### BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met at the Mayor's Office, on Friday, May 4, 1888, at 1 o'clock P. M., pursuant to the following notice:

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT,  
MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, May 3, 1888.

SIR—You are respectfully requested to attend a meeting of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, to be held at the office of the Mayor, on Friday, May 4, 1888, at 1 o'clock P. M., to take into consideration unfinished business and such other matters as may be presented to the Board.

Present—Abram S. Hewitt, Mayor; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller; John Newton, Commissioner of Public Works; J. Hampden Robb, President of the Department of Public Parks; George H. Forster, President of the Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting of April 20, 1888, were read and, on motion, approved. The unfinished business laid over from previous meetings was taken up. 1st. East River Park extension, between Eighty-sixth and Eighty-ninth streets. After a discussion of the subject by members of the Board, its consideration was again postponed to give such of the members who had been unable to view the location an opportunity to do so.

The matter of High Bridge Park was next taken up, and a debate was carried on by the members of the Board in regard to the area of land, properties, etc., to be taken and the dimensions of said park, and it was decided that while awaiting the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, or the necessary legislation giving this Board the power of fixing the proportion of assessments to be paid by the City, etc., the matter be referred back to the Department of Public Parks with the request that a further investigation be instituted with a view to the suggestion of some modification of the plans recommended in the report of that Department, which would avoid so extensive an outlay of money.

The Secretary presented the following letter, enclosing petition for opening Audubon avenue, which was directed to be referred to the Department of Public Works:

No. 32 LIBERTY STREET, N. Y., April 20, 1888.

WILLIAM V. I. MERCER, Esq., Secretary:

DEAR SIR—A number of the property-owners on Audubon avenue desire to have that avenue opened according to law, from One Hundred and Fifty-eighth to One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street.

The street is being rapidly built up, and in view of the time which the proceedings will necessarily take, they would like to present the matter to the Board of Street Opening and Improvement in the hope of its favorable consideration as soon as possible.

SIR—I herewith forward a resolution for adoption by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, to amend its resolution of August 2, 1886, relative to opening East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, Twenty-third Ward, by omitting the words "from Vanderbilt avenue, East, to Third avenue and," so as to read as follows:

3d. East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, from Franklin avenue to East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street.

The reason for making this change in the limits of opening is, that East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, from Vanderbilt avenue, East, to Franklin avenue, was ceded by Gouverneur Morris, November 8, 1864.

The President of the Department of Public Parks offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That so much of the resolution passed by this Board August 2, 1886, as relates to acquiring title for the use of the public to the lands required for East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, as a street of the first class, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York, be and the same is hereby amended by striking out the words "from Vanderbilt avenue, East, to Third avenue, and," so as to read as follows, to wit:

3d. East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, from Franklin avenue to East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen—5.

There being no further business, on motion, the Board adjourned.

### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a special meeting of the Board of Docks, held April 28, 1888.

Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews and Marshall.

The following preambles and resolutions were,

On motion, adopted:

Whereas, This Board did, on the twenty-fourth day of June, eighteen hundred and eighty-six, adopt a resolution appropriating the southerly half of the stone bulkhead between Piers, new 37 and 38, North river, and the northerly half of the stone bulkhead between Piers, new 36 and new 37, North river, to the sole use of the special kind of commerce carried on by steam transportation, and that a lease of said bulkhead be granted to C. P. Huntington, with permission to shed the same fifty feet easterly from the front of the bulkhead and from the middle of the bulkhead between Piers 37 and 38 to the middle of the bulkhead between Piers 36 and 37; and,

Whereas, this Board did, by resolutions adopted on the ninth day of February, eighteen hundred and eighty-seven, and on the fourteenth day of July, eighteen hundred and eighty-seven, amend the said resolution of June twenty-fourth, eighteen hundred and eighty-six; and,

Whereas, Certain errors and inaccuracies occur in the said amendatory resolution of July fourteenth, eighteen hundred and eighty-seven, whereby it has become advisable to adopt a further amendatory resolution; it is therefore

Resolved, That the said resolution of June 24th, eighteen hundred and eighty-six, be amended so as to read as follows:

Resolved, That by virtue of the power vested in this Board by subdivision 6 of section 6, chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, and section 716 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, commonly called "The New York City Consolidation Act," as amended by chapter 517 of the Laws of 1884, the stone bulkhead extending from the middle of the slip between Piers, new 36 and new 37, North river, to the middle of the slip between Piers new 37 and 38, North river, be and hereby is appropriated to the sole use of the special kind of commerce carried on by steam transportation.

