## BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,  
NEW YORK CITY, November 25, 1887. }

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 2 P. M., at the office of his Honor Mayor Hewitt.

Present—The Mayor, the Commissioner of the Public Works Department, Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald, and Colonel Emmons Clark.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

A communication was read from Mr. W. D. Manice, owner of the building now under lease to the City and occupied by the Eighth Regiment as an armory.

The Secretary was directed to ask the opinion of the Corporation Counsel as to whether calamine was properly repairs or not, and forward the same to the Commissioner of the Public Works Department, to whom the matter was referred.

M. COLEMAN, Esq., Secretary of the Armory Board:

SIR—Absence from the City delayed my receipt of your letter of the 4th instant, and I have deferred answering it for a few days until the completion of some work that I had ordered to be done in the premises referred to.

In your letter you inform me that you were directed by the Armory Board, at its meeting on the 29th ultimo, "to write to the owner, asking him to attend to the repairs in conformity with the terms of the lease, and enclose him a list of such repairs, the list to be obtained from Col. Scott," of the Eighth Regiment; and you enclose a list of repairs forwarded by Col. Scott, which he thinks are necessary, and (you add) "which, by the terms of your lease with the City, you are required to do."

In my lease with the City of the second story of the building bounded by Broadway, Sixth avenue, Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets, in the City of New York, for the use and occupation of the Seventy-first Regiment, which will expire on May 1, 1889, I covenanted that during the term "the superstructure shall and will be kept in good repair by and at the expense of the owner thereof," and did not covenant to do any other repairs whatever.

That covenant is a repetition of one contained in several preceding leases of the same premises to the City for the same regiment; it was originally inserted expressly to provide for keeping the roof of the building (there being no story above the second, of which the roof is the superstructure) in repair, and has been always so understood and acted upon according to its plain meaning.

The "superstructure" has been, is now, and will be kept throughout the term of the lease in good repair.

According to my understanding of the covenant and to the action in respect to it heretofore of the tenant, the City, and the occupant, the Seventy-first Regiment, none of the "repairs forwarded by Colonel Scott which he thinks are necessary" are included within it. Such repairs, whenever done heretofore, have been done at the expense of the tenant or occupant, and not at my expense.

The damage to the armory for which the repairs marked second and third on Colonel Scott's list are thought necessary by him, namely: "Second, broken plastered walls to be repaired," and "Third, wooden mouldings in drill-rooms, officers and company rooms to be put in order," was done at the time of the removal of the Seventy-first Regiment therefrom, about May 1 ultimo.

In a communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, received by them at their meeting of April 20, 1887, I protested against the removal of that regiment and the occupation of the armory by the Eighth Regiment. Such change of occupants was nevertheless made, and the damage last referred to was done then, and, otherwise, would not have been done. In my opinion that change was illegal, and the Eighth Regiment is not in lawful occupation of my property.

However, while not admitting but denying any obligation on my part to do them at my expense, as they are not extensive, I have, nevertheless, caused to be done the repairs specified on Colonel Scott's list Nos. Second and Third (which are those caused by the removal of the Seventy-first Regiment) and the Fifth.

As to the fourth on his list, it is not necessary. The urinal referred to was found in a foul state owing solely to its not being cleaned, and it has been cleaned. A few days since the water-closets also were found in a like state for the same cause only. They were all placed there by the City, are in good order and require nothing but cleanliness in the care of them.

But, with reference to the first item on Colonel Scott's list, namely: "calamine ceiling and sidewalls of drill-rooms, halls and officers' rooms," as it is not within my covenant, and in view of the short remainder of the term of the lease, I am not disposed to incur the expense of mere decoration. The ceilings and sidewalls are now in good repair; the former are only discolored by smoke from the gaslights which were put in by the City or the Seventy-first Regiment.

I make this answer to your letter solely out of courtesy to the Armory Board; but, with due respect for it, I beg leave to add that I do not find in the military code by which it is created any authority vested in it in respect to the repair of armories, and that it has no jurisdiction for any purpose over my property during the existing lease.

Hon. MICHAEL COLEMAN, Secretary of the Armory Board:

SIR—This Department is very much concerned regarding the condition of the Ninth Regiment Armory. The boiler there cannot be repaired; a new one is required at a considerable cost; the lease expires next May; it is understood that there are no flues in the building for the use of stoves, and it is a difficult thing to define what is to be done, unless a new boiler is put in the building. I transmit herewith a copy of a letter which I have received from Mr. Melcher, the executor of the estate, to the effect that a former boiler belonging to the building had been removed, and a smaller and more inefficient one substituted by this Department. This paper is all the evidence that I have of the occurrence, since there is no record of it in the Department. I think this matter ought to be brought before the Armory Board in order that the Commissioner may be instructed what to do, in view of the near approach of winter and the necessity for warming this building.

A report was received and read from the Commissioner of the Public Works Department to whom, in connection with the Hon. Mr. Cooper, the matter had been referred. The report recommended the use of mechanical power to remove the smoke.

Both matters were referred to the Commissioner of the Public Works Department.

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to inform you that a five-story apartment house is now in process of construction on the lot adjoining the west end of the Twelfth Regiment Armory on Sixty-second street, and that it will in consequence be necessary to at once provide for increasing the height of the chimneys as the draft, now none too good, will be almost smothered; provision will also be required to more securely protect the building from entrance by way of the roof by parties from the apartment house who will be able to reach the armory roof from that house. The stone coping and ornamental finish to the chimneys project beyond the line of the lot and must be removed as they will interfere with the course of construction of the sidewalls of the apartment building.

I would suggest that the plans of this apartment building be carefully examined to discover what if anything else must be done to prevent injury to the armory or interference with the objects for which it was constructed.

Edward Cooper and myself, at the earliest convenience of Mr. Cooper, in regard to the ventilation of the rifle gallery, and it was the recommendation of all concerned to adopt mechanical power to fulfill this object, and it was likewise the opinion of all concerned that Mr. Tudor, an expert in steam and ventilation, should be called upon to prepare a plan and estimate. It is doubtful whether this Department has the power to undertake this work, as it appears to be nothing more than the proper completion and adaptation of the structure to its legitimate uses.
