BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

Resolution Authorizing Heads of Departments to Grant Leaves of Absence to Certain Classes of Employees.

Whereas, The New York State Firemen's Association and the Southern New York Volunteer Firemen's Association hold their annual conventions during the months of August and June, respectively; and

Whereas, Many of the employees of the City of New York and the Counties within said City are members of these associations; and

Whereas, Many of these employees perform services as volunteer firemen for the City of New York and the Boroughs now embraced in said City and many of them at the present time are performing active service as such volunteer firemen; therefore be it

Resolved, That the heads of all departments in the City of New York and the Counties therein be and they hereby are requested to grant leaves of absence to the employees of their respective departments with pay for the three days commencing on the 11th day of June, 1918, to enable them to attend the convention of the Southern New York Volunteer Firemen's Association to be held at Brooklyn, New York, and be it further

Resolved, That similar leaves of absence be granted such employees to enable them to attend the convention of the New York State Firemen's Association at Lockport, New York, on the five days commencing on August 19th, 1918.

Provided, however, that said employees attend said conventions either as members or delegates and produce suitable certificates from the secretaries of said associations testifying to such attendance, and be it further

Resolved, That this Board approves of such leaves of absence accordingly.



STATE INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION—DEPARTMENT OF LABOR.

Resolutions Adopted.

Whereas, the Division of Factory Inspection has submitted to this Commission appeals filed from orders issued by said Division of Factory Inspection against the premises cited below, the granting of which appeals would necessitate a variation of law; and

Whereas, the said Division of Factory Inspection had a reinspection made of the premises in each case, and upon the reports submitted gives the existing conditions and recommends as follows:

1. Premises affected, Auburn, Genesee and Osborn sts.; appellant, International Harvester Co. 3—Provide additional means of exit from "Patterson Shop" Building No. 4, 3-story non-fireproof building; open lofts; sprinkler; combustible; no fire alarm; occupancy, 41; above 1st floor, 30; above 2d floor, 20; exits, one interior stairway on the north; running from 2d to 3d floors; one interior stairway on the west in pattern shop from 1st to 3d floors; horizontal exit to adjacent machinery building on the north; exit from 3d floor to roof; cw section on south; stair in machinery building does not extend to grade, and horizontal exit has fire door on one side only; exits remote; no safe egress from roof.

Recommendation: Accept a doorway to be provided in fire wall which gives access to stairway in Sales Department; fireproof self-closing door to be installed at said opening, said doorway to open outwardly, doorway to be unobstructed and door to be kept open at all times when anyone is at work in building.

2. Premises affected, Brooklyn, 1114 DeKall ave.; appellant, S. Liebmann's Sons Brewing Co. Provide suitable water closet, constructed as per Code Rules. As compliance with this order, appellant has provided a long hopper closet of the Kelly anti-freezing type, which is located in the yard of the premises, and conforms in all other respects to the Industrial Code rules.

Recommendation: Acceptance of long hopper closet of the Kelly anti-freezing type in lieu of inside flush water closet.

3. Premises affected, Buffalo, 546 Seneca st.; appellant, F. N. Burt Co., Ltd. 1—Arrange swing firedoors at entrance to stair hall on Myrtle st. side to swing outwardly. (Orders May 14, 1917.) These are doubleleaf swinging doors, open on one side of stair hall and sliding doors on other side of stair hall. Sliding doors are always open.

Occupancy of building is as follows: 2d floor, 48 males, 42 females; 3d floor, 13 males, 189 females; 4th floor, 15 males, 70 females. On 2d floor there are four horizontal exits, none of which is perfect. On 3d floor are two horizontal exits. The high occupancy of the building is in close proximity to this stairway.

Recommendation: Sliding doors be accepted if kept open at all times when any one is at work in the building, the swinging doors to be made to swing outwardly.

4. Premises affected, Buffalo, 1317 Elk st.; appellant, Rolt, J. Reidpath & Son. 29—Make stairway in four-story part of incombustible material.

