

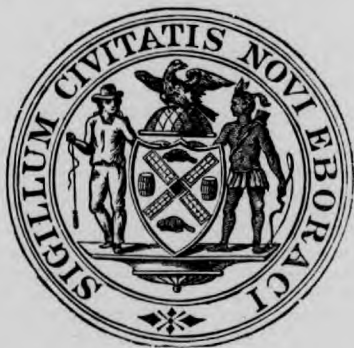

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
NEW YORK, September 14, 1887.

The Board met pursuant to adjournment.
Present--Commissioners James C. Bayles, Joseph D. Bryant, the Health Officer of the Port, and the President of the Board of Police.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 10, 1887:

There were 6,725 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police.

There were 648 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police.

There were 357 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 85 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 12 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 76 permits.

I herewith forward reports from Chief Inspectors Tracy, Edison and Bullard of the work performed by themselves and their respective corps.

The certificates of 691 births, 54 still-births, 289 marriages and 781 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, September 10, 1887. This shows a decrease of 139 births and 1 still-birth, and an increase of 62 marriages and 88 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 69 births, 23 marriages and 128 deaths, and a decrease of 12 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles, 2; whooping cough, 1; malarial fevers, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 13; alcoholism, 3; cancers, 8; marasmus and tabes mesenterica, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; apoplexy, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; gastritis, enteritis, gastro-enteritis and peritonitis, 2; suicide, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 2; scarlatina, 7; diphtheria, 21; croup, 3; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 5; puerperal diseases, 6; inanition, 1; rheumatism and gout, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 8; pneumonia, 8; heart diseases, 35; aneurism, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; convulsions, 7; brain and nervous diseases, 4; nephritis and nephritis, 15; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; premature and preternatural births, 4; surgical operations, 1; drowning, 1. The number of deaths from cerebro-spinal fever and bronchitis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 228 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 301 under two years, 360 under five years, and 51 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 20 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 46.09 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 142 were in institutions, 473 in tenement-houses, 141 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 18 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 157 on the first, 185 on the second, 143 on the third, 94 on the fourth, 35 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 766 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 15 non-residents; 94 were stated to be single, 178 married, 97 widowed, and the condition of 412 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 781; still-births, 54; bodies in transitu, 18; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 93 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 691 births, 289 marriages, 54 still-births, 781 deaths; 18 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 122 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 5 transcripts of the birth record, 10 of marriage, and 88 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending September 10, 1887, was 67.7 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 29.924; the mean humidity was 66, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,109, and the total amount of rain-fall was .17 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 753 deaths and still-births, or 90.11 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 38; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 313; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 97; Greenwood (undenominational), 34; Lutheran (undenominational), 117; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 10; Evergreen (undenominational), 47; Woodlawn (undenominational), 25; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 14; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 16; Machpelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending September 3, 1887, was 725; this is 30 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1886, and 78 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.31 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,489,646.

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called "extra water rents" of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
