Four bids or estimates were received for furnishing material and labor for removing part of pier at Twenty-fifth street, North river, and building Pier, new 55, North river, as follows, to wit:

On motion, laid on the table, and the Secretary directed to address a communication to the Counsel to the Corporation, stating that four estimates for building Pier, new 55, North river, were received and opened this day, and that the estimate of Holmes Brothers, for \$62,800, is the lowest, that Jennie E. Richardson, one of the sureties offered in said estimate, is the same person whose adequacy and sufficiency the Comptroller refused to approve upon an estimate from said Holmes Brothers, for doing the same work, opened on November 24, 1880, and which estimate was rejected by this Department, and the work readvertised for, pursuant to an opinion from the Law Department, rendered 10th instant, and requesting him to advise this Board in writing, as to its duty, in relation to said estimate.

On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Phelps Brothers & Co., requesting certain information in reference to a lease of Pier, new 1, North river. Applicants informed, first, that if the Commissioners should decide to lease said pier for a term of years, the lease will probably be offered at public sale, but the time of holding said sale cannot now be determined; second, that if a lease of said pier be offered at public sale, it will merely be the right to collect such legal wharfage as may accrue at the pier, and without the privilege of erecting a shed thereon; but this Department would probably grant permission to the purchaser of the lease to erect a shed upon the premises; third, that the depth of water existing at the pier is about twenty-one feet at mean low water; fourth, that the Commissioners at present are unable to state at what time the building of Pier, new 2, North river, will be commenced by this Department; and, fifth, that in case a lease of Pier, new 1, North river, should be offered at public sale, it would be stated in the advertisement what repairs to the pier the lessee would be obliged to make at his own cost and expense, but it would be probably determined, in reference to this, the only stone pier owned by the city, that the necessary repairs thereto would be done by this Department.

From Department of Taxes and Assessments, requesting to be furnished with copies of permits issued by this Department to private parties for the building sheds, bulkheads, etc. Secretary directed to forward copies of permits in accordance with said request.

From Martin Karl, lessee of pier at Fifty-first street, North river, requesting that an allowance be made to him for loss of wharfage in consequence of the mooring of floating bath thereat, from September 1st to October 16th last. Application denied, inasmuch as the allowance made for the mooring of said floating bath in the sum of \$300 by resolution of the Board, adopted May 19, 1880, was in full for the whole season.

From Comptroller, approving of sureties to estimate of Cape Ann Granite Co., for furnishing granite stones for bulkhead or river wall, publicly opened on the 5th instant.

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head of department may abolish and consolidate offices and bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same department."

The Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the duty imposed and the authority thus conferred upon him, hereby orders and directs that the following Bureaux in the Finance Department shall be consolidated, the consolidation thereof to take effect on the first day of January, 1881, viz:
