.

The resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of June 21, 1904, provided further that, pursuant to the provisions of section 823A of the Greater New York Charter, the title to the property should vest in The City of New York upon the date of the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners. By the determination of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to have the property acquired by condemnation, the St. George land proposition has been settled, so far as this Department was concerned, after the filing of these oaths, and the title to the property required for ferry purposes vested in The City of New York on January 17, 1905, from which date, under section 823A of the Greater New York Charter, the City will pay interest on whatever awards may be made in the condemnation proceedings.

It must be noted that the plan for the operation of the municipal ferry to Staten Island, as presented by me to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, involved not only the purchase of the land at St. George, but also the purchase of the buildings both at St. George and at the foot of Whitehall street, also the purchase of the five boats now being operated on the present ferry, together with the agreement for the continued operation of the ferry by the ferry company until such time as the City will be in a position to begin the operation of the "Municipal" ferry.

I might mention at this time that an offer from Edward Lauterbach, representing the ferry company's interests, dated January 3, 1905, to sell to the City the properties heretofore mentioned, excepting the item of lands, is now before the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their consideration. A copy of this offer is herewith inclosed.

Your attention is hereby called to the fact that the five new boats now being built for the City will be ready for use about June 1, 1905; that up to date the City has not been able to proceed with the work of constructing the new terminals at St. George and Whitehall street, Manhattan, owing to the differences of opinion of members of the Sinking Fund and this Department on the proposition submitted. I keenly feel the responsibility of an immediate adjustment of the situation, which has become so complicated, and feel that all that remains now to be done is for the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to act upon the offer now before them, the land item having been settled as hereinbefore stated.

DEAR SIR—Conferences with the parties interested in the Staten Island ferries, enable me to make the following suggestions of adjustment which, if immediately carried out, will, in my opinion, based upon those conferences, be formally adopted by the Boards of Directors of the companies interested:

First—For the improvements at the Whitehall slip the City is to pay one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars; for those at St. George, seventy-five thousand dollars. These payments are to be made at the time of the execution of the lease hereinafter mentioned.

Second—The City is to pay for the "Garrett" and "Castleton" the sum of two hundred and forty-five thousand dollars; for the "Southfield," thirty thousand dollars; for the "Westfield," twenty-three thousand dollars; for the "Middletown," twenty-two thousand dollars. These sums are to be paid at the expiration of the said lease, or at the time of the termination of the lease if it be sooner terminated.

Third—A lease, with provisions similar in form as far as such form may be applicable to leases heretofore made, to be forthwith executed by the City to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Company, to begin forthwith and to terminate on the first day of June, 1906, or sooner, at the option of the City, on giving thirty days' notice; the annual rental to be the fixed gross sum of twelve thousand five hundred dollars rental for the term intervening between the last payment of rent, and the date of the new lease to be at the same rate. The lease shall provide for the right of the City to enter upon the terminals at Whitehall slip and at St. George, in order to make alterations necessary for the operation of the ferry by the City, but with as little inconvenience to the lessee company as possible.

The Mayor presented the following opinion from the Corporation Counsel:

LAW DEPARTMENT,

NEW YORK, January 31, 1905.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I have your favor of January 30, 1905, in which you call my attention to an offer made on behalf of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company to sell to The City of New York all of its lands and improvements covered by the plan for improving the water front and harbor of The City of New York in the vicinity of South street, St. George, in the Borough of Richmond, approved by the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners on the 16th day of October, 1903, as well as that part of its property not covered by the plan, but included within the lines of Jay street, west of DeKalb street, in the Borough of Richmond, proceedings for the condemnation of which were authorized under a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted May 29, 1903, for the lump sum of \$540,000.

You desire to be informed whether this offer can be accepted, by whom, and in what manner this purchase should be ratified, and specifically request an answer to the following inquiries:

First—Whether or not this property can be purchased at private sale by The City of New York, notwithstanding the pending condemnation proceedings.

Second—In what manner the purchase of this property should be approved and by what officer or Board.

Third—Whether this property must be purchased as a whole, or whether the offer to sell this property should be separated into two portions, namely, that relating to the land required for the proposed ferry terminal and improvement of the water front, and that required for the widening of Jay street.

In answer I desire to say that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York approved, and, on the 16th day of October, 1903, certified to an amended plan for the improvement of the water front and harbor of The City of New York, in the vicinity of South street, St. George, in the Borough of Richmond, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks, and dated September 28, 1903. This map or plan for the improvement of the water front did not include as part of the improvement of the water front that part of Jay street west of DeKalb street, proposed to be taken for the widening of Jay street in proceedings which were authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 29, 1903, and the map or plan of which had been adopted by the same Board on April 17, 1903. These proceedings, although authorized, had never been carried forward to the appointment of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment for the reason that certain objections had been made to the appointment of Commissioners by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, for the removal of which negotiations have been pending between that company and The City of New York ever since.

Negotiations also had been entered into between the Commissioner of the Dock Department and the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company for the purchase of the property and improvements embraced within the lines of the map or plan for the improvement of the water front above mentioned. These negotiations, however, fell through, and thereupon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution on the 20th day of November, 1903, authorizing the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings to acquire the property and improvements shown on this amended plan for improving the water front aforesaid, and therefore on June 21, 1904, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution directing that title should vest in The City of New York to the property above mentioned on the day of the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners who were thereafter to be appointed.

These Commissioners were actually appointed on December 27, 1904, and their oaths were filed on January 18, 1905.

At the present time there are thus proceedings pending for the acquisition of all the property embraced within the map or plan for improving the water front or har-

bor of The City of New York in the vicinity of South street, St. George, Borough of Richmond, and that part of Jay street not included in the plan of the improvement of the water front, for which an offer has been made on behalf of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company to sell the same to The City of New York for the lump sum of \$540,000.

Title was authorized to vest in all of the property covered by the above mentioned map or plan for the improvement of the water front upon the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners appointed in proceedings for that purpose.

