### PROCLAMATION.

MAYOR'S OFFICE,  
NEW YORK, Feb. 6, 1874.

Whereas, Nicholas Ryan and his sister Mary Ryan were found dead at their residence, No. 204 Broome street, on the 20th December last, and whereas the coroner's jury, from the facts elicited during the inquest, were unable to determine the manner of their death; and

Whereas, from such an examination of the case as I have been enabled to make, I am of the opinion that the said Nicholas and Mary Ryan were brutally murdered, at the time and place above stated, now,

I, WILLIAM F. HAVEMEYER, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby offer a reward of one thousand dollars for the discovery and conviction of the party or parties who may have committed the deed, the said reward to be paid on the conviction of the said party or parties, and the certificate of the District Attorney that such conviction was had upon the testimony of the person or persons claiming the reward. But all claims not presented to the Mayor within twenty days after such conviction shall be disregarded.

### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, for the two weeks ending Saturday, the 21st February, 1874.

A plan for the construction of Riverside Park and Avenue, so that both could be combined in one esplanade, was adopted.

The following memorial was ordered to be presented to the Legislature, to the Chairmen of the Committees on Affairs of Cities in both the Senate and Assembly, and to be printed at length in the minutes:

To the Honorable the Legislature of the State of New York:

The memorial of the undersigned Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, respectfully represents:

That it is desirable that not only the plan of all surface improvements to be made on the streets and avenues bounding all public parks north of Fifty-eight street, in the City, should be designed and prescribed by the Department of Public Parks, but that the construction and management and control and maintenance of all regulating, grading, paving, curbing and guttering, and other improvements on such streets and avenues should be ordered and done by the Department of Public Parks; and among the many reasons for such course, the following may be adduced:

First—The grades of the streets and avenues bounding the public parks having been fixed and determined, all improvements in the several parks must be made with reference to such grades, so far as ingress and egress to them is concerned, and also as to the construction of retaining walls for fences for enclosure, and of embankment walls for adapting the surface of the parks to the grades most proper for them in planting and improving the parks.

Second—That in the planting of trees in the parks and in the avenues and streets adjoining them, a system should be pursued to produce regularity of growth, as well as tasteful and picturesque effect; and these remarks equally apply to the lighting and surface-draining of streets and avenues.

Third—That unless the work of regulating and otherwise improving the streets and avenues bounding parks progresses systematically with the improvements made in the parks, much delay and expenditure will probably occur, which should be avoided if both works were under one control, and it would be difficult to define on whom the responsibility for such delay and excess of cost should rest, if it were divided between two or more departments.

Fourth—That by a judicious system of improvement and maintenance, almost or quite the whole width of all streets and avenues bounding public parks may be so arranged as to add to the size and appearance of the parks, as effectively as if they were actually included in the parks, and it is feared such would not be the case were they under the care of separate departments.

Fifth—In the cases of the Riverside and the Morningside parks, which are each of great length and small width, it appears very desirable that any measures that can be adopted for increasing their apparent width, should prevail.

Should your honorable body, or any committee thereof, to whom this matter be referred, desire further information in relation to the foregoing matter, the undersigned will be most happy to give it, either by engineering illustrations or oral testimony, whenever required so to do.

**BUREAU OF THEATRES, HOTELS, SCHOOL-HOUSES, CHURCHES, FACTORIES AND SPECIAL SURVEYS.**

Abstract of operations during the week ending February 21, 1874:

**THEATRES.**

Thirteen theatres, public lecture halls and places of public amusement have been officially

visited during the week, as follows, to wit: Union Square Theatre, the Bowery, Pastor's Opera House, Metropolitan, Niblo's, Olympic, Academy of Music, Terrace Garden, Wallack's, Daly's 5th Ave., Grand Opera, Booth's and Steinway Hall. No infraction of section 29 of the building law noted, except in the Union Square, reported for obstructing aisles with camp stools.

**HOTELS.**

Fifteen hotels and lodging houses have been officially and carefully inspected as to their condition, means and facilities for egress, escape, etc., in case of fire, viz.: French flat or apartment, building 251 Fifth avenue, corner of 28th street; Hotel de Hanora, 101 West street; Western R. R. House, 127 Liberty street; National Hotel, 3, 5 and 7 Courtlandt street; Belmont Hotel, 133, 135 and 137 Fulton street; McKimley's, 93 South street; Sweet & Sons, No. 4 Fulton street; Crook's Hotel, 90 Chatham street; Hotel du Canada, 110 Chatham street; Union Theological Seminary, 9 University place; Commercial, 73 Courtlandt street; Dillinger Hotel, 613 and 615 3d avenue; Belvidere, 15 Irving place; Delyon, corner of Franklin and Gold streets; Dennis, 25 East 17th street; and where deemed necessary the parties in interest have been notified to provide additional safeguards.

