Gates & Company, stating that a claim has been made by the Mott Haven Company for possession of the land under water on the easterly side of the Harlem river at the foot of One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to what action this Board should take in the matter.

Reeder, offering to sell to the City the bulkhead extending from a point 75 feet easterly of the easterly side of Pier, old 54, East river, near the foot of Jackson street, easterly a distance of 23 feet, for the sum of \$80 per running foot, was referred to the Department of Parks, the bulkhead in question adjoining the park thereat.

The communication from the Central Hudson Steamboat Company, complaining of the obstruction of the slip between Piers 23 and 24, North river, by floats, was referred to the Dock Superintendent to examine and report.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Old Dominion Steamship Company, to place an asphalt pavement over the driveway under the shed in front of Pier, new 26, North river.

Terry & Tench Construction Company, to construct a temporary dock between Third and Lexington avenues, on the south side of the Harlem river, in accordance with plans to be hereafter approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

Morse Iron Works & Dry Dock Company, to construct a boat landing, 20 by 25 feet, on the south side of the Pier foot of Fifty-eighth street, Brooklyn.

2d. Requesting information in relation to the leasing of Pier, new 31, East river, to the Old Colony Steamboat Company, and the granting of permission for the erection of a shed on said pier. Action of the Secretary in furnishing the information approved.

From the Department of Health—Requesting that a berth be set aside for the use of the steamboat used by said Department to convey patients from the Borough of Brooklyn to the Riverside Hospital.

On motion, permission was granted the Department of Health to land said steamer at the foot of Noble street, Borough of Brooklyn, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Board.

From the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies—Requesting permission to berth public baths at the piers foot of West Thirty-fifth and East Eighth streets. Together with report of Engineer-in-Chief, stating that it will not be necessary to transfer the Hazelwood Ice Company from the Pier foot of East Fifth street to the pier foot of East Eighth street, as said company can be accommodated on the north side of the former pier.

3d. Stating that they will vacate the westerly half of Pier, old 15, East river, on June 1, 1901.
