[Extract from Proceedings of the Board of Aldermen of October 7, 1902.]

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS

The President laid before the Board the following departmental estimates:

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES.

Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx,
Commissioner's Office, Foot of East Twenty-sixth Street,
New York, September 10, 1902.

Hon. C. V. FORNES, President Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—Pursuant to the request of the Comptroller of July 23, 1902, I beg to submit herewith the estimate of the Department of Public Charities for the year 1903. This estimate shows a considerable increase over the amounts allowed for 1902 in the items of salaries, supplies and contingencies, and alterations, additions and repairs to buildings and apparatus. The facts which make it necessary to ask for increased allowances for these purposes are as follows:

Salaries.

The estimate for salaries shows an increase of \$62,551.17 over the amount allowed for 1902. The amount allowed in 1902, however, failed to take into account the fact that this Department was required to pay the salaries of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for one month. The increase in the estimate for 1903 over the roll of July, 1902, is \$57,672.83. This increase comprises four items:

1. The substitution of a schedule covering the entire year for the Cumberland Street Hospital and for the Bradford Street Hospital in place of a schedule for a part of the year for each of those hospitals for 1902. The Cumberland Street Hospital was opened July 1, 1902, and will be fully occupied before the end of the year. The Bradford Street Hospital will also be opened before the close of the year. The amount of the increase for these two items is \$19,552.

2. An increase in the wages of engineers to the prevailing rate and in the wages of stokers to the prevailing rate. The engineers of this Department now receive salaries ranging from \$900 to \$1,277.50 per annum. I believe that all of the engineers should receive the prevailing rate of wages, viz.: \$3.50 per day (\$1,277.50 per annum) less an equitable deduction for maintenance in the case of those who are required to reside in the institutions maintained by the Department. I have submitted a schedule which calls for \$3 per day (\$1,095 per annum) for engineers in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, most of whom now reside in the institutions, with the expectation of paying \$3.50 to such of them as I may find it practicable to permit to reside outside of the Department. In Brooklyn the engineers now reside outside of the institutions and I have asked for \$3.50 per day for them. The total proposed increase on account of engineers' salaries is \$2,420.

I have asked for the stokers who now reside in the institutions \$1.50 per day with the expectation of increasing the wages to \$2 per day for all those whom it is practicable to permit to reside outside of the institutions. This involves an increase of \$6,557.50.

The total proposed increase in the salaries of engineers and stokers is \$8,977.50. To the extent that I find it practicable to permit engineers and stokers to reside outside of the institutions, I will be able by the reduction in the cost of maintenance to ask for a transfer from supplies to salaries to cover the increased wages.

3. Increases of salaries. I have recommended an increase of salary only in those instances in which the salary paid is manifestly inadequate to the responsibilities and duties of the positions and inadequate to retain the services of people competent to perform the duties of the positions, or in case of employees who have served faithfully and efficiently and have thus won a promotion to a higher grade. I am convinced that a comparison of the salary roll of this Department with those of other departments will show that much lower salaries are paid by this Department for similar grades of work. The amount involved in the proposed increases of salaries (other than those of engineers and stokers), is \$8,170.

4. Additional employees. I have been obliged to ask for additional employees in various offices and institutions in which the experience of the past year shows that the present force is inadequate to do the work as it should be done or in which new work is to be undertaken during 1903, as in the case of the proposed new convalescent wards at the Metropolitan Hospital. The total amount of the additional help requested is \$20,973.33.

Supplies and Contingencies.

