

Report for the Quarter ending June 30, 1885.

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS, No. 36 UNION SQUARE, July 17, 1885.

Hon. WILLIAM R. GRACE, Mayor:

SIR-In accordance with section 49, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Department of Public Parks hereby makes the following report of its transactions for the quarter ending June

During the past quarter the personnel of the Board governing the Department has been changed by the retirement of Commissioner Wales and the appointment in his place of Mr. M. C. D.

Commissioner John D. Crimmins has been elected President and Commissioner M. C. D. Borden

Commissioner John D. Commissioner St. C. B. Borden Treasurer, for the year ending May 1, 1886.

The Presidents of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the National Academy of Design and the New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, having reported favorably upon the artistic merits of the statue of Wm. E. Dodge, the same was accepted, and its erection authorized on the triangle at Thirty-fifth street and Broadway.

Arrangements have been completed for concerts in the Central and several of the city parks

Arrangements have been completed for concerts in the Central and several of the city parks during the present season.

Cappa's Seventh Regiment band has been employed to furnish music for the concerts in Central Park, Bayne's Sixty-ninth Regiment band for the Battery Park, Conterno's Ninth Regiment band for Tompkins Square and Eben's Seventy-first Regiment band for East River Park.

During the quarter all the old and useless material, tools, etc., also the surplus ram lambs of the Central Park flock, have been disposed of at public auction, and the proceeds duly transmitted to the Chamberlain.

A license was granted John P. Ryan to sell refreshments on the Battery Park.

Permission was granted Dennis Cray to erect a temporary pavilion on Tompkins Square, for the

A permit was issued to John C. Cornett to moor a float on the east side of the north end of the Third Avenue Bridge.

Permission was granted Thompson & Dollivar to place and operate their "Lohengrin" boats on the lower lake in Central Park.

Permission was granted the Suburban Rapid Transit Company to open streets, etc., in the Twenty-third Ward, for the purpose of erecting their structures.

Rev. Henry Kimball has been allowed the use of the fountain-basin at the Five Points Park, for the purpose of dispensing food to the poor.

The Department approved the plans prepared by the Trustees of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, for the enlargement and equipment of the building now in their possession on the Central Park, and requested the concurrence of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the matter as provided by cheater 106 of the Laws of 1885.

A plan for the final surface improvement of Riverside Park, above One Hundred and Fifteenth street, has been prepared, and the matter is now under consideration.

Resolved, That this Board disapproves of Senate Bill No. 270, amending the provisions of the Consolidation Act relating to Parkkeepers, and asks that it be not enacted. The Board is unanimously of opinion that the act if passed would be highly injurious to the interests of the public and

prejudicial to the force which, under the present system, is daily increasing in efficiency.

Resolved, That, in the opinion of this Board, the interests of the Twenty-third Ward are suffer-Resolved, That, in the opinion of this Board, the interests of the Twenty-third Ward are suffering in consequence of the delay in the proceeding for opening Railroad avenue, east, from Harlem river to East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, and that the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in that matter be requested to use all means in their power to hasten the completion of the legal proceedings for the opening of that avenue.

Whereas, By the closing of the Metropolitan Museum of Art and the Museum of Natural History on Sunday, thousands who can have no other time for visiting them are deprived of the rich benefits in recreation and improvement they are calculated to afford;

And, whereas, justice to this class requires that this restriction should be removed, especially in view of the fact that the Museum buildings were erected at public expense, and the greater part of the cost of maintaining them is annually provided for out of the tax levy;

Resolved, That the Trustees of said Museums be and they are hereby requested to open their respective buildings to the public on Sundays, from two o'clock to seven o'clock in the afternoon during the summer months, and from half-past one to half-past four o'clock in the afternoon in the winter.

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to notify the New York and Harlem Railroad Company of the dangerous condition of the streets, roads, avenues and public places in the Twenty-third Ward, crossed by the tracks of the Port Morris branch of the said railroad, and to direct the said company immediately to place, maintain and properly operate suitable and substantial gates, doors, guard-rails or other protections for the safety of the public, at each and every of such crossings.

suitable and substantial gates, doors, guard-rails or other protections for the safety of the public, at each and every of said crossings.

The Gas Commission was requested to make arrangements for lighting Mount Morris Park in order to make it safe and agreeable for such persons as may desire to enter the same at night.

The laborers of the regular maintenance work of the parks have been provided with check jumpers or overshirts, and the drivers suitable hats, as a distinguishing mark of the regular Department employees.

The Board of Health having called the attention of this Department to the sanitary condition of the lands in the water-shed of Bungay Creek in the Twenty-third Ward, the Clerk of Street Openings was requested to urge forward as rapidly as possible the proceedings for opening Bungay and other streets in that district, in view of the great sanitary necessity for the improvement of that

locality.

The pond on the west side of Central Park, south of Seventy-seventh street, having been ordered drained and filled in, Mr. Calvert Vaux was requested to furnish a plan for the improvement

of the grounds at that point.