Resolved, That C. P. Huntington be and is hereby informed that this Department will grant to him a lease of the said bulkheads for a term of years, co-terminous with his present lease of Pier, new 37, at an annual rent of \$3,500, payable quarterly in advance, and will agree in said lease to give to said lessee a covenant of renewal for a further term of years, co-terminous with his right of extension of his present lease of said pier, at an advanced rent of three thousand and eight hundred dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance, in accordance with section 716 of the Consolidation Act of 1882, provided that said C. P. Huntington shall, within five days after receipt thereof, file in this office a written acceptance of the terms hereof, and agree to execute a lease for said bulkheads, with permission to shed the same fifty feet easterly from the front of the bulkheads, and from the middle of the bulkhead, between Piers 37 and 38, to the middle of the bulkhead between Piers 36 and 37, containing the usual covenants and conditions and in conformity with the terms herein set forth; and be it further

Resolved, That said shed shall be constructed subject to the regulations required by chapter 249 of the Laws of 1875, and of sections 772 and 774 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, commonly called "The New York City Consolidation Act," and in conformity with plans to be first submitted to and approved by the Commissioners of Docks, and all work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department;

Provided, that the area of pavement to be occupied by said shed shall be maintained and kept in satisfactory repair by and at the expense of the lessee;

And provided further, that the said lessee shall file in the office of this Department, within five days after receipt hereof, a written agreement that the said shed shall revert to and become the property of the Corporation of the City of New York, upon the expiration or sooner termination of the lease of said bulkheads, free of all claims of every kind whatsoever; and be it further

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby requested to prepare in proper form a lease in triplicate to C. P. Huntington of the said premises for a term of years, co-terminous with his present lease and his renewals, containing the usual covenants and conditions, with the terms herein set forth, and that the officers of this Board be and are hereby authorized and empowered to execute the said lease when approved as to form by the said Counsel to the Corporation.

Upon reading and filing the application dated April 19, 1888, of the Southern Pacific Company, acting through its counsel Charles H. Tweed, for leave to use and occupy Pier, old 36, North river, during the month of May, 1888, to which application reference is hereby made, and upon all the papers and proceedings in this matter,

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to the said Southern Pacific Company to occupy the said Pier, old 36, North river, for the purposes of their business until June 1, 1888 (being the whole of the month of May), at and for the price of one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five dollars, payable immediately; provided, however, that it be distinctly understood that the Department of Docks shall, on that date, June 1, 1888, enter into full and peaceable possession of the said Pier and that the said Southern Pacific Company will, at the latter date, deliver up possession thereof to the said Department of Docks; and provided further, that the said Southern Pacific Company shall, without delay, file in the said Department an agreement, in writing, to surrender and relinquish the occupancy of the said pier on the 1st of June, 1888, and also assent, in writing, to all the terms and conditions of this resolution.

It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott Street, January 27, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 18 of the Sanitary Code be amended in the following manner, to wit: "No person shall be allowed to occupy any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same, or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same, to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbside of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not apply to any building, or any portion or apartment of any building, which is used as a place of occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid, and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a place of sleeping or residence, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment."

**REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.**

**UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS** 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, are as follows:

"The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of assessors."

Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water.

Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meter.

\*\*\*\*\* The said commissioner of public works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offence, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such penalty shall be charged against the owner of the premises.

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwellings-houses are on the basis that one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows to wit:

BAKERY.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBERS.—Shops shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bathtub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick-tens—cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum. DUNG SLOOPS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.
