DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, June 30, 1892.

Present—President Cram.
" Commissioner Post.
" " Phelan.

The minutes of the meetings held June 16 and 23, were read and approved.

Cyrus Clark appeared, and requested the Board to cause the removal of the street-cleaning dump from the foot of West Seventy-ninth street to some point further south. Senator Plunkitt, on behalf of a number of residents of the west side of the City, appeared in opposition to the transfer of the dump.

On motion, the application of Cyrus Clark was denied.

Charles G. Wilson, Joseph D. Bryant, M. D., William T. Jenkins, M. D., and James J. Martin, Commissioners of the Board of Health, appeared respecting the resolution adopted by said Board, November 27, 1891, requesting the transfer of a strip of land now in the custody of this Department, northerly of Sixteenth street, East river, for the purpose of a reception hospital.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the consent of this Board be and is hereby granted to the Board of Health to use and occupy, in addition to the land now occupied by them thirty-six feet in width northerly of the northerly line of East Sixteenth street and westerly of Avenue D, a strip of land extending thirty-five feet northerly of the above-mentioned strip, to a line seventy-one feet northerly of the northerly line of East Sixteenth street and parallel thereto, from the westerly side of Avenue D to the waters of the East river; provided the consent of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund is obtained to said transfer.

The Commissioners of the Board of Health being present, agreed that in case they obtained permission to inclose a portion of the sidewalk on the northerly side of East Sixteenth street, they would use so much less of the land now occupied by this Board.

The communication from Brown & Fleming, requesting permission to dump cellar dirt at the street-cleaning dump, foot of Canal street, North river, and the report on Secretary's Order No. 11932, as to the application of the Department of Public Charities and Correction for the extension and improvement of the store-house dock at Blackwell's Island were tabled until July 14, 1892.

Report on Secretary's Order No. 12052, on the application of J. F. Schaperkottter for a lease of a ferry between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, North river, was tabled until July 7, 1892.

The communication from the Law Department, submitting a proposition from the Rapp & Johnson Lumber Company for the settlement of the claim against said company for rent of land under water at One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, East river, was taken from the table and, together with the report on Secretary's Order No. 12070, referred to the Treasurer, with power.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, viz.:

From the Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. Transmitting lease for extension of Pier foot of Jane street, North river, with his approval as to the form indorsed thereon. The officers of the Board authorized to execute said lease in the form as approved by the Counsel to the Corporation.

2d. Approving specifications and form of contract for removing the existing Pier at the foot of Thirty-third street, East river, and for building a new wooden pier with appurtenances at the foot of said street, etc.

From Jefferson Hogan—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted the 23d instant for the erection of a shed on Pier, new 59, North river.

From Theodore F. Tone—Protesting against the transfer of the dump of the Department of Street Cleaning from One Hundred and Twenty-ninth to One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, North river.

From the Chapman Derrick and Wrecking Company—Protesting against the use of the derrick "City of New York" for the purpose of unloading the 120-ton Krupp gun intended for exhibition at the Chicago World's Fair.

From the Baker Transfer Company—Offering to supply a horse and cart for Department work at the rate of \$3.50 per day.

From the Hoboken Land and Improvement Company—Stating that it would greatly facilitate the carrying out of the order of March 24, 1892, to permit them to use temporarily a strip on the north side of Pier, new 15, North river. Application denied.

From Dennis J. Trolan—Requesting permission to run a derrick on any of the City's piers. Application denied.

From the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—Requesting permission to repair the bulkhead platform between Piers 25 and 27, North river. Application denied.

From the Cunard Steamship Company—Requesting a lease of Pier, new 40, North river, when extended, together with the bulkhead northerly, and agreeing to cancel the existing leases of said pier and bulkhead. Referred to the Treasurer.

From the Catskill and New York Steamboat Company, with consent of the owner—Requesting permission to paint a sign on the elevator foot of West Eleventh street. Referred to the Treasurer.

From the St. John's Guild—Requesting the placing of two white oak spring piles at the Pier foot of Rutgers Slip, East river. Referred to the Treasurer, with power.

From the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company—Requesting to be informed whether the repairs made by said company to the Pier foot of East Thirty-first street are satisfactory. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report.

From the North and East River Steamboat Company—Requesting the Department to drive four piles at the berth occupied by the steamboat "Shady Side," on the south side of Pier, new 32, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to do said work and report cost for collection.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Henry E. Nesmith—To repair the outer end of Pier 9, East river.

J. Affleck, executor of the estate of George Law—To repair the surface of the Pier foot of Eleventh street, East river.

New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—To repair the bulkheads between Piers "G" and "I," and replace fender-piles between Piers "D" and "E," North river, in accordance with specifications submitted.

Standard Gas-light Company—To drive fender-piles at the bulkhead between One Hundred and Fifteenth and One Hundred and Sixteenth streets, East river.

Union Ferry Company—To drive six or seven piles at the end of Pier 22, East river.