Owing to a lack of flow in the waters of the lower lake or other causes, questions have arisen as to its sanitary condition. The subject is now in the hands of a committee for examination and report as to what remedial measures should be adopted.

orders have been given to allow tricycles to pass over the west drive in Central Park, from Fifty-ninth street to Seventy-second street, during the hours prescribed for bicycle riding.

The Sinking Fund Commission has been requested to lease, for the use of this Department for its principal offices, rooms on the third floor of the Stewart building, at a yearly reatal of \$6,500.

The subject of the proposed bridge over the Harlem river at One Hundred and Eighty-first street has received the consideration of this Board, and on May 20 a plan for its construction was adopted.

The Counsel to the Corporation having advised the Department of the confirmation by the Supreme Court of the report of the Commissioners in the matter of opening Rider avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Thirty-sixth streets, the buildings, fences, etc., standing within the lines of the avenue have been ordered sold at public auction.

Plans for the construction of the system of sewers dependent upon Rider avenue for an outlet, have been prepared and approved, and the work is about to be advertised.

An approximate estimate has been made of the cost of changing the old and constructing new sewers in Central Park, to convey the surface water from the drives and rides, and from the buildings, closets, etc., into the city sewers. An application has been made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for money to carry out the improvement.

A statue commemorative of the landing of the Pilgrim Fathers at Plymouth Rock on June 20, 1620, has been presented to the city by the New England Society of the City of New York, and placed upon the Central Park.

CENTRAL PARK.

Under the Superintending Gardener, there has been planted out 79,100 plants, as follows:
A large bed of clematis jacqueminot, 100 feet long by 4 feet wide, has been arranged on the borders of the East Drive.

Fifteen new beds, containing 1,140 roses of various sorts, have been dotted here and there near the Casino. Seven new beds of colored leaved plants at Mount St. Vincent have been made. Fountains on the Mall and at City Hall Park have been filled with foliage plants. A large new bed of coleus geraniums, etc., has been planted at Stuyvesant Square. In the neighborhood of the Claremont Hotel, Riverside Park, three new beds of flowering and colored leaved plants have been laid out. The other beds of flowering and colored leaved plants in different parts of the Department have been treated in the same manner as last year.

Many hundreds of herbaceous plants have also been planted throughout the Ramble and at Bryant Park.

Flowering shrubs for undergrowth have been set out on the steep bank east of the upper reservoir and also in several other places in Central Park.

The new nursery near the North Meadow has been thoroughly reorganized by the removal of worthless trees and shrubs and the transplanting of such as can be used hereafter. The removal of branches and dead trees has been prosecuted with vigor, and trees set out in different parts of the city squares. city squares.

General Work.

There have been removed from new walks and flower-beds about 3,000 feet of sods, which were used again in repairing borders and lawns.

Rock is being excavated for a new bear pit, and new walks made on Zoological grounds.

The Plaza at Fifty-ninth street and Fifth avenue has been regraded, besides putting on broken stone and graval.

All the fences of barbed and nearly all those made of plain wire have been removed.

The Belvedere has been overhauled, cleaned, repaired and pointed.

The slope at Seventy-fourth street and Fifth avenue, above the Conservatory lake, has been graded, top-dressed with good mould, and made ready for planting.

The Curlers' house has been removed from the west to the east side of Conservatory lake.

The walks, drives, bridges, basins, buildings and lawns have received the usual amount of

520 signs were also painted, lettered and varnished.

The rolling stock, consisting of dirt and stone trucks, road rollers, grass carts, light wagons and express wagons, was painted, and likewise the monkey-house, the cages in the Carnivora, the outside of the Casino, the picket fence on Fifth avenue, from Ninety-seventh to One Hundred and Second street, and the stationary benches on the Mall.

Carpenters' Gang.

This gang was employed in building— 2 new grass carts. I new dirt cart.

I new road scraper. Also repairing express wagons, two-horse trucks, grass, hand and dirt carts, water trucks, wheelbarrows and light wagons, making 66 new signs and two new cages for monkey-house, reflooring ten cages in the Carnivora and putting new skylight in bird-house.

Fitting up new offices on first floor of Arsenal for use of Police and Director of Menagerie. Repairing floor and base of music-stand on the Mall, and all the music desks.

Fitting up six new stalls in Eighty-fifth street stables and repairing the flooring of the old ones. Repairing the stationary seats on the Mall.

On Central Bridge form seats on the Mall.

On Central Bridge four entire new bents were made and put up, besides putting in two new caps and fifteen new timbers.

A new platform was made for Madison Avenue Bridge, the steps lowered and a crib put down.

Blacksmiths, Engineers, Etc.

This gang was employed in repairing the rolling-stock of the Department, consisting of dirt carts and trucks, water, stone and spring trucks, hand carts, express wagons, light wagons, horse and hand mowers, mowing machines and road rollers.