Notwithstanding the pendency of these proceedings, The City of New York, through its proper board of officers, undoubtedly still has the power to purchase this property. By section 822 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioner of Docks, with the approval of the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners, is authorized to purchase the property required for the improvement of the water-front, and the amendment (section 823A, contained in chapter 624 of the Laws of 1903), does not take away from them the power to make such a purchase, even though condemnation proceedings have been authorized and the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have been appointed.

Section 822 of the Charter makes applicable all of the provisions of the Street Opening Law to the condemnation of this property and by section 904 of title 4 of the Greater New York Charter Revised, it is provided that The City of New York may at any time and times, either before or after the appointment of Commissioners, agree with the owners as to the compensation to be made for the land proposed to be taken by virtue of such proceeding.

Consequently, the commencement or pendency of proceedings for the condemnation of this land does not prevent the Dock Commissioners and the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners from purchasing all the property covered by the proposed plan for improving the water-front and harbor of The City of New York in the vicinity of South street, St. George, Borough of Richmond.

Although title may have become vested in the City, pursuant to the resolution of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, adopted on June 21, 1904, directing that title vest on the date of the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the proceedings authorized to be taken for the condemnation of the property covered by the amended map or plan aforesaid, which vesting would have taken place on January 18, 1905, the date on which the oaths of Commissioners were filed, I am in doubt as to whether this vesting has, as a matter of fact, taken place.

The provisions of law relating to the condemnation of private property for public use are strictly construed, and the letter of the statute must be followed, especially where property is taken summarily from a private individual by force of the provisions of statute, which taking is not immediately accompanied by compensation.

The provisions of chapter 624 of the Laws of 1903, amending section 823A of the Charter, relating to the vesting of title, contain the following:

"In a proceeding hereafter brought for the acquirement of any such wharf property, rights, terms, easements, or privileges, or uplands, or lands under water, situate, as in this section set forth, if the commissioners of the sinking fund shall by resolution so direct, the title to the said wharf property, uplands and lands under water, rights, terms, easements, and privileges, shall vest in the city of New York at such time as said resolution shall direct after the filing in the office of the clerk of the county where the proceedings are pending, of the oaths of the commissioners of estimate and assessment in said proceedings appointed, and all of the rights, title and interest of any and all of the owners or persons interested in the said wharf property, rights, terms, easements, and privileges or lands under water, or uplands, shall cease and determine and be extinguished at such time. All the awards made in such proceedings for the value of property acquired or interests extinguished shall draw interest from the time of the vesting of title in the city of New York."

The above language apparently authorizes the adoption of a resolution vesting title only after the oaths of the Commissioners have been filed, and in view of such a limitation it may be doubtful whether or not a direction of the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners that title should vest upon the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners to be thereafter appointed, is sufficient, and whether or not the language above quoted does not require that direction to be given after the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners.

But this does not seem to be material in view of the fact that, whether the City has title or not to this property under condemnation proceedings, the Commissioner of Docks and the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners have still power to purchase it, notwithstanding the fact that the proceedings are pending. The proposal of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company to sell all of this property, including that portion of Jay street not covered by the waterfront improvement plan, for a lump sum of \$540,000, in my opinion requires to be approved by the Dock Commissioner and Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners under section 822 of the Charter, and also by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under sections 970 and 994 of the Charter. The question how much of this lump sum of \$540,000 should be apportioned to that portion of Jay street which is not included in the waterfront improvement plan, and what portion of it should be apportioned to the property covered by the proposed plan for improving the waterfront and harbor of The City of New York is not free from difficulty, because it may be that the Staten Island Railroad Company, in view of its objection to the condemnation of Jay street, would not sell for any price that portion of its property which is included in the street opening proceeding, separate and apart from the property covered by the amended plan for improving the waterfront and harbor of The City of New York. They possibly would not offer to sell separately the two pieces of property above mentioned for a sum which would aggregate \$540,000, and apparently the sale of the part of its property embraced within the lines of Jay street is conditioned on the sale of the property required for the improvement of the waterfront as a terminus. As the compensation for all of this property comes out of the City Treasury and the City is not to be reimbursed for any part of it by an assessment for benefit, it makes little difference whether the whole property is purchased at one time for a lump sum. In order that a proper charge may be made against the fund for street and park openings for that portion of the property which is to be used for street purposes, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Dock Commissioner and the Sinking Fund Commissioners can readily agree as to what part of the lump sum should represent the value of the property taken for that purpose, and the remainder should be charged against the fund out of which dock property is to be purchased. The apportionment of this sum is a mere matter of bookkeeping under the circumstances.

In view of the fact, however, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has jurisdiction over that portion of the property which is to be used for street purposes, and the Dock Commissioner and the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners over the rest of the property required for the improvement of the waterfront, I would suggest that the Sinking Fund Commissioners, before acting upon this matter, invite the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to sit with them in joint session, and that resolutions be adopted by both boards at such session approving of the purchase of this property as a whole. Such a course would obviate any conflict of jurisdiction, and would effectually ratify and bind the City to the purchase of the property as a whole.

Whereas, The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company has now offered to sell to The City of New York all the land and improvements aforesaid, together with a strip of land for the widening of Jay street, for a total sum of \$540,000; and

Whereas, An appraised value of said additional strip of land is \$48,800; and

Whereas, It would appear to be in the interest of the City to accept said offer and thereby avoid the attendant expense of condemnation proceedings; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the acceptance of the said offer in so far as the same relates to the purchase of the property required for the water-front improvement, and recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the acceptance of the said offer in its entirety.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Chamberlain, the President of the Board of Aldermen and Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution for adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 29, 1903, authorized the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings for the widening of certain streets in the vicinity of St. George, Borough of Richmond, and more particularly for the widening of Jay street, between South street and Richmond terrace; and

Whereas, The said Board did provide that the entire cost and expense of such proceeding should be assessed upon the City; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 20, 1903, authorized the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of property for the improvement of the water-front in the vicinity of St. George, Borough of Richmond, upon the plan adopted by the Department of Docks and Ferries on September 28, 1903, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on October 16, 1903; and

