DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION.

REPORT OF TRANSACTIONS, AUGUST 28 TO SEPTEMBER 3, 1905.

Communications Received.

From the Finance Department—Receipt for security deposits accompanying proposals for kitchen utensils, rudder stock for steamboat, and for miscellaneous supplies, opened August 29, 1905. On file.

From the Finance Department—Deputy Comptroller Phillips asks for plans and specifications under which P. J. Carlin & Co. have erected extension to female prison at City Prison, and for which voucher for \$2,465 has been filed in the Finance Department. Also for specifications for kalamined door at same prison, and for wooden doors for which former were substituted, as per voucher for \$103. Plans and specifications forwarded to Finance Department.

From the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Stating that arrangements have been made with the Consolidated Gas Company for the lighting of highways on Blackwell's Island, the expense of lighting to be borne by that Department. The co-operation of the Department of Correction is asked, and the assignment of men of sufficient intelligence to be trained to care for the lamps requested. Wardens Fallon and Fox each to assign a man to care for lamps on grounds around their respective institutions.

From Heads of Institutions—Reporting that meats, fish, bread, milk, etc., for week ending August 26, 1905, agreed with specifications. On file.

From Steamboats—Department Inspector reports that two prisoners escaped from the steamer "Massasoit," while making the trip from Blackwell's to Hart's Island, on August 28, 1905. The men jumped overboard, but were recaptured by the crew of the steamer, assisted by the tug "Portchester," which was passing at the time.

Inspector suggests certain changes in the steamer, which would make it less easy for prisoners to escape, and would improve present conditions. On file.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
