BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's Office, in the New Court-house, on Friday, April 18, 1879, at 12:13 o'clock P. M. Present—Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; Hon. William C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation; Hon. John K. Hackett, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held February 24, 1879, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the following assessment lists received from the Board of Assessors, with communications dated March 28, 1879, viz.:

1. Eleventh avenue—Paving, with Belgian pavement, from Fifty-ninth to Sixty-fifth street.

2. Eighty-eighth street—Regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging, between First avenue and Avenue A.

3. One Hundredth street—Regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging, between Bloomingdale road and the Boulevard.

4. Ninety-fourth street—Sewers, between Third and Fourth avenues and in Fourth avenue, east side, between Ninety-third and Ninety-fourth streets.

Seventieth street—Sewer, between First and Second avenues.
 One Hundred and Eighth street—Paving, with Belgian pavement, between Fourth and Mad-

Ninety-sixth street-Regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging, between the Boulevard and the Hudson river.

7. Miley-skith street—Sewer, between Barclay street and Park place.

8. West street—Sewer, between Barclay street and Park place.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form, and no objections having been filed, on motion, they were severally confirmed—all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for paving, with Belgian pavement, One Hundred and Twentieth street, between Second and Third avenues, with objections of Mr. L. T. Lehmeyer, was presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with a communication dated March 28, 1879.

After consideration of the said objections, on motion, they were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed—all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for paving, with Belgian pavement, Lexington avenue, between Eighty-fifth and Eighty-sixth streets, accompanied with objections and a communication from the Commissioner of Public Works in answer thereto, laid over for special examination and further consideration at the last meeting, was presented to the Board by the Comptroller, together with a report thereon of Mr. J. B. Bacon, examiner for the Finance Department.

After hearing the said report and the counsel in behalf of Elizabeth H. Theall and others, on motion, the assessment list was again laid over, and the Comptroller requested to cause a further examination to be made in respect to the condition of the work at this time.

After hearing Mr. Abner Bartlett in behalf of the trustees of J. J. Astor and W. Astor, on motion, the said assessment list and objections were referred to the Counsel to the Corporation for a further examination and opinion upon the legal questions involved in said matter.

The Comptroller called the attention of the Board to the fact that the fees of City Surveyors, under the present ordinances, are exorbitant in many cases and unjust to property owners, and offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments call the attention of the Commissioner of Public Works to the fact that the rates of surveyors' fees, as established by the present ordinances, are in many cases, particularly in small improvements, such as laying crosswalks, very

Commissioner of Public Works to the fact that the rates of surveyors' lees, as established by the present ordinances, are in many cases, particularly in small improvements, such as laying crosswalks, very large, and are unjust burdens upon property owners, amounting in some instances to a sum almost equal to one-quarter of the whole expense of the improvement, and request that the Commissioner of Public Works communicate with the Common Council upon said subject with a view to the amendment of the ordinances as now existing, relative to fees of city surveyors, to the end that the compensation may be what the services are fairly and reasonably worth in each case.

At 1:10 o'clock P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.

Commissioner MacLean here retired.

In the matter of complaint against Captain Alex. S. Williams, Twenty-ninth Precinct, charge—conduct unbecoming an officer (Blake case), Commissioner Smith moved that he be dismissed, giving his reasons therefor. Commissioner Ethardt moved to amend—that the complaint be dismissed—giving his reasons therefor. Carried—Commissioners Wheeler and Erhardt voting aye; Commissioner Smith voting no.

Commissioner Smith moved that the opinions of Commissioners Smith and Erhardt be entered in Commissioner Smith moved that the opinions of Commissioners Smith and Erhard be effected in the minutes. Commissioner Wheeler moved to amend that they be placed on file. Lost—Commissioner Wheeler voting aye; Commissioners Smith and Erhardt voting no.

The question then being taken on original motion, was carried—Commissioners Smith and Erhardt voting aye; Commissioner Wheeler voting no.

In the matter of the complaint of William V. Blake, against
Captain Alexander Williams of the Twenty-ninth Precinct. Opinion of Commissioner Smith.

Captain Alexander Williams of the Twenty-ninth Precinct. J
William V. Blake, of Trenton, New Jersey, testified in his direct examination that about quarter
past nine, on the evening of March 11, at Gilmore's Garden, he saw Captain Williams strike a man,
at which he, among others, hissed, thereupon Captain Williams came and thrust his club into Blake's
chest, and called him a damned sneak thef. Blake got up and the Captain struck him again; the
Captain dragged Blake from the gallery, and as Blake was passing under the railing the Captain
gave him a violent kick; that after getting outside the Captain struck Blake again, and made him
reel like a drunken man, and ordered him out of the building. This evidence was not shaken by the
most searching and shrewd cross-examination, which occupies thirty pages of the stenographer's
transcript, nor was Blake's recollection shown at fault in any matter of moment during all the crossexamination, or by any evidence offered in the case.

