

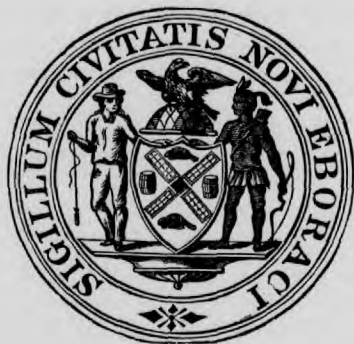

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,  
NEW YORK, October 14, 1879.

The Board of Health met this day.

#### Reports Received.

From the Sanitary Superintendent: On the operations of the Sanitary Bureau; on contagious diseases; on slaughter-houses; on applications for permits; weekly report from Riverside Hospital; on certain street pavements; on operations of the Sanitary Company; on inspection of milk on Steamer "William Cook"; on careless manner of blasting rock corner Seventy-third street and Lexington avenue; on applications for relief; on application for leave of absence; on applications for permits.

#### Resolutions.

Resolved, That in the cases reported by Inspector John S. Berry, of violation of the tenement-house laws, chapter 908 of the Laws of 1867, and chapter 504, Laws of 1879, including those cases wherever the condition of a permit to build tenement-houses have been and are now being violated, the Attorney be instructed to prosecute the owners or builders of such building and to take the necessary steps, by injunction or otherwise, to secure compliance with the tenement-house law.

Resolved, That a copy of the complaint and report on careless manner of blasting rock at the corner of Seventy-third street and Lexington avenue, be forwarded to the Department of Public Works for the necessary action.

Resolved, That the application of Stephen A. Dodge, for extension of order on premises 58 Fourth avenue, to May 1, 1880, be and is hereby granted.

Resolved, That order 11,685, on premises 217 Avenue A, be and is hereby rescinded.

Resolved, That leave of absence for two weeks be and is hereby granted to Assistant Sanitary Inspector H. A. Clay, without pay.

Resolved, That order 7,172, on premises 95 Henry street, be and is hereby suspended for one week.

Resolved, That the plans (No. 282) for light and ventilation of seventeen tenement-houses, proposed to be built, as follows:

Eight on the east side of Lexington avenue, commencing forty feet from the northeast corner of Lexington avenue and Forty-second street;

Six on the south side of Forty-third street, commencing eighty-seven feet east of Lexington avenue; and

One lodging-house on the northeast corner of Lexington avenue and Forty-second street;—submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by Fr. S. Barus, be and—on condition that a space of ten feet clear be left in the rear of the second and upper stories of said lodging-house—the said plans are hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 294) for light and ventilation of the tenement-house proposed to be built at No. 348 West Fifty-second street, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by Bernard Munday, be and is hereby approved, on condition that all inside rooms be lighted and ventilated by windows of twelve square feet area.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 295) for light and ventilation of five tenement-houses, proposed to be built, as follows:

One on the northeast corner of One Hundred and Eighth street and Fourth avenue, and three adjoining on One Hundred and Eighth street; also one on the east side of Fourth avenue, 74 feet north of One Hundred and Eighth street, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by E. M. Meehan, be and—on condition that shafts of not less than two feet wide, and of at least twelve square feet area, with windows of at least twelve square feet area, to light and ventilate all inside bed-rooms—the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the application to record birth returns of Cornelia Minsel, born March 26, 1872, and of Frederick William Minsel, born October 24, 1874, be and is hereby denied.

Resolved, That Alfred B. Taylor, Eugene B. Laird, and James R. Shirley be and are hereby appointed Assistant Sanitary Inspectors, at the rate of \$60 per month, and assigned to duty in the Tenement-house Corps.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 11, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 2,110, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 1,065 tenement-houses, 67 private dwellings, 21 manufacturing and workshops, 11 stores and warehouses, 63 stables, 50 other dwellings, 15 slaughter-houses, 5 lodging-houses, 1 gut cleaning establishment, 1 lard rendering establishment, 1 lime kiln, 1 garbage dump, 2 manure dumps, 11 sunken and vacant lots, 84 yards, courts, and areas, 85 cellars and basements, 113 waste-pipes and drains, 340 privies and water-closets, 48 street gutters and sidewalks, 10 dangerous stairways, 5 smoky chimneys, 1 cesspool, 39 other nuisances, together with 68 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 1,290.

During the past week 151 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 93 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

215 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 51 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 50 houses, 50 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 521 births, 44 still-births, 260 marriages, and 493 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 11, 1879. This shows a decrease of 103 births and 5 deaths, and an increase of 5 still-births and 85 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was an increase of 1 birth, 3 still-births, and 39 marriages, and a decrease of 23 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased, 3; whooping cough, 3; erysipelas, 1; malarial fevers, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 5; phthisis pulmonalis, 23; heart diseases, 5; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 5; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; apoplexy, 7; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; cyanosis and atelectasis, 5; suicide, 2; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 5; croup, 9; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; inanition, 5; alcoholism, 7; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 2; bronchitis, 4; pneumonia, 17; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; convulsions, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 1; premature and preterm births, 2; surgical operations, 1; drowning, 2. The number of deaths from measles, typhoid fever, and puerperal diseases was the same for the past as for the preceding week.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 149 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 187 under two years; 227 under five years, and 27 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 4 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 46.04 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 89 were in institutions, 264 in tenement-houses, 126 in houses containing 3 families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 105 on the first, 138 on the second, 85 on the third, 58 on the fourth, 5 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 492 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 1 non-resident. 53 were stated to be single, 110 married, 58 widowed, and the condition of 272 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 493; still-births, 44; bodies in transitu, 17. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 64 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 521 births, 260 marriages, 44 still-births, 493 deaths, 17 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 30 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 2 transcripts of the birth record, 4 of marriage, and 23 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 11, 1879, was 66.9 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.109, the mean humidity was 73, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 711, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 486 deaths and still-births, or 90.67 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 9; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 215; City, (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 73; Greenwood (undenominational), 38; Lutheran, (undenominational), 78; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 16; Evergreen (undenominational), 15; Woodlawn (undenominational), 13; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 5; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 3; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 6; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 5; Washington (undenominational), 5.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending October 4, 1879, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 8; Second, 1; Third, 6; Fourth, 7; Fifth, 9; Sixth, 4; Seventh, 17; Eighth, 14; Ninth, 26; Tenth, 11; Eleventh, 29; Twelfth, 63; Thirteenth, 7; Fourteenth, 15; Fifteenth, 10; Sixteenth, 18; Seventeenth, 44; Eighteenth, 18; Nineteenth, 81; Twentieth, 34; Twenty-first, 36; Twenty-second, 40; Twenty-third, 5; Twenty-fourth, 9.

The actual mortality for the week ending October 4, 1879, was 512; this is 20 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1878, and 8.4 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.17 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,101,295.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns, of Philadelphia was 13.61; Brooklyn, 18.33; St. Louis, 11.64; Boston, 20.12; New Orleans, 21.04; Charleston, 34.63; Dayton, 12.64; Erie, 13; Lowell, 20.54; Worcester, 17.87; Cambridge, 13.56; Lawrence, 6.83; Lynn, 21.48; Springfield, 13.24. Monthly returns—Chicago, 17.84; Providence, 15.84; Lansing, 10.96; Yonkers, 13.20; Norfolk, 31.30; Wilmington, Del., 34.80; Minneapolis, 14.89; Quincy, Ill., 12.34; Baltimore, 19.41; San Francisco, 12.62. ## BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY\* for the week ending October 11, 1879, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending October 4, 1879.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 493 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 11, 1879, which is a decrease of 5, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 23 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1878.
