The 797 deaths represent a death-rate of 21.83, against 19.40 for the previous week and 18.88 for the corresponding week of 1894.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 226, 234, 109, 32 and 1, against 225, 242, 76, 18 and 0 for the previous week, a total of 602 against 561. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Eleventh and Fifteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Seventeenth and Nineteenth Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Nineteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Twelfth and Twentieth Wards and the decrease in the Twelfth and Eighteenth Wards and the decrease in the Thisteanth and Nineteenth Wards. chiefly in the Ninth, Twelfth and Eighteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Thirteenth and Nine-teenth Wards. Twenty of the 32 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 5 of the remaining 12 were below Fourteenth street. The single case of small-pox was reported from

Sir—In order to aid you in estimating the amount to be provided for in the year 1896 for rents, I desire to lay before you the following statements:

During the latter part of the present year I found that the public business was being seriously impeded owing to the fact that I had not sufficient room for the bureau in this department known as the Bureau of Street Openings, and for the hearing of street-opening proceedings, of which there are about one hundred in active progress.

The Park Department had occupied, until some time in the early summer or spring, offices in the Emigrant Industrial Savings Bank building in Chambers street, under a lease which, as I am informed, expires on the first day of May next.

The Commissioners of the Park Department, deeming that the administration of their department would be served thereby, moved their offices to the Arsenal in Central Park, leaving the rooms in the Savings Bank building vacant. I obtained the consent of the Commissioners of Parks to my use of the rooms formerly occupied by them in the Savings Bank building until the expiration of their lease on May 1, 1896.

It seemed to me to be a wise thing to do, inasmuch as the City was bound by the lease to pay the rent for the premises in any event, and the rooms were convenient and capacious.

It was also agreed with the Department of Public Parks that I would endeavor to arrange that provision should be made for the rent of the premises from the first of January to the first of May, such provision down to the first of January having been made in the appropriations or 1895.

I therefore request you to include in the schedule of rents for which appropriations must be made the rent for the months of January, February, March and April of the rooms referred to, in the Savings Bank building, which are leased to the City at an annual rentle o

That on the 29th day of April, 1892, the New York and College Point Ferry Company was given a lease from New York City for the sum of \$4,500 per year to maintain and operate a ferry between East Ninety-ninth street, New York City and College Point, Long Island, for the term of five years, and as required by the said lease the said rent was paid up to and including the 31st day of October, 1895. That on or about the 1st day of November, 1895, by order of the Dock Department of the City of New York, the ferry company was ordered to surrender and did vacate its slip at East Ninety-ninth street and remove the same temporarily over to East One Hundredth street, pending the improvements to be made by the City. This removal cost the said Ferry company upwards of ten thousand dollars. That the Dock Commissioners, with all these facts before them, fixed a rent for such temporary slip at \$30 per month, and that on or about the 26th day of November, 1895, the said ferry company paid the said rent so fixed to the Dock Department. That under the provisions of the said lease the ferry company claims it is released from the payment of all further rent during the occupancy of its temporary slip. Your attention is respectfully called to the following section of the said lease, page 10, viz.:

"And in case the whole of said wharf property shall be taken, the party of the second part, "its successors and assigns, shall not be required to pay any rent for any time after the said wharf property shall have been surrendered and vacated. But in case only a portion of the said wharf "property shall have been surrendered and vacated. But in case only a portion of the said wharf "property, or only a temporary possession of the whole or a portion of said wharf property shall be required by the said parties of the first part, for the purpose aforesaid, then and in such case "the parties of the first part will make a reasonable deduction f

That in the Police Court-room a proper gate be provided in the railing to the right of the Judges' bench; that suitable hand-rails be provided for the staircase leading from this court-room to the prisoners' pens; that in the examination-room adjoining this court-room suitable iron window guards be provided.

RECORDER'S ROOM. That in the Recorder's Room on the second story of the Criminal Court Building, necessary repairs be made on account of damage done by water and that a new carpet be provided.

ENGINEER'S DEPARTMENT.