Henry B. Livingston, of 17 Washington square, testified that he heard hissing; he then saw Captain Williams ascending the tiers and motion to Blake with his club; whether Captain Williams touched Blake or not he could not say. As Blake started to go, Captain Williams took him by the coat and pulled him forcibly from his place; he struck him on the arm and the crowd hissed; Blake offered no resistance; the Captain struck him again on the shoulder and the crowd hissed again; Blake offered no resistance; the Captain struck him again on the back; the crowd hissed and Livingston could see no more.

Livingston was also cross-examined at length, but without affecting his evidence.

Henry Thompson, of 160 West Eleventh street, a lawyer by protession, testified that on the same occasion he heard some hissing of the crowd, and immediately after Captain Williams came in sight on the track; the hissing them stopped; when Captain Williams was in sight of Thompson, then Captain Williams turned to the crowd and said: "You are a lot of God damned dirty Irish bastards; why don't you do it now; I would like to see one of you to do it." A little man, short, thick, stout, came up and said: "I can point him out; I can make my affidavit;" the Captain said, point him out, then the Captain thrust his club in Thompson's face. The man said: "No, I did not see him; the man back of him, in the row back of the boxes; a man with light whiskers;" the Captain said to him, "I know you, you damned dirty loafer;" the man pointed him out and said: "that is not the man;" the Captain said, "who is he then?" The little man said: "I will show you," then the little man and the Captain clambered up through the box; the Captain went under the rail and went up to the man and struck him with his club; the man got up; the Captain struck him again; he took him and pressed him in front of him down through the box and struck him again when he was on the railing in front of the box; the man jumped or was forced down and the Captain came down after him and struck him again.

J. M. R. Williams, of Paterson, New Jersey, also testified to having seen the clubbing of Blake, as did also George Bradshaw of the same place, and likewise Alfred Crent. Both Bradshaw and Crent testified that the Captain called Blake a damned sneak thief.

The character of none of these witnesses was in anywise impeached, nor was any one of them

The character of none of these witnesses was in anywise impeached, nor was any one of them broken down upon cross-examination.

broken down upon cross-examination.

The charge against Captain Williams is that of "conduct unbecoming an officer." The evidence given by these witnesses goes to show conduct so unbecoming as to have been specially provided against by more than one rule of the Board of Police.

The defense put in on the part of the Captain was that the gathering at Gilmore's Garden was one which easily might have broken out into a very serious disturbance, and required stern and judicious treatment, and that it received that and nothing more. Many witnesses were examined on the part of Captain Williams, a few of whom said they were in a position to see the occurrence, and contradicted the statements made by the witnesses above mentioned. It is not necessary to analyze the statements of the several witnesses on the part of the defense, to show how some of the witnesses such as Plummer, were not only inconsistent with themselves, but contradicted each other.

The question here is not the ordinary one of the "weight of evidence," a principal element of which is the supposition that all the evidence which could have been adduced for either side has been submitted, which in this case could only have been done by calling every one of the nine thousand persons present who saw anything of the affair.

What is to be determined is whether the testimony of the witnesses that testified directly to having seen the Captain club Blake, and use most unbecoming language is to be believed, and whether the defense attempted by the Captain was made out.

Opinion fo Commissioner Erhardt.

Blake testifies that he was clubbed and kicked several times. He is corroborated to a certain extent by two witnesses. On the part of the defense a very large number of witnesses testified that they saw the occurrence, and sustain Captain Williams in his action, and positively deny any maltreatment. There has been no attempt to impeach the character of any of the witnesses either for the prosecution or the defense, and the weight of evidence being so overwhelmingly in favor of the defense, it is a fair inference that during the excitement attending an international walking match in

defense, it is a fair inference that during the excitement attending an international walking match in which existed national antipathies, personal friendship, pecuniary wagers, and a turbulent crowd, exaggeration may have colored the honest convictions of witnesses. Prompt action on the part of the commanding officer in this case was required to quell trouble at the outset. While this would not justify unnecessary harshness, it would authorize any commanding officer, and, indeed, it would be his duty to check instantly any quarreisome spirit or riotous demonstration among the spectators.

It appears that stones were thrown through the windows near Rowell's tent; that there were from eight to ten thousand people present, not an orderly crowd, but one bent on mischief, and in dealing with it decision was required on the part of the officer in command; that the adherents of some of the contestants at the time of the alleged offense, were desirous of creating such a disturbance as to break up the match; that Captain Williams was requested by one of the referees, who represented the lessees of the building, and who had the authority usually given in such cases to preserve order, to quiet and eject Blake, and this he did. It does not appear he used unnecessary

harshness; it does appear, however, that he was prompt, and that a serious disturbance did not take place. It must not be forgotten that every officer is entitled to credit for any riot he prevents, and that in this case prompt action and watchfulness alone prevented it.

In the matter of complaint against Sergeant David H. Crowley, Detective Squad, charge conduct unbecoming an officer, Commissioner Erhardt moved that the complaint be dismissed. Carried—Commissioners Wheeler and Erhardt voting aye; Commissioner Smith voting no.