Notwithstanding the fact that during 1903 several hospitals will be open during the entire year which were open during only a part of 1902 and also that the consumptive wards at the Metropolitan Hospital will be open during the entire year with their full capacity instead of only in part as in 1902, the Department would have been able to recommend a reduction in the appropriation for supplies on account of certain economies which have been effected were it not for the marked increase in the cost of food supplies and coal over the prices paid during 1902 on contracts advertised during the latter part of 1901 before the increase in the cost of meats and other food supplies and coal. While it is impossible at this time to make a close estimate of the prices that must be paid for supplies in 1903, a careful inquiry indicates that an average increase in the cost of food supplies and coal as compared with the prices at which bids were received in 1901 for deliveries in 1902 will be at least 10 per cent. and may, especially in the case of meat and coal, considerably exceed that figure. An increase of 10 per cent. to cover this rise in prices is requested, and it is believed that this is a very conservative estimate. The present range of prices in the largest two items of supplies—meats and fuel—would indicate a much larger increase than 10 per cent., but it is believed that prices will be somewhat lower before the purchases for 1903 are made.

Alterations, Additions and Repairs to Buildings and Apparatus.

The appropriation requested for this item is \$157,000. This is an increase of \$76,500 over the appropriation for 1902, but is less than the average of the appropriation for 1899 and for 1900, which were \$200,000 and \$135,500 respectively. The buildings occupied by this Department accommodated during the month of August, 1902, an average of 8,364 persons. A moderate estimate of their cost would be \$450 per capita, or a total of \$3,763,800. Many of these buildings are old, and there is constant need of minor repairs, renewal of plumbing, heating and ventilating apparatus, etc. An estimate for repairs of 4 per cent. per annum on the original cost of the buildings would certainly be a very moderate one, and would indicate an expenditure of \$150,552 annually for ordinary repairs. In addition to this some alterations and additions are necessary to fit certain of the buildings for their present uses, and a steam launch should be provided for the Randall's Island Ferry in place of the present open row boat. In the estimate a detailed statement of each item for repairs, so far as we can now foresee the same during 1903, is given.

I should state that in this estimate I have included only those items which are, in my judgment, of immediate and urgent necessity. I have omitted many items requested

by heads of institutions which were reasonable and proper, but which are of less immediate need, as, for instance, a crematory for the incineration of garbage on Randall's Island, which is now disposed of in a very primitive manner; the enlarging of the laundry on Randall's Island, etc.

Donations to G. A. R. Veterans and Burial of Veterans, and Headstones.

The expenditures for these items are not practically subject to the control of this Department, the expenditures being made in the first instance by other authorities and the bills for their reimbursement being audited by this Department. The appropriations for these items have always been inadequate; and under existing statutes the Department is unable to confine the actual disbursements to the amounts as appropriated, with the result that a transfer of these items has for several years been necessary. This has resulted in delay, and has been a source of considerable annoyance to the G. A. R. posts who have made the disbursements.

Every item in the estimate as submitted has been considered with great care, and is believed to be necessary to secure such shelter and care for the wards of this Department as the City authorities would desire them to have.

To the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Under date of August 9, 1902, I submitted the Departmental Estimate of the amount of expenditures necessary for the payment of the salaries of the Justice and Officers of this Court for the year 1903.

I learn that the other districts of the Municipal Court have added thereto for your consideration a request for an additional sum to cover the contingent expenses of the Court for the several districts. Last year my impression was that the Board of Justices, as such, submitted an estimate to cover the contingent expenses of the entire Court, and I therefore omitted to ask for any sum for this district for the ensuing year.

I would add that the sum of at least \$500 is necessary to cover the actual expenses of the Court, outside of salaries, etc., and I ask that such amount be appropriated in addition to the sum of \$19,100 covered by my prior estimate.

NEW YORK POST-GRADUATE MEDICAL SCHOOL AND HOSPITAL.

New York Post-Graduate Medical School and Hospital,
Second Avenue and Twentieth Street,
New York, September 30, 1902.

To President Board of Aldermen, New York:

Sir—In consequence of the order of the Board of Health excluding children with trachoma (granular lids) from the public schools, literally thousands of children are and will be excluded from the schools of The City of New York this year and are without any proper surgical treatment. Under modern methods of treatment in a hospital, by means of a surgical operation and other treatment, this disease can be cured in a very large percentage of cases. Without such treatment a large proportion of these little patients will become partially or completely blind.