That in the cellar, on the Centre street side, suitable plain wooden partitions or screens be provided for the dressing-rooms of the men, that a bath-tub with a plain screen be provided for the use of the men, that iron doors be provided for the openings on Franklin and White streets to

Dear Sir—I have personally made a preliminary examination of a part of the wiring and appliances for the electric lighting of the Criminal Court Building and find that the wiring, cutouts, distribution boxes and other parts relating thereto, where exposed to view, are not in accordance with the rules and regulations of the New York Board of Fire Underwriters and not in compliance with the rules and requirements of the Board of Commissioners of the Fire Department,

New York City.

Inclosed I beg to hand you report of Messrs. Pattison Bros., Electrical Experts, who made an

examination at my request.

I would suggest that you be authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to have the electric-lighting system tested and examined by an expert, for the purpose of ascertaining exactly what the defects and shortcomings are.

Such an examination and tests can be made at an expenditure not exceeding \$350.

With the data thus obtained I can then prepare drawings and specifications for remedying the defects and for the installation of an electric-light plant, for the lighting of the entire building.

DEAR SIR—In accordance with your request, we have made a preliminary examination of the electric-light work at the Criminal Court Building, and we beg to report that there are many things in connection with this work that are not in accordance with the present rules and regulations of the Board of Fire Underwriters and the rules and requirements of the Fire Department.

We give you the following few items as examples:

The tubing on the main risers from the switchboard is not properly joined together, and in

many cases the insulated wires are resting upon iron pipes.

Mouldings and boxings are put in without any paint of any description, and a number without

Tubes are in many places fastened to or resting upon the pipes of the gas, water or heating

The wires, where they are brought into the switchboard, are not properly protected. Fuses in various parts of the building are blown, showing that trouble does or has existed on

The wires at some outlets are left with the ends untaped.

The existence of these defects renders it necessary to test the entire system, and remedy all the existing faults, bringing the system up to the present requirements before the current can be turned on to the various parts of the building.

the office of the District Attorney.

Seventh—Milk from which any part of the cream has been removed.

Eighth—Milk which has been adulterated with water or any other fluid, or to which has been added or into which has been introduced any foreign substance whatever.

Fifth—Milk drawn from animals fed on distillery waste, or any substance in a state of fermentation or putrefaction, or on any unhealthy food.

Firth—Milk drawn from animals led on distincty waste, or any substance in a state of fermentation or putrefaction, or on any unhealthy food.

Sixth—Milk drawn from cows kept in a crowded or unhealthy condition.

Seventh—Milk from which any part of the cream has been removed.

Eighth—Milk which has been adulterated with water or any other fluid, or to which has

been added or into which has been introduced any foreign substance whatever.

Whenever any owner, lessee, tenant, or occupant or person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the City of New York shall fall to comply with the provisions of any ordinance of the said city for the removal of snow and ice from the sidewalk or gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which the said building or lot fronts, the Commissioner of Public Works of the said city shall cause such removal to be made, and thereupon the expense of such removal as to each particular lot of ground shall be ascertained and certified by the said City, who shall pay the same in the same manner as the expense of removal as to each particular lot of ground shall be accertained and certified by the said Commissioner of Public Works to the Comptroller of the said city, who shall pay the same in the same manner as the expense of removing snow from the streets of the city is paid; and immediately after the making of the payment of such expense as so certified to him, the said Comptroller shall make and deliver a certificate thereof to the Board of Aldermen of the said city, and the said amounts so certified shall, by the said Board of Aldermen, annually be added to and made to form a part of the annual taxes of the next ensuing fiscal year against the lots against which the said amounts shall be so certified respectively, and the same shall be collected in and with and as part of the annual taxes for such fiscal year, for or during which the same shall be collected in and with and as part of the annual taxes for such fiscal year, for or during which the same shall be only the streets or avenues any snow or ice which may be removed from the sidewalk or gutter fording the streets or avenues any snow or ice which may be removed from the sidewa

Section 4. This act shall take effect on the first day of November, eighteen hundred and ninety-five."

