

SIR-The report of the Board of Assessors for the quarter ending March 31, 1878, is herewith

SIR—The report of the Board of Assessors for the quarter ending stated 35, 177, respectfully submitted.

At the date of the last quarterly report there were 60 assessment lists, aggregating an amount of \$1,718,046.43, in this office, which, with 17 lists received up to March 30th (Schedule A), make a total of 77, amounting to \$1,926,479.42.

Of these, 18 (Schedule B), showing a total of \$552,767.28, were made up and sent to the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments, leaving still in this office 59 lists, amounting to \$1,373,712.14. As 22 of those now on hand were advertised on March 22d, there will be at the expiration of thirty days from that date but 37 lists to be disposed of.

In conclusion, we would state that in the cases of three lists, comprising a portion of what is knows as the "Eastern Boulevard," a reduction to the amount of \$167,455.85 upon a total of \$631,886.67 was recommended by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments, which necessitated a reapportionment of the several amounts.