Whereas, This latter proceeding included a portion of the land required for the widening of Jay street, and contained in the first proceeding above mentioned; and

Whereas, The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company as owners have made objection to the appointment of Commissioners in the first proceeding above recited; and

Whereas, It seems desirable that this improvement should be commenced at the earliest possible date, and that it would be in the interests of the City to acquire all of the property before mentioned at private sale, rather than by two condemnation proceedings; and

Whereas, The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, by George F. Randolph, has, under date of January 19, 1905, offered to sell to the City all the above mentioned property at private sale, for the sum of \$540,000; and

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have this day adopted a resolution as follows:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the acceptance of the said offer in so far as the same relates to the purchase of the property required for the water-front improvement, and recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the acceptance of the said offer in its entirety";

Now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby concurs in the said resolution, and approves of such purchase, and hereby authorizes the Comptroller of The City of New York to enter into contracts for the acquisition of the same, at a price not exceeding \$540,000, said contracts to be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form.

GENTLEMEN—In the matter of the peremptory writ of mandamus issued against the various members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the matter of the People ex rel. Clifford L. Miller against The City of New York and others, commanding the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to meet and provide funds to enable the Departments of Docks and Parks to respectively carry out the provisions of a judgment heretofore entered for the dredging and protecting of Cromwell Creek, I respectfully report that it appears that on January 13, 1905, your Board voted \$15,000 to the Commissioner of Parks in the Borough of The Bronx for the purpose of building a bulkhead as required by said judgment, and that the Department of Docks is continuously in funds from which sufficient might be taken for the dredging purposes required therein. It would seem, therefore, that no action is necessary on the part of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

I desire to inform you, however, that, pursuant to the advice of the Corporation Counsel, under date of January 20, 1905, this Department has been conducting negotiations with the said Miller and his attorneys, looking to the acceptance by Mr. Miller of a lump sum, which will be compensatory to him for the damages already sustained, and prospective damages, by which the necessity of performing the acts required by said mandamus will be obviated. These negotiations were entered into pursuant to statement of the Corporation Counsel that said creek will soon be closed, and that such work as should be done would therefore be wasted.

Said negotiations have not as yet been perfected, and I am therefore at present unable to lay the matter before you for your approval.

Whereas, The Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, and the Department of Docks, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, the two Departments and Board of the said City of New York, which are charged collectively and individually with the carrying out of said judgment of this Court, have failed to proceed to carry out said judgment, and have failed in every respect to carry out the said judgment of this Court and still refuse to carry out the same.

All of which appears to us by the complaint and affidavits of said Clifford L. Miller and the affidavit of Jacob E. Miller used on the application for this writ, and which affidavits we have adjudged to be true as appears to us of record.

Now, therefore, we, being willing that speedy justice be done in this behalf to him, the said Clifford L. Miller, do command and enjoin you and each of you collectively and individually, and each in the several ways dictated by its duties, that is to say: The said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, composed as aforesaid, to immediately convene and hold a meeting, and at such meeting to forthwith provide and apportion sufficient moneys to the Department of Docks and to the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, to enable the said Departments to carry out forthwith the said judgment in all its terms; the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, to immediately and forthwith protect the dies of the park under its care and control on the northerly side of Cromwell creek, from One Hundred and Sixty-first street to the Harlem river, so as to prevent the mud and dirt and stones from the said park on said northerly side from entering into the said creek or filling up the same; and the Department of Docks of The City of New York to immediately and forthwith dredge out the said creek and open the same, and remove all obstructions therefrom from One Hundred and Sixty-first street to the Harlem river and to a depth of at least eleven feet, so as to render the same navigable for boats drawing at least eleven feet of water going to and from One Hundred and Sixty-first street to the Harlem river, and of sufficient width to allow vessels drawing eleven feet of water to pass each other in said creek.

And we do further command and enjoin you and each of you, collectively and individually, to forthwith and immediately, and to the best of your ability, proceed to carry out the terms of the said judgment of this Court entered in an action wherein Clifford L. Miller is plaintiff and The City of New York and Department of Parks are defendants, entered in the office of the Clerk of this Court on the first day of July, 1904, and each and every part thereof.

The Mayor announced that the purpose of the meeting was to award the contract for the publication of the CITY RECORD during the year 1905, and stated that the two lowest bids were those of the Burr Printing House and the Martin B. Brown Company.

The Supervisor thereupon submitted and read the following report on an examination made by him of the plant of the Burr Printing House, with a view to determining its capability to properly perform the work required under the contract:

The City of New York—Board of City Record,
Office of the Supervisor,
December 30, 1904.

The Honorable the Board of City Record, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen—In connection with the tabulation of bids "for printing, etc., the CITY RECORD," I submit herewith a report in regard to the Burr Printing House, Frank D. Harmon, proprietor, the lowest bidder for doing the work.

Thursday, after the Board had opened and read the proposals "for printing, etc., the CITY RECORD for the year 1905," I asked the superintendent of the Burr Printing House to come to my office so that I might obtain from him information as to the ability of his principal to comply with the terms of the contract.

During the conversation I was given the impression that the Burr Printing House was fully equipped with modern machinery and conveniences. The superintendent, among other statements, said to me that the plant included sixteen linotype machines. Subsequently, in the same conversation, he reduced the number to eight, saying they would be worked when necessary by two shifts. An inspection of the establishment which I made yesterday was disappointing.

The composing room shown to me has only four linotype machines, instead of sixteen, as originally stated by the superintendent, and eight in his amended statement. Mr. Harmon told me that four others had been ordered and were expected on Saturday. The hand type that I was shown was not of old style face as required by the specifications. All the appliances of the composing room, except the linotype machines, were antiquated.

There was no visible sign of an organized force to work at the case, nor was it apparent that Mr. Harmon had perfected any organization with an experienced executive head to take charge of the work. In executing this contract an entirely separate department will be required. Mr. Harmon has now no room in his building properly fitted up for this work. I was shown a vacant loft which he proposes to utilize. It has neither gas nor electric lights. To put it in suitable condition will require time.

