REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COM-MISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1880, SECTIONS 350, 381, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Law 1850, Sections 350, Law 1850, and as amended by chapter the commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellags, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be sale from time to time, and extend its other descriptions of buildings and extend its other descriptions of buildings and extend its other descriptions of buildings and

deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lieu upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arroars to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforeaid, shall become a charge and lieu upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be m de against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be flaced as provided in this act. In all such cause that would not account to the state of the works is hereby authorised to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, fractively to the presention of the words of the control.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health of the consent of all the citizens, and this obtained by a complete by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

If the properties of the control of water responsible for the amount of water used or wasted is all further applications for reduction of water reres, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their remises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is compiled with no deductions in unless this requirement is compiled with no deductions in the water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