The Post-Graduate Hospital, as at present constituted, without a much larger appropriation from the City than has been made for the last three years, can not care for but a very few of these as house patients, the only way that it is possible to cure them. It is estimated that we can treat constantly forty of these patients in a building near the hospital, which we can hire for the purpose, at a total expense, including the entire care of the patients, of about seven thousand dollars per annum. A large number would be treated during the year, as the necessary stay for each patient in the ward would not be more than from three to four weeks. The disease is highly contagious, and cannot, therefore, be treated in any but isolated wards. This is one of the reasons that we can, as at present assisted by the City, only care for a small number. The directors of the institution are confident that a large sum of money would be saved to the State if these school children could be properly treated by us and similar institutions during the year.

The urgency of the situation has induced the directors to present this statement as a supplement to their annual application for a sum not to exceed the sum of thirty thousand dollars annually, which your Board is allowed to give at their discretion to assist us in our work.

Appropriations Required to Carry on the Following Work in the Topographical Bureau.

I.—Making Topographical Surveys, Laying Out Streets, Making Maps, Plans, etc. This work comprises:

First—Making surveys, calculations, maps and technical descriptions of alterations and amendments of lines or grades of streets authorized by special acts of the Legislature or by the Local Board of the Borough of The Bronx, or by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Second—Making topographical surveys and preparing maps for the laying out and the establishing of lines and grades of avenues and streets which have not been established heretofore.

Third—Making surveys, computations and plans for the sewerage systems.

Fourth—A general topographical survey is to be made of all those portions of The City of New York for which no survey has been made. This survey will form the basis for the preparation of the street system and sewerage plans and has to be completed before any actual laying out of streets and improvements in the same can be commenced.

II.—Monumenting Avenues and Streets.

This work is required to define on the ground, by means of stones or bolts, the lines of the streets and their intersections as shown on filed maps. Instructions are prepared in the office for selecting traverse stations on the ground, from which the positions of new monuments are calculated and stakes for the monuments will be set.

After that, parties, each of which consist of one (1) Assistant and two (2) Laborers, will proceed to put monument stones or bolts into the ground. The work is to be plotted, recorded on maps and in books, and the positions of the stones or bolts have to be tested.

The Topographical Bureau is called upon to keep all monuments in correct positions, to reference the same and to take up and reset the same before and after every contract for a street improvement is carried out.

III.—Making Surveys and Maps for Acquiring Title to Avenues and Streets for the Use of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment and for Acquiring Right of Way for Building Drains.

The work under this head consists of:

First—Making rule maps, in triplicate, and technical descriptions for the use of the Counsel to the Corporation, showing the lands to be taken by the City in the proceedings to acquire title, for the use of the public, to streets and avenues and roads, and to acquire the right-of-way for drains to be constructed as directed by the Board of Health.

Second—Making a survey of every visible object within the lines of streets to be opened.

Third—Making the draft damage map for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, showing the dimensions of the lands, buildings, fences, walls, etc., within the lines of the streets to be opened; also the materials of which the buildings, etc., are constructed. A copy of this map is retained for use in this office.

Fourth—Making the draft benefit maps for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, showing all the lots and plots or parcels of land to be assessed within the area to be defined by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, giving all the ward numbers, lot numbers, names of owners and areas of lots. A copy of this map is retained for use in this office.

Fifth—Making the final copies in triplicate of the damage and benefit maps.

Sixth—Making profiles showing the present and the future elevations of all streets for which proceedings for acquiring title are pending. These profiles required field work in many cases.

Proceedings are now pending in the Borough of The Bronx and are in various stages of completion.

The work relating to street opening matters is of great importance, and is rapidly increasing.

IV.—Supplies, Contingencies, Lithographing and Printing.

It is intended to lithograph all maps of importance and such maps as will be distributed to the public, and also to reduce or to enlarge by the photo-lithographic process maps to be used in the other City departments.