Fulton Market Fish Mongers Association—To drive fender-piles at the east side of Pier 22, East river.

Lawrence, Son & Gerrish—To dredge in front of bulkhead on Water street, East river, from East street to the marble yard.

Knickerbocker Steamboat Company—To cover the shed at Castle Garden with a board and tar paper roof.

The following permits were granted, to continue only during the pleasure of the Board:

Syracuse and Oswego Line—To maintain derrick on the westerly side of Pier, new 6, East river.

Jackson Architectural Iron Works—To use and occupy the bulkhead at the foot of Thirtieth street, East river. Compensation to be fixed by the Treasurer.

From Dock Master Parks:

1st. Reporting that the fender-piles on the northwest corner of the Pier foot of Thirty-third street, North river, require refastening. The lessee directed to repair.

2d. Reporting damage to the Pier foot of Thirty-fourth street, North river, by the steamboat "Henry E. Bishop." The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair and report cost for collection.

From Dock Master Fleming—Reporting damage to the Pier foot of West Fiftieth street, North river, by the tug "G. W. Bride," owned by the Cheney Morse Towing Company. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair and report cost for collection.

From Dock Master Martin—Reporting the sliding out of the bulkhead between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove the old crib-work and fence off the premises.

The recommendation of the Treasurer that the following compensation be charged for permits granted, payable at the end of each month to the Dock Master of the District, was approved.

George V. Brower, Receiver of the Ridgewood Ice Company, ice platform on south side of Pier foot of East Eighth street, \$118.50.

C. V. H. Post—To land the steamer "Henry E. Bishop" at Castle Garden Wharf, \$5 per day.

Peter Hunt—For bath-houses at the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, North river, \$100 per annum.

From the Treasurer:

1st. Report as to the application of Thomas A. Fee, for the privilege of maintaining a lunch and restaurant counter on the pavilions to be erected on certain piers, and stating that it will be time enough to consider the subject when the pavilions are erected and available. Report approved.

2d. Recommending that the bill of Alexander Pollock for repairs to tar-kettle, amounting to \$134.15, be audited at \$115 in full settlement of his claim. Recommendation adopted.

The Treasurer Commissioner Phelan submitted his report of receipts for the week ending June 29, 1892, amounting to \$6,209.21, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes as follows:

From the Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Report for the week ending June 25, 1892.

2d. Reporting the erection of a fence on the westerly line of the marginal street between One Hundred and Eighth and One Hundred and Ninth streets, Harlem river. Notify Morris B. Littman that his fence must not extend beyond high-water mark.

3d. Reporting that the bulkhead-wall foot of East Ninety-fourth street will soon be completed and recommending that he be directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for the building of a new pier at the foot of said street. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Reporting that a portion of the pavement on the new-made land north of the southerly line of Houston street, North river, and running thence in a northerly direction about two hundred and seventy lineal feet, requires to be taken up and relaid, and recommending that the work be ordered. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Reporting repairs required to the Pier at Fifty-second street, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

6th. Amending his report of May 26, 1892, as to the cost of the extension to Pier foot of West Twenty-second street, North river. The Secretary directed to prepare the necessary lease.

7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 10475, as to the area of land under water occupied by ferry structures between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, East river. The Treasurer authorized to collect.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 11996, as to the placing of an electric hoist on Pier, new 15, North river.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 12057 as to repairs required to Pier 9, East river. Owner directed to repair.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 12061, that it is not the intention of J. H. Butcher & Son to repair sewer-pipe opposite No. 77 South street. Permit revoked.

Reports on Secretary's Orders Nos. 11803, 11924, 11952, 11982, 11989 and 12035, that he had erected an awning near the outer end of Pier foot of Thirty-fourth street, North river; repaired the sheathing on deck of Pier, new 32, East river, and the sheathing on deck of Pier 44, East river; repaired the pavement at the approach to the Pier at East Eighteenth street, East river; erected for the Free Swimming Baths at the Pier foot of East Twenty-eighth street, East river, and at the Pier foot of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, North river, platforms at said piers.

Reports on Secretary's Orders Nos. 11222, 11512, 11569, 11703, 11749, 11765, 11892, 11908, 11913, 11916, 11920, 11942, 11944, 11969, 11992, 12013, 12017, 12024, 12034 and 12047, that he had superintended the following work: The erection of a frame building, covered with iron south of foot of Thirteenth street, North river; paving in front of property at Thirteenth Street Ferry, North river; dredging in the half-slip adjoining the easterly side of Pier, old 35, East river; the widening and extension of approach to ferry premises south of East Twenty-third street, East river; the re-sheathing of deck of Pier foot of Fortieth street, North river; the cleaning of Pier at Thirty-fifth street, North river; the repairs to sheathing on deck of approach to Pier, old 41, North river; the paving in front of bulkhead and ferry-house between Little West Twelfth and Thirteenth streets, North river; the widening of the structure for an additional track on the southerly side of the tracks

