SUBSCRIPTIONS BY CITY AND COUNTY OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES.

STANDING OF THE CITY AND COUNTY DEPARTMENTS.

The figures below are based upon subscriptions received up to 2 o'clock P. M. yesterday at the Comptroller's office, Room 851, Municipal Building, having been in the first instance turned in to the heads of the respective departments and by them transmitted to the Comptroller, as the Chairman of the Mayor's Committee. The Comptroller files a summary statement daily with the Commissioner of Accounts, as Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Mayor's Committee, and the latter calculates the departmental percentages upon the basis of one \$50 bond to the total payroll of each department, as provided in the 1917 budget, thereby fixing the base percentage for each department. In the interest of fairness the smaller boards, commissions etc., have been grouped together for scoring purposes. Similarly certain county offices of each county have likewise been combined.

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, May 1, 1917, at 3:30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, O'Keefe, Robbins, Stern and Farley, Trustees. Excused—Mr. Sachs and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The daily average census at the various hospitals during the month of April, 1917, was as follows: Bellevue, 1,510; Gouverneur, 177; Harlem, 302; Fordham, 228; Neponsit, 91.

Dr. Gregory has returned from his vacation, and is again on duty. Dr. Thornton has been confined to the ward for a few days with ear trouble, is convalescent, and will probably be out shortly. Miss Hilliard and Miss Brink have been in Philadelphia attending the meeting of the National Nurses' Association.

On April 21 the circus made its annual visit to the hospital, and was much enjoyed by the patients, particularly the children.

On the 27th of April a man giving the name of Bogt (James Clayton) was caught in the act of mutilating the fire hose in one of the hallways. When taken to the Detective Bureau he was recognized as a man with a criminal record and was held for the Court of Special Sessions. To-day he was convicted of petty larceny and sentenced to the penitentiary for an indeterminate sentence (one to three years).

The elevator service in pavilions A and B is very unsatisfactory. This building has only one elevator which must be in constant use, and when it is out of commission there is not sufficient time to do more than make most urgent repairs. Last Wednesday, when loaded, it dropped from the ground floor to the basement. It is most urgent that some provision be made for increasing the elevator service in this pavilion. These elevators are now operated by hospital helpers receiving from \$20 to \$25 per month, working 12 hours each day, and there are many changes. I believe this is a factor in the trouble we have with the elevators. The operators of elevators in the Municipal Building receive \$70 per month and work 8 hours a day. I would therefore recommend that request be made of the Board of Estimate to establish a similar grade of elevator service in the hospitals of this department.

We are experiencing great difficulty in securing helpers of a satisfactory character, as so few men apply who are willing to accept the long hours of duty with the small wages. Our present staff of messengers and orderlies in the admitting office is a disgrace to any well regulated institution, but we cannot do better.

Miss Wadley, of the Social Service Bureau, desires to call attention to the Baby Parade which is to be held on Saturday of this week at 11 o'clock.

One Hundred and Thirty-seventh st., east of Lenox ave., is in very bad condition. I would suggest that the attention of the Borough President be called to it.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

It was moved, seconded and carried, to extend a vote of thanks, on behalf of the patients of Bellevue Hospital, for the kindness of Barnum and Bailey in giving the performance.

After discussion, it was resolved to make provision in the 1918 budget for a new grade of employees as elevator operators in all the buildings of the department, and on the recommendation of the Building Committee it was moved, seconded and carried, to ask McKim, Mead and White to make an examination of the elevators in pavilions A and B and present their recommendation, and also to report on the feasibility of providing another elevator for the building.

After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to take appropriate action, either by request to the Board of Estimate for the transfer of funds or by applying for revenue bonds, in order to obtain higher wages for a better class of employees for the department, particularly in the admitting office.

It was moved, seconded and carried, to bring to the attention of Borough President Marks the bad condition of 137th st., east of Lenox ave., and to request him to have the street repaved.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Dr. Brannan presented a list of bids received at the office of the Central Purchasing Committee on April 23 for potatoes and on April 26 for coal. On the recommendation of the Committee on Supplies the following action was taken: On potatoes, contracts were awarded to the low formal bidder on lines 4a to 9a, inclusive, which cover a period of three months. Bids on lines 4 to 9, the alternate

bid for one month, were rejected. On coal bids were rejected on account of the high prices, purchases to be made in the open market as far as possible.

The Chairmen of the Building Committee reported that under date of March 22, he communicated with the Superintendent of the Bureau of Buildings, who reported on April 18 that his Bureau could not modify their requirements on the construction of the type of balconies at Bellevue. As A. W. King on March 13 presented a request for an extra of \$275 for changes required in the type of construction and as this was recommended for acceptance by McKim, Mead and White under date of May 1, it was moved, seconded and carried, on the recommendation of the Building Committee to authorize the payment of the additional amount.

On the recommendation of the Conference Committee of the First Division of Bellevue Hospital, William R. May was appointed Physician to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician, Pediatric Service, for the year ending June 30.

On the recommendation of the Conference Committee of Fordham Hospital, George A. Wyeth was appointed to the position of Surgeon to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon.

On the recommendation of the Conference Committee of Gouverneur Hospital, Milton A. Shlenker was appointed Assistant Visiting Obstetrician to Gouverneur Hospital for the remainder of the year 1917.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to renew the request to

the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for permission to buy instruments for the Ear, Nose and Throat Department to the extent of \$3,400 required in that department. The original request was made under date of July 24, 1916, in the sum of \$2,600, supplemented on Aug. 28, 1916, for an additional amount of \$1,600, upon which request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on Dec. 15, 1916, granted authority to purchase instruments to the extent of \$1,050.