The Budget of the City for the year 1902 provided for work in the Topographical Bureau as follows:

It has been found from past experience that it is rather difficult to keep the appropriation for monumenting avenues and streets and one for surveying, laying out, maps, plans, etc., separate, and to make the charges of the work, which consist of office work and field work, perfectly correct.

It is suggested, therefore, that these two items be merged into one, and therefore only three items be mentioned in the appropriation for the Topographical Bureau, namely:

The foregoing estimate of funds required for the outside force of the Bureau of Highways has been carefully compiled and only the bare necessities of the work considered.

The item of broken stone in the list of supplies is an important one, at least 60,000 cubic yards being required to put the earth roads in proper condition and for laying and relaying macadam.

The rapid growth of the population in the outlying districts of the borough require the streets not yet graded to be rounded up and continually kept in passable condition.

The present force is far from sufficient to cover the large territory, so necessarily do the needs of the borough in this connection require the additional supplies, such as tools, coal and material, shown by the schedule.

This estimate for rock soundings provides for the cost of investigating the character of the material on streets where improvements are about to be made, so that accurate estimates of the various materials to be excavated may be made in advance of the letting of proposed contracts. It also provides for the cost of examination of completed contracts, to determine whether the material, when rock, has been excavated to the depth required by the contract.

The custom of determining closely the amount of rock and other material to be removed has worked advantageously in the letting of contracts, as it has avoided so-called unbalanced bids and the result in disputes arising over great variations between the preliminary and final estimate.

Provision is made also for such investigations as may be necessary to determine the character of foundations required for the various structures built as a part of the work of this Bureau.

The appropriation asked for preliminary surveys, etc., is required to cover the necessary expenses in making, for the information of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, surveys, estimates and reports of the cost of proposed sewers, and also the preparation of plans, specifications therefor, for the necessary investigation, surveys, plans, computations, etc., in the matter of proposed tunnel outlet sewer, which is intended to take the drainage from about one-half of the territory of the Borough of The Bronx, lying east of the Bronx river, and from the northerly section of the borough located west of the Bronx river, besides providing an adequate outlet for drainage from the Bronx river and Tibbett's Brook valley; it is proposed to have this tunnel sewer discharge into the Hudson river at some suitable point between Spuyten Duyvil and the northern line of the City.

It is of supreme importance as a measure of proper sanitation that the Bronx river should be free from the pollution to which it is subjected, as in its present state it is virtually an open sewer flowing through and in proximity to a residential district, and passing also through the entire length of Bronx Park, in which are located the Botanical and Zoological Gardens, thereby creating not only an unpleasant condition, but one which is inimical to the public health.

To ameliorate these conditions the money required for the purposes hereinbefore outlined should be provided. Fifteen thousand dollars of the increase required is intended for the preliminary surveys, etc., on account of this proposed sewer, the balance being needed for the studies and investigations, the surveys and plans, in the matter of providing overflow sewers and the remodelling of the existing sewers in those portions of the borough which have become closely built up and where the present sewers are but too frequently inadequate to discharge the duties imposed upon them. This is a matter of great importance and provision should be made in the Budget, so that this matter may be taken up as soon as the funds therefor are available.

The amount asked for boring examination is required for the purpose of defraying the cost of borings and soundings necessary to ascertain the quantities of rock to be removed and the character of necessary foundation for the construction of proposed sewers and appurtenances; these examinations are a most important part of the preliminary investigations requisite to obtain the data upon which to base the estimates of cost desired for the information of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the matter of projected sewers, etc., and also for the preparation of the plans and specifications for such work.

The importance of an adequate appropriation is respectfully urged, and it is to be noted that the appropriation for 1902 will be insufficient to meet the requirements in the case, and to eke out this account a transfer from some other fund will be necessary. The full amount therefore asked (\$21,675) should be allowed in the Budget for 1903.