across Mill Brook where it joins the Kills and within the limits of the New Haven Railroad Company's railroad across said brook; the extending of the south ferry-rack of the Tenth and Twenty-third Street Ferry Company a distance of one hundred and fifty feet on the north side of Twenty-third Street East river, and from ten to fifteen feet from the north side of said pier; the repairs to, Pier at Sixteenth street and at Fortieth street, North river; to Pier 21, East river; the removal of salt-water supply-pipe under Pier foot of Forty-sixth street, East river; dredging the half slip adjoining the easterly side of Pier, old 48, East river; the erection of a shed with a gravel roof on Pier foot of Thirtieth street, North river; the erection of a platform seventy-five feet long, ten feet wide and three feet high, also placing scale with tally-house attached on Pier and bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Nineteenth street, Harlem river; the repairs to Pier foot of Thirty-first street, East river; and the cleaning of the Pier at Horatio street, North river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted, Commissioner Post voting in the negative:

Whereas, Under Section 715 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of the Department of Docks of the City of New York is authorized to acquire by purchase in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, wharf property in said city, and all rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking

Fund, and agree with such owners upon a price for the same, and in case of failure to so agree, to initiate legal proceedings to acquire the same for the improvement of the water-front of said city; and

Whereas, Said Board is desirous of acquiring in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, all riparian and wharfage rights and all interests not now owned by said city in or appurtenant to the following-described premises, to wit: The bulkhead opposite West street, running northerly forty-four feet and seven inches from the northerly line of Battery place, together with all the rights of wharfage, crantage, advantages and emoluments and appurtenances therewith connected; and

Whereas, It appears that the estate of Augustus Hemenway is the owner of the above premises, with all the hereditaments and easements therewith connected, excepting such rights and interests as the Corporation of the City of New York may now have in said premises; and

Whereas, It appears that the Camden and Amboy Railroad and Transportation Company held a lease of aforesaid premises for the term of nine hundred and ninety-nine years, from May 1, 1857, which lease is now held by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company;

Resolved, That this Board offers to purchase the above-described premises, and pay for a good and sufficient title therefor to be approved by the Counsel to the Corporation of the City of New York for said bulkhead as hereinbefore described, the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) per running foot front, along the westerly line of West street, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund as prescribed by law.

Resolved, That a copy of these preambles and resolutions be served upon the aforesaid Pennsylvania Railroad Company, and upon William B. Bacon, Charles P. Hemenway, and Charles J. Morrill, trustees of the estate of Augustus Hemenway, deceased, the owners and lessees of above-described premises, or their legal representatives, and that they be and hereby are requested within ten days from receipt hereof, to notify this Board in writing whether they will sell the rights and interests in above-described premises to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York for the price above mentioned; and in the event that they shall fail to notify this Board of their willingness to so convey the rights and interests as aforesaid, it shall be deemed that no price can be agreed upon for the said premises between the said owners thereof and this Department.

Commissioner Post offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That all directions, permits or licenses issued by this Board to private owners or their representatives, to construct wharves and bulkheads under the "new plan," be and are hereby rescinded; and that said private owners or their representatives be informed in writing of this action of the Board and the cause thereof.

The motion of Commissioner Post to adopt the above resolution was lost by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioner Post.

Negative—President Cram and Commissioner Phelan.

Commissioner Phelan gave notice of his intention to move to set apart as provided by chapter 298, of the Laws of 1892, as one of the piers on the East river water-front to be hereafter used for purposes of public resort and recreation, Pier, new 35, East river.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to repair and strengthen the wharf at Castle Garden.

The Secretary reported that the pay-rolls for the General Repairs and Construction force for the week ending June 24, 1892, amounting to \$11,248.90, had been approved and audited and transmitted to the Finance Department for payment.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

On motion, the Civil Service Board were requested to transmit the eligible list of Clerks, who have passed the examination in copying from manuscript and indexing.

On motion, the Board adjourned until one o'clock P.M. and then proceeded to open the estimates for removing the existing Pier at the foot of East Thirty-third street, East river, and for building a new wooden pier with appurtenances, including a sewer-box at the foot of said street, and for repairing the crib-bulkhead thereat, and for dredging the site of said pier under Contract No. 420, a representative of the Comptroller being present.

The 815 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.28 against 24.67 for the previous week, and 24.94 for the corresponding week of 1891.

The decrease of 48 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 12 in the deaths from measles, of 11 from scarlet fever, of 18 from diseases of the nervous system, of 14 from heart disease, of 12 from bronchitis, of 9 from croup, of 24 from pneumonia and of 10 from Bright's disease, partially offset by an increase of 7 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 40 from diarrhoeal diseases, and of 13 from diseases of the digestive organs.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards, from measles in the Twenty-second and Twenty-third Wards, and from scarlet fever in the Twelfth Ward.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
