1 curve 4 ft. 0 1/2 in. x 6 1/2 in. To these curves you to use a false brass nosing
1 curve 4 ft. 9 1/2 in. x 6 1/2 in. instead of the deep ones.

For the two upper and two lower landings using the same deep nosing in front, red cork and brass alternately as shown on sketch herewith, for the sum of \$307.

For the Erysipelas Pavilion No. 1, Blackwell's Island.

1 top 3 ft. 0 in. x 6 1/2 in. Set in wood.
4 treads 3 ft. 3 in. x 6 1/2 in. Upon wood.

2 treads 3 ft. 6 in. x 6 1/2 in. Upon wood.
25 treads 3 ft. 3 1/2 in. x 6 1/2 in. Set in wood.

The following communications were received from the Sanitary Superintendent: First—Weekly reports of the Sanitary Superintendent. Ordered on file.

Second—Weekly reports from the Willard Parker, Reception, Riverside and Kingston Avenue hospitals. Ordered on file.

Third—Reports and certificates on overcrowding in the following tenement houses: On motion, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the following apartments in tenement houses in The City of New York are so overcrowded that less than 400 cubic feet of air space is afforded to each occupant in the said houses; it is

Ordered, That the number of occupants in said apartments be and are hereby reduced as follows:

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

No. 1. Southwest corner Church street and Broadway, Kingsbridge, first floor; occupant, Filimino Glorioso; 10 adults.

No. 2. Southwest corner Church street and Broadway, Kingsbridge, second floor and attic; occupant, Nicholas Kinigut; 10 adults.

Fourth—Certificates in respect to vacation of premises at No. 101 Atlantic avenue and No. 47 Bridge street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Whereas, The premises, No. 507 West One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the conducting of a barber shop, in its present condition, be discontinued.

Whereas, The premises, Nos. 25 and 27 Hinckley place, Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises in its present condition as a stable be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that stable floor be made water-tight, and that the horse stalls be provided with a valley drain properly trapped and connected with a sewer-connected drain.

Whereas, The premises, east side of Church street, about 175 feet south of Fulton street, Jamaica, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises in its present condition as a stable be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the saturated and offensive wooden floor of the horse stall be removed, the ground space beneath same be cleaned and disinfected, and that the floor of the horse stalls be made water tight and so graded as to discharge all liquid matter into a water-tight, properly trapped sewer-connected valley drain; that the walls and ceilings of the stable be thoroughly scraped, cleaned and then whitewashed; that all manure and rubbish be removed from the ground about the stable and that hereafter all manure be removed from the premises daily, unless pressed in bales, barrels or boxes, at least once a day, and so pressed as to reduce the same to not more than one-third the original bulk; said bales, barrels or boxes to be kept inside the stable until time of removal; that all unnecessary unclean material be removed from the stable.