The amount required as shown above is for the proper maintenance, cleaning and repairs of sewers and appurtenances and it is of the first importance that the full amount requested be appropriated, as the sum available for the current year will not be adequate to continue this highly important work in such manner as it should be, it being estimated that the 1902 appropriation will be over \$23,000 short of meeting the needs of this branch of the business of the Bureau.

The length of sewers to be maintained, etc., is about 190 miles, and the number of receiving basins to be kept clean is about 2,200. The majority of these basins have to be cleaned out very frequently, many of them after every storm, owing to the fact that they receive the surface drainage from unpaved streets and therefore become quickly filled with earth and sand.

In addition, much labor and expense is required to properly care for the surface drainage of all the borough lying east of the Bronx river, and of about one-half of the area of the borough lying west of the Bronx river, where no sewers suitable to care for storm water have as yet been built. It is essential that an adequate appropriation be made to permit of this work being carried on continuously with a suitable number of men employed during the whole year. It is most urgently requested that the full amount of the departmental estimate for the purposes above named be incorporated in the Budget for 1903.

This is a new account, and the amount estimated is required for the following reasons.

The outlet sewer for Williamsbridge and Wakefield Districts passes through Bronx Park, and is carried under the Bronx river by an inverted syphon. This syphon requires frequent cleaning at the cost of much time and expense, and the work involved is of a precarious nature to those who have to perform it. To obviate these objectionable features and to minimize the cost of maintenance it is proposed to make such repairs and renewals in the line of the sewer above the inlet end of the syphon as are required to provide against the recurrent trouble of the obstruction of said syphon. It is to be regretted that the request for this appropriation was not allowed for the year 1902, as this work is a matter of urgency, and the appropriation therefor should be allowed.

This also is a new account, and the appropriation is requested for the following reasons:

The Brook avenue sewer is the main outlet sewer for a district having an area of about four square miles, and as a considerable mileage of the streets within this section is unpaved, storm water carries quantities of earth and sand into the sewerage system, and a portion of this silt finds deposit in the Brook avenue sewer on account of the tidal action to which it is subjected.

The sewer in question is about 10,000 feet in length, and there is a deposit therein to the extent of about 5,000 cubic yards, which very materially reduces the carrying capacity of the sewer, with the result that after every storm many house cellars are damaged by back water, and the health of the community subjected to these conditions is seriously menaced.

Attention is respectfully called to the fact that after every storm many complaints as to the conditions hereinbefore indicated are lodged with the Bureau of Sewers by citizens whose properties are subjected to damages by overflow; and further, it is to be remembered that in the year 1901 there occurred two extremely rainstorms, which resulted in damages to many premises along the line of the Brook avenue outlet sewer, and that the owners of the premises in question now have claims for damages filed against the City in the aggregate of several hundred thousands of dollars.

This request for an appropriation to cover the cost of cleaning this sewer (by contract) is a repetition of one made in the early part of this year, and it is to be hoped that the present request will meet with favorable consideration, as the matter of cleaning this sewer is one of the great and pressing needs of this borough.

Attention is called to the fact that the amount actually required during 1902 for appropriation of "salaries and wages" as per following salary list was \$39,100.50, while

the total appropriation for the purpose was but \$34,000, necessitating the laying off of several employees for a part of the time, although the force is exactly the same numerically as it was on December 31, 1901, when the employees of the old Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies of the Borough of The Bronx were merged into this jurisdiction.

Said salary list shows three additional firemen required, which, though apparently an increase, is really a reinstatement, as during nine months of the year four firemen are required, there being but one at work during July, 1902, the month from which this salary list is made up.

By reason of insufficient appropriation this Bureau has been hampered for lack of clerks, the entire clerical work falling on the Superintendent. At least one Clerk is required, also a Telephone Operator to operate switchboard now being installed in the Municipal Building.

The increase in salaries and wages for 1903 over 1902, as shown by above table, viz.: \$290,084.75, provides to a large extent for an increase of force, particularly in the outside laboring force of "Highways" and "Sewers," these two last named bureaus alone showing an increase of \$266,117.