In my judgment the Burr Printing House is not now adequately equipped and prepared to insure the satisfactory and timely printing of the CITY RECORD and its supplements. It is a fair assumption that at least ten days will be required to install and put in good working operation the four additional machines which Mr. Harmon says he expects to come on Saturday.

During the month of January the CITY RECORD is expected to make 1,400 pages, in which will be included the salary list of 500 pages, and which the law requires to be printed during that month. The four linotype machines at present in the establishment cannot be relied on to do the work that will be required during the month of January, and it is uncertain when the four additional machines not yet in being will become effective.

I report that, in my opinion, the Burr Printing House is not in condition to print, etc., the CITY RECORD for the year 1905, and I base my conclusions on these facts:

1. The inadequate number of linotype machines.
2. The unsuitable character of the hand type.
3. The antiquated appliances.
4. The apparent lack of organized force with an experienced executive head.
5. The lack of a separate department with satisfactory appliances for this special work.
6. The absence of a system for delivery of the paper.

"The CITY RECORD is unique among newspapers, in that almost all the work necessary for its production consists of composition, the requirements of the publication often demanding immense quantities of composition (over 75 per cent. being tabular) in a very short time, while the press work is comparatively small. Their facilities for composition at this time consist solely of four Linotype machines. Four others are contracted for and it is expected will be erected in two days. Movable type is on hand, but none is of the kind called for in the specifications.

"I am of the opinion that a composing equipment consisting of but eight machines is entirely inadequate for this publication.

The reading of the minutes of January 5, 12 and February 2, 1905, was dispensed with.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for paving with asphalt blocks Convent avenue, from One Hundred and Forty-first street to One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, with objections of Richard H. Smith, attorney for St. Luke's Episcopal Church, and communication from the President of the Borough of Manhattan in regard to the previous paving of the avenue, dated January 23, 1905; also copy of opinion of the Corporation Counsel of September 12, 1892, as to the City's right to improve the part of the avenue in question, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 8, 1905.

No one appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for constructing sewers in Ovington avenue, between Third and Fourth avenues, and outlet sewers in Silliman place, between Third and Second avenues, and in Second avenue, between Silliman place and Seventy-first street, with objections of Estate of Horace Holden, filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney; Mary Slay and others, filed by Hoyer & Alderman, attorneys, and communication of the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Brooklyn, dated January 17, 1905, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 8, 1905.

Mr. R. Tobias, representing Mr. Flannery, attorney, and Mr. Alderman, attorney, were heard in opposition to the assessment on account of the excessive cost of the work, and also for the reason, as alleged, that Silliman place, through which the sewer runs, had never been legally acquired, and that the City therefore had no right to enter upon the street for the purpose of building the sewer.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, paving with asphalt pavement, curbing and recurbing, and laying cement sidewalks in Osborn street, between Sutter and Blake avenues, and objections, the further consideration of which was postponed at the last meeting, after hearing, to afford the attorneys for the objector an opportunity of filing a brief in support thereof, were taken up.

Mr. Moore, of Messrs. Moore, Ashley & Linton, attorneys, for the objector, appeared.

On motion of the Assistant Acting Corporation Counsel, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors for further consideration, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

(a) From the Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, of date January 12, 1905, concurring in resolution of the Armory Board, and authorizing the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to an amount not exceeding \$100,000.

(b) From the Deputy Comptroller, of date January 16, 1905, and from the Corporation Counsel, of date January 18, 1905, transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment January 13, 1905, authorizing the acquisition by condemnation.

(c) From the Deputy Comptroller, of date January 30, 1905, transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment January 27, 1905, authorizing the Comptroller to enter into contract for the acquisition at private sale of a piece of property within the area of the proposed site.

Ordered filed.

The Secretary reported that, in obedience to the alternative provision in the resolution of the Armory Board, of date December 29, 1904, relative to the acquirement of the site by purchase or condemnation, he has forwarded the resolution, with the maps and certificates of filing thereof, to the Corporation Counsel, in order that the proceedings for condemnation may proceed.

A communication was received from the Deputy Comptroller, of date January 11, 1905, advising the Armory Board that \$51,206.33 was deposited in the City Treasury, to the credit of the Armory Fund. Ordered filed.

The Secretary reported the receipt of a communication from the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, of date January 11, 1905, relative to the proposed alteration in the Seventy-first Regiment Armory, for the accommodation of the First Signal Corps, and stated that he referred the same to the architects of the building, and presented herewith their reply; and recommended that the reply be forwarded to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to facilitate their action on the resolution of this Board, of date September 29, 1904, which was submitted to them for their concurrence. Which was so ordered.

A communication was received from Major Oliver Bridgman, commanding Squadron "A," N. G., N. Y., renewing his application for a new armory for that organization. Referred to the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx.

A communication was received from Colonel William G. Bates, commanding the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G., N. Y., making requisition for the extension of the lease of the Lenox Lyceum, now occupied by his organization.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be requested to have executed a lease, being a renewal of the lease expiring April 8, 1905, for the premises known as the Lenox Lyceum, at the corner of Fifty-ninth street and Madison avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G., N. Y., from month to month, at a rental at the rate of \$23,000 per annum, the other terms and conditions of the lease remaining unchanged, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same.

Referred to the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens.

The Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens made the following report, recommending a proposed change in the electrical wiring in the armory for the Second Battalion Naval Militia:

"January 19, 1905.

"To the Armory Board, City of New York:

"At the last meeting of the Board letters from Lord & Hewlett, architects for the construction of the armory for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, and from the Kenny Electrical Manufacturing Company, sub-contractors of James McFerran, contractor, with respect to a proposed change in the electrical wiring in that armory, were referred to the Committee on Brooklyn Armories for examination and report.

