

#### BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL, New York CITY, June 20, 1887.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 2 P. M., at the office of his Honor

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 2 P. M., at the once of his Flohor Mayor Hewitt. Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commis-sioner of the Public Works Department, and Brig.-General Louis Fitzgerald. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The bids which had been received in response to proposals for building an Armory for the Twenty-second Regiment, were then opened in the presence of Mr. E. G. Marsh, the representative of the Comptroller. The lowest bids for the whole construction appreciated 5410 688 and as only 5200 000 had

The lowest bids for the whole construction aggregated \$419,688, and as only \$300,000 had been appropriated, the bids were, by unanimous vote, all rejected, and the construction of the Armory was referred to the Committee on Plans to confer with the Architect, and remodel the drawings and specifications, for the purpose of reducing the cost, before readvertising again for bids and estimates.

HEWITT, Mayor and Chairman Armory Board: SIR—In reference to the resolution of the Armory Board, requesting me to have the boiler in the Ninth Regiment Armory repaired, and that the lease of the armory building be renewed for one year, I desire to say that I have report from the Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies that the boiler in question is in such condition as to be beyond repair; that even if it could be repaired it is entirely insufficient m size for the proper heating of the armory, and that the cost of placing a new boiler of sufficient size would be about \$1,500. In view of the fact that the lease of the building is extended only one year, I would submit to the Armory Board the question whether the City should incur so large an expense for a new boiler at this time. SIR—Herewith I enclose a communication from the Counsel to the Corporation, relative to the leasing of the Armory on Broadway, between Forty-fourth and Forty-fifth streets, authorized by a resolution adopted by the Armory Board, March 29, 1887, and by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by a resolution adopted April 20, 1887. You will observe that attention is called to the requirement of chapter 487 of the Laws of 1886, applicable to the leasing of property for the use of the National Guard. I do not see any pertinence in the discussion of Mr. Manice's objections to the transfers of the Armory Board and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as the only question seems to be were the "requirements" of chapter 487, Laws of 1886, complied with, as to the application of the Commandant of the Seventy-first Regiment for the armory to which it has been transferred. The bill of Moran & Armstrong for "Repairs to parapet walls and shooting-boxes on Ninth avenue and Sixty-first street fronts of Twelfth Regiment Armory," \$990, was received, and was referred to General Newton. The meeting then adjourned.



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
