
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DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Report for the Quarter ending December 31, 1880.

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS, 36 UNION SQUARE, February 2, 1881.

SIR—At a meeting of the Board governing the Department of Public Parks, held this day, I was directed to transmit to you the accompanying quarterly report of the Department for the quarter ending with December 31, 1880, and am

In accordance with section 27, chapter 335. Laws of 1873, the Department of Public Parks presents the following statement of its transactions for the quarter ending with December 31, 1880:

During the past quarter the personnel of the Commissioners governing the Department has changed by the appointment of Salem H. Wales, as Commissioner, in the place of James F. Wenman, whose term of office had expired, and William M. Olliffe, in place of Andrew H. Green, and Charles F. MacLean, in place of Samuel Conover, resigned.

The working forces of the Department have been learnly reduced during the contraction.

The working forces of the Department have been largely reduced during the past quarter, the season of the year and the condition of the works under the control of the Department warranting such reductions.

The foundation for the statue of Admiral Farragut, to be erected on Madison Square, has been put in and all is now ready for the pedestal, which, it is understood, will be erected in the early Spring.
A statue of Alexander Hamilton, erected on the Central Park by John C. Hamilton, was pre-

A statue of Alexander Hamilton, etceled on the Central Park by John C. Hamilton, was presented to the city with appropriate ceremonies on November 22d.

A contract has been entered into with the Russell Pavement Company for paving the Mall and concert ground on the Central Park with asphalt pavement. This work is one that has long been necessary, and, when completed, will greatly add to the pleasure and attraction of that portion of the

Repairs have been made to the walks in the Central Park. About 15,000 square feet of asphalt pavement has been laid on the walks about the Casino and 5,000 square feet on the walks leading from the Sixth avenue entrance at Fifty-ninth street. Repairs to the extent of some 4,000 square feet have been made to the Neufchatel pavement at Union Square.

The maintenance of the roads and walks of the parks, the care of the turf, plants, and trees have all been continued to the extent the limited force in the employ of the Department would admit.

The work of cleaning and repainting of the Terrace Bridge was continued until the severity of the weather prevented.

4,389 cubic yards of filling have been put in at Manhattan Square during the past quarter.

During the last ten days of the quarter the ice on the lakes at the Central Park has been thrown open to the public for skating, and has been enjoyed by thousands. The Conservatory lake has been reserved for the use of the curlers.

Upon the permission heretofore granted, work upon the foundation and base upon which is to be erected the Alexandrian Obelisk has been steadily progressed. This work is being conducted

without expense to the Department.

In accordance with the permission given some time since, the drinking fountain erected at Madison Square through the liberality of Miss Olivia Phelps Stokes, has been completed and dedicated to public use. The fountain is a meritorious work of art, and the whole structure reflects great credit upon the donor.

A contract has been entered into with George W. Ward for the erection of a ladies' cottage on Tompkins Square. This will complete the construction of this Square as intended by the original

Contracts for the following named works have been awarded:

Sewer and appurtenances in Third avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, from One
Hundred and Fifty-eighth street to Brook avenue.

Sewer and appurtenances in One Hundred and Forty-first street, from Third avenue to Alexander avenue, with branch in Alexander avenue.

der avenue, with branch in Alexander avenue.

Sewer and appurtenances in One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, from Third avenue to the summit east of Willis avenue, with branches in Lincoln, Alexander, and Willis avenues.

Sewers and their appurtenances in the Southern Boulevard (One Hundred and Thirty-third street), from Third avenue to Willis avenue, with branches in Lincoln, Alexander, and Willis avenues.

Laying crosswalks in Courtland avenue, and in each street intersecting said avenue, from Third avenue to One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street.

These works having all been petitioned for by the adjacent property owners, and will be prosecuted so soon as the season will admit.

The following named assessment list for works completed have been signed and forwarded to the Board of Assessors:

For constructing drains for the lands bounded on the north by Fordham, and Balkern and Balkern.

For constructing drains for the lands bounded on the north by Fordham and Pelham avenues, on the south by the Kingsbridge road, on the east by the Southern Boulevard, and on the west by Arthur street, in the Twenty-third Ward.

For the sewers with their appurtenances in Mott avenue, from the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad to One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, and in One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, from Mott avenue to the Ice Pond brook, in the Twenty-third Ward.

For the sewers with their appurtenances in One Hundred and Fortieth street, from Alexander avenue to Brook avenue, with branches in Alexander and Willis avenues.

For the sewer and its appurtenances in One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, from 410 feet east of Willis avenue to Brook avenue, with branches in Brown place.

MADISON AVENUE BRIDGE.