"It seems that the specifications were originally drawn on the supposition that the Edison Company would furnish a direct current service for light and heat. The Secretary of that Company now states that they will be unable to furnish a direct current for several years, but can now furnish an alternating current. The use of the alternating current will require heavier feeders and an estimated expense of \$332. In view of the fact that this appears to be a necessity under the circumstances, that the Kenny Electrical Company will make the change for this amount, that the Architects recommend it, and that Captain Forschew, commanding the Battalion, has given it his approval, we respectfully advise the adoption of the resolution attached to this report.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Thomas J. Buckley, Esq., Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and contractor, the sum of one thousand one hundred and thirty dollars and fifty cents (\$1,130.50), as per accompanying voucher, on account of his contract for furnishing materials and labor required in the repairs and alterations to the Eighth, Twelfth, Twenty-second Regiments and Squadron "A," in Manhattan; Fourteenth and Twenty-third Regiments in Brooklyn, and Seventeenth Separate Company in Queens.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis and Chief Engineer Smith.

Minutes of December 20, 22, 27, 1904, and January 5, 1905, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 16637 to 16656, inclusive, amounting to \$8,385.60, and estimate contained in Voucher No. 16637, amounting to \$9,048.60, which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The Construction Committee returned to the Commissioners a communication from McDonald & Onderdonk, dated December 22, 1904, requesting an extension of time in which to complete contract for Jerome Park Reservoir, with the recommendation that the request be declined and that the President be directed to notify the contractors thereof, in accordance with the resolution adopted by the Commissioners on December 2, 1904, in regard to similar applications.

The recommendation of the Committee was adopted and the President directed to request an opinion accordingly.

The Construction Committee returned to the Commissioners a communication from the Comptroller, dated December 23, 1904, transmitting report of Engineer of Finance Department on voucher for \$3,167.79 in favor of Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman for extra work performed at the New Croton Dam, with the recommendation that it be referred to the Chief Engineer for a further report.

The recommendation of the Committee was adopted.

The Construction Committee returned to the Commissioners opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated December 31, 1904, in relation to construction of drain pipe in Van Cortlandt avenue and alleged trespass on lands of Mr. Augustus Van Cortlandt, with the recommendation that the papers in the matter be ordered filed and the President directed to request the Corporation Counsel to notify the Commissioners when the grant or easement referred to in his opinion is received from Mr. Van Cortlandt.

The recommendations of the Committee were adopted, and the President directed to communicate with the Corporation Counsel accordingly.

Weekly report of the Chief Engineer for the week ending December 29, 1904, was received and referred to the Construction Committee.

Opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated January 9, 1905, in regard to taxes on lands owned by The City of New York in Westchester and Putnam counties, and as to the payment of school district taxes for the year 1903, was received and referred to the Finance Committee, with power to direct the Secretary to prepare vouchers for the school district taxes in accordance with the opinion of the Corporation Counsel.

Communication from the Empire State Surety Company, dated January 7, 1905, in regard to completion of contract of Norton & Dalton Contracting Company for overflow from Gate House No. 2, Jerome Park Reservoir, was received and referred to the Secretary with instructions to notify the surety company that the work has been completed, but that the final estimate has not been paid on account of delay in completing contract.

Report No. 1126 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 13, 1904, preferring charges against Benjamin L. Blauvelt, Leveler, was received and the President directed to transmit a copy of the charges and specifications to Mr. Blauvelt, and to notify him that an

opportunity to make an explanation would be given him on Tuesday, January 17, 1905, at 10.30 o'clock in the forenoon.

Resignation of Benjamin L. Blauvelt, Leveler, dated December 14, 1904, was laid over.

Report No. 1147 of the Chief Engineer, dated January 9, 1905, in regard to application of Coldwell-Wilcox Company for extension of time on contract for certain iron work at the New Croton Dam, was received and ordered filed, and the President directed to notify the company that if it performed the work in the manner recommended by the Chief Engineer its application would be carefully considered.

Communications from H. R. Barrett, Esq., and Harrison T. Slosson, Esq., Counsel for Westchester County and certain towns thereof, dated January 9 and 10, 1905, respectively, transmitting statements of amount of money expended per annum for maintenance of highways affected by the City's taking for the New Croton Reservoir, were received and referred to the Chief Engineer to be considered in connection with his report on cost of maintenance of the highways.

Resignation of James A. Brennan, Axeman, dated January 11, 1905, was received and accepted, to take effect January 6, 1905.

Resignation of Norbert Lyons, Rodman, dated January 9, was accepted, to take effect January 19, 1905.

Communication from I. J. Beaudrias, Esq., Special Counsel, dated January 10, 1905, approving of sufficiency of affidavit of American Telephone and Telegraph Company as to title to right of way submitted in connection with the agreement for the removal of the lines of the company from within the flow line of the New Croton Reservoir, was received and ordered filed.

Opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated January 9, 1905, in regard to substituted right of way for the New York and Harlem Railroad, Mahopac Branch, through the Mead and Whitlock farms, and transmitting for adoption by the Commissioners form of preamble and resolution embodying form of deed of such right of way, was received and ordered filed and the following preambles and resolution offered:

Whereas, The New York and Harlem Railroad Company, the New York and Putnam Railroad Company, the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and The City of New York, heretofore duly made and entered into, exchanged and delivered a certain grant and agreement dated October 16, 1903, and recorded in the Westchester County Register's office in Liber 1671 of Deeds, at page 339, on the 28th day of January, 1904; and

Whereas, In and by the said grant and agreement it was provided that the said New York and Harlem Railroad Company should, subject to all the provisions of the said grant and agreement, convey to the said The City of New York, the fee of such portion of the lands of the said New York and Harlem Railroad Company, as is shown by "pink" coloring on the map in said grant and agreement described and entitled "Property Map No. 2 of additional lands required for the construction of a new Croton Reservoir in the Towns of Yorktown, Bedford, Lewisboro, Somers, North Salem, Westchester County, New York, Exhibit No. 4, of 1903," approved by Robert Grier Monroe on February 28, 1903, and adopted by the Aqueduct Commissioners on March 3, 1903, and filed in the Westchester County Register's office on March 13, 1903, as Map No. 1225 (excepting the portions of Parcel No. 392 required for the new right of way of the New York and Harlem Railroad, Mahopac Branch), when the said The City of New York shall have vested or caused to be vested in the said New York and Harlem Railroad Company the fee, free from incumbrances, of the land required for the said new right of way, one hundred (100) feet in width, indicated by the letters "AB" on said map; and

