

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, October 19, 1887, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway and Fish. Also, Chief Engineer Church, and Chief Engineer Birdsall of the Department of Public Works. The minutes of the stated meeting of October 12, were read and approved. The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 3023 to 3043, inclusive; and on motion of Commissioner Dowd the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction recommended the adoption of the following resolution : Resolved, That the signing of the contract executed by Messrs. O'Brien & Clarke with the Aqueduct Commissioners, for filling the low ground at Shaft Site No. 12, situated west of the Saw-mill River road, on Section No. 6 of the New Croton Aqueduct, by the sureties of said O'Brien & Clarke, be and the same is hereby waived, inasmuch as the amount for doing said work will not exceed the sum of \$5, cco. Adopted.

exceed the sum of \$5,cco. Adopted. Also recommended the adoption of the following resolution : Resolved, That the security for the performance of the contract of Messrs. O'Brien & Clark, for work on the gate-house superstructure at Ardsley, be and the same is hereby waived. Adopted. Also recommended the adoption of the following resolution : Resolved, That an appropriation of \$200 be made for the purpose of purchasing and printing sets of tables for tacilitating the calculation of disc-diagrams to determine the final estimates of the several contractors ; and that the Chief Engineer be authorized to superintend the purchasing and printing of said tables. Adopted.

Also recommended the adoption of the following resolution : Resolved, That an appropriation of \$300 be made for the purpose of purchasing and printing sets of tables for facilitating the catculation of disc-diagrams to determine the final estimates of the several contractors ; and that the Chief Engineer be authorized to superintend the purchasing and printing of said tables. Also recommended the adoption of \$170 be made for the purpose of lithographing contract drawings for the gate-baoks superstructures at Pocanicio and South Vonkers, on Sections 4 and 9 respectively. of the New Croton Aqueduct ; and the Chief Engineer is hereby directed to superin-tend said work.