**CHURCHES.**

Eight churches have been carefully inspected as to their condition, means and facilities for egress and protection in the event of fire, none of which are reported as requiring additional safeguards.

**FACTORIES.**

Sixty factories have been thoroughly inspected as to their condition, and the means, facilities and appliances therein severally provided, for protection, egress and escape in case of fire, of their employees and operatives, and where such means were found to be insufficient, the parties in interest have been notified to provide such additional fire safeguards, as being deemed necessary, were recommended by the inspectors charged with the duty of such examinations.

47 buildings have been reported as requiring additional fire safeguards.

**POLICE DEPARTMENT.**

**SECOND MEETING.**

The Board of Police met on the 24th day of February, 1874. Present—Messrs. Charlick, Gardner, Duryee and Russell, Commissioners.

On motion Commissioner Duryee was called to the Chair.

The following preamble and resolutions were unanimously adopted.

Whereas, Henry Smith, Commissioner of the Police Department of the City of New York, and President of the Board of Police, died at his rooms at the Metropolitan Hotel, in this city, at half-past ten o'clock P. M., on the 23d day of February, 1874.

Resolved, That the Board of Police unite with the public in an expression of feelings of regret at the untimely death of Mr. Smith, who has been called in the prime of life from the performance of important official duties, and from the cherished companionship of a wide circle of devoted and earnest friends.

Resolved, That the Board of Police desire, in the most emphatic manner, to publicly express their appreciation of and sincere regard for the deceased, as a genial and competent official associate—always considerate and just—as a presiding officer, judicious and prompt—and as a man, distinguished by generous impulses and far-reaching, wide-spread works of benevolence, humanity and charity.

Resolved, That the surviving members of the

Board, by official and personal association with the deceased, have been deeply impressed, not only with the evidence of his great experience and conceded ability as a public officer, but his amiable and excellent qualities as a citizen, companion and friend; and improve the occasion to place on record their high appreciation of his merits, and their deep regrets at their own personal loss in his death.

Resolved, That the Board of Police, though conscious that words of condolence have little effect in mitigating the force of supreme affliction, nevertheless tender an earnest expression of their sympathy to the grief-stricken wife, and the afflicted kindred of the deceased, in their great sorrow.

Resolved, That as a well merited tribute of respect to the memory of the deceased President of the Police Department, the officers of the police force wear on the left arm the usual badge of mourning for the term of thirty days.

Resolved, That these resolutions be entered in the minutes of the Board, and that the chief clerk cause an engrossed copy to be furnished to the family of the deceased.

Resolved, That the Superintendent select and detail a suitable number of captains and an inspector, to accompany the remains of the deceased to Amsterdam.

**LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.**

From the proceedings of the Board of Aldermen, February 19, 1874:

By Alderman Koen—

Whereas, It is clearly evident that the great and needed changes in the method of transacting the business of this city, and the location of the public buildings and markets near its geographical centre, as indicated in the foregoing and many others that might be suggested, could be effected, not only without expense, but so far as the city is concerned, at a large pecuniary gain. The price that would be realized for the land and buildings now used and occupied for city purposes, including the markets, would be far in excess of the sum required to erect new ones as proposed, while the advantages to the general business of all classes of our citizens cannot now be estimated fairly. As it is the duty of the Common Council to take the most effective and decided measures to secure for all time to this city, its pre-eminence as the financial, mercantile and manufacturing centre of the great country, and to preserve it as the import and export mart of the American continent, and as it is fair to presume that the people of this State, who are directly interested with ourselves in the prosperity of our city, which now annually pays one-half the entire taxes of the state, will second our efforts, through the state legislature to preserve to ourselves and to them, the advantages of continuing to be the first city in the Union; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby directed to prepare a draft of an act with provisions containing the charges enumerated in the foregoing preamble, together with a memorial on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the city of New York, praying for the passage of the said act by the legislature of this state at its present session, and providing for the election of three commissioners, by the people of the city, at the next general election, who shall, by said act, be fully empowered to inaugurate and prosecute to completion, the changes to be set forth and contained in said act; the said memorial and act, upon receiving the approval of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, to be transmitted by his Honor, the Mayor to the State Legislature.
