

Upon many of the reels taken there are dwellings, most of which will have to be removed as the construction work progresses, but many of which can be allowed to remain undisturbed until the near completion of the construction work and flooding of the reservoirs. To obtain proper information regarding the character and condition of these buildings, and to ascertain as far as possible the wishes of the owners or occupants with regard to the surrender of the buildings, this Committee directed its Secretary to visit all of said owners and occupants, and to make report of each case. That report is herewith submitted, showing that many of the parties have made no preparations to vacate, and desire to remain until the coming spring, or longer if possible; whilst others have already vacated, or will shortly leave, and turn their premises over to this Commission. Those parties who wish to remain are willing to do so upon rentals, or in lieu of rent to waive interest on the awards to be made by the Commissioners of Appraisal. We consider it to be for the best interest of the City that all the buildings which will not be required for use of the Engineer Corps of this Commission, or by the Commissioners of Appraisal, should be rented to the parties now occupying them, or to others who will care for and protect the premises from depreciation until such time as the progress of

the work requires the removal of the buildings. We therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Committee on Real Estate be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to assign to the Engineers of this Commission, and to the Commissioners of Appraisal, such dwelling-houses and premises, upon the lands taken for the double reservoirs at Sodom, as may be required for the proper conduct of their respective business, and to rent or otherwise provide for the occupancy and care of all other buildings until such time as the progress of the construction work upon the dams and reservoirs shall require the removal of said buildings, said Committee to report from time to time to this Commission what disposition is made of each and all of said buildings and premises:

At the headquarters of the Engineer Corps suitable desks, drawing tables, chairs, etc., will be required, and we therefore recommend that the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) be appropriated for that purpose.

And as those headquarters will require to be properly taken care of and protected we recommend the appointment of a suitable person for that duty. Such a person we believe to be Theodore Kelly, a well-known and highly recommended resident of the town of South East, whose papers are submitted herewith, and we submit for your adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That Theodore Kelly is hereby appointed an Axeman in the Engineer Corps of this Commission, and that until otherwise ordered he be assigned to duty as custodian of the headquarters of the Engineers of this Commission at Sodom, with compensation at the rate of sixty dollars (\$60) per month.

On motion, the report was approved, the resolutions adopted, and the appropriation therein contained made.

Also submitted the following report:

We desire to call your attention to the consideration of the construction of a receiving and storage reservoir in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York, and to recommend your prompt action in relation thereto. If the Commissioners conclude to construct such a reservoir, they should inaugurate the work immediately. You are aware that all the necessary surveys, soundings and maps were some time ago made by the Engineers of this Commission, and in view of the rapidly increasing value of the property to be taken for, or affected by, this new reservoir—which must be constructed in the very near future—we believe that the necessary proceedings to acquire the property should be commenced without further delay. We therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby requested to prepare and submit to this Commission, as soon as practicable, plans, maps, specifications, estimates and particulars for the construction of a receiving and storing reservoir, in the vicinity of the New Aqueduct and upon lands adjoining the same in the Twenty-fourth Ward of this City; and that to assist said Commissioner in preparing said plans, maps, specifications, estimates and particulars, the Chief Engineer of this Commission is hereby directed to place at the disposal of the said Commissioner all the surveys, soundings, maps and other information in his custody or possession, relating to the said proposed new reservoir.

On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the report was referred to the Committee on Construction for consideration and report.

The Comptroller, under date of October 15, gave notice of the issue of a warrant for the payment of a voucher, not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners, for New York County Section..... \$250 00—which was ordered entered upon the books of the Commission and filed.

The Secretary gave notice of the filing of a lien by Joseph O'Leary against Sections 13 and 14 of the New Croton Aqueduct; which was ordered filed, and notice given to John Brunton & Co., contractors for said sections for said lien.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

**NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.**

**NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN** made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage or waste by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force, or by washclothes, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to check the needless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

No notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may be ascertained without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.
