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BOARDS OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

TWENTY-FIRST DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

MINUTES.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board, Twenty-first District, met at 2 P. M., July 7, 1898, at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Municipal Building, Crotona Park.

Present—President Haffen, Councilman Hottenroth, Alderman McGrath and Alderman Geiger. Minutes of meeting held June 30 last read and adopted.

HEARINGS.

Elevated Column at Third Avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-ninth Street.

Councilman Hottenroth moved that a committee be appointed to prepare a report and communicate with the Corporation Counsel relative to this matter. Alderman McGrath seconded the motion and President Haffen appointed as the Committee Councilman Hottenroth, Alderman McGrath and Alderman Geiger.

The Union Railway Company was not represented.

East One Hundred and Seventy-third Street Asphalt, from Third Avenue to Park Avenue.

Petition of George C. Dressel and others was read and the Secretary stated that the block in question was already under contract for paving with granite block. The petition was ordered placed on file and the Secretary was requested to notify the petitioners that the block mentioned was now under contract for paving with granite block.

East One Hundred and Eighty-second Street (Andrew's place), from Aqueduct Avenue to Jerome Avenue, Regulating and Grading.

Petition of James E. Hussey and others, dated June 14, 1898, was read, and, on motion of Alderman Geiger, it was

Resolved, That this Board hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that the said work be done.

Adopted.

East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth Street, Question of Grade with a View to the Preservation of Trees, between Third Avenue and Southern Boulevard.

Mr. S. C. Thompson, Principal Assistant Engineer in Charge of the Regulating, Grading and Paving Branch of the Department of Highways, Borough of The Bronx, and Mr. F. Greiffenberg, Principal Assistant Topographical Engineer of the Board of Public Improvements, gave the Local Board the information required, and, on motion of Alderman Geiger, the Secretary was instructed to refer the matter to the attention of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Highways, Borough of The Bronx, President Haffen remarking that the petitioners should receive as much consideration as possible.

Fulton Avenue, between East One Hundred and Seventy-third and East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth Streets.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President, Board of Public Improvements :

DEAR SIR—With a letter, dated March 25, from your secretary, I received for investigation and report a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx, recommending that the roadway of Fulton avenue, between East One Hundred and Seventy-third street and East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, be paved with granite-block pavement, and that crosswalks be laid where necessary.

The Deputy Commissioner of Highways for the Borough of The Bronx reports to me that, in his opinion, asphalt pavement ought to be substituted for granite on account of Grammar School No. 63 being located in that block. He also recommends that the regulating, grading and paving work should be included in one contract.

I therefore suggest that the matter be remitted to the Local Board, in order that they may amend their resolution accordingly, if they deem it proper to do so.

The estimated cost of a granite-block pavement on Fulton avenue, between One Hundred and Seventy-third and One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street is \$4,500, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$199,600.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President, Board of Public Improvements :

DEAR SIR—With a letter, dated March 25, from your Secretary, I received for investigation and report a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx, recommending that Fulton avenue, between One Hundred and Seventy-third and One Hundred and Seventy-fourth streets, be regulated and graded, curbstones set and crosswalks flagged a space 4 feet wide through the centre thereof.

The estimated cost of this work is \$6,000, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$199,600.

The Deputy Commissioner of Highways for the Borough of The Bronx recommends that the entire avenue, from the Twenty-third Ward line to East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street, be regulated and graded, instead of only the block between One Hundred and Seventy-third and One Hundred and Seventy-fourth streets.

I concur in the Deputy's recommendation, and suggest that the matter be remitted to the Local Board, in order that it may amend its resolution to cover the entire length of the avenue.

The regulating, grading and paving, being all assessment work, should be included in one resolution and performed under one contract.

On motion of Councilman Hottenroth, it was

Resolved, That the action of the Local Board, Twenty-first District, on March 17 last, upon the petition of Marcus Nathan and Max Marx, dated February 25 last, relative to Fulton avenue, sewer, regulating, grading, etc., and paving between One Hundred and Seventy-third and One Hundred and Seventy-fourth streets, and for sewer, regulating, grading and paving of East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, between Third and Fulton avenues, be and it is hereby rescinded.

