COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11.30 o'clock a. m. on Thursday, February 13, 1902.

Present at roll call—Seth Low, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Elgin R. L. Gould, Chamberlain, and Herbert Parsons, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The reading of the minutes was dispensed with.

A copy of the record upon the application of the Fulton Market Fishmongers' Association, heretofore made for a renewal of the lease of the wholesale Fulton Fish Market, was received from Mr. Abel Crook, the attorney for said Association, with a request that the matter initiated during the past year be continued and completed by the present Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. (See Minutes 1901, pages 479, 516.)

Referred to the Comptroller.

The Comptroller presented the following:

GENTLEMEN—I beg to submit herewith a preliminary report of Expert Accountants in connection with the administration of the affairs of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and recommend the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Pursuant to your instructions under date of January 6, 1902, I have under way an examination into the methods and practices followed in the procurement of supplies and the performance of work in the Department of Docks and Ferries previous to January 1, 1902.

At the outset of said examination I find a condition existing which would appear to call for your immediate attention in connection with the disbursement of public moneys, namely, that there are now outstanding orders of the former Treasurer of the Dock Commission to the estimated amount of \$430,200.69 for the purchase of supplies and the performance of work authorized by the former Commissioners of Docks and Ferries, where the work has not yet been completed and the supplies either wholly or partially undelivered, not a dollar of which is represented by a contract let after public advertisement.

Under opinions of the Corporation Counsel rendered between January 1, 1898, and previous to December 31, 1901, the Department of Finance was instructed in substance that the Dock Commission, under the Greater New York Charter, in the purchase of supplies, or the performance of construction and repair work on or about the docks of the city, was relieved from the restrictions of section 419 of said charter, requiring that all work or supplies costing over one thousand dollars should be subject to contract let after public advertisement, and that, on the contrary, under section 821 of said charter, said Commission, by a unanimous vote, could legally purchase supplies or authorize work at a cost only limited by the ample financial resources at the command of the Dock Department, without either private or public competition.

It appears that the Dock Commission, throughout at least the last four years and apparently for many years previously, freely exercised its authority to order large amounts of work or enormous quantities of supplies, without the formality of contract after advertisement. A cursory examination shows that hundreds of thousands of dollars of these so-called Treasurer's orders were issued annually and that orders for especially large amounts were issued during the year 1901, with the result, as previously noted, of leaving behind nearly half a million dollars of the same to be disposed of by the present administration. Schedule A attached to this report contains a list of the Treasurer's orders outstanding and for which no bills had been presented to the Dock Department on January 31, 1902, said list having been furnished to a representative of the Department of Finance by the Chief Clerk of the Department of Docks and Ferries on February 10, 1902.

Said Schedule A includes in its total of \$418,050 the trifling amount of \$1,665, of orders issued since the first of January by the present Commission.

In addition there are claims which were authorized by the Dock Commission previous to January 1, 1902, but which have not as yet been audited by the Department of Finance to the amount of \$13,815.69. The said latter amount and the items included in Schedule A, less orders authorized since January 1, 1902, make up the total stated in the second paragraph of this report.

While these said Treasurer's orders, as issued by the former Dock Commission, have not the form of a contract, it would seem that work has been done upon them as if such was the case. The work of the Morris & Cumings Dredging Company may be taken as an example.

The records of the Department of Finance show that the Morris & Cumings Dredging Company was paid for dredging during 1901, on Treasurer's orders, \$233,941.30, and that an additional claim of \$15,274.83 is awaiting payment in this Department, as per Schedule B attached to this report. Besides this the amount of \$13,815.69 in claims above referred to as awaiting audit, also is for work done by this concern.

Of the \$418,050 estimated cost of work previously referred to and included in Schedule A, \$243,575 is upon Treasurer's orders for dredging work to be done by the Morris & Cumings Dredging Company, or about a year's work at the rate of payment made last year.

It appears (see Schedule A) that there is work yet to be done on three Treasurer's orders, numbered respectively 20,863, 20,894 and 21,146, to the estimated amount of \$143,500 for dredging. The Morris & Cumings Dredging Co. during 1901 did a considerable amount of work on each one of these, to such an extent, in fact, that there were four so-called "partial payments" on order 20,894 and three so-called "partial payments" on 20,863 and 21,146, respectively. The status of work on these orders is shown in the following:

I am informed that the Morris & Cumings Dredging Co. is proceeding with the work under these orders and that the Department of Finance will, from time to time, be called upon to audit and pay bills for the same.

In view of the fact that the issuing of such Treasurer's orders for amounts in excess of \$1,000 appears to be prohibited, under the provisions of the Greater New York Charter as amended by chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, and in view of the fact that said Treasurer's orders, issued previous to January 1, 1902, may not have the character and effect of contracts under the provisions of the amended Charter, I would respectfully suggest that the facts in connection with the same be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his advice.

SIR—R. ROSS APPLETON, Secretary Brooklyn Public Library, in his communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, dated January 22, 1902, states: "At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Brooklyn Public Library held Tuesday, January 21, it was unanimously voted to request the Sinking Fund Commission to make a two years' lease of the first floor of the building Nos. 1217-1221 Bedford avenue, known as Avon Hall, for additional quarters for the Bedford Branch at a rental of eighteen hundred dollars (\$1,800) per annum, the lease to be dated from 1902.

"Name of owner, Kate Anderson."

Further conditions and restrictions are also given in the communication. In reply, I beg to state that on June 27, 1901, I reported to the then Comptroller on a similar application for a lease of these same premises, which report is inclosed and is now made a part of this.

