DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At an executive meeting of the Board of Docks held December 9, 1887.

Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews and Marshall.

The minutes of the meeting held December 8, 1887, were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Counsel to the Corporation—Enclosing copy of opinion sent to the Comptroller on August 16, 1887, relating to the subject of the proposed improvement of the Harlem river at One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street. The Secretary directed to have the same recorded in the Book of Opinions.

From Sarah McGarigal—Requesting permission to erect and maintain derrick masts at the foot of East Seventy-sixth, Seventy-ninth and Eighty-sixth streets, East river, for unloading coal. Referred to Dock Master, George A. Dearborn, to examine and report.

From Charles B. Husted, Dock Master—In reference to the application of the Knickerbocker Ice Company for permission to retain engine-house and shed on the bulkhead at West Twentieth street, North river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Charles H. Pendergast, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting that dredging is required in front of the bulkhead between Piers 47 and 48, at Pier 47, East river, and in front of the bulkhead between Piers 61 and 62, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

2d. Reporting that Piers 46 and 48, East river, require cleaning. The action of the President in requesting the Department of Street Cleaning to clean was approved.

From Civil Service Supervisory and Examining Boards—Requesting the number of Laborers in the service of the Department on November 30, 1887, not classified under Civil Service Rules and the number of persons appointed during the year ending November 30, 1887, after Civil Service examination, and discharged during or at the end of their probationary period. The action of the President in furnishing the desired information was approved.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Respecting possession of wharf property at West Twenty-seventh street, North river. Referred to Commissioner Marshall.

2d. Reporting repairs required to Piers 9 and 54, East river. The action of the President in notifying the alleged owner or owners of Pier 9, East river, to repair under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, and directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair Pier 54, East river, as recommended in his report, at a cost of about \$50, was approved.

3d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6502, in reference to superintending and directing the repairing of bulkhead north of Pier, old 34, North river, by S. Charles Welsh, alleged owner.

4th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7226, repairs required to the pavement in front of bulkhead, between Piers, old 18 and 19, North river. The action of the President in directing the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company, lessees, to repair under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.

5th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7227, repairs required to the sheathing on upper side of Pier, old 23, North river. The action of the President in directing Buck & Steljes, lessees, to do the said work, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, was approved.

Commissioner Matthews, to whom was referred with power, the claim of the propeller "C. A. Dickey" for assistance rendered to the tug "Manhattan," reported that he had settled the same for \$2.

On motion, his action was approved.

The following resolution was,

On motion, adopted:

Resolved, That Van Tassel & Kearney, auctioneers, on behalf of this Board, be and hereby are authorized and directed to offer for sale at public auction at East Seventeenth Street Yard, East river, at the basin foot of West Thirtieth street, North river, and at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard, North river, on Wednesday, December 21, 1887, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon of that day, certain old material as recommended by the Engineer-in-Chief.

On motion, ordered to be placed on file and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the substitution of John Gillies and Joseph Cummings in place of William Gaskell and William P. Greenlie to the estimate of Duncan A. Gillies for building a crib-bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, North river, and for dredging thereat under Contract No. 260.

A communication from Hon. Abram S. Hewitt, Mayor, enclosing copies of resolutions adopted by the Board of Aldermen, for the regulating, grading, etc., of Fifty-sixth street, from Eleventh avenue to the bulkhead-line on the North river; Forty-first street, from First avenue to bulkhead-line on the East river, and for changing the grade of Eighty-third and Eighty-fourth streets, from Avenue B to the East river, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file and referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The application of the Inland and Seaboard Coasting Company for tally-house on Pier, new 32, East river, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file and permit granted the said tally-house to be and remain during the will of the Board.

Dock Master George A. Dearborn having reported favorably on the application of Sarah McGarigal for permission to locate derricks for hoisting coal at the foot of Seventy-sixth, Seventy-ninth and Eighty-sixth streets, East river,

On motion, permit was granted, the said derricks to be and remain during the will of the Board.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to fence off the dangerous portion of Pier foot of Eighth street, East river, and place fender-piles on the southerly side of Pier, new 57, North river, for the accommodation of vessels berthed thereat.

A communication was received from the Engineer-in-Chief in relation to Treasurer's Order No. 12309, for timber, which was read, and,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the time for the delivery of the timber under Treasurer's Order No. 12309, dated 28th April, 1887, and issued to the Hilton Timber and Lumber Company, be extended to the 5th day of September, 1887, and that the order be canceled and withdrawn for all the timber that is undelivered and unaccepted at that date.

A communication was received from the Engineer-in-Chief in relation to Treasurer's Order No. 12409, for timber, which was read, and,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the time for the delivery of the timber under Treasurer's Order No. 12409, dated 9th July, 1887, and issued to Mr. Dexter Hunter, be extended to the 23d November, 1887, and that the order be canceled and withdrawn for all timber that is undelivered and unaccepted at that date.

