# BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL, NEW YORK CITY, November 25, 1887.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 2 P.M., at the office of his Honor Mayor Hewitt.

The bolier there cannot be repaired ; a new one is required at a considerable cost; the lease expires next May; it is understood that there are no flues in the building for the use of stoves, and it is a difficult thing to define what is to be done, unless a new bolier is put in the building. I transmit herewith a copy of a letter which I have received from Mr. Melcher, the executor of the estate, to the effect that a former bolier belonging to the building had been removed, and a smaller and more inefficient one substituted by this Department. This paper is all the evidence that I have of the occurrence, since there is no record of it in the Department. COLEMAN, Esq., Secretary Armory Board, N.Y.: DEAR STR-I have the honor to inform you that a five-story apartment house is now in process of construction on the lot adjoining the west end of the Twelfth Regiment Armory on Sixty-second street, and that it will in consequence be necessary to at once provide for increasing the height of the chimneys as the draft, now none too good, will be almost smothered ; provision will also be required to more securely protect the building from entrance by way of the roof by parties from the apartment house who will be able to reach the armory roof from that house. The stone coping and ormamental finish to the chimneys project beyond the line of the lot and must be removed as they will interfere with the course of construction of the sidewalls of the apartment building. I would suggest that the plans of this apartment building be carefully examined to discover what if anything else must be done to prevent injury to the armory or interference with the objects for which it was constructed. **COFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORDATION, Hon. MICHAEL COLEMAN,** Secretary of Armory Bears: SIR—I beg to acknowledge your letter dated October 4, 1887, inclosing the proposed contract for furnishing materials and ironwork in the erection of an armory on the west side of Fourth ave-nue, from Ninety-fourth to Ninety-fifth street, approved by me as to form, August 12, 1887. You state that, although the letting of the contract has been advertised on three different. occasions, only one bid on each advertisement was received, and that not of a satisfactory character; and your Committee on Plans, having under consideration the modification of the contract, plans and specifications, desire my opinion whether the marked clause on page one of the contract plans and specifications, desire my opinion whether the marked clause on page one of the contract plans and specifications, desire my opinion whether the marked clauses on page one of the contract plans and specifications due to the state of the clause in question reads thus : "I the understood and agreed between the parties hereto, that the party of the second part shall have the right to suspend the work for a specified time without becoming liable to any claim for damages by the party of the first part, provided that the term of such suspension, to be determined in writing by said Armory Board, shall be added to the time stipulated for the completion of the work."

It writing by such Armory Board, shall be addeed to the time supulated for the completion of the work." I know of no law requiring the insertion of this clause in the contract. The presence of such a clause in the contract is a matter of policy to be passed upon by your Board in conjunction with the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. See the opnion of my prede-cessor to your Board dated November 24, 1884. The work of constructing the building being done by separate contractors, the clause was doubtless inserted in order to give your Board control of the progress of the work under the respective contracts, so that in case it became expedient to suspend work under one contract on account of work being done under another contract, the City should not be involved in a dispute with the contractor whose work has been suspended. As I have said, the presence or absence of the clause quoted involves considerations of ex-pediency addressed to the discretion in relation to the construction of the building vested by law primarily in your Board, subject to the approval of the slinking Fund Commissioners.