Whereas, The said New York and Harlem Railroad Company has duly executed a deed conveying to The City of New York the fee of the said portion of its lands and is ready to deliver the same upon the execution and delivery by The City of New York of a conveyance of the said new right of way to the New York and Harlem Railroad Company; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the grant to the said railroad company shall be in the following form, to wit:

This indenture, made and entered into this _____ day of _____, in the year nineteen hundred and _____, by and between The City of New York, a municipal corporation, acting by its Aqueduct Commissioners, party of the first part, and the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, a railroad corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of New York, party of the second part:

Whereas, The said New York and Harlem Railroad Company, the New York and Putnam Railroad Company, the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and the said The City of New York heretofore duly made, entered into, executed, exchanged and delivered a certain grant and agreement, dated October 16, 1903, and recorded in the Westchester County Register's office in Liber 1671 of Deeds, at page 339, on the 28th day of January, 1904, to which said grant and agreement, and to the recitals therein contained, reference is hereby had with the same force and effect as if the same were fully set forth herein; and

Whereas, In and by the said grant and agreement it was provided that the said the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, party of the second part hereto, should, subject to all the provisions of the said grant and agreement, convey to the said The City of New York, party of the first part hereto, the fee of such portion of the lands of the said New York and Harlem Railroad Company, as is shown by "pink" coloring on the map in said grant and agreement described and entitled "Property Map No. 2 of additional lands required for the construction of a new Croton Reservoir in the Towns of Yorktown, Bedford, Lewisboro, Somers, North Salem, Westchester County, New York, Exhibit No. 4 of 1903," approved by Robert Grier Monroe on February 28, 1903, and adopted by the Aqueduct Commissioners on March 3, 1903, and filed in the Westchester County Register's office on March 13, 1903, as Map No. 1225 (excepting the portions of Parcel No. 392 required for the new right of way of the New York and Harlem Railroad, Mahopac Branch), when the said The City of New York, party of the first part hereto, shall have vested or caused to be vested in the said New York and Harlem Railroad Company the fee, free from incumbrance, of the land required for the said new right of way, one hundred (100) feet in width, indicated by letters "AB" on said map and hereinafter more particularly described and hereby granted and conveyed; and

Whereas, The said party of the second part has duly executed a deed conveying to the party of the first part hereto the fee of the said portion of its lands and is ready to deliver the same upon the execution hereof; and

Whereas, The Aqueduct Commissioners on the tenth day of January, 1905, adopted a resolution authorizing the conveyance by The City of New York to the New York and Harlem Railroad Company of the premises hereinafter described and designating the Mayor of The City of New York as the officer to execute the said conveyance:

Now, therefore, this indenture witnesseth that the party of the first part, in pursuance of the said grant and agreement and in pursuance of the statute in such case made and provided, and in order to provide the party of the second part with a new right of way commensurate with the adapted to its needs, and in order to substitute, in the place of the real estate heretofore used by the party of the second part for its railroad, the lands required for such new right of way, and in consideration of the premises and of the said conveyance (dated November 24, 1903, executed by the said New York and Harlem Railroad Company and the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to The City of New York), has granted, released and conveyed and by these presents does grant, release and convey unto the party of the second part and its successors and assigns forever.

All that certain piece or parcel of land situated in the Town of Somers, County of Westchester and State of New York, being a strip of land of the uniform width of one hundred (100) feet, bounded southerly by that parcel of land conveyed to the New York and Mahopac Railroad Company by Staats E. Mead and Elizabeth Mead his wife, by deed dated July 15, 1871, and recorded in the office of the Register of Westchester County, July 20, 1871, in Liber 772 of Deeds, at page 447, and northerly by that parcel of land conveyed by Edward B. Brady and Julia Brady, his wife, to said New York and Mahopac Railroad Company by deed dated May 6, 1871, and recorded in the office of the Register of Westchester County, June 10, 1871, in Liber 775 of Deeds, at page 253, lying fifty (50) feet on each side of the centre line of the proposed new route or right of way for the New York and Harlem Railroad, Mahopac Branch, as shown on a certain map entitled "Property Map No. 2 of additional lands required for the construction of a new Croton Reservoir in the Towns of Yorktown, Bedford, Lewisboro, Somers, North Salem, Westchester County, New York, Exhibit No. 4, of 1903," filed in the Westchester County Register's Office March 13, 1903, as Map No. 1225, said centre line being described as follows: Beginning at a

point in the present centre line of the Mahopac Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad and at station 6x28.21 of said centre line, as shown on said map, and running thence northwesterly, by a curve to the right with a radius of one thousand, four hundred and thirty-two and sixty-nine hundredths (1,432.69) feet tangent to said present centre line of said Mahopac Branch, three hundred and forty-one and eighty-eight hundredths (341.88) feet to station 9x70.09 of said centre line, as shown on said map; thence north twenty-eight (28) degrees, eighteen (18) minutes and thirty (30) seconds west, tangent to the last above described line, three thousand, five hundred and fifty-seven and nine hundredths (3,557.09) feet to station 45x27.18 of said centre line as shown on said map; thence northwesterly and westerly, by a curve to the left with a radius of eight hundred and nineteen and two hundredths (819.02) feet, eight hundred and eighty-five and seven tenths (885.7) feet to station 54x12.88 of said centre line as shown on said map; thence north eighty-nine (89) degrees forty-one (41) minutes and thirty (30) seconds west, four hundred and fifty-six and eighty-one hundredths (456.81) feet to station 57x09.69 of said centre line; thence westerly and northwesterly, by a curve to the right with a radius of one thousand, two hundred and twenty-eight and eleven hundredths (1,228.11) feet, to station 72x48.34 of said centre line, as shown on said map, and a point of tangency in said present centre line of said Mahopac Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad; containing twelve and ninety-five hundredths (12.95) acres of land, more or less; said above described premises being shown by yellow shading on the plot thereof which is hereto attached and hereby made a part of this description;

Together with the appurtenances, and all the estate and rights of the said party of the first part in and to said premises;

To have and to hold the above described premises unto the said party of the second part, its successors and assigns, forever.

