

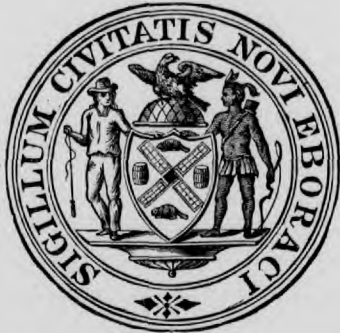

In relation to the votes given in said City, and in the several portions thereof, for Municipal Offices at the General Election held November 7, 1899.