Reference was made to the resignation of George H. Mallett presented on Feb. 15, but deferred at that meeting with the hope that it would be reconsidered. Dr. O'Hanlon informed the Trustees that Dr. Mallett stated that he desired to have his resignation accepted, but he would be willing to give his services should they be required at Harlem Hospital to fill any vacancy caused by members of the surgical staff taking active military service. It was moved, seconded and carried, to extend to Dr. Mallett the sincere thanks of the Trustees for the offer of his services, to be accepted should they be required, and to express the Trustees' regret that he finds it necessary to withdraw from Harlem Hospital.

Dr. Brannan referred to a communication from William H. Stewart, under date of April 20, in regard to instructions given by him in the X-Ray Department of Harlem Hospital and also relating to his work in connection with the New York School of Roentgenology. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to request Dr. Stewart to meet with the Trustees at their next meeting on May 15.

Dr. Brannan reported that the Mayor, under date of April 24, asked for a list of all employees of the department who could be released for work in connection with the checking and classifying of data of the proposed military census. Dr. Brannan informed the Mayor, under date of April 28 that it would be impossible to spare any of the clerks for any length of time unless they would be willing to do part of their work in the evenings, and transmitted to him a list of the men of the department who had volunteered for the work, returning to Bellevue in the evenings.

The President reported that he had met with Frederick S. Dennis and discussed with him the subject of accepting the legacy of William Washington Cole and suggested that this fund be used for equipping and providing protection for the roof wards of pavilions L and M.

Dr. Brannan reported upon a request, dated April 19, from Colonel William Heyward of the Fifteenth Regiment, N. Y. N. G., he gave Clarence Mayer permission to use the dental room at Harlem Hospital for the dental treatment of the men of that regiment. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to approve the action of the President.

Dr. Brannan reported that he had conferred with Dr. Moskowitz, of the Civil Service Commission, on April 26, regarding the request of Dr. Camac, of Gouverneur Hospital, for permission to appoint a Laboratory Assistant from outside the Civil Service list, whereupon he requested the General Medical Superintendent to transmit a formal request, which he did under date of April 30.

Mr. Paulding referred to the need of providing additional employees in the Out Patient Department of Bellevue, and after discussion, it was moved, seconded and

carried, to include in the estimate of 1918 at least one woman interpreter and, if necessary, a male interpreter; an assistant to Miss Hansen; clerical assistants in the Out Patient Department of all the hospitals.

Mr. Paulding also suggested that the size of the pharmacy be reduced in order to give more room for the Out Patient Department facilities at Bellevue. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to refer the matter to the General Medical Superintendent for the presentation of plans at the next meeting.

Mr. Stern reported that while on a visit to Fordham Hospital on April 20, between 10 and 12 a. m., he found that the surgical clinic in the Out Patient Department was not attended by the surgeon in charge. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to request Alexander Nicoll, the Director of that service, to take appropriate measures to have the clinics attended by the men assigned to them.

COMMUNICATIONS.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for April 14 were presented. The request for apparatus required for the Carrel treatment was referred to the General Medical Superintendent. The nominations of Stanley Brady as Pediatrician to the Hospital and Out Patient Department, and Ten Eyck Elmendorf and M. C. Hill as Assistant Pediatricians, were referred to the Conference Committee. The proposed plan of organization for the interne staff was adopted, provided it meets with the approval of the General Medical Superintendent.

A letter, dated April 21, was presented from S. J. Scadron resigning as Assistant Visiting Obstetrician to Gouverneur Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the resignation was accepted with regret.

A communication under date of April 14 was presented from James Alexander Miller nominating Leo Kessel as Visiting Physician to the Tuberculosis Service, First Division, Bellevue Hospital, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Bertram Waters. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the nomination was approved and the appointment made accordingly.

A communication, dated April 28, was presented from John J. McGrath applying for a leave of absence from his duties at Fordham for the month of May, and also transmitting a request from Dr. Healy for a leave of absence for the same time. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to inform Dr. McGrath that as he and Dr. Healy are on the same division, they make arrangements so that either one or the other will cover the service. Subject to this modification, the Board approved the suggestion that Anthony Harrigan be placed in charge of the surgical and gynaecological services on the Second Division during May.

A letter under date of May 1 was presented from William Darrach, Director of the First Surgical Division, Bellevue Hospital, requesting an indefinite leave of absence for himself, Dr. St. John and Dr. McGrath, as they have been called abroad with Base Hospital No. 2. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this request was approved.

A communication, dated April 17, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, approving (a) revision of salary schedules; (b) expenditure for the installation of lighting fixtures in the Out Patient Department of Gouverneur; (c) corporate stock in the sum of \$1,325 for surgical equipment for the Eye Department; (d) expenditure of \$900 for alterations to the fourth floor of the Neponsit Beach Hospital; (e) special revenue bonds in the sum of \$10,000 for the equipment of the Out Patient Department of Gouverneur; (f) special revenue bonds in the sum of \$7,000 for the construction of a bridge across Gouverneur Slip; also a communication from the same Board, dated April 24, approving (a) revision of salary schedule of Fordham Hospital; (b) plans and specifications for loggia enclosures for pavilions I and K, Bellevue; (c) increase in rates for help at present compensated below \$480 per annum; (d) plans and specifications for layout of grounds at Harlem, which communications were ordered placed on file.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.



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

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walls, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher, at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been properly performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidders assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furring, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per cent of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specific schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies are to be furnished. Plans and drawings of construction work may be seen there.
