Dear Sir—In conformity with the requirements of section 119 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, we transmit herewith the results of our examination of the receipts and disbursements of the office of the Chamberlain for the third quarter of 1901.

At meeting of the Trustees of Union Free School District No. 7, Jamaica, on October 7, 1897, Singer and Chambers were employed as Architects for school buildings Nos. 7, 8 and 9, and at meeting of the said Trustees on December 10, 1897, \$4,046.85 was paid to Singer and Chambers, being 5 per cent. on the total amount of the contract prices, including heating for the above mentioned schools Nos. 7, 8 and 9.

The original contract for the erection of School No. 7 was awarded to Raines & Mosher for \$24,200, and \$20,200 of this amount was paid to them when they abandoned the work, which was subsequently completed by contract of Alexander Brower for \$4,893.

In order to let the uncompleted work Mr. Charles Singer, the successor of Singer & Chambers, was verbally requested by the Superintendent of School Buildings of the Board of Education to prepare new plans and specifications for the uncompleted work. The demands on the Contingent Account have been exceptionally heavy during the current year, owing to the fact that extraordinary expenses were incurred in conducting the investigations in relation to the Police and other departments, the New York Central Railroad tunnel, the Brooklyn Bridge matter, and in the preparation of a certain homicide case. Particularly heavy was the outlay in the police investigations and trials, in the conduct of which it was found necessary to engage private detectives and to provide for the maintenance of important witnesses, who were kept under constant surveillance; and as in the recent trial of Captain Thomas J. Diamond held in the Supreme Court of Albany County, where it was necessary to send counsel for the People, private detectives and a large number of witnesses to Albany, all of whom had to be provided with transportation and hotel accommodation.

The total expenses incurred in all of the aforesaid cases at present amount to \$18,835 and about \$9,000 of this sum was expended in the police cases.

This additional transfer of \$12,000 will make a total of \$52,000 appropriated to the credit of the Contingent Account for the current year. PUBLIC SCHOOL 92, BROOKLYN.

The new addition to Public School 92 is to be erected at the rear of and connected to the present two-story building, situated on the corner of Rogers avenue and Robinson street, Borough

The new building will be a two-story-and-attic structure, with basement and cellar. The roof to be pitched and covered with tin. The shape will be that of the letter T, the extreme width being about 72 feet by 60 feet deep. At the rear of the present building a space about 12 by 42 feet will be remodeled to receive two new fireproof stairs for pupils, starting at basement entrance. This new school building is to be erected on a plot bounded by Leonard, McKibbin and Boerum streets and will be 200 feet long and 60 feet wide, with wings on each street extending 15 feet further back from the rear of the main building, covering a superficial area of 1,272 square

feet.

The building will be four stories high above the basement. A sub-basement will be constructed beneath the central portion, in which the boilers and coal storage rooms will be placed.

It will contain a total of 48 class-rooms, including an assembly-room equal in capacity to 6 class-rooms, which is not to be subdivided at present.

The exterior will be of red brick with gray terra cotta and limestone trimmings, and the roof, which is flat, will be covered with slag or gravel roofing.

The building is to be of bearing-wall construction and fireproof throughout, floors to be of steel beams and fireproof arches supported by fireproofed iron columns.

The basement will be used exclusively for an indoor playground and will be divided centrally by sliding doors. The first, second, third and fourth stories will contain 12 class-rooms each, 6 rooms in the fourth story forming the assembly-room.

The stairs are to be constructed with iron supports and bluestone treads. The main entrance hall and all the stairways where a wall surface occurs on the stair proper will have tile wainscoting.

The sanitary arrangements for teachers will be placed at each end of the building, while those for the pupils will be placed in a separate one-story brick building in the rear of the school yard. The heating and ventilating system will be what is known as the "Plenum System," with steam as an auxiliary.