And the party of the first part does hereby covenant, as the owner in fee of the above described premises, that the same are free and clear from all incumbrances.

Minutes of January 10, 1905, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 16660 to 16667, inclusive, amounting to \$1,698.13, and estimates contained in Vouchers Nos. 16678 and 16679, amounting to \$8,138.30, which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The Committee of Finance and Audit returned to the Commissioners opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated January 9, 1905, in regard to taxes on lands owned by The City of New York in Westchester and Putnam Counties, and reported that there are no unpaid school taxes for the year 1903, except on the extra assessment for the unfinished dam in the Town of Cortlandt and the town tax in the Town of Yorktown for 1902-1903, both of which are in litigation; that the school tax bills for the year 1904 have been referred to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to their payment; that the tax for School District No. 6, North Salem, has been paid and the warrant indorsed by Samuel H. Whipple, Consulting Engineers, dated December 10, 1904, on matters relating to the Jerome Park Reservoir and the filtering of the Croton water, with the recommendation that the President be directed to transmit them to the Corporation Counsel, together with a copy of the report of the Burr-Hering-Freeman Commission on Additional Water Supply, dated January 16, 1905, on the advisability of suspending work on the easterly division of the Jerome Park Reservoir and of filtering the Croton water, with a request for an opinion as to whether the Commissioners have power under chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, and the acts amendatory thereof, to construct a filtration plant.

The report of the Committee was approved and the President directed to request an opinion accordingly.

Communication from the Comptroller, dated January 10, 1905, transmitting opinion of Corporation Counsel, dated January 5, 1905, in regard to claims of Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman for certain extra work under their contract for the New Croton Dam, was received and referred to the Chief Engineer for a report.

Communication from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated January 14, 1904, approving of transfer of Herbert C. Alden, Assistant Engineer, was received and ordered filed.

Communication from I. J. Beaudrias, Esq., Special Counsel, dated January 14, 1905, acknowledging receipt of proposed stipulation and releases in connection with title to Road No. 8½, was received and ordered filed.

Resignation of Thomas C. Bell, Axeman, dated January 5, 1905, was received and accepted, to take effect December 31, 1904.

Communication from James J. Kelly, Axeman, dated January 16, 1905, in regard to salary alleged to be due for part of month of November, 1904, was received and referred to the Chief Engineer for a report.

Report No. 1148 of the Chief Engineer, dated January 9, 1905, in regard to completion of Norton & Dalton Contracting Company's contract for overflow from Gate House No. 2 of the Jerome Park Reservoir, was received and approved and the following preambles and resolution offered:

Whereas, The Chief Engineer of this Commission has certified, under date of October 31, 1904, that, in his opinion, the Norton & Dalton Contracting Company has completely performed and carried out the provisions of the contract made by it with this Commission on the 15th day of January, 1904, for constructing an overflow and blowoff pipe-line and appurtenances from Gate House No. 2 of the Jerome Park Reservoir; and has stated from actual measurements the whole amount of work done and materials furnished under and according to the terms of said contract, and of the true value thereof, and that there were ninety working days in excess of the date of contract time for completion; and

Whereas, The said contractors, in a communication dated December 29, 1904, have stated some of the reasons for said delay, showing that it was beyond their control, and the Chief Engineer in a report (No. 1148) dated January 9, 1905, has also stated that said delay was beyond the control of the said contractors and that the City has suffered no damage by reason of such delay; therefore

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners accept the work done and materials furnished by the Norton & Dalton Contracting Company under the contract above referred to, and direct that a proper voucher for the final payment for work done and materials furnished under said contract be approved and certified to the Comptroller for payment.

Report No. 1152 of the Chief Engineer, dated January 14, 1905, in regard to claims for rent against certain parcels, was received and ordered filed and the President directed to transmit a copy to I. J. Beaudrias, Esq., Special Counsel, as a reply to his communication of January 10, 1905.

Report No. 1153 of the Chief Engineer, dated January 16, 1905, recommending that the name of William J. Fox, Inspector of Masonry, be dropped from the rolls on account of lack of work, was received and ordered filed and the following resolution offered:

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer contained in his Report No. 1153, dated January 16, 1905, the name of William J. Fox, Inspector of Masonry, be and hereby is dropped from the rolls, to take effect January 31, 1905, and be sent to the Municipal Civil Service Commission to be placed on the 1543 eligible list.

Resignation of Benjamin L. Blauvelt, Leveler, dated December 14, 1904, was read and the following resolution offered:

Resolved, That the resignation of Benjamin L. Blauvelt, Leveler, dated December 14, 1904, be and hereby is declined, and the Secretary directed to notify Mr. Blauvelt accordingly.

The following preambles and resolution were thereupon offered:

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

New York, January 4, 1905.

A meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Wednesday, January 4, 1905, at 9.30 A. M. All the Commissioners were present.

The minutes of December 30, 1904, and January 3, 1905, were approved.

The Assistant Secretary called the attention of the Commission to the appeal of James Gallagher, No. 22 Lewis avenue, Brooklyn, candidate in the recent examination for promotion to Roundsman, Police Department, for a correction of his record, the same having been confused, when computed by the Examiners, with the record of another candidate of the same name. The matter was referred to the Assistant Secretary for a complete report to be presented at the next meeting.