The balance of increase is required to equalize salaries and recognize worth, merit and long experience, of faithful and competent employees engineers, draughtsmen, etc., many of whom have been offered the rate of salary proposed for 1903 by other City Departments, and only by the proposed increase can their severance from, and consequent detriment to, the interests of this Department be averted.

These increases, as shown in the several salary lists, should have been made in the Budget and salary list adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 30 last, but in view of the expressed desire of said Board, i. e., that 10 per cent. deduction be effected in the salary lists of each department, said increases were postponed until the Budget for 1903 was prepared.

Gentlemen—In behalf of the Directors of the Union Settlement Association (incorporated) I would respectfully make application for an appropriation from the City of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) to be applied to the work of our Free Circulating Library.

In filing this application, I beg to submit the following facts:

1. There is, we believe, no other free lending library within the Thirtieth and Thirty-second Assembly Districts, with a population of nearly 140,000; the nearest library to the south being the Yorkville Branch of the New York Public Library, Seventy-ninth street and Second avenue, and on the north, the Aguilar Library, East One Hundred and Tenth street.

2. With a total of 2,001 volumes in the library, our circulation for the year ending April, 1902, was 11,430; and it can be confidently predicted that the circulation for the current year will reach nearly 15,000. This has been accomplished at an annual expenditure of \$1,050. If we should be able to receive the appropriation desired from the City, it would be possible to carry out plans which would largely increase the usefulness of the library.

3. We are endeavoring to make the library of special service to the children of school age and are working in close co-operation with the public schools of our neighborhood.

4. Our library is open for reading, reference work and circulation every day in the year, except Sundays and legal holidays.

The library has State registry, and I am filing with the Comptroller, as required by law, a certificate from the State library of approved circulation of 11,000 volumes. I inclose an estimate of our expenses for the year.

Sirs—In accordance with your resolution of July 11, and under the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, I transmit herewith the Departmental Estimate of the Tenement House Department for the year 1903:

The amount asked for the proper administration of that Department for 1903 is \$563,850, made up as follows:

In connection with this estimate I wish to make the following explanations:

1st. It is an increase of \$216,797.92 over the estimate for 1902, approved April 30 by your Honorable Board, the amount of which was \$347,052.08, made up as follows:

Salaries.....	\$299,933 34
Rents.....	14,500 00
Supplies and Contingencies.....	32,618 74

This increase is partly only apparent and partly real.
It is partly only apparent because the appropriation for 1902 was practically an eight months' and not a twelve months' appropriation, as must be the appropriation for 1903.

For reasons which will be hereafter stated there were only 28 officers and employees of the Department on April 30, when this appropriation took effect, out of a total of 341 whose salaries were fixed by your Honorable Board on that date, and the appropriation was made at the amount named for that reason.

The proper basis of comparison, therefore, as respects salaries, is not the actual appropriation, which was for substantially eight months of 1902, but the amount of salaries as then fixed for the entire year.

That amount was..... \$422,350 00

Adding to this the allowance made in 1902 for—

Rents 14,500 00

—and for

Supplies and Contingencies..... 32,618 74

Makes a total of \$469,468 74

Therefore, the actual increase between the appropriation for 1902 and that asked for 1903 is..... \$563,750 00

Less 469,468 74

\$94,281 26

Nor is this the difference between the amount which I stated to you as in my opinion necessary for salaries in the Tenement House Department for the year 1902 and the amount which I now deem necessary for 1903, because, as you will remember, the salary list originally named by me was cut down by about 10 per cent., pursuant to your resolution of April 7, and, as I stated at the time of that reduction, "the original amount was, in my opinion, necessary to the proper administration of the Tenement House Department." This 10 per cent. cut was \$33,222.

This leaves, however, a substantial difference between the amount asked for in 1902 and that asked for in 1903.