Work upon the piers and abutments for this bridge has been progressed. The easterly draw-rest pier is completed, and the east abutment pier finished to within about twelve feet of the top. The dredging for the foundation of the two west piers is complete, and the driving of the piles

The dredging for the foundation of the two west piers is complete, and the driving of the piles commenced. The north guard pier has been carried up to within three feet of the top. Rip-rap has been placed around the face and ends of the draw-rest pier, and also at the abutment pier.

The examination for the foundations for the permanent approaches to the bridge has been finished. In consequence of the severity of the weather, the mason work was discontinued on 22d November last, leaving about one-third of the masonry remaining to be done.

Considerable progress has been made with the plans for a bridge to be built across the Harlem river above the High Bridge.

The work of regulating and grading Third avenue between One Hundred and Forty sevents.

The work of regulating and grading Third avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-seventh street and the Harlem river, has been completed.

Work on the sewer in One Hundred and Forty-second street, from Alexander to Brook avenue, has been continued. 541 lineal feet of 15-inch sewer pipe and 300 lineal feet of 12-inch sewer pipe have been laid, 12 manholes built, 745 cubic yards of rock excavated.

Drain in One Hundred and Forty-second street, between the old channel of Mill brook and Brook avenue sewer. 302 lineal feet of 8-inch pipe have been laid, 223 cubic yards of rock have been excavated.

Sewer and drain in One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, between the old channel of Mill brook and Brook avenue sewer.

196 lineal feet of 15-inch sewer pipe have been laid.

2 manholes have been built.

The assessment maps for sewers in Third avenue, One Hundred and Thirty-fourth, and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, will be completed soon. Considerable delay and difficulty has been encountered in getting the correct dimensions of the lots to be assessed, but as the surveys of these lots have been completed by the surveyors engaged in making the tax maps, no further delay will be

Spur maps and tracings of all sewers completed are being made, showing the exact locations of all house connections.

Maps and plans of sewers in One Hundred and Fifty-first street, from Courtland avenue to Third avenue to Grove street and along Grove street to Brook avenue have been made, and also a map showing receiving-basins and 12-inch pipe sewer between Melrose and Courtland avenues in One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street.

The assessment map for Brook avenue sewer is in course of preparation; all that portion of it east of Washington avenue, and from One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street to Fordham, covering an area of 250 acres, has been mapped during the quarter, and a description of each piece of property has been copied from the assessors' books at the tax office. The whole drainage area covered by this assessment is about 2.800 acres. assessment is about 2,800 acres.

The work of repairing and improving the Southern Boulevard was commenced on October 15. A little over one mile of the roadway has been finished for a width of sixteen feet through the centre, with broken trap-rock and a surfacing of trap-rock screenings or Roa Hook gravel. That portion of the roadway between Third avenue and the New Haven Railroad freight depot has had a severe trial and has withstood the wear and tear of the very heavy traffic admirably.

The work on Sedgwick avenue was begun on November 15. About 1,800 lineal feet of rubble foundation was laid 16 feet wide, and one course of broken trap-rock has been spread over a portion of the same; about 60 feet of drain pipe was laid, and a stone inlet and outlet built.

The work of maintaining the roads, avenues, bridges, etc., in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards has been continued.

The work of maintaining the roads, avenues, bridges, etc., in the I wenty-third and I wenty-fourth Wards has been continued.

Repairs have been made on Third avenue, One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, Southern Boulevard, Sedgwick avenue, Kingsbridge road, Berrian avenue, Jerome avenue, Riverdale avenue, Broadway, Mosholn avenue, Morris street, Williams Bridge road, Railroad avenue, Thomas avenue, Valentine avenue, Lincoln avenue, Morris avenue, and Robbins avenue.

The bridges over Mill brook at Pelham avenue, Morris street, and One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, over the Bronx river at Williams Bridge, Samuel street, Pelham avenue, and the Bleach bridge, and over Cromwell's creek at One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street and One Hundred and Sixty-first street, have been repaired. The sewers and drains have received attention through the district.

The Topographical work in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards has been continued, and during the past quarter 86 monuments have been set and reset, 54 monument points set, and 22,786 feet of traverse line run. The work of preparation of tax maps for this district is steadily progressing, and locations of property subdivisions within an area equal to about 3,160 city lots have been made.

METEOROLOGICAL OBSERVATORY—CENTRAL PARK.

During the past quarter, weekly reports have been issued to the CITY RECORD, Health Department, newspapers, and also two hundred monthly reports have been sent to home and foreign observatories and libraries.

Many applications have been made for the records taken by the self-recording instruments; among them may be mentioned the U. S. Census Commission, desiring the rainfall, not only for the times of beginning and ending, but also the rate at which it descended, in relation to the health and sewerage of the city.

By the tables the temperature for October, 1880, was 53.6 degrees, being 1.9 degree colder than the average for the past ten years.

