1142. Removal of encroachments or encumbrances on East 149th street, between Third avenue and St. Ann's avenue, Borough of The Bronx.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at its meeting on December 4, 1913, adopted a resolution as follows:

"Resolved, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, That all ordinances, resolutions, permits or licenses heretofore adopted, issued or granted by The City of New York, or by any board, body, council or officer thereof, or by any department, division, bureau or officer thereof, permitting, licensing or allowing any stoop, steps, courtyard, area, platform, porch, fence, railing, showcase, bay window, ornamental entrance, storm door, newsstand, flower stand, or any other projection or encroachment of whatsoever nature or description, either temporary or permanent, or signs which extend more than one foot from the building line on 149th street, between St. Ann's avenue and Third avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, between levels ten (10) feet above the curb grade and a sufficient depth below said curb to provide proper support for the street and walk surfaces, and for necessary and proper subsurface structure, be and they are hereby in all respects repealed, cancelled and revoked; and be it further,

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of The Bronx be and he is hereby authorized to remove, or cause to be removed, all said encroachments or encumbrances in accordance with the foregoing resolution.

Which was adopted unanimously (see page 9419, Board of Estimate and Apportionment Minutes).

It was respectfully recommended by the Local Board of Crotona, 24th District, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment rescind its resolution of December 4, 1914, in so far as it relates to the block of East 149th street, between St. Ann's avenue and Brook avenue.

On motion, seconded, the Board adjourned until June 16, 1914.

#### Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, June 2, 1914, at 3 o'clock.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; and Messrs. Farley, O'Keeffe, Paulding, and Stern, Trustees. Excused—Messrs. Kingsbury, Robbins and Sachs.

The minutes of the meeting of May 19th were held as read and approved. Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

A request has been received from the Social Service Department for permission to appoint an additional worker for the unmarried mothers, the salary to be paid from a special donation to the bureau for this purpose.

Authority is requested to close the offices at 4 o'clock, in accordance with the usual custom.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The appointment by the social service bureau of an additional worker was approved.

It was resolved, for the three summer months, to follow the custom of other City departments and close the offices at 4 o'clock, provided the work permits.

##### REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

The Conference Committee of the First Division of Bellevue Hospital recommended the appointment of Dr. Oscar M. Schloss as Physician to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician, Children's Service, and upon motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved and Dr. Schloss appointed accordingly.

The Conference Committee of the Third Division reported upon the nominations referred to them at last meeting, and in accordance with their recommendation, it was

Resolved, To promote Dr. Robert J. Carlisle to the place of Visiting Physician, to promote Dr. James F. Nagle to Assistant Visiting Physician, to promote Dr. Luther B. MacKenzie to Physician to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician, and to appoint Dr. George B. Wallace as Physician to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician.

The Harlem Hospital Conference Committee reported that they had considered the nomination and applications for the place of Visiting Otolologist and Laryngologist to that hospital, and recommended that Dr. Lester Mead Hubby be promoted to this place. This report was approved.

Mr. O'Keeffe reported that he had considered the request of the Rev. E. P. Southwell for the appointment of an additional Chaplain for night duty at Bellevue Hospital, and recommended as funds are not available to make an appointment at present that provision be made for this place in the Departmental Estimate for 1915. This recommendation was adopted.

The Building Committee recommended the payment of the bill of McKim, Mead and White, dated November 11, 1911, for fees for the revision of the plans and specifications for pavilions I, K, L and M for the amount of \$4,416.89, in accordance with the schedule showing the proposed allowance for the separate items prepared by the Engineers of the Department of Finance, as set forth in a communication from that department under date of May 12, 1914. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendation of the Building Committee was approved, and the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to prepare a voucher in accordance therewith.

The Building Committee reported that they had considered the request of J. H. Freedlander, set forth in his letter of May 14, for the amendment of his contract for architectural services in connection with the alterations to Harlem Hospital so as to include 2½ per cent. for fees for the employment of consulting engineers, and recommended that no change be made at this time in the contract submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved.

##### COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter was presented from Dr. L. E. Faetra under date of May 15th, recommending the reappointment of Dr. L. C. Schroeder as Resident Physician on the pediatric service of Bellevue Hospital for one year from July 1, 1914. On the recommendation of the Committee on Officers and Employees, it was moved, seconded and carried, to make this appointment.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for May 27th were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the resignation of Dr. William H. Sheldon, as Physician to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician to the Second Division, was accepted with regret; on the recommendation of the Conference Committee, the nomination of Dr. Robert A. Cooke to fill the vacancy caused by Dr. Sheldon's resignation was referred to the President with power; the recommendation that the Trustees consider the advisability of paying salaries to the visiting staff of the out-patient department was referred to the Committee on Officers and Employees, and the General Medical Superintendent was directed to obtain information as to the cost that would be involved if this plan were adopted.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for May 26th were presented. The resignation of Dr. Walter E. Tymson as Assistant Physician to Out Patients and of Dr. S. Barshell as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients were accepted with regret.

The minutes of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School for May 8th were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried the recommendation that a uniform laundry bag be provided for the Nurses was referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

A letter dated May 15th was presented from the President of the Board of Managers of the Training School, outlining

a plan for the training of medical social service Nurses in conjunction with the School of Philanthropy. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to endorse this plan.

A letter dated May 28th was presented from Dr. John H. Huddleston, requesting an increase in salary for Dr. I. P. Starr, who is in charge of the children's clinic of Gouverneur Hospital, and the appointment of a Clerk for the tuberculosis clinic and a social service Nurse for the day camp, and endorsing the recommendations of the Committee on Standardization of Nurses' Salaries. As there were no funds available in the appropriations of the Department for this purpose, it was moved, seconded and carried, to make provision thereof in the Departmental Estimate for 1915.

A letter dated May 28th was presented from the Department of Public Charities, requesting the appointment of a representative to confer with Deputy Commissioner Wright in regard to the operation of the new morgue. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for his attention.

A letter dated May 20th was presented from the Fire Department, transmitting a report of the Chief of the Fire Prevention Bureau on the recommendation of H. F. J. Porter for reducing the fire risk in the old buildings of Bellevue Hospital, together with letters from Mr. Porter under date of May 16th, May 22d and June 3d relating thereto. On motion, duly seconded and carried, these communications were referred to the Building Committee.

A letter was presented from the New York Edison Company under date of May 21st, relating to the report of C. E. Knox on the cost of producing electric current at Harlem Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this was referred to the Building Committee with power.

A letter dated May 29th was presented from McKim, Mead and White, transmitting two sets of drawings and specifications for the new building for the out-patient department of Gouverneur Hospital. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was

Resolved, To transmit them to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

A letter dated May 26th was presented from McKim, Mead and White, transmitting a block plan of the new Bellevue Hospital and setting forth the amount of Corporate Stock required for the further construction of that hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the Building Committee.

A letter dated May 30th was presented from Dr. John J. Morehead, inquiring, on behalf of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company and other railways in the City, as to the rates that would be charged by the hospitals of the Department for the care of employees under the compensation law. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for report at next meeting.

A letter dated May 23d was received from Dr. John H. Huddleston, presenting an outline of a suggested rearrangement of the medical service of Gouverneur Hospital, and recommending that the term of service be lengthened, that the size of the service be lessened, and that the number of assistants and members of the house staff be increased. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to invite the medical members of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital to express their opinion on the recommendations set forth by Dr. Huddleston.

A letter was presented from the Department of Health, transmitting a copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Health on May 27th directing the issuance of a permit to the Bellevue Hospital Training School for Midwives to conduct a school for midwives registered by the Board of Health, at 223-225 East 26th street, for one year from date of issue. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

A communication dated May 23d was presented from the Department of Finance, transmitting an executed copy of a renewal of the lease of the premises at 117 West 136th street for one year from May 1, 1914. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this letter was ordered placed on file.

A communication dated May 26th was presented from the Commissioners of Accounts, transmitting at the direction of the Mayor a copy of functional charts prepared by that commission showing the conditions existing in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals at the beginning of the present administration. On motion, duly seconded and carried, these were referred to the General Medical Superintendent for use in connection with the preparation of the Departmental Estimate for 1915.