And, be it further Resolved, That this board hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements in lieu of its recommendation of March 17 last on said petition, the regulating, grading and paving with granite-block on sand foundation of Fulton avenue, from East One Hundred and Seventieth to East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street, except the one block between One Hundred and Seventy-third and One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, for which asphalt on concrete foundation is recommended on account of the public school at that location ; and that a sewer be constructed in Fulton avenue, from One Hundred and Seventieth to One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street, with branches between Third and Fulton avenues ; and that East One Hundred and Seventy-third street, between Fulton and Third avenues, be regulated, graded and paved with asphalt on concrete foundation and that a sewer be also constructed in this block.

Adopted.

MY DEAR ALDERMAN—Will you kindly see that the proper resolution is passed calling for water and gas mains in East Two Hundred and Fifth street, from Webster avenue to Woodlawn road, and in Hull avenue ; also Decatur avenue, from Woodlawn road to East Two Hundred and Seventh street.

Water and gas mains are at each end of the above points so that the above resolution would make a connection greatly needed.

The streets and avenues are now graded, flagged and curbed, and by the time the resolution passes be in excellent shape.

The Secretary was directed to refer the matter to the Chief Engineer of Highways of the Borough of The Bronx.

ELECTION MINUTES.

At a meeting of the Board of Police of the Police Department of The City of New York, held on the 16th day of May, 1898.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the requirement of the Primary Election Law, the Police Board, as custodian of the primary records, hereby prescribes the ballot to be used at the Primary Election to be held June 7, 1898, as follows:

The size of ballot shall be eight and one-half inches in width by fourteen inches in length. The weight of paper shall be 32 pounds to the ream of 480 sheets, double cap (17 by 28). The texture Greylock linen ledger.

The color for the Democratic ballot shall be blue. The color for the Republican ballot shall be pink. Such ballots shall be printed in black ink, brevier caps and lower case roman, the caption to be in caps of brevier roman, the names of delegates in caps and lower case brevier roman, all to be leaded.

Resolved, That in conformity with section 4, subdivision 3, chapter 179 of the Laws of 1898, the Primary Districts required for the official primary elections to be held on June 7, 1898, for the Boroughs comprised within The City of New York, are constituted as follows:

ELECTION MINUTES.

At a meeting of the Board of Police of the Police Department of The City of New York, held on the 17th day of May, 1898.

Present—Commissioners York (President), Hamilton, Sexton and Philips.

Resolved, That the Superintendent of Elections shall call for sealed bids for the cartage of polling-place fittings, from station-houses to and from polling-places within The City of New York, for the official primary election to be held June 7, 1898, such bids to be submitted for the action of the Board before 12 M. on May 25 next.

Estimates for the furnishing of paper required for ballots by the Primary Election Law having been invited and received, and the Martin B. Brown Company being the lowest bidders, and having offered to furnish such paper for ballots in size, color, form and texture as adopted by this Board of Police, at the rate of \$2 74 per 1,000 ballots, it is

Resolved, That the said bid of the Martin B. Brown Company be accepted, and that an agreement be made by and between this Board and the said Brown Company by which the said Brown Company will agree to furnish such quantity of said ballots as may be required and to be delivered at such place or places as may be required by this Board, said Brown Company to collect and receive from the persons desiring to purchase said paper the price therefor, the Board of Police being in nowise responsible for the value of the same, and that an agreement to this effect be entered into by and between the said Martin B. Brown Company and the Superintendent of Elections in behalf of the Board of Police.

Resolved, That the Chairmen of the different County Committees be notified as to the size, kind of paper, etc., that Martin B. Brown Company has been awarded contract at two dollars and seventy-four cents per thousand, and that such ballots can be furnished at Nos. 49 to 57 Park place on and after the 24th day of May, 1898.

Resolved, That the persons named in list marked "O" be selected and appointed as Inspectors of Election in the several districts named, in the place and stead of those previously selected, approved and appointed, who have resigned, failed to qualify, etc.

That said list be approved and ordered on file in the Bureau of Elections, and the Chief of the Bureau be directed to issue the necessary notices to said persons and qualify them according to law:
