HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.
No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, or the content of the content o

The use of nose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon the permitted in the street or on the sidewalk except upon the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept weed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept were and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures. No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left frunning when not in actual use, and if he drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urmals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Founams or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-sloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas,

saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, bouse-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a v.-lation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not pad when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1897, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every rature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters. on the alleged ground of leakage caused by depective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in tull force in water-closes, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises

out the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premilike main object of the use of water-meters is to enable
this bepartment to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential
to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for
the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through
meters are a lien against the respective premises, and
the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore even to all householders that in all
turther applications for reduction of water rests of
allowance will be made on account of waste of water
cocurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or
plambing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may
have o curred without the knowledge or consent of the
owners of the buildings.