31—Provide skylights in stairway enclosures three-quarters area of enclosure. 32—Continue stairs in two-story part to roof.

33—Make stairs in two-story part at least 44 inches wide. 34—Make stairs in two-story part not more than 7 3/4 inches rise. (March 1, 1918.) Two- and four-story nonfireproof building erected before Oct. 1, 1913, with open lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 116; above 1st floor, 28; above 2d floor, 20; exits, two interior stairways properly enclosed with fireproof partitions, doors to which open outwardly and are self-closing; exits remote. This building was originally three- and four-story building, each separate, but since

reconstruction the premises consist of one, two and four-story parts, known as "A," "B," "C" and "D," and was inspected as one building for the reason that the 1st floor (except at the extreme north end, and where the one-story engine, compressor and cooler rooms are located) the story runs right through without partition or fire wall. In reconstruction, stairways were changed as to location and made new; elevators were changed and new shafts made; a large part of the old structure was taken down, and the new construction is more than 50 per cent. of the old. Stairs are enclosed with fireproof material with proper firedoors at all openings; existing new stairs are of wood; staircases have exterior windows which give plenty of light and air; if stairs were continued to roof, it would make a continuous passageway over roof, but there would be no other egress from roof in the four-story portion, not being accessible. On the 2d floor of this portion of the building two persons are usually employed. Stairs are 42 inches wide, risers 7 3/4 inches high of 8 inches high. Recommendation: Waive orders Nos. 29, 31, 32, 33 and 34, and accept stairways at present constructed.

5. Premises affected, Cortlandt, 106, 108, 110 Main st.; appellant, W. H. Clark. 1—Additional exit remote from existing exit on 2d and 3d floors of 110 Main st. 2—Class "A" fire alarm signal system. 3—Organize and maintain fire drills. (Jan. 7, 1918.) Four-story nonfireproof building; divided lofts; no sprinkler; combustibles; imperfect fire alarm signal system; occupancy, 62, 49 of whom are factory employees; above the 1st floor, 53; above 2d floor, 45; exists one interior stairway enclosed fire-resisting from 1st to 2d and from 3d to 4th floors, doors to which open out and are double swing, self-closing; imperfect rear fire escape, openings to which are nonfireproof; exits not remote; safe egress from roof (the roof at rear of building slopes but at front is level and adjoining building can be reached); on 3d floor is a perfect horizontal exit, which is not remote from stairway; the floors are divided, and factory occupancy all floors is south of center firewall. Standard Printing Co. also occupy 3d and 4th floors north of firewall; remainder of building occupied by store on ground floor and storage on 2d floor; both sides of firewall 4th floor used for storage; no one employed thereon; occasionally one or two persons go to this floor. Orders for fire alarm signal system and fire drill are in the hands of Fire Prevention Engineer Ongley and will be acted on when his report is received.

Recommendation: Accept fire escape if made to conform to Rule 4-b, except that same need not be carried to roof with balcony, because of unsafe condition caused by slope of roof at rear of building; horizontal exit conforming to Section 79-f-9 to be provided at east end of building through center firewall at 3d floor; door to be cut through wall separating workrooms in southwest corner of building.

6. Premises affected, Elmira, 159-167 Lake st.; appellant, H. C. Mandeville. Approved fire alarm signal system. Organize and maintain fire drills. (March, 1918.) Five-story building with a two-story addition at the rear; Custer & Kinstler use part of this building as a laundry; front of 1st floor used as office; rear of 1st and 2d floors proper used as laundry, which part is not open to office section; there is a door which may be used in case of necessity, leading from 2d floor to main hallway in office building; above 2d floor are three floors of offices; on the 1st and 2d floors rear are 43 persons at work in the laundry; one open stairway leading from 1st to 2d floors and fire escape from 2d floor to ground. There is a fire alarm signal system, installed some years ago, consisting of one large gong in open stairway midway between 1st and 2d floors. At 3 different points on 1st floor are installed jackknife switches that can be thrown in any one of which will start this gong ringing; wiring not in rigid conduit, but open wiring in small gauge, i. e., 19 B. & S. gauge.

