**Amendments to Sanitary Code.**

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held June 28, 1917, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Section 88 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 88. Duty of Superintendents of Hospitals and Dispensaries, and of Physicians, to Report Cases of Venereal Diseases. It shall be the duty of the manager, superintendent, or person in charge of any correctional institution and of every public or private hospital, dispensary, clinic, asylum or charitable institution in the City of New York to report promptly to the Department of Health the name or initials, together with the sex, age, marital state, and address, of every occupant or inmate thereof or person treated therein, affected with syphilis or gonorrhoea; and it shall also be the duty of every physician in the said City to promptly make a similar report to the Department of Health relative to any person found by such physician to be affected with syphilis or gonorrhoea. All reports made in accordance with the provisions of this section, and all records of clinical or laboratory examinations indicating the presence of syphilis or gonorrhoea, shall be regarded as confidential, and shall not be open to inspection by the public or by any person other than the official custodian of such reports or records in the Department of Health, the Commissioner of Health, and such other persons as may be authorized by law to inspect such reports or records, nor shall the custodian of any such report or record, the said Commissioner of Health, or any such other person divulge any part of any such report or record so as to disclose the identity of the person to whom it relates.