2d. This difference represents the present judgment of myself, my Deputy Commissioners and my heads of Bureaus as to the amount of additional service needed in the Department to properly perform its work. I emphasize "present judgment" because that judgment may be modified by our experience, even during the short time that will elapse between the date of this estimate and the time when you are called upon to fix the Budget.

This Department, as you are aware, is a new one. The extent of its normal work is still unknown. It is inaugurating for the first time a system of regular periodic inspections of the tenement houses of Greater New York, which number over 83,000 and which, according to the last authentic census, were occupied by 2,372,079 persons. The Department cannot yet be said to be completely organized, for, although most of its employees are now appointed, the greater part of them have been appointed so recently that they have not yet become experienced. Its organization must be tentative until experience has shown the volume of its work as well as the capacity of its employees after training to perform that work.

3d. You may very properly ask why it is that a Department which came into existence on January 1, even though it was charged with new duties, the extent of which could only be determined by experience, has not yet had sufficient experience to be able now to state with certainty the number of employees required for the coming year.

The reason is because, under the Civil Service Law and Rules, as administered and in spite of every effort on my part and on the part of those associated with me in the Department, it has been impossible to complete its organization by the appointment of a full quota of employees until during the past month, and those who were appointed have not become familiar with their duties nor have many of them

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yet passed their probationary period. The bulk of the Department employees are Inspectors and Clerks. No eligible list of Inspectors was provided until May, and it was not until well into June that they could be sufficiently trained in their duties to be placed in the field. No eligible list of Clerks was received until May 27, and out of that entire list only 11 were available for some 50 positions. A second examination was immediately requested, and the eligible list from that examination was received on July 23, so that the necessary Clerks (allowing for the preliminary examination requisite to enable the appointing officer to use the discretion accorded to him) could not be actually appointed until early in August.

The Department has, therefore, had nothing approaching its full complement of employees until within the last few weeks, and most of these employees are as yet untrained. Nor have all positions yet been filled. They will be filled as more untrained men can wisely be added to the ranks of those who are becoming accustomed to their work.

Under these circumstances you will appreciate that I have had no sufficient experience on which to make an exact estimate for the coming year.

I therefore ask that the estimate now made be received as a tentative estimate, subject to revision by me at the time when it comes up for consideration by your Honorable Board, so that I may then have opportunity to change it according to the test of actual experience between now and then.

4th. The comparison between 1902 and 1903 is made for the month of August instead of for the month of July, because many employees were not appointed until August, and August furnished the only full month in the past on which any intelligent comparison could be predicated; and even that is incomplete, for the reasons stated.

5th. No increase in any salary is requested.

To the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—The accompanying requisition for this Department asks for an increase for the ensuing year over the appropriations for the current year of \$17,600, being 2 per cent. on the amount of the present payroll. This is to cover increased expenditures which will be necessary during the year 1903 because of the increase of

work and of the development of certain lines of work which will, during the year, require various new appointments and promotions. The increase of work is due, in the first place, to the natural increase of the City from year to year, and specifically this year and next, to the large expenditures which the City is making upon improvements. As for new work, I especially desire, during the ensuing year, to develop the Real Estate Bureau of the Department. Much has been done during the past year in this line, as is evident from the large number of parcels of land which have been acquired by private purchase instead of condemnation. I wish to create a complete plant, such as the best real estate offices of the City have. This would be of great assistance in the City's dealings in real estate. The City of New York is probably the largest individual owner of land within the City, and probably buys each year more pieces than any other single purchaser. Something should be done during the coming year towards selling lands for which the City no longer has use. It has not been possible this year, in the press of other work, to develop this Department satisfactorily so as to cover these purposes.

In reckoning the appropriations at the disposal of this Department during the year, I have included the two transfers from the Sinking Fund expenses and the "City Record" appropriation, due to the transfer of individual employees, and have also included the item allowed in the last budget for the expenses of real estate, an item which has always been in fact, though not in form, a part of the appropriation of this Department. These sums make apparent but not real increases in the budget.