Recommendation: Accept present fire alarm signal system and treat laundry separate from office building when said system has been reconstructed as follows: Break-glass boxes substituted for present three jackknife switches; present wiring to be torn out and wire of 14 B. & S. gauge used either in rigid or soft conduit; the use of soft conduit probably making a better condition owing to many turns necessary; battery to be enclosed in metal battery cabinet with lock and key.

7. Premises affected, Gloversville, 67 East Fulton st., rear; appellant, Lehr & Wilson. 1—Organize and maintain monthly fire drills. 2—Additional exit. 3—Prohibit occupancy. 4—Approved fire alarm system. 5—Additional watercloset for females. (Oct. 2, 1917.) Four-story nonfireproof building; divided lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; unapproved fire alarm signal system; occupancy, 51; above the 1st floor, 25; above 2d floor, 25; exists, one interior stairway, doors to which open out but are not self-closing; imperfect fire escape on side; exits remote; no egress from roof. Order No. 1 has been complied with; fire escape conforms to Rule 4-b, except that same does not extend to 4th floor and openings are nonfireproof; order for fire alarm signal system in hands of Fire Prevention Engineer Ongley. Watercloset formerly used by males assigned to females, and watercloset with lock and key.

8. Premises affected, Kingston, Barnard ave.; appellant, Peter Barnard. 1—Ceiling over tops or extend partitions of waterclosets used by males, 2d floor, so that same will go to ceiling. 2—Properly ventilate to outer air watercloset compartments for males on 2d floor. 3—Additional exit from all floors, four-story building; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy of building, 11; above 1st floor, 1; above 2d floor, 1 occasionally. There are three interior stairways, doors to which open in; exits remote. Orders Nos. 1 and 2 refer to waterclosets located in small room on 2d floor, from which there is a large opening to floor above; the top of building is provided with several ventilators to roof; closets clean and no odor perceptible; owing to location of closet, proper compliance with order is impracticable. Orders Nos. 5 and 6 refer to top floor of building; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy of building, 11; above 1st floor, 8; above 2d floor, 28; exists, one interior wood-enclosed stairway, doors to which open out but are not self-closing; perfect fire escape on east side of building; fireproof openings 7 by 3 feet high; exits remote; safe egress from roof; building divided in two sections by firewall; south section 5 stories, north section 4 stories; stairway from 1st to 2d floors on north side of firewall; and 2d to 5th floors on south side of firewall.

9. Premises affected, Rochester, 495 Broadway; appellant, American Tobacco Co. 2—Properly guard belts and pulleys on 16 tobacco strippers, 1st floor. 15—Remove unsanitary urinal in males' watercloset compartment, 1st floor. 23—Remove unsanitary trough waterclosets used by

males, 1st and 2d floors. 29—Properly re-enamel seats of male watercloset compartments, 3d floor, 34—Two waterclosets, 3d floor, 35—New urinal, 3d floor. 31—Provide enclosure for dressing room for females on 2d floor, Buildings 1 and 2. (April 1, 1918.) No. 2—Guarding practicable, belts 2 inches wide, slow moving and guarding would not be required under proposed Dangerous Machinery Code. 19—Urinal in bad condition, supply pipe disconnected; it should be entirely removed or replaced by proper installation. 23—Troughs of waterclosets referred to are in fair condition. 29—Order refers to iron framework on which wooden seats rest. 34-35—Orders require replacement of present installations ordered removed by order No. 30, which is not appealed, present closets being in fair condition. 31—Order refers to spaces on 2d floor, containing racks for hanging clothing of female employees; as dressing room and rest room are provided in other parts of plants, enclosure of these racks will in no way better conditions in view of the fact that ventilation is provided by their being left in their present condition.