The following preambles and resolutions were,

On motion, adopted:

Whereas, The Manhattan Railway Company, by letter of R. M. Galloway, Vice-President of said Company, dated 6th September, 1887, has requested this Department to lease for a term of 50 years to said Company, the land under water commencing at a corner on the westerly side of the Harlem river at the intersection of the northerly line of the land belonging to the estate of William Lynch, and the bulkhead-line called the United States Improvement line, or the Department of Public Parks pier line, thence running northerly along the circumference of the circle having a radius of 4,220 feet, 500 feet to a point on the United States Improvement line, thence westerly and radially 200 feet to the point of intersection with the easterly line of the marginal wharf or street or place; thence southerly along the easterly line of this marginal wharf or street, and parallel to the United States bulkhead-line, 390 feet, more or less, to the northerly line of land belonging to the estate of William Lynch; thence easterly along the line of land belonging to the estate of William Lynch, 236 feet, more or less, to the United States Improvement line on the westerly side of the Harlem river and the place of beginning; and also has requested this Department to appropriate and set aside for the special kind of commerce of the Manhattan Railway Company, the portion of the water-front above described; and also has requested permission to erect the necessary sheds, elevators and coal hoisting apparatus; and also to erect on the marginal street and said above-described premises, iron columns on which will rest iron girders at the proper elevation above the roadway and supporting tracks, necessary for access to the Harlem river, and

Whereas, A "plan for the improvement of that part of the water-front of the City of New York on the westerly side of the Harlem river, between the westerly side of the Eighth avenue at the southerly side of One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street and High Bridge," was determined by the Department of Docks on the 28th June, 1887, and adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the 31st August, 1887, and filed in the Department of Docks.

Resolved, That for the purpose of enabling the Manhattan Railway Company to erect coal elevators and other improvements and accommodations for its business, this Department will grant and make a lease to the said Manhattan Railway Company of the land under water belonging to the City of New York and commencing at a corner on the westerly side of the Harlem river at the intersection of the northerly line of the land belonging to the estate of William Lynch and the bulkhead-line called the United States Improvement line, and thence running northerly along the circumference of the circle in said line, having a radius of 4,220 feet, 500 feet to a point on the said United States Improvement line; thence westerly and radially 350 feet to the point of intersection with the westerly line of the exterior wharf, street or place; thence along the westerly line of this exterior wharf, street or place, and parallel to the said United States bulkhead-line, 320 feet, more or less, to the northerly line of the lands belonging to the estate of William Lynch; thence easterly along the line of the land belonging to the estate of William Lynch 410 feet, more or less, to the United States Improvement line on the westerly side of the Harlem river, and the place of beginning, for a term of ten years, with a privilege of two renewals of ten years each, with the privilege and permission to erect and build on said premises, the wharves, piers, bulkheads, slips and exterior wharf, street or place, shown and provided for in the plan for the improvement of that part of the water-front of the City of New York on the westerly side of the Harlem river, between the westerly side of Eighth avenue at the southerly side of One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street and High Bridge, which was determined by the Department of Docks on the 28th June, 1887, and adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the 31st August, 1887, and filed in the Department of Docks, in accordance with plans and specifications to be hereafter first submitted to and approved by the Board governing the Department of Docks before beginning the work; and also that this Department will grant permit for the erection and construction upon said wharves, piers and bulkheads by the said Manhattan Railway Company of proper sheds, elevators and coal-hoisting apparatus necessary for the business of the said Manhattan Railway Company, and for the erection of iron columns supporting and carrying railway tracks upon the exterior wharf, street or place and upon the said piers and bulkheads, all to be built under and in accordance with plans and specifications to be hereafter first submitted to and approved by the Board governing the Department of Docks before beginning the work.

Provided, That the said Manhattan Railway Company shall first, and within ten days after receipt of notice of this action of the Board of Docks, file in the office of the Department of Docks its written agreement to pay rent for said land under water in the sums and manner following, to wit: During the first term of ten years from the day of signing the lease, the sum of \$5,000 per annum, and during the second term of ten years the sum of \$6,500 per annum, and during the third term of ten years the sum of \$8,000 per annum, the same to be payable quarterly in advance on the usual quarter days.

And also its written agreement immediately to execute and deliver the necessary lease upon written notice of this Board so to do;

And also its written agreement to maintain in good order and condition all of the exterior wharf, street or place, and all wharves, piers, bulkheads, and slips to be built on the said premises, and to do all dredging appertaining thereto, during the continuance of the lease, and that it will, at the expiration or sooner termination of the said lease, surrender all of the said wharves, piers, bulkheads and slips, and that the same shall become the property of the City of New York, together with all structures thereupon, free of all cost and expense to the said City;

And also its written agreement that the said exterior wharf, street or place, shall be kept clear by said company of all obstructions and impediments to travel under the structures over said exterior wharf, street or place, as provided by plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Department of Docks, and that the said Company will, on the expiration or sooner termination of said lease, remove all columns, tracks and structures of every kind placed upon, on or over said exterior wharf, street or place, within 30 days after notice in writing has been duly served on said Company to remove the same;

And further provided, that all the above agreements in writing to be filed within ten days from receipt of notice of the passage of these preambles and resolutions, shall be duly and properly executed by the proper officers of the said Manhattan Railway Company under and with the corporate seal of said company attached to said agreements, and that until such agreements, so executed and sealed, shall be filed in this Department by the said company, all of the foregoing preambles and resolutions shall be of no force or effect.
