

#### LAW DEPARTMENT.

New York, March 10, 1883.

At a Conference between the Mayor and the heads of several Departments of the City of New York, this day held at the Mayor's Office, there were present the following gentlemen:

Franklin Edson, Mayor; Allan Campbell, Comptroller; Hubert O. Thompson, Commissioner of Public Works; Charles F. Chandler, President of the Health Department; John J. Gorman, President of the Fire Department; Stephen B. French, President of the Police Department; William Laimbeer, President of the Dock'Department; Henry H. Porter, Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities and Correction; William M. Olliffe, Commissioner of the Park Department; James S. Coleman, Commissioner of the Street Cleaning Department; George P. Andrews, Counsel to the Corporation.

After discussion, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Resolved. That, in the opinion of this Conference, Assembly Bill No. 381, entitled "An act for

Resolved, That, in the opinion of this Conference, Assembly Bill No. 381, entitled "An act for the removal of refuse matter from the City of New York," is an objectionable bill, and should not become a law for the following reasons:

1. There is no necessity, or excuse, for creating such a corporation as "The Manhattan Refuse Company," proposed in this bill.

2. It creates a monopoly.

3. It taxes citizens for the benefit of a company.

4. It makes a misdemeanor for manufacturers and others to dispose of their refuse for their own benefit.

Resolved, That, in the opinion of this Conference, Assembly Bill No. 379 should be ameuded by striking out the word "Fifteen," in line ten, and substituting the word "Five," and in that shape it is a proper bill, and should become a law.

Resolved, That, in the opinion of this Conference, Assembly Bill No. 383, entitled "An act setting apart and reserving Pier 37, East river, etc.," is an objectionable bill, and should not become a law, for the reason that it is an unnecessary interference with the powers and duties of the Commissioners of the Dock Department and the Harbor Masters, who already possess the power to set apart piers and bulkheads for all proper purposes.

Resolved, That, in the opinion of this Conference, Senate Bill No. 220, should be amended so as to provide that "Such cables should be laid under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works," and when so amended, that it is a proper bill, and should become a law.

Resolved, That, in the opinion of this Conference, Assembly Bill No. 382, providing for the payment of salary to John Foley, for an unexpired term of office as Supervisor, is an objectionable bill, and should not become a law, inasmuch as the office was abolished, and no services were or could be performed.

Resolved, That, in the opinion of this Conference, Assembly Bill No. 343, which provides for the remission of interest on unpaid assessments, be disapproved, for the reason that it is special legislation in favor of a few persons, and is detrimental to the interests of the city at large, which has paid the interest on bonds issued for the execution of this work, for which assessments have legally been made.