Recommendation: Order No. 2 to be held in abeyance pending adoption of Dangerous Machinery Code. No. 19 to be complied with. If wood at back and sides of present trough waterclosets be removed and proper enameled seats will be accepted as compliance with order No. 23 or in lieu thereof Department will accept proper closets to be installed and present troughs removed. No. 29, iron framework on which wooden seats rest to be properly scraped, cleaned and covered with at least two coats of light-colored enameled paint. Nos. 34 and 35, accept installation of one closet, inasmuch as there are adequate closets in other parts of buildings, and these accommodations are used by male employees only. No. 31 to be waived.

10. Premises affected, Middleport; appellant, Niagara Sprayer Co. Additional exit. Three-story nonfireproof frame building; open lofts; sprinkler with one source of water supply; combustibles carried (sulphur); no fire alarm; occupancy, 62, 49 of whom are factory employees; above 1st floor, 24; above 2d floor, 8; exits, one interior stairway enclosed with fireproof partitions, doors to which open in and are not self-closing; imperfect rear fire escape, with nonfireproof openings 37 by 44 inches; exits remote; no egress from roof; 1st and 2d floors used for office purposes, 3d and 4th floors as designing rooms; fire escape complies with Rule 4-b, except that windows on course are not fireproof. No women employed above the ground floor of building; sprinkler system has two sources of water supply, and is installed in all parts of building except the ground floor; on the 2d, 3d and 4th floors sprinkler heads are placed in front of each window opening on course of fire escape; at times the occupancy of the building is considerably larger than that given herein.

Recommendation: Accept present fire escape as 2d required means of exit for not more than 47 persons above the 2d floor, without fireproofing the openings on course thereof, provided automatic sprinkler be extended to cover the first floor.

11. Premises affected, New York City, 251-253 Seventh ave.; appellant, Wm. A. White & Sons. 1—Provide one additional wash basin for females, 9th floor. 3—One additional wash basin for females, 7th floor. 4—Additional watercloset for females, 7th floor. 5—Additional wash basin for females, 6th floor. 8—Additional wash basin for females, 5th floor. 7—"T" screen at 2d floor toilets. There are the same number of waterclosets and basins on each floor; north toilet room contains three seats; center room one seat; south room, one seat. Toilets for sexes adjacent; entrance within 10 feet of each other; south closet contains one basin with two faucets, one without water supply; one sink 30 inches long on left side of toilet compartments, with two faucets; one without water supply. All basins and sinks so located that two persons may use each one at the same time. Some faucets broken, some arranged to automatically shut off; all toilets and compartments will be screened; but changes in screening will be necessary in some cases to allow of a different assignment of basins; no noxious fumes or injurious substances used, principally garment work; in each case water shut off from faucet formerly used for hot water supply.

Recommendation: Accept one basin or sink with two faucets as equivalent of two basins on condition that each faucet be provided with proper water supply, either hot or cold, that all broken faucets be replaced, that all faucets be so constructed as to permit of a constant flow of water when in use, and watercloset screening re-arranged and closets be designated as follows: No. 1 (11th floor, 10 males, 32 females), when water is turned on all faucets order will be complied with. No. 2 (9th floor, 6 males, 51 females), when water is turned on all faucets, north and south toilets designated for females, center compartment for males, screening rearranged so that partition between male and female toilets will divide sink at center between the two faucets, and new entrance to males' toilet is cut through from screen order will be complied with. No. 3 (7th floor, 1 male, 63 females), when water is turned on all faucets, center compartment for males, screening rearranged so that partition between male and female toilets will divide sink at center between the two faucets and new entrance to males' closet is cut through center of screen, order will be complied with. No. 4, when arranged as called for in re orders Nos. 2 and 3 order will be complied with if one watercloset in north toilet room is properly repaired. No. 5, when water is turned on all faucets order will be complied with. No. 6, when water is turned on all faucets, all faucets repaired and of a style to permit a continuous flow when in use, order will be complied with. No. 7, order has been complied with.



The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per cent of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies are to be furnished. Plans and drawings of construction work may be seen there.