Making ironwork for signs, settees and Belvedere.

Repairing hydrants, water-pipes, urinals, steam pumps, tree guards, animal cages, railings on city parks and fountains on Madison Square, Stuyvesant Square and Tompkins Square.

Keeping in repair all the tools of the Department and making new ones.

Repairing bearing plate, wheels, gearing and large rack of Third Avenue Bridge and gates on Madison Avenue Bridge.

Also, attending the engines on Third Avenue and Madison Avenue Bridges, besides general supervision and care of all bridges of this Department over the Harlem river.

Shoeing all the Department horses.

During the past quarter, "Insect life" has developed to an astonishing degree in many cases, owing, no doubt, to the extreme dry weather, which is most favorable for the growth and increase of many species.

The Scale Insects and Plant Lice are unusually abundant this year, and the work in this direction has been carried on as far as possible with the force employed.

But one man, beside the Entomologist, has been employed on the work since May 12, 1885, until June 28, when an additional man was added to the force.

The work during the month of April was in the removal of cocoons and egg-masses from the trees and shrubs in the Central and city parks, in this way reducing the number that would otherwise remain to increase during the summer.

During the month of May, the work was on the destruction of Scale Insects, and those in active operation on the foliage. The month of June has been given to the work on the scale insects, elm beetle and web-spinners. The different parks have been examined weekly, and the insects removed, as was required in each particular case.

A great number of vines of Ampelopsis and Grape have been treated for the caterpillar of Alypia octomaculata. The total number of trees treated in the Central Park during the past quarter being three thou-

sand nine hundred and forty-five (3,945). In Bryant Square, twenty (20) trees were treated for scale insects and cocoons removed from the remainder of the trees.

In Tompkins Square, ninety (90) trees have been treated for scale insects and the cocoons and egg-masses of Orgyia leucostigma removed.

In Battery Park, eighty (80) trees have been treated for scale insects, besides the removal of a portion of the cocoons from the trees.

In Madison Square, eighteen (18) trees have been treated for insects and the remainder cleaned of all cocoons and egg-masses.

of all cocoons and egg-masses. In Union Square, twenty (20) trees have been cleaned of scale insects, besides the removal of all cocoons and those insects in active operation on the foliage.

In Washington Square, forty-eight (48) trees have been treated for scale insects and the destroying of a large quantity of the caterpillars of Orgyia feeding on the foliage.

In City Hall Park, thirty (30) trees have been treated for Scale Insects and a large quantity of cocoons and egg-masses of Orgyia removed.

East River Park, being filled with Ailanthus trees chiefly, the work has been in the removal of the cocoons of the Japanese silk-worm, which work upon the foliage of these trees.

In Mount Morris Park, the work thus far has been in the treating the Cratægus for Aphis species and the rose bushes for the Rose slug.

In Abingdon Square, twenty-four (24) elm trees have been treated for Eriosoma Rileyi. The other small squares, including Bowling Green, Duane and Beach Street Parks, have all been given attention, and the trees cleaned as was found possible with the force employed.

In Cooper Park, ten (10) trees were cleaned of scale insects and the cocoons removed from all. Riverside Park.

On Riverside Drive, one hundred and eighty Elm trees have been treated for the Elm beetle and the removal of all insects in active operation on the foliage, including the Caterpillars of Vanessa

In all the parks, the work has been carried on as was most necessary, and in all, the trees are in very creditable condition, considering the disadvantage of a very severe drouth.

A T A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 14th day of July, 1885, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, sections 56 and 184 of the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same are hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 56. That the keeping and slaughtering of all cattle, and the preparation and keeping of all meat and fish, birds and fowl, shall be in that manner which is, or is generally reputed or known to be, best adapted to secure and continue their safety and wholesomeness as food. The slaughtering shall not be permitted or conducted at any place in the City of New York south of Thirty-ninth street, nor north of said street without a special written permit from this Department: nor unless the same shall be done in buildings located upon the water-front.

the same shall be done in buildings located upon the water-front.

Section 184. The business of slaughtering animals in the City of New York shall not be conducted south of One Hundred and Tenth street, unless the same shall be in buildings located upon the water-front, and so constructed as to receive all stock deliverable thereat from boats, cars or transports; and to secure the proper care and disposition of all parts of the slaughtered animals upon the premises or the immediate removal thereof by means of boats; and no cattle, sheep, hogs or calves shall be driven in the streets of such city below One Hundred and Lenth street, except through Sixtieth street and Eleventh avenue, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 350 of the Laws of 1885; nor shall any fat, hides, hoofs, or entrails, or other refuse, parts of slaughtered animals, be transported in said streets; nor shall any buildings be erected or converted into or used as a slaughter-house or factory or place for fat-rendering, or for any offensive business growing out of slaughtering, such as fat-melting, hide-curing, gui-cleaning, bone-boiling, glue-making, etc., until the plans thereof have been duly submitted to the Board of Health and approved in writing by the said Board.