The Commission again considered the report of Examiner Byrne on the complaint of Joseph Curren, Jr., a Clerk in the Department of Education, against the designation of Examiner George G. Brown, Jr., to act as Deputy Superintendent of School Supplies, which report had been laid over from a previous meeting. After taking into consideration the facts stated by Examiner Byrne, the Commission directed the Secretary to communicate with the Department of Education and state that, under the law, it can no longer attach its certificate to Mr. Brown's pay-roll for services rendered in his present capacity, and to request that he be immediately assigned to duties appropriate to his title of Examiner.

A letter was presented from the Department of Education, dated December 8, requesting the Commission to extend the leave of absence granted William Hearn, Inspector of Masonry and Carpentry, until January 1, 1905, on account of illness, and transmitting a doctor's certificate. The request was granted.

A letter was presented from the Department of Health, dated December 16, requesting approval of leave of absence, without pay, from December 15, 1904, to June 15, 1905, granted Lawrence J. Osborne, M. D., Medical Inspector, on account of illness, and transmitting a doctor's certificate. The leave of absence was approved.

A letter was presented from the Superintendent of Buildings, Borough of The Bronx, requesting the Commission to hold an examination for promotion from the position of Messenger to that of Clerk. The matter was laid over.

A letter was presented from the Board of Education, stating that the recent examination held by the Commission for the position of Janitor did not comply with the requirements of the department as set forth in the rules and regulations governing Janitors, Janitor-Engineers and Cleaners in public schools, etc., and requesting that that examination be canceled and a new one called. In connection with the letter of the Department of Education, the Commission considered a report of the Chief Examiner, which stated that the examination for Janitor was not held particularly for the Department of Education, but for any department in the City which might need such services, and for that reason specific questions of the character indicated by the Department of Education were not presented to the candidates. After some consideration the request of the Department of Education was denied.

The Commission then adjourned to meet Thursday, the 5th inst., at 9 A. M.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

New York, January 5, 1905.

A meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Thursday, January 5, 1905, at 9.30 A. M. All the Commissioners were present.

The minutes of the meeting held January 4 were approved.

The Assistant Secretary presented a report on the appeal of James Gallagher of No. 22 Lewis avenue, Brooklyn, candidate for promotion to the position of Roundsman in the Police Department. The report of the Assistant Secretary stated that when Mr. Gallagher's record was transmitted to this office by the Police Department it was in error attached to the papers of one James Gallagher of Neck row, Sheephead Bay, and the latter's record sheet was, by mistake, attached to the papers of James Gallagher of Lewis avenue, Brooklyn. It appearing that an injustice had been done the latter candidate by confusing the records, for the reason that, had he been given credit for his proper record, his total average would have been 80.08 per cent. instead of 76.88, the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Chief Examiner and request him to at once correct the mistake and compute Mr. Gallagher's percentage in accordance with the correct record.

The request of the Fire Department that the Commission call a new examination for the position of Automobile Engineman, and, pending the establishment of the eligible list, to approve the temporary appointment of Everett L. Tarlton, under Rule XII, paragraph 3, was granted.

The Secretary presented an affidavit from Frederick J. Peters, candidate in the recent examination for Fireman, who was dismissed from the examination after having completed all his papers, for producing his experience paper which he had written at home. The affidavit set forth that the candidate had intended no fraud or deceit in preparing his experience paper before he entered the examination, as he thought in that way he would be able to save time. The Commission, being convinced that Mr. Peters acted in good faith, and, in view of the fact that all his papers had been completed by him and handed in at the time he produced the written memorandum setting forth his experience, the Secretary was instructed to direct the Chief Examiner to rate the candidate's papers and place his name on the eligible list in accordance with his ascertained percentage.

A letter was presented from Lawrence Veiller, Esq., manager of the City Club Bureau of Legislative Information, requesting that that Bureau be authorized to furnish the Commission with copies of bills introduced in the Legislature in 1905 affecting Civil Service. The letter was referred to Commissioner Appleton for a reply.

A letter was presented from Henry Greenfield, No. 66 Floyd street, Brooklyn, requesting that his name be restored to the eligible list for Temporary Clerk, he having terminated his service in the Department of Finance under a misapprehension. The letter stated that when he was certified to the Tenement House Department for temporary employment he accepted same, thinking that said certification was from the list for Temporary Clerk, when in reality he was certified from the list for Clerk, and had he known this fact he would not have left the service of the Finance Department. The request was granted.

An affidavit was presented from John B. Conley, requesting that his name be transferred from the eligible list for Court Attendant, Borough of Manhattan, to that for Court Attendant, Borough of The Bronx, and stating that he resides in the latter borough. The matter was referred to Examiner Byrne for verification.

The request of L. E. Bormand, No. 122 East Twenty-seventh street, that his name be restored to the eligible list for Inspector of Sewer Construction was granted, it appearing that at the time he was notified for appointment to said position he was detailed to duty in Bessemer, Ala., by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and he therefore failed to receive such notice.

The action of the Chief Examiner in rejecting the applications of Bartholomew Mulvihill for the positions of Attendant, Inspector of Lamps and Gas, Inspector of Tenements and Watchman, was sustained, it appearing that the applicant had made contradictory statements in said applications and altered the spelling of his name in each.

The action of the Chief Examiner in rejecting the applications of the following-named persons for the position of Rodman, for the reason that they contained false statements, was sustained:

McNeil of No. 21 Carlton avenue, Brooklyn, be placed upon the eligible list for Patrolman just announced by the Commission. It appearing that Mr. McNeil is over thirty years of age and that the New York Charter provides that "No person may be appointed a Patrolman who shall be, at the time of the placing of his name on the Civil Service eligible list, over thirty years of age," the request was denied for lack of power.

The Commission then adjourned to meet on Friday, the 6th inst., at 9 A. M.

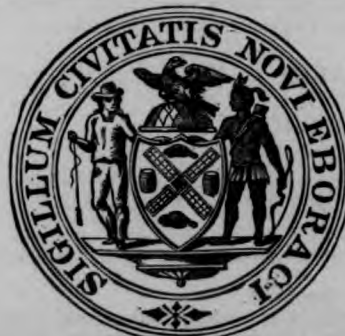

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits, thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