Rain and Snow, 1880.

During the year rain fell on 101 days, having a duration of 25 days, 6 hours, 40 minutes, the amount of water being 32.99 inches.

Snow fell on 16 days, having a duration of 6 days, 6 hours, 30 minutes, and 27.6 inches depth, producing when melted 4.71 inches of water, making the total water fall for the year 37.7 inches, being the smallest annual rainfall since 1849, when it was 31.7 inches.

The prevailing wind for the year was northwest, and the total horizontal movement was 60,569 miles.

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances, resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending February 19, 1881.

Whereas, The sad intelligence of the death of the Hon. Fernando Wood, officially announced in this Board in a message from his Honor the Mayor, calls from us, the representatives of the people of this city, an expression of their profound sorrow, and imposes upon us the mournful duty of testifying in a marked manner to the general sorrow occasioned by the demise of our illustrious fellow citizen. The deceased statesman was, in his lifetime, well-known, honored, and beloved by the people of this city. He was a representative in Congress during the years 1841 and 1842; was chosen Mayor in 1854, and held that exalted office during the years 1855, 1856, 1857, 1860, and 1861. In 1865 he was again chosen a Representative in Congress, and was re-elected at each successive election for that office, up to and including the year 1880, when he was chosen for a full term, commencing December, 1881. He was pre-emmently a self-made man, having commenced active life in this city as an apprentice when but twelve years of age, where by untiring industry, patient application, persistent energy, and indomitable perseverance he secured for himself high public honors at the hands of a grateful and admiring constituency, and the world-wide reputation certain to result from the intelligent exercise of the unusual ability he possessed. His life was an eloquent commentary on the blessings and advantages of our popular system of republican government, which not only admits of, but assists in, the elevation of its citizens from the humblest walks in life, as it did him, to the highest honors and dignities in the State, and a prominent place in the affections of its people. His death is a public loss, as we look in vain for one so well qualified, either in ability or experience, to fill the place thus made vacant; be it therefore,

Resolved, That out of sorrow for the death and respect for the memory of Hon. Fernando Wood, it is hereby recommended that our citizens close their respective places of business, and refrain from any secular employment on the afternoon of the day to be set apart for solemnizing the funeral rites and ceremonies; that the members of the Common Council will attend his funeral in a body, with their staves of office draped in mourning, and that his Honor the Mayor, and the heads of the several departments of the city government, be requested to unite with the Common Council on the sad occasion; that the usual badge of mourning be worn for a period of thirty days; that the flags on the City Hall, and the other public buildings, be displayed at half-staff from sunrise until sunset on the same day; and the owners or masters of vessels in the harbor, and the owners or occupants of buildings in the city be requested to display their flags in like manner; that a special committee of five be appointed to proceed to the City of Washington, D. C., to represent this municipality at the obsequies in that city, and to accompany the remains to the City of New York; that the Governor's room in the City Hall be placed at the disposal of the committee, prepared appropriately for the reception of the remains, and that another special committee of five be appointed to per fec the above, and after consultation with his Honor the Mayor, and heads of departments, make such other and further arrangements as to them may appear better calculated more clearly and impressively to manifest sorrow for the death and reverence for the memory of the deceased.

Adopted unanimously by the Board of Aldermen, February 18, 1881, and Aldermen McAvoy, Finck, Murphy, B. Kenney, and Hilliard appointed the Special Committee to represent the City of New York, on the occasion of solemnizing the obsequies in the City of Washington, and Aldermen Sauer, Perley, Keenan, Waite, and Sheils appointed the Special Committee to perfect arrangements for funeral obsequies in the City of New York.

ASSESSMENT COMMISSION.

No. 27 Chambers Street, Tuesday, February, 15, 1881, 2 o'clock P. m.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 5, 1881. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,337, as follows, viz.:

I public building, 668 tenement-houses, 74 private dwellings, 57 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 19 stores and warehouses, 23 stables, 1 lime-kiln, 14 slaughter-houses, 2 manure dumps, I garbage dump, 2 lodging-houses, 3 gas-mains, I soap factory, 21 sunken and vacant lots, 3 uninhabitable dwellings, 25 yards, courts, and areas, 75 cellars and basements, 190 waste pipes and drains, 123 privies and water-closets, 3 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 8 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 6 cesspools, 7 other nuisances, together with 4 special visits to cases of contagious disease. contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 550.

During the past week 144 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. Permits were granted to the consignees of 25 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

53 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks. The Disinfecting Corps have visited 120 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 112 houses, 112 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

15 cases of contagious diseases were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

CHAPTER 123.

An Act in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and selfity-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax on having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPART-MENT-

MENT:

Section 3 of Chapter 521 of the Laws of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head of department may abolish and consolidate offices and bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same department."