I am informed that objection was made to this lease, and in consequence no action was taken at the time by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. Should a lease be made at the present time, I would suggest that in view of the fact that certain alterations are to be made by the owner prior to the commencement of the lease, same should date from the time when such alterations are completed, and not from any fixed date.

SIR—FRANK P. HILL, Secretary of the Brooklyn Public Library, in a communication under date of June 19, 1901, states in part as follows:

"The Committee on Sites and Buildings of the Brooklyn Public Library, to whom had been referred by the Board of Directors of that Library, with power, the question of acquiring suitable quarters for the circulating department of the Bedford Branch, held a meeting June 18, 1901, when the following action was taken:

"Resolved, That the Sinking Fund Commissioners be requested to approve a three years' lease of the first floor of the building known as Avon Hall, Nos. 1217-19-21 Bedford avenue, for the circulating department of the Bedford Branch of the Brooklyn Public Library, at a rental of \$1,800 per annum, including heat and janitor service, the lease to date from August 1, 1901.

"Alterations and repairs to be made by owner prior to commencement of lease. Owner is to lay felt on top of the present floor and a 7/8 inch wood floor on top of that, so as to effectually deaden the sound from the bowling alleys.

"Repairs during term of lease to be made by lessee; heating and janitor paid by owner on a basis of seven months' use, October 1 to May 1; if under seven months deduction will be made in proportion; lighting paid by lessee.

"This change is made in the interests of the public residing in the Bedford District; it is made not to curtail, but to increase the privileges and facilities afforded to readers. The present quarters, No. 26 Brevoort place, are not large enough to accommodate the circulating and the administrative departments, and the committee, after looking around the neighborhood very carefully, have selected the place named above for the following reasons:

"1. The lease of the present Bedford Branch, No. 26 Brevoort place, does not allow any tearing down of partitions, and, as there is not room enough in that one building, an addition would have to be put up at a large cost;

"2. The rent is fair and reasonable;

"3. The majority of users of the library come from the north side of Fulton street;

"4. The library is brought nearer the pupils of school No. 3;

"5. Being on a thoroughfare without trolley or elevated cars, the library advertises itself by its very publicity, at the same time giving satisfactory accommodation to readers;

"6. The change would enable the Board of Directors to place the whole Brooklyn Public Library on a business and systematic basis;

"7. The Committee desires the Sinking Fund Commission to be assured that this change is made only in the interests of the public, and for the more satisfactory management of the public library.

"Appended are further reasons for the additional room, which I am directed by the Committee on Sites and Buildings to forward for your consideration."

The premises proposed to be leased consist of the first floor of a brick building, on the east side of Bedford avenue, near the corner of Halsey street, known as Avon Hall, Nos. 1217-19-21 Bedford avenue.

The floor space amounts to about 4,176 square feet, which, at the rental asked, will give a rate of 43 cents per square foot.

The lot on which the building stands is 60 feet by 82 feet, slightly irregular in shape, and is assessed at \$24,000 on the tax books of the Twenty-third Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, for the year 1901.

On the second floor of the building is a large hall, suitable for assemblies and general amusement purposes. The basement is fitted up with bowling alleys, which are rented to private clubs.

The proposed change, contemplated by the Brooklyn Public Library, of the circulating department from No. 26 Brevoort place to the quarters at Nos. 1217-19-21 Bedford avenue, seems to have been very carefully considered by the Board of Directors of the Library. It has submitted in detail the reasons and facts which have led it to decide upon such change, a copy thereof being hereto appended.

In a communication to his Honor the Mayor, under date of June 4, 1901, one Anson C. Baker enters a protest against the proposed removal.

I am informed that on June 7, 1901, Mr. David A. Boody, President of the Board of Directors of the Library, replied thereto.

I am of the opinion that the terms proposed are reasonable and fair and that the lease may receive the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the city from Kate Anderson, of the first floor of the building known as Avon Hall, Nos. 1217-1219-1221 Bedford avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the Bedford Branch of the Brooklyn Public Library, for a term of two years from the date when alterations to be made by the owner are completed, at an annual rental of eighteen hundred dollars (\$1,800), payable quarterly, the rent to include heat and janitor's services, for a period of seven months in each year, from October 1 to May 1; if under seven months, deduction to be made in proportion; the owner to make such alterations and repairs as are required to fit the same for library purposes prior to the commencement of the lease, and to lay felt on the top of the present floor and a 7/8-inch wood floor on top of that; also to change the toilet room and paint and paper the same; dancing in the hall overhead to be permitted only from September 1 to May 1, on each Monday and Wednesday, from 7.30 to 10.30 p. m., and on each Saturday from 3 to 5 p. m. and 7.30 to 11.30 p. m. and on all holidays; bowling in the basement to be permitted only from 8 to 12 p. m. and on all holidays; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the city that such lease be made, the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

Mr. Snow, Chairman of the Administration Committee of the Brooklyn Public Library, appeared before the Board and was heard at length in regard to the necessity and advisability of leasing these premises.

The report was then accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report relative to the application of Dean Sage and others (see page 38):

February 11, 1902.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—In the matter of the application of Dean Sage and others for an adjustment of boundaries of the city, I have received a specific proposition that the applicants deed to the city all their right in the lands lying between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets east of the line 100 feet from the westerly side of the marginal street, and that the city release all the lands west of said line. Upon this I have asked the engineers to report, specifically, the number of square feet which each side to the controversy would get and the value of each.

Meanwhile, I suggest that the Law Department be requested to advise this Board as to what the rights of the applicants are in these lands, especially in view of the Speedway decision recently rendered, and upon your instructions to that effect, will frame a request.
