An Ordinance to Amend Subdivision 1 of Section 240 of Article 17 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Vaults and Cisterns."

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: That Section 1, subdivision 1 of section 240 of article 17 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "vaults and cisterns," is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 240. General Provisions: 1. Definitions. Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Whereas, The statute of Horace Greeley will soon be removed from the place it has long occupied in front of the building of the New York Tribune, the newspaper he founded, and by the aid of which he exerted a powerful and beneficent influence throughout this country for many years; and

Whereas, This statute of a great American, than whom there was no greater patriot, and who died full of years spent in aiding the furtherance of a nation for which none bore greater love and in which he occupied a proud and unique position; and

Whereas, This memorial is to be a gift to The City of New York and should have a place in the immediate neighborhood of a locality historically associated with the making of newspapers and which Horace Greeley helped make famous; therefore

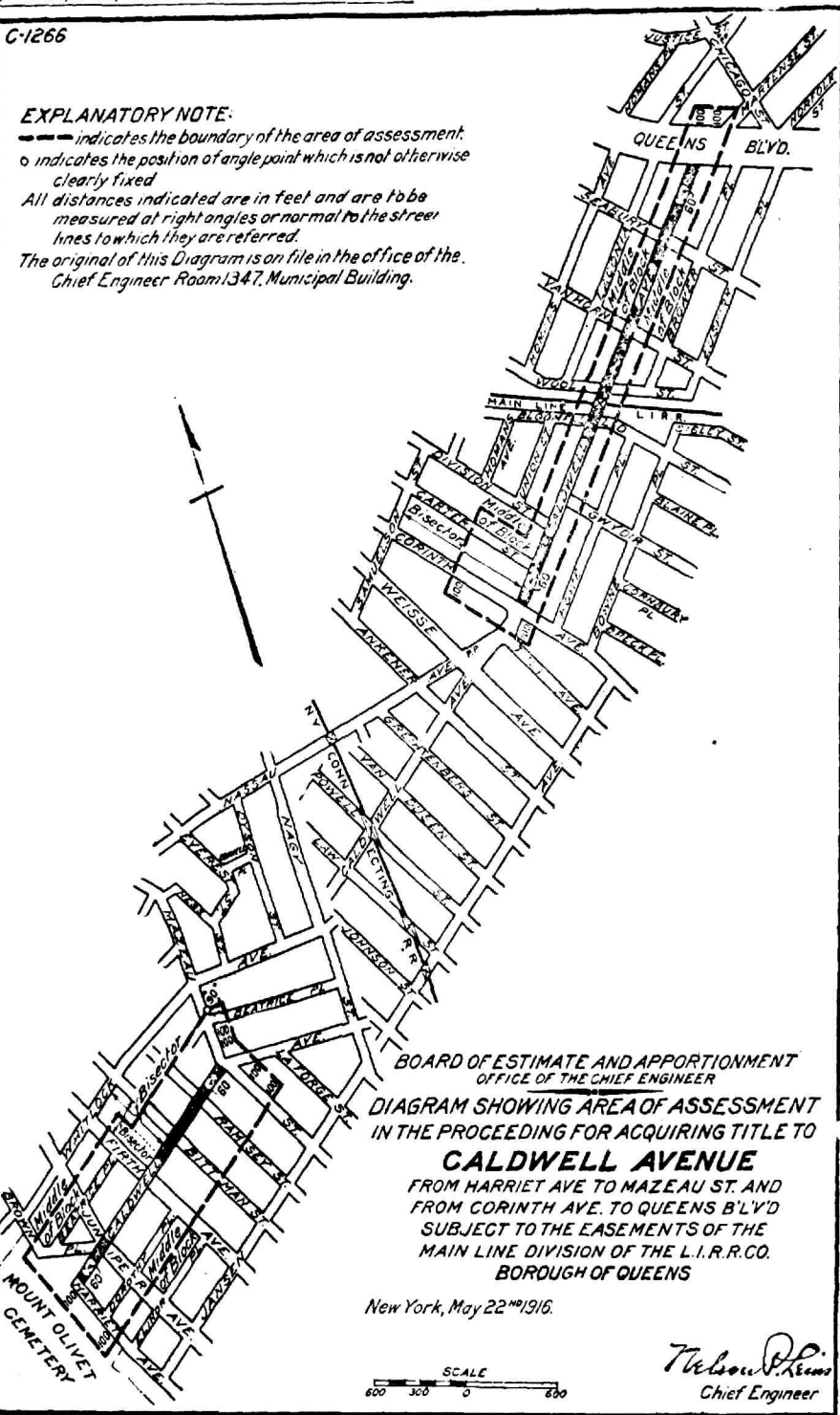

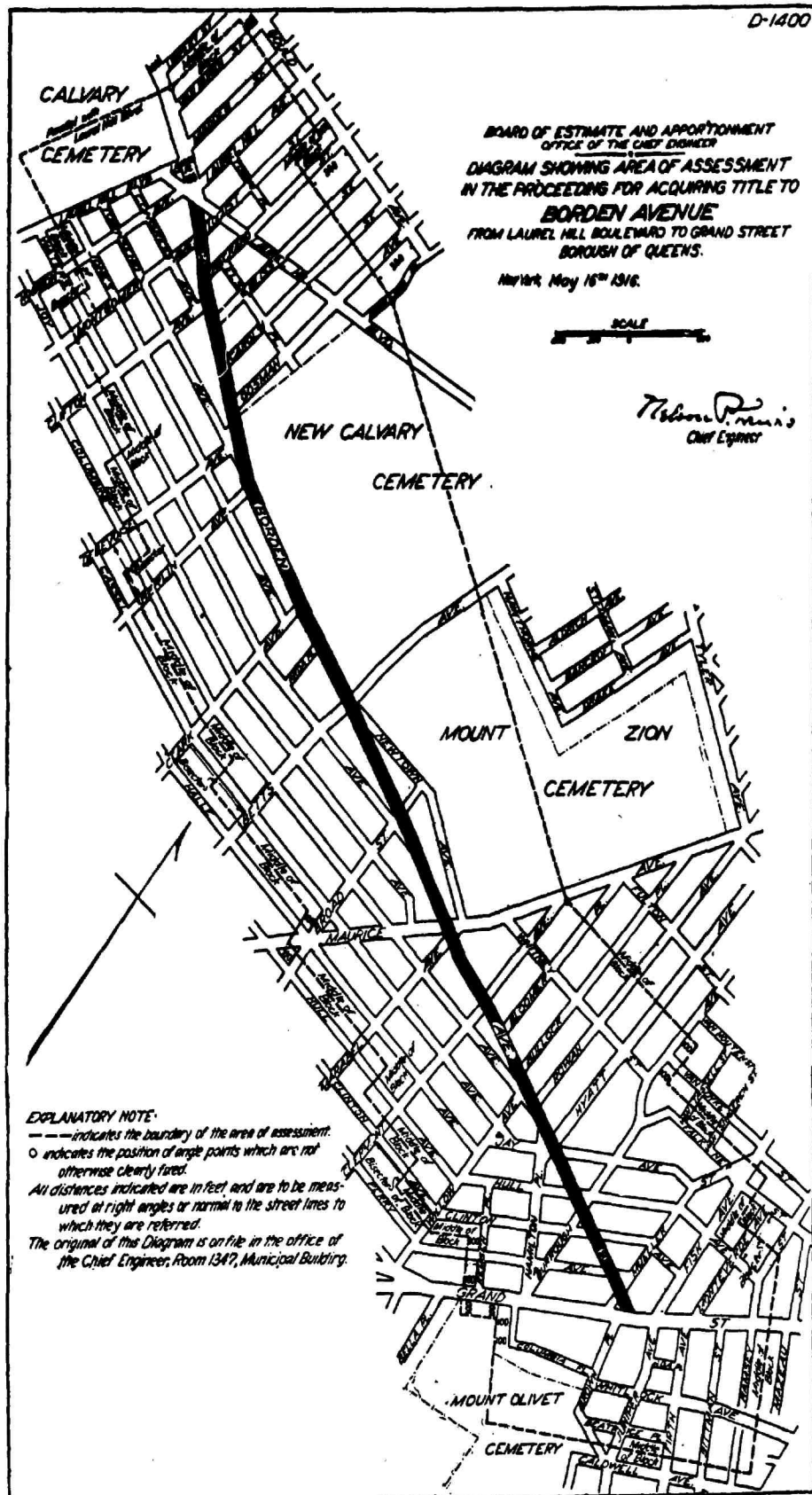

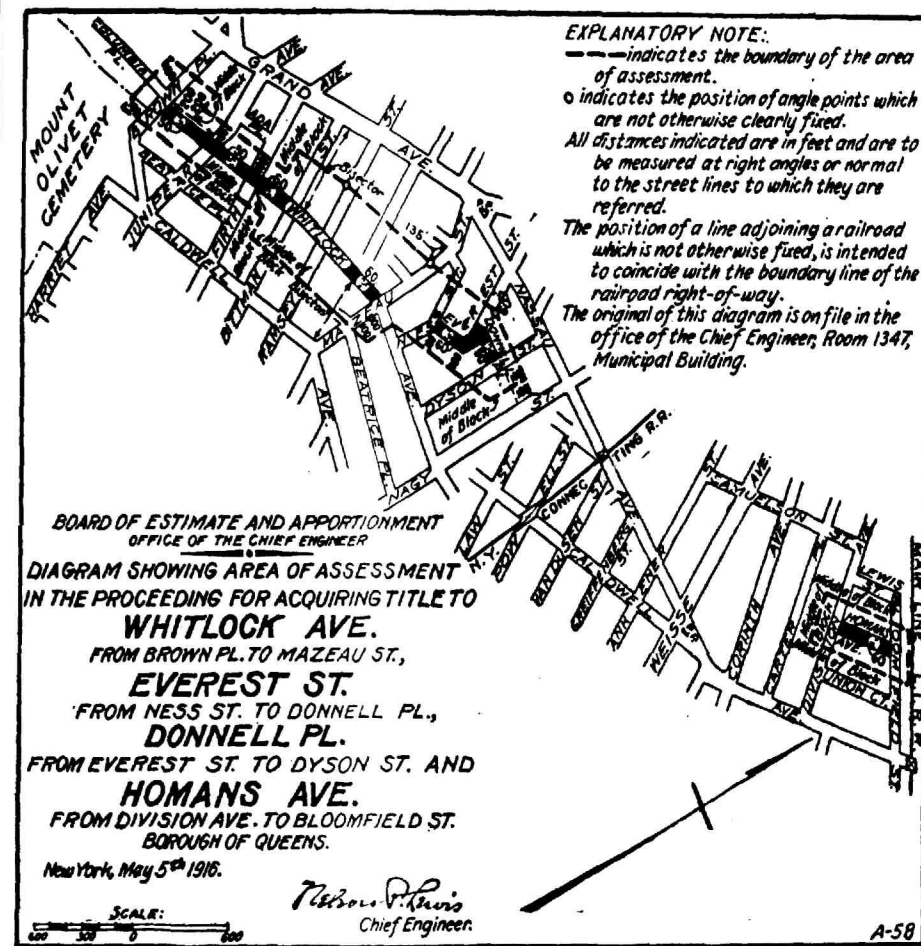

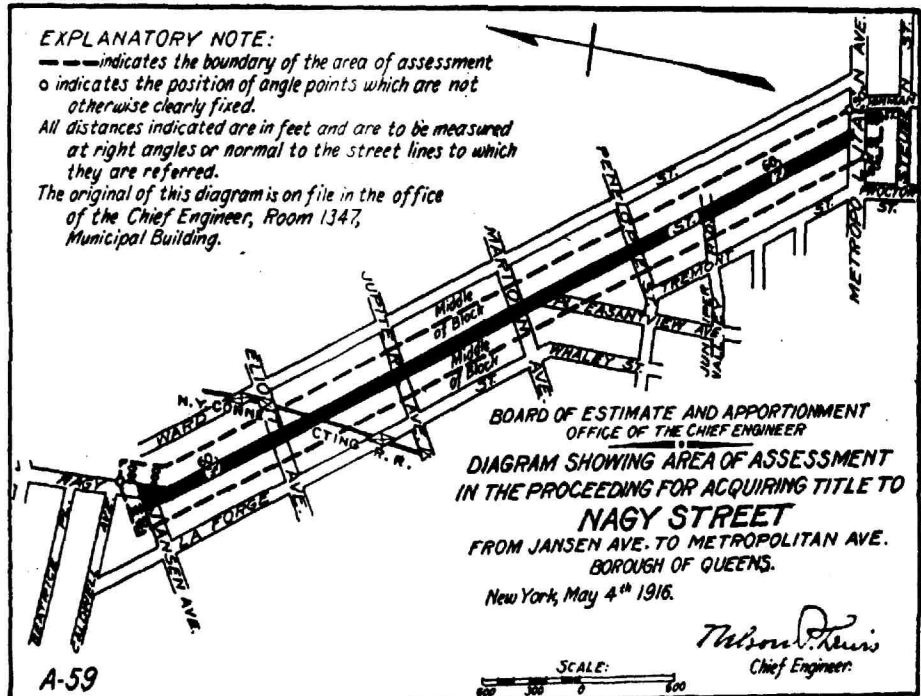

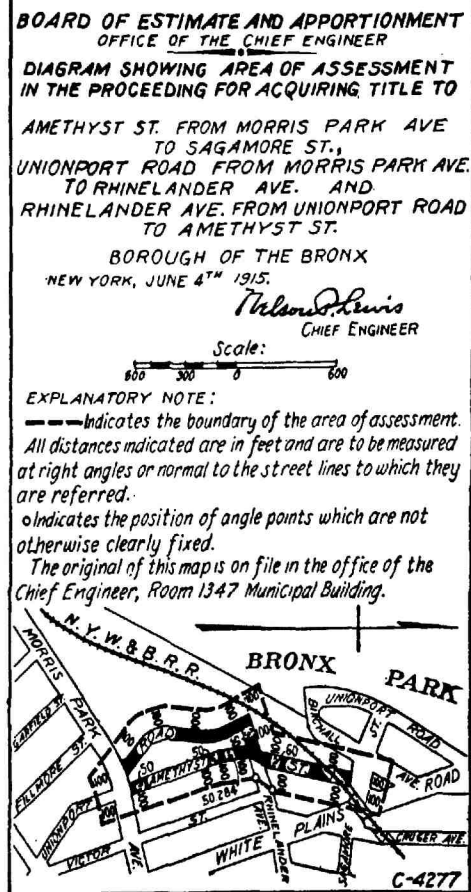
