*To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment :*

GENTLEMEN—We respectfully request the transfer of \$2,500, from the appropriation or appropriations under control of the Department of Taxes and Assessments designated in the written consent of that Department filed with your Board, to the appropriation "Commissioners of Accounts—Salaries of Assistants and Contingencies," which is insufficient; such transfer being necessary to enable us to carry on the business of this office during the remainder of the current year.

The amount appropriated for the year 1886 for the last-mentioned purpose was \$25,000. The amount of our estimate for the like purpose for 1887 was \$25,000. The amount appropriated was \$15,000, being forty per cent. less than our estimate.

If the transfer now asked be not granted we shall be compelled to discharge our force at the end of this month, leaving the Department of Public Works, the Department of Public Charities and Correction and the Fire Department, together with several of the courts and minor offices, without examination during the current year.

Whereas, Pursuant to the provision of chapter 504 of the Laws of 1887, the District Attorney has appointed an additional Assistant District Attorney for the County of New York at a salary of \$7,500 per annum, and no provision exists for the payment thereof for the months of October, November and December, 1887.

Resolved, That the sum of \$1,875 be and is hereby transferred from the appropriation entitled "Salaries—Judiciary," for 1886, which is in excess of the amount required for the objects and purposes thereof, to the appropriation under the same general head, for the District Attorney's Office, entitled "Assistants, Clerks, Stenographers, etc.," for 1887, which is insufficient for the purposes thereof.

Which were adopted by the following vote :

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered the following preamble and resolution :

Whereas, The appropriation for "Judgments," for 1887, is exhausted; and Whereas, There is an unexpended balance of five thousand six hundred and forty-eight dollars and nineteen cents (\$5,648.19) of the appropriation entitled "Judgments," for 1886, which is not required for the purposes thereof;

Resolved, That the sum of five thousand six hundred and forty-eight dollars and nineteen cents (\$5,648.19) be and is hereby transferred from the appropriation entitled "Judgments," for 1886, which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes thereof, to the appropriation entitled "Judgments," for 1887, which is insufficient for the purposes thereof.

Which were adopted by the following vote :

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Heads of Departments, the Board of Education, and all officers who have annual appropriations made to them by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be and are hereby requested to furnish to this Board, positively, on or before the first day of December, 1887, statements of all unexpended balances of appropriations made to them for the year 1886, and all previous years, together with statements of all unsettled claims and liabilities that may exist against such unexpended balances of appropriations, stating the nature of the claims or liabilities and the names of the claimants and the amounts thereof.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller moved that the Board proceed to the consideration of the Departmental Estimates for the year 1888.

Which was agreed to.

The estimate of the Common Council was taken up for consideration.

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that the Clerk of the Common Council be requested to furnish to this Board a statement of the clerks and officers of the Board of Aldermen, and to appear before this Board and explain their duties, etc.

Which was agreed to.

The estimate of the Mayoralty was taken up for consideration.

The various items therein were discussed and unanimously agreed upon.

The estimate of the Finance Department was then considered.

The estimates for the various bureaus therein were discussed and unanimously agreed upon.

On motion, the Clerk was directed to request the commanding officers of the various regiments and batteries in the City of New York to appear before the Board in explanation of the salaries, duties, etc., of the armorers, janitors and engineers of the armories located therein.

On motion, the Clerk was directed to request the Counsel to the Corporation to appear before the Board at its next meeting, in explanation of the proposed appropriation for "Judgments."

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that the Counsel to the Corporation be notified that the estimate of the Law Department would be considered to-morrow, at 1 o'clock P. M., when an opportunity would be afforded him to be heard relative thereto.

Which was agreed to.

On motion, the Clerk was directed to notify the Clerk of the Common Council that the estimate of the Common Council would be considered to-morrow at 1 o'clock, and to request his presence in explanation thereof.

On motion, the Clerk was directed to notify the Commissioner of Public Works that the estimate of the Department of Public Works would be considered to-morrow, at 1.30 o'clock P. M., and that an opportunity would be afforded him to be heard relative thereto.

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that when the Board adjourns it do so to meet to-morrow, October 21, 1887, at 1.30 o'clock P. M.

## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, October 12, 1887, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, Baldwin and Ridgway.  
Also, Chief Engineer Church.

The minutes of the stated meeting of October 5 were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of Vouchers Nos. 3005 to 3010 inclusive, being estimates for work done by contractors during the month of September. Also of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 3020 to 3031 inclusive, and, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution:  
Resolved, That an appropriation of \$235 be made to cover cost of printing contract drawings for "The East Branch Reservoir;" and the Chief Engineer is hereby authorized and directed to superintend the printing of same. Adopted.

Also, recommended the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the "East Branch Reservoir" and its dams and appurtenances, situate on the east branch of the Croton river, in Putnam County, is hereby set apart and shall hereafter constitute a division of the Aqueduct work, and shall be known as the "Sixth Division," and the said division and the work therein shall be placed under the charge and supervision of a Division Engineer.

Resolved, That George B. Burbank, now Assistant Engineer attached to the First Division of the Aqueduct work, be and he is hereby promoted from said office and appointed to the office of Division Engineer of the said Sixth Division of the Aqueduct work, said appointment to take effect from the time the Chief Engineer shall assign him to duty as such Division Engineer. Adopted.

Also recommended that the Chief Engineer be authorized to call upon Messrs. O'Brien & Clark, contractors, for labor and materials for making and caulking lead joints of the iron pipe which line Shafts 22 and 23, the cost not to exceed \$350.

On motion, the report of the Committee was approved and adopted, and the appropriation made.

Also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer is hereby authorized and directed to use four-inch iron pipe, instead of tile pipe, on any portion of the sunken Aqueduct, where, in his opinion, an advantage may be gained by keeping fresh masonry free from water. Adopted.

By Commissioner Ridgway—

Resolved, That the preamble and resolutions adopted by the Aqueduct Commissioners on August 3 last, approving of the forms of contract, specifications and bond for the construction of the masonry and stonework for the superstructures of the gate-houses for the blow-off chambers at Pocantico and at South Yonkers, on Sections 4 and 9 respectively, of the New Croton Aqueduct, be and the same are hereby reconsidered. Adopted.

The Commissioner of Public Works, under this date, submitted forms of contract, specifications and bond for the faithful performance thereof, for building the gate-house superstructures, roofs, floor systems and foot-bridges for the blow-off chambers at Pocantico and South Yonkers, on Sections 4 and 9 respectively of the New Croton Aqueduct, to take the place of forms heretofore submitted; and in connection therewith, Commissioner Ridgway offered the following preamble and resolutions:

Whereas, The Honorable Commissioner of Public Works has submitted to the Aqueduct Commissioners for their consideration, forms of contract, specifications and bond for the faithful performance thereof, for the construction of the masonry and stonework for the superstructure and for the roof, floor system and foot-bridge of the gate-house for the blow-off chamber at Pocantico on Section 4 of the New Croton Aqueduct; and also for the gate-house for the blow-off chamber at South Yonkers, on Section 9 of the New Croton Aqueduct, in accordance with the provisions of section 25 of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883; and the same having been examined and considered; therefore,

Resolved, That the said forms of contract, specifications and bond for the faithful performance thereof, be and the same are hereby approved; and the Aqueduct Commissioners are authorized and directed to certify their approval by their certificate endorsed in triplicate upon three similar copies of said contract, specifications and bond.

Resolved, That the President and Secretary be and they are hereby authorized and directed to publish in the CITY RECORD, and in the "New York Tribune," and in the "New York Star," the notice and advertisement for sealed bids or proposals for the doing of the work and furnishing the materials for the construction of the gate-houses for the blow-off chambers at Pocantico on Section 4 of the New Croton Aqueduct, and also at South Yonkers on Section 9 of the said New Croton Aqueduct, as called for in the forms of contract this day approved by the Aqueduct Commissioners.

On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the preamble and resolutions were adopted.

Commissioner Spencer, as Vice-Chairman of the Committee on Construction, stated that Messrs. John Brunton & Co., contractors, had requested an extension of ten days in which to sign stipulations renewing their contracts; and, on motion of Commissioner Baldwin, a further extension of time of ten days was granted to all contractors to complete the signing of such stipulations.

The Commissioners then adjourned.
