AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of three hundred and seventy thousand dollars (\$370,000), to provide means for the construction of a stable on the block bounded by Flushing avenue, Graham street, Kent avenue and Little Nassau street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:
Section I. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following preambles and resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment February 19, 1904, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 5, 1903, adopted a resolution, subject to the concurrence of the Board of Aldermen, authorizing the issue of Corporate Stock to an amount not exceeding three hundred and seventy thousand dollars (\$370,000), to provide means for the construction of a stable on the block bounded by Flushing avenue, Graham street, Kent avenue and Little Nassau street, Borough of Brooklyn;

"Whereas, The Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in a communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment dated February 16, 1904, has made requisition for the issue of bonds to the amount of three hundred and seventy thousand dollars (\$370,000), to provide for the construction of a stable on the block bounded by Flushing avenue, Graham street, Kent avenue and Little Nassau street, Borough of Brooklyn, as provided by section 546 of the Greater New York Charter; therefore be it

"Resolved, That, subject to the concurrence herewith by the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of three hundred and seventy thousand dollars (\$370,000), the proceeds whereof to be expended for the purposes aforesaid."

In the Board of Aldermen received February 20, 1904, and

April 2, 1904, the Board of Aldermen having failed to pass upon the proposition within six weeks after the same was received, either by an affirmative vote or by a failure of a majority of all the members of the Board of Aldermen to vote against the same, therefore in accordance with the provisions of section 48 of the amended Greater New York Charter the proposition is deemed to be passed.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or traud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau. deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