Another fact to be noted is that during this year, as heretofore, the Department has been allowed, from the sale of Special Revenue Bonds, two sums for Expert Accountants and for Compilation Clerks, which this year amount to \$53,940.98. They have been part of the appropriation of the office, but have not appeared in the current year's budget. The effect of meeting them by Special Revenue Bonds under laws which so provided at the outset, but with the intention, as I believe, that the method should be followed only for the first year, has been to transfer the part of each year's expense represented by such Revenue Bonds to the next year's tax account. This is obviously a bad system of finance, and I hope to discontinue it. To do so necessarily means an increase in this year's budget of this sum of \$53,940.98, but it is not an increase in the appropriation of the Department.

The total increase in the appropriation for the Department which is asked is only the 2 per cent. increase of \$17,600.

BOARD OF CITY RECORD.

New York, July 28, 1902.

A meeting of the Board of City Record was held this day in the Council Chamber, City Hall, at 2 o'clock.

Present—Hon. Seth Low, Mayor; Hon. George L. Rives, Corporation Counsel, and Hon. E. M. Grout, Comptroller.

The minutes of July 14 were approved as submitted.

The following resolution was passed:

Resolved, That the minutes of June 23 be amended so as to include *Daily America* and *Literary Digest* in the list of papers to be used for the bond sale of June 26.

The Supervisor submitted a report concerning requisitions for 1903, which was ordered on file, and the following resolution referred to therein adopted unanimously:

"Resolved, In case of any department, or office, or court, ordering, through the City Record, a duplicate book of one which is at present in use, that the Supervisor shall be authorized to decline executing such order unless he has received a sample sheet from the book to be duplicated, or a ruled sheet with proper instructions thereon sufficiently explicit to enable a duplicate copy to be made."

On motion of the Corporation Counsel, the following resolution concerning bookbinders was unanimously adopted:

The Supervisor submitted the following communication:

NEW YORK, July 28, 1902.

To the Honorable the Board of City Record:

GENTLEMEN—His Honor the Mayor has forwarded for your consideration a communication from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity transmitting bills for advertising the shutting off of the water supply in January last. When the former Commissioner made a request to the Board to authorize this or similar advertising the Comptroller remarked that, needful as it was, there was no authority under which it could be done.

The following sentence appears in section 1526 of the Charter: "No money shall be paid from the City Treasury and no action shall be maintained and no judgment obtained against The City of New York * * * for any advertising, except such as is herein authorized."

When, therefore, Mr. Monroe conferred with me ten days ago as to doing similar advertising, I suggested that I could order it only on condition that he would agree, in the event of there being no other way to meet the expense incurred, to have it charged against his appropriation for contingencies, and that in that case I would recommend a transfer from the appropriation "General Advertising, not otherwise provided for," to his contingent account to cover the same. This advertising as well as that called for in the bills submitted by his Honor the Mayor, was an absolute necessity, and if there is no way of covering it, some way should be found.

Altogether, it seems to me that sections 1526 and 1528 of the Charter require recasting and the injection of some common sense, and I suggest that the Corporation Counsel be requested to propose their amendment when the Legislature meets. Meanwhile I suggest the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Board of City Record approve the action of the Supervisor in inserting the notice concerning shutting off water July 19 and 20, at the request of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in the following papers of July 18 and 19: *Sun, Times, News, Commercial Advertiser, New Yorker Zeitung, World, Journal, Mail and Express, Staats Zeitung and Herald*,—the cost thereof to be charged against the appropriation "Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Contingencies, 1902."

Resolved, That this Board approve of the action of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity in advertising the shutting off of water on January 19 and 20, in the *Tribune, Herald, Sun, Press, Staats Zeitung, Times, World and Journal*—and that the Supervisor, after verifying the bills, be directed to forward the same to the Finance Department, with the approval of the Commissioner, for payment out of the appropriation "Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Contingencies, 1902."

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 430 of the Greater New York Charter.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to The City.

The contracts must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of The City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by The City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the department for which the work is to be done.