A communication dated May 26th was presented from the Art Commission,



transmitting copy of a resolution adopted on May 11th, approving of the designs and location of the dispensary building for Gouverneur Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

A communication dated May 20th was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copies of two resolutions adopted on May 15th, (1) approving of plans and specifications and estimate of cost of \$40,500 for alterations to hospital building in connection with the construction of the new ward wing at Harlem Hospital, and (2) approving of form of proposed contract, plans, designs, specifications and estimate of cost of \$5,500 for furnishing and installing electric and gas fixtures in pavilions L and M. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file, and it was

Resolved, To authorize an advertisement for bids for the alterations to the main building at Harlem Hospital, and it was further

Resolved, To authorize an advertisement for bids for furnishing and installing electric and gas fixtures in pavilions L and M of the new Bellevue Hospital.

A letter dated May 29th was presented from Dr. George L. Brodhead, suggesting changes in the new wing of Harlem Hospital to make further provision for the obstetrical service. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this was referred to the Building Committee.

A letter dated June 2d was presented from McKim, Mead and White, transmitting plans and specifications for a new floor and an additional shelter on the roof wards of pavilions A and B, which were estimated to cost \$7,500. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was

Resolved, To transmit them to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

The President presented a letter received from the Department of Finance under date of May 25th, relating to the food served to the employees of the department. After discussion, on motion, duly seconded and carried, the President was authorized to prepare a report thereon and forward it to the Finance Department, and the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to confer with representatives of that Department with a view to determining what can be done to serve food to the employees of the hospitals at a cost within the budgetary allowance.

NEW BUSINESS.

The President referred to the desirability of constructing an iron fence along First avenue, in place of the wooden one in front of pavilion I, extending from the pathological building to the Catholic chapel. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to obtain estimates and report as to the probable cost of such a fence.

Reference was made to the desirability of providing awnings for Ward 15, and the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to have them put in place.

The President referred to the lack of furnishings in the Ambulance Drivers' dormitory at Bellevue Hospital, and on motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to inquire into the reason for the failure to provide these furnishings promptly.

The President reported that at a recent conference the Corporation Counsel had informed him that the Board of Trustees could not delegate its authority to sign certificates of necessity for repairs, except in emergencies, and that hereafter such orders must be signed by the Board. It was moved, seconded and carried, to act in accordance with this opinion.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To hold a special meeting on Friday, June 12, 1914, at 11 a. m.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

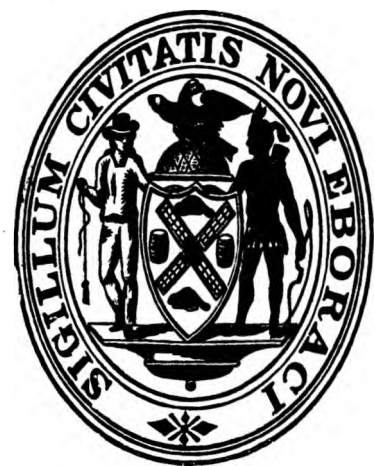

All the filling shall, unless otherwise directed, be placed directly in the rear of the bulkhead

All material must be dumped and filled in only in such manner, at such points and in such order of procedure and at such times and seasons as may, from time to time, be directed, and the work of filling in may be entirely suspended for such periods of time as may be directed by the Engineer. Rip-rap stone coming directly on or against the bulkhead wall must be deposited carefully in such manner as will not injure the same.

All the filling, except as otherwise specified herein, shall be of ashes, cellar dirt, broken stone, etc., entirely free from garbage or any organic matter objectionable in the opinion of the Engineer.

At any section of the bulkhead wall the filling shall be brought up level with the under side of the backing log of the bulkhead wall at such section, and no higher unless otherwise directed.

The filling shall be commenced within five days after the date of the receipt of a notification from the Engineer that the work, or any part of it, is ready to be begun, after which not less than 100 cubic yards per day shall be placed, and the whole amount of the filling called for to bring the above described basin up to grade shall be completed within twenty-nine days from the date of the receipt of said notification. At the expiration of this time this agreement shall be considered closed unless a further extension of time shall be given by the Commissioner of Docks. If at any time during the progress of the work it shall be deemed necessary to order the suspension of the whole or any part of the filling, the time for completing said filling shall be extended as much as it may have been delayed by such suspension.

That the wages to be paid for a legal day's work to all classes of such laborers, workmen or mechanics upon public work or upon any material to be used thereon shall not be less than the prevailing rate for a day's work in the same trade or occupation in the locality where such public work is being constructed. Each such laborer, workman or mechanic shall receive the prevailing rate of wages. TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