The City Ordinance to which the above statute applies reads as follows:

"Section 669. Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant crperson having charge of any building or lot of ground in the city of New York shall, within eight hours after the fall of any snow, and within eight hours after the fall of any snow, and within eight hours after the forming of any ice on the sidewalk or in the gutter in front of any such building or lot, remove, or cause the same to be removed, from such sidewalk or gutter, under the penalty of three dollars for every such neglect, to be paid by the said owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or person having charge severally and respectively; but where said snow falls or ice forms between the hours of eight o'clock in the evening and five o'clock in the morning, this ordinance will be complied with by removing, or causing the same to be removed, before nine o'clock of the morning succeeding its fall or formation."

# REPORTS OF THE BUREAUS AND OTHER SUBDIVISIONS OF THE LAW DEPARTMENT.

Bureau of Street Openings.

LAW DEPARTMENT, BUREAU OF STREET OPENINGS, No. 51 CHAMBERS STREET, NEW YORK, October 21, 1895. Hon. Francis M. Scott, Counsel to the Corporation:

SIR—We submit herewith the report of the operations of the Bureau of Street Openings for the third quarter, ending September 30, 1895, showing the status of each street opening proceeding as follows:

Proceedings in which Commissioners have not yet been Appointed.

Other Proceedings not above Classified.

We wish to particularly call your attention to the length of time required in the preparation of the necessary maps. There are 151 proceedings waiting for rule maps, 11 waiting for draft damage and benefit maps, and 12 waiting for final maps.

Of the rule maps not yet received three were requested in 1891, six in 1892, thirty-three in 1893, forty-two in 1894 and fifty-six between January 1 and July 1, 1895.

Of the eleven proceedings waiting for draft damage and benefit maps request was made nine months ago in one, six and a half months ago in two and nearly three months ago in two others; in the twelve proceedings waiting for final maps request was made nearly five months ago in two and two months ago in three others.

Taking the proceedings in Schedule B, subdivisions 2, 3 and 4, draft damage and benefit maps have been received in about fifty-eight, and the average time required after request was also about eighty days.

Section 956 of the Consolidation Act, as amended in 1893, and again in 1895, gives the Board of Street Opening and Improvement the power to direct that the title to the lands to be condemned for street purposes shall vest in the City, in cases where there are no buildings, upon the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners and, in cases where there are no buildings, upon the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners and, in cases where there are buildings, upon the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of time must be obtained from the Supreme Court, and this act evidently contemplates that the proceedings shall terminate within six months from the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners.

Of course it is impossible to complete the proceedings within six months when on the average we have to wait more than five months for maps. The consequence is that great hardship results to the owners of improved property when their property is advertised for sale after the vesting of titl

venture to suggest that provision for a larger force of engineers should be made in the appropriations for the coming year.

We also wish to call your attention to the unequal valuation of property in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards upon the tax books of the City. It is frequently the case that the testimony given by experts on behalf of the owners of property, part of which is to be taken, makes it appear that land is valued on the tax books of the City at not more than one-fourth of its true value, and sometimes even less. As section o81 of the Consolidation Act limits Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in levying their assessments to one half of the tax valuation of the property assessed, it often follows that the City must pay a part of the awards in cases where they should be assessed entirely upon the property benefited, or the area of assessment has to be very much enlarged, thus burdening unduly property but slightly benefited, and allowing the property most benefited to escape its fair share of the assessment. When the tax valuation on unimproved property is within sixty per cent. of the market value we do not usually meet with any difficulty in laying assessments for benefit.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Each street surface, or other railroad company operating or running passenger-cars on the surface of any street, avenue or thoroughfare in the City of New York shall, between the first day of October and the first day of April in each year, properly heat and keep heated at least every second car on its line or lines, whenever the temperature upon the street shall fall below forty degrees

Sec. 2. A failure to so heat and keep heated each second or alternate car, where the thermometer shall record a temperature below forty degrees Fahrenheit, shall subject the company or companies so violating the provisions of section I to a penalty of twenty-five dollars (\$25) fine for

each and every failure so to do.

Sec. 3. There shall be conspicuously displayed on both sides of each heated car,

Sec. 3. There shall be conspicuously displayed on both sides of each neated car, when all the cars of a line are not heated, a placard or sign, containing the words "Heated Car," in large type.

Sec. 4. The above sections shall apply only to cars running a distance of three miles or more.

Sec. 5. All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 6. This ordinance shall take effect six weeks after the date of its approval by his Honor the Mayor.
